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1	HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 223
2	AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE
3	(Proposed by the House Committee on Rules)

3	House Amendments in [] — February 15, 2000
6	Continuing the Commission on Educational Infrastructure as the Commission on Educational
7	Infrastructure and Technology.
8	WHEREAS, beginning in the 1980s and gaining momentum in the 1990s, school construction and
9	technology issues have been paramount in the minds of many of Virginia's division superintendents,
10 11	school boards, and local government officials; and WIJEPEAS originally actablished pursuant to House Joint Desolution No. [125, 165, 1 (1006), the
12	WHEREAS, originally established pursuant to House Joint Resolution No. [135 165 ] (1996), the Commission on Educational Infrastructure was continued and expanded, with cochairmen established in
13	1998; and
14	WHEREAS, over the last several years, the Commission has implemented study plans to collect data
15	and background information on Virginia construction and educational technology programs and on the
16	programs implemented in other states; and
17	WHEREAS, in the last two years, the Commission has received presentations on North Carolina,
18 19	Ohio, and West Virginia, conducted a review of construction issues in other states in the Southern region, examined higher education methodology for determining space utilization, received data on the
20	Commonwealth's student demographics and the effects of facility needs, and initiated its own survey of
21	facilities' needs in Virginia; and
22	WHEREAS, during the 1999 interim, the final year of the twentieth century, the Commission
23	continued to receive data on the Literary Fund and from the Virginia Public School Authority; and
24 25	WHEREAS, the primary 1999 focus of the Commission was on the school of the new millennium, studying what the school of the twenty-first century will look like and how technology will impact
23 26	building design and curricula, school operations, teaching, student achievement, and student discipline;

28	WHEREAS, in accomplishing this goal, the Commission has received presentations on several
29	innovative, high-tech public school programs, such as the Henry County's Universal Laptop Initiative, a
30 31	unique collaboration between the local governing body and the school board to place a laptop computer in the homes of every fourth and eighth grade student and to expand this access to technology by one
31 32	grade each year until all students in grades four through 12 have access to this program; and
33	WHEREAS, the Commission received a presentation and a virtual tour of the Center for Applied
34	Technology and Career Exploration (CATCE) in Franklin County, a problem-based learning approach
35	that includes the Socratic method, project-based education, and discovery-based education in a high
36	technology, corporate-setting environment; and
37 38	WHEREAS, these presentations and the data received on Virginia's educational technology efforts have convinced the Commission of the importance and integral role of educational technology in this
39	new century; and
40	WHEREAS, the Commission received the final report on the survey of facilities needs that was
41	initiated in 1998, learning that 128 school divisions responded to the survey, providing data that
42	indicates structural problems in significant numbers of schools, with one-third of the respondents noting
43 44	the need for attention in the near future, 12 percent noting significant deficiencies, and three percent noting serious inadequacies; and
45	WHEREAS, of the 87 school divisions having capital improvement plans, approximately 68 percent,
46	over three billion dollars of construction needs are projected for five years between 1999 and 2003; and
47	WHEREAS, in addition to the almost \$900 million in non-debt expenditures, the total outstanding
48	indebtedness for school construction/infrastructure was reported as almost four billion dollars on June
49 50	30, 1998; and WHEREAS, the Commission has recommended the authorization of an escrow account for local
50 51	governing bodies to deposit the lottery funds appropriated in 1999 for education infrastructure in order
52	to empower those school divisions who were not able to spend the money in this fiscal year to carry the
53	funds forward; and
54	WHEREAS, the Commission has recommended the codification of the lottery distribution procedure
55 56	that was included in the 1999 budget; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring. That the Commission on Educational
56 57	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Commission on Educational Infrastructure be continued as the Commission on Educational Infrastructure and Technology.
58	The Commission shall be composed of 34 members, which shall include 22 legislative members, 8

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59 nonlegislative citizen members, and 4 ex officio members as follows: the Co-Chairmen of the House Committees on Appropriations, Finance, and Education, and six members of the House of Delegates to 60 61 be appointed by the Speaker of the House, in accordance with Rule 16 of the Rules of the House of 62 Delegates; the Chairmen of the Senate Committees on Finance and on Education and Health, and eight 63 members of the Senate to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; eight 64 citizens, one each who shall have expertise in commercial communications technology, educational 65 technology, school design and construction, and funding public school and capital construction, one licensed architect who specializes in school design, and one citizen at-large to be appointed by the 66 Speaker of the House; one representative each of the Virginia Municipal League and the Virginia 67 Association of Counties to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; the 68 Lieutenant Governor of Virginia; the Secretary of Education; the President of the Board of Education; 69 and the Superintendent of Public Instruction who shall serve ex officio with full voting privileges. 70

71 Staffing shall continue to be provided by the Division of Legislative Services, the House Committee 72 on Appropriations, and the Senate Committee on Finance. In addition, all agencies of the 73 Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Commission, upon request.

74 The direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$31,500.

75 The Commission shall complete its work in time to submit its written findings and recommendations
76 to the Governor and the 2001 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the
77 Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents.

78 Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint
 79 Rules Committee. The Committee may withhold expenditures or delay the period for the conduct of the
 80 study.
