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VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend and reenact §§ 22.1-26 and 22.1-212.5 through 22.1-212.15 of the Code of Virginia, 3 relating to public charter schools.

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Approved

6 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

7 1. That §§ 22.1-26 and 22.1-212.5 through 22.1-212.15 of the Code of Virginia are amended and 8 reenacted as follows:

§ 22.1-26. Joint and regional schools; regional public charter schools.

10 Two or more school boards may, with the consent of the State Board, establish joint or regional schools, including regional public charter schools as defined in § 22.1-212.5, for the use of their 11 12 respective school divisions and may jointly purchase, take, hold, lease, convey and condemn both real 13 and personal property for such joint, regional, or regional public charter schools. The school boards, 14 acting jointly, shall have the same power of condemnation as other school boards except that land so 15 condemned shall not be in excess of thirty acres for the use of any one joint or regional school. The title to all property acquired for such purposes shall vest jointly in the school boards in such respective 16 17 proportions as the school boards may determine, and the schools shall be managed and controlled by the 18 school boards jointly, in accordance with such regulations as are promulgated by the State Board. 19 However, the regulations in force at the time of the adoption of a plan for the operation of a joint, 20 regional, or regional public charter school shall not be changed for such joint, regional, or regional 21 public charter school by the State Board without the approval of the school boards. The school boards 22 operating a regional *public* charter school shall determine the school division to which any regional 23 *public* charter school is assigned for the purposes of any restrictions on the number of *public* charter 24 schools imposed by § 22.1-212.11.

§ 22.1-212.5. Objectives; definitions.

26 A. In order to (i) stimulate the development of innovative programs within public education; (ii) 27 provide opportunities for innovative instruction and assessment; (iii) provide parents and students with more options within their school divisions; (iv) provide teachers with a vehicle for establishing schools 28 29 with alternative innovative instruction and school scheduling, management and structure; (v) encourage 30 the use of performance-based educational programs; (vi) establish high standards for both teachers and 31 administrators; and (vii) develop models for replication in other public schools, *public* charter schools 32 may be established in Virginia as provided in this article. 33

B. As used in this article:

34 "At-risk pupil" means a student having a physical, emotional, intellectual, socioeconomic, or cultural 35 risk factor, as defined in Board of Education criteria, which research indicates may negatively influence 36 educational success.

37 "Public charter school" means a public, nonsectarian, nonreligious, or non-home-based alternative 38 school located within a public school division. A public charter school may be created as a new public 39 school or through the conversion of all or part of an existing public school; however, no public charter 40 school shall be established through the conversion of a private school or a nonpublic home-based 41 educational program.

42 "Regional public charter school" means a public charter school operated by two or more school 43 boards and chartered directly by the participating school boards. 44

§ 22.1-212.6. Establishment and operation of public charter schools; requirements.

45 A. A public charter school shall be subject to all federal and state laws and regulations and constitutional provisions prohibiting discrimination on the basis of disability, race, creed, color, gender, **46** national origin, religion, ancestry, or need for special education services and shall be subject to any 47 court-ordered desegregation plan in effect for the school division or, in the case of a regional public **48** 49 charter school, any court-ordered desegregation plan in effect for participating school divisions.

50 Enrollment shall be open to any child who is deemed to reside within the relevant school division or, 51 in the case of a regional public charter school, within any of the participating school divisions, as set forth in § 22.1-3, through a lottery process on a space-available basis. A waiting list shall be established 52 53 if adequate space is not available to accommodate all students whose parents have requested to be 54 entered in the lottery process. Such waiting list shall also be prioritized through a lottery process and 55 parents shall be informed of their student's position on the list.

56 B. A public charter school shall be administered and managed by a management committee,

composed of parents of students enrolled in the school, teachers and administrators working in the 57 58 school, and representatives of any community sponsors, in a manner agreed to by the *public* charter 59 school applicant and the local school board. Pursuant to a charter contract and as specified in 60 § 22.1-212.7, a *public* charter school may operate free from specified school division policies and state 61 regulations, except for and, as public schools, shall be subject to the requirements of the Standards of 62 Quality, including the Standards of Learning and the Standards of Accreditation.

C. Pursuant to a charter agreement, a *public* charter school shall be responsible for its own 63 operations, including, but not limited to, such budget preparation, contracts for services, and personnel 64 matters as are specified in the charter agreement. A *public* charter school may negotiate and contract 65 66 with a school division, the governing body of a public institution of higher education, or any third party 67 for the use of a school building and grounds, the operation and maintenance thereof, and the provision of any service, activity, or undertaking which the *public* charter school is required to perform in order to 68 carry out the educational program described in its charter. Any services for which a *public* charter 69 70 school contracts with a school division shall not exceed the division's costs to provide such services.

D. In no event shall a public charter school be required to pay rent for space which is deemed 71 72 available, as negotiated by contract, in school division facilities. All other costs for the operation and 73 maintenance of the facilities used by the *public* charter school shall be subject to negotiation between 74 the public charter school and the school division or, in the case of a regional public charter school, 75 between the regional public charter school and the participating school divisions. 76

E. A *public* charter school shall not charge tuition.

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§ 22.1-212.7. Contracts for public charter schools; release from certain policies and regulations.

78 An approved charter application shall constitute an agreement, and its terms shall be the terms of a 79 contract between the *public* charter school and the local school board or, in the case of a regional 80 public charter school, between the regional public charter school and the participating school boards. The contract between the *public* charter school and the local school board or participating school boards 81 shall reflect all agreements regarding the release of the *public* charter school from school division 82 83 policies. Such contract between the *public* charter school and the local school board or participating 84 school boards shall reflect all requests for release of the *public* charter school from state regulations, 85 except for the requirements of the Standards of Quality. The local school board or participating school boards, on behalf of the public charter school, shall request such releases from the Board of Education. 86

87 If the charter application proposes a program to increase the educational opportunities for at-risk 88 students, the local school board or participating school boards, as the case may be, on behalf of the 89 public charter school, shall also request that the Board of Education approve an Individual School 90 Accreditation Plan for the evaluation of the performance of the school as authorized by the Standards of 91 Accreditation pursuant to 8 VAC 20-131-280 C of the Virginia Administrative Code.

92 Any material revision of the terms of the contract may be made only with the approval of the local 93 school board or participating school boards and the management committee of the public charter school. 94 § 22.1-212.8. Charter application.

95 A. Any person, group, or organization may submit an application for the formation of a *public* 96 charter school.

97 B. The *public* charter school application shall be a proposed agreement and shall include:

98 1. The mission statement of the *public* charter school that must be consistent with the principles of 99 the Standards of Quality.

100 2. The goals and educational objectives to be achieved by the *public* charter school, which 101 educational objectives must meet or exceed the Standards of Learning.

102 3. Evidence that an adequate number of parents, teachers, pupils, or any combination thereof, support 103 the formation of a *public* charter school.

104 4. A statement of the need for a *public* charter school in a school division or participating school divisions in the case of a regional public charter school, or in a geographic area within a school 105 106 division or participating school divisions, as the case may be.

107 5. A description of the public charter school's educational program, pupil performance standards, and 108 curriculum, which must meet or exceed any applicable Standards of Quality; the assessments to be used to measure pupil progress towards achievement of the school's pupil performance standards; the timeline 109 110 for achievement of such standards; and the procedures for taking corrective action in the event that pupil performance at the *public* charter school falls below such standards. 111

112 6. A description of the lottery process to be used to determine enrollment. A lottery process shall also be developed for the establishment of a waiting list for such students for whom space is unavailable 113 114 and, if appropriate, a tailored admission policy that meets the specific mission or focus of the *public* charter school and is consistent with all federal and state laws and regulations and constitutional 115 provisions prohibiting discrimination that are applicable to public schools and with any court-ordered 116 desegregation plan in effect for the school division or, in the case of a regional public charter school, 117

118 *in effect for any of the participating school divisions.*

7. Evidence that the plan for the *public* charter school is economically sound for both the *public* charter school and the school division *or participating school divisions, as the case may be*; a proposed budget for the term of the charter; and a description of the manner in which an annual audit of the financial and administrative operations of the *public* charter school, including any services provided by the school division *or participating school divisions, as the case may be*, is to be conducted.

8. A plan for the displacement of pupils, teachers, and other employees who will not attend or be
employed in the *public* charter school and for the placement of *public* charter school pupils, teachers,
and employees upon termination or revocation of the charter.

9. A description of the management and operation of the *public* charter school, including the nature and extent of parental, professional educator, and community involvement in the management and operation of the *public* charter school.

130 10. An explanation of the relationship that will exist between the proposed *public* charter school and
131 its employees, including evidence that the terms and conditions of employment have been addressed
132 with affected employees.

133 11. An agreement between the parties regarding their respective legal liability and applicable134 insurance coverage.

135 12. A description of how the *public* charter school plans to meet the transportation needs of its 136 pupils.

137 13. Assurances that the *public* charter school (i) is nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies,
138 employment practices, and all other operations and (ii) does not charge tuition.

139 § 22.1-212.9. Review public charter school applications.

140 A. Public charter school applications shall only be received and reviewed by a local school board 141 or, in the case of a regional public charter school, by all of the participating school boards, after public notice, a public hearing, and adoption by the local school board or boards of a resolution stating its the 142 143 intent to receive applications for the establishment of such other public charter schools in the relevant 144 school division divisions; the local school board may receive and review all applications for charter 145 schools. The public notice shall appear once a week for two successive weeks in a newspaper having a 146 general circulation in the jurisdiction of the *relevant* school division divisions. The second publication 147 shall not be sooner than one calendar week after the first publication.

148 The Each local school board may that adopts a resolution announcing its intent to accept 149 applications for public charter schools and publishes such notice of its intent shall establish procedures 150 for receiving, reviewing, and ruling upon applications and shall make a copy of any such procedures 151 available to all interested parties upon request. If any such board finds the public charter school 152 application is incomplete, the board shall request the necessary information from the charter applicant.

B. To provide appropriate opportunity for input from parents, teachers, and other interested parties and to obtain information to assist the local school board boards in its their decision decisions to grant a *public* charter school application, the local school board boards may establish a procedure for public notice, comment, or hearings on *public* charter school applications.

157 *C. Each local school board shall provide public notice by December 31, 2000, of its intent to accept or not to accept applications for public charter schools.*

159 § 22.1-212.10. Decision of local board subject to review.

160 The decision of a local school board to grant or deny a *public* charter school application or to revoke 161 or fail to renew a charter agreement shall be final and not subject to appeal.

162 § 22.1-212.11. Public charter school restrictions.

163 A. On and after July 1, 1998, local school boards electing to receive applications for *public* charter 164 schools pursuant to § 22.1-212.9 may establish a *public* charter school schools within the school division and shall be authorized to limit the number of schools so established; however, the total number of 165 166 public charter schools, including those designed to increase educational opportunities for at-risk pupils but not including any regional public charter schools, shall not exceed ten percent of the school 167 168 division's total number of schools or two *public* charter schools, whichever is greater. Further, no more 169 than two charters per school division shall be granted prior to July 1, 2000. Priority shall be given to 170 *public* charter school applications designed to increase the educational opportunities of at-risk students, 171 and at least one-half of the *public* charter schools per division shall be reserved for such applications for 172 at-risk students.

B. Local school boards that grant *public* charter school applications shall report such action to the
Board and shall specify the maximum number of charters that may be authorized, if any; the number of
charters granted; and whether a *public* charter school is designed to increase the educational
opportunities of at-risk students.

177 C. Nothing in this article shall be construed to prevent a school that is the only school in the division from applying to become a *public* charter school.

179 § 22.1-212.12. Public charter school term; renewals and revocations.

180 A. A charter may be approved or renewed for a period not to exceed three school years. A *public* charter school renewal application submitted to the local school board or, in the case of a regional 181 182 public charter school, to the participating school boards shall contain:

183 1. A report on the progress of the *public* charter school in achieving the goals, objectives, program 184 and performance standards for students, and such other conditions and terms as the school board or boards may require upon granting initial approval of the charter application. 185

2. A financial statement, on forms prescribed by the Board, that discloses the costs of administration, 186 instruction, and other spending categories for the *public* charter school and that has been concisely and 187 188 clearly written to enable the school board or boards and the public to compare such costs to those of 189 other schools or comparable organizations. 190

B. A Local school board boards may revoke a charter if the *public* charter school:

191 1. Violates the conditions, standards, or procedures established in the *public* charter school 192 application;

193 2. Fails to meet or make reasonable progress toward achievement of the content standards or student 194 performance standards identified in the charter application; 195

3. Fails to meet generally accepted standards of fiscal management; or

4. Violates any provision of law from which the *public* charter school was not specifically exempted.

197 A charter may be revoked if the local school board determines, in its discretion, that it is not in the 198 public interest or for the welfare of the students within the school division to continue the operation of 199 the school or, in the case of a regional public charter school, to continue its participation in the 200 operation of the school.

201 C. Nothing in this section shall be construed to restrict the authority of the local school board boards 202 to decline to renew a charter agreement. 203

§ 22.1-212.13. Employment of professional, licensed personnel.

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204 A. Public charter school personnel shall be employees of the local school board or boards granting 205 the charter.

206 B. Professional, licensed personnel may volunteer for assignment to a *public* charter school. 207 Assignment in a *public* charter school shall be for one contract year. Upon request of the employee and 208 the recommendation of the management committee of the *public* charter school, reassignment to the 209 public charter school shall occur on an annual basis.

210 C. At the completion of each contract year, professional, licensed personnel who request assignment to a *public* noncharter school in the *relevant* school division or who are not recommended for 211 212 reassignment in the *public* charter school, other than for the grounds cited in § 22.1-307, shall be 213 guaranteed an involuntary transfer to a *public* noncharter school in the school division according to the 214 employment policies of the school division.

215 D. Professional, licensed personnel of a *public* charter school shall be granted the same employment benefits given to professional, licensed personnel in public noncharter schools in accordance with the 216 217 policies of the relevant school board or boards.

218 E. Nothing in this section shall be construed to restrict the authority of the local school board to 219 assign professional, licensed personnel to a *public* charter school or any other public school as provided 220 in §§ 22.1-293 and 22.1-295. 221

§ 22.1-212.14. Funding of public charter schools; services provided.

222 A. For the purposes of this article, students enrolled in a *public* charter school shall be included in 223 the average daily membership of the *relevant* school division; however, *public* charter schools shall not 224 be reported in fall membership for purposes of calculating the state and local shares required to fund the 225 Standards of Quality if the enrollment at the public charter school is less than 100 students and 226 constitutes less than five percent of the total enrollment of the relevant grades in that school division.

227 B. Insofar as constitutionally valid, a local school board or, in the case of a regional public charter 228 school, the participating school boards may establish by contract an agreement stating the conditions for 229 funding the *public* charter school.

230 C. Services provided the *public* charter school by the local school board or participating school 231 boards may include food services; custodial and maintenance services; curriculum, media, and library 232 services; warehousing and merchandising; and such other services not prohibited by the provisions of 233 this article or state and federal laws.

234 D. Funding and service agreements between local school boards and *public* charter schools shall not 235 provide a financial incentive or constitute a financial disincentive to the establishment of a *public* charter 236 school, including any regional public charter school.

237 E. Any educational and related fees collected from students enrolled at a *public* charter school shall 238 be credited to the account of such *public* charter school established by the *relevant* local school board.

F. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the proportionate share of state and federal resources 239

allocated for students with disabilities and school personnel assigned to special education programs shall
be directed to *public* charter schools enrolling such students. The proportionate share of moneys
allocated under other federal or state categorical aid programs shall be directed to *public* charter schools
serving students eligible for such aid.

G. The management committee of a *public* charter school is authorized to accept gifts, donations, or grants of any kind made to the *public* charter school and to spend such funds in accordance with the conditions prescribed by the donor. However, no gift, donation, or grant shall be accepted by the management committee of a *public* charter school if the conditions for such funds are contrary to law or the terms of the agreement between the local school board and the *public* charter school *or, in the case of a regional public charter school, the participating school boards and the regional public charter school.*

H. The Department of Education shall provide technical assistance to local school boards electing to receive, review, and act upon applications for *public* charter schools.

253 § 22.1-212.15. Evaluation of public charter schools; reports.

School boards establishing *public* charter schools shall submit annual evaluations of such schools to the Board of Education. The Board shall review the evaluations against any Board regulations and policies waived for the *public* charter schools to determine the efficacy of such waivers and whether the *public* charter schools accomplished established goals and objectives. Such school boards shall also submit annually to the Board a comparison of the performance of *public* charter school students and students enrolled in the regular schools of the *such relevant* school division and a report of the number of students enrolled in such *public* charter schools at the end of the school year.

The Board shall report annually its findings and evaluations of any *public* charter schools established in the Commonwealth to the Governor and the General Assembly, beginning in January 1999.
