3 4 5	Requesting the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) to study the progress made by the Department of Environmental Quality toward full implementation of the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and Restoration Act.

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11	WHEREAS, the 1997 General Assembly enacted the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and
12 13	Restoration Act; and WHEREAS, the 1996 and 1998 Virginia Water Quality Assessment Reports document that the
13 14	percentage of all free-flowing streams and rivers monitored for water quality throughout the
15	Commonwealth decreased from approximately 65 percent to 35 percent during a four-year period; and
16	WHEREAS, the 1998 Virginia Water Quality Assessment Report concluded that 48 percent of those
17	waters monitored are threatened or impaired for at least one designated use; and
18	WHEREAS, a 1996 report by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation entitled "Virginia's Waters Still at
19 20	Risk" found that the Department of Environmental Quality's (DEQ) assessment of water quality
20 21	monitoring data severely underestimated the amount of impaired waters throughout the Commonwealth, concluding that 65 percent of all waters monitored were polluted to some extent; and
$\frac{21}{22}$	WHEREAS, DEQ has strongly opposed the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's inclusion of the
$\overline{23}$	main stem of the Chesapeake Bay and several tidal tributaries in Virginia's most recent Impaired Waters
24	List and is currently operating under a federal directive to restore more than two thousand miles of
25	impaired streams and rivers over the next ten years; and
26	WHEREAS, the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and Restoration Act imposes numerous
27 28	requirements upon DEQ, specifically related to increased environmental monitoring, reporting and communication; and
20 29	WHEREAS, the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and Restoration Act is designed to provide
30	vital information to allow the citizens of Virginia to understand the conditions of the Commonwealth's
31	waters; and
32	WHEREAS, the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and Restoration Act requires DEQ to make
33 34	water quality information readily available to the public (e.g., by defining water segments in a specific and easily identifiable manner); and
35	WHEREAS, the activities required by the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and Restoration
36	Act have not been fully implemented; now, therefore, be it
37	RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Joint Legislative Review
38	and Audit Commission (JLARC) be requested to study the progress made by DEQ toward full
39	implementation of the Water Quality Monitoring, Information and Restoration Act. The study shall
40 41	include, but not be limited to, the effectiveness of DEQ in meeting its legislative directives relating to water quality, fish tissue and sediment monitoring, reporting, inspections, cleanup plans and citizen
41	notification provisions.
43	All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to JLARC for this study, upon request.
44	JLARC shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and recommendations to the Governor
45	and the 2001 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of
46	Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents.

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INTRODUCED
