012982732 1 **HOUSE BILL NO. 2776** 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 34 56 7 (Proposed by the Joint Conference Committee on February 24, 2001) (Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Dillard) A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 58.1-603, 58.1-604, 58.1-611.1, 58.1-614, 58.1-627, 58.1-628, and 58.1-638 of the Code of Virginia, relating to additional state sales and use tax in all counties having 8 a population of more than 800,000, as determined by the 1990 U.S. Census; all counties and cities 9 adjacent thereto; and all cities contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities and dedicating 10 revenues from such additional tax to education-related purposes in such localities and to a regional 11 transportation authority for any or all of such localities first created during either the 2001 or 2002 12 Session of the General Assembly; and authorizing the issuance of bonds by such authority in the 13 principal amount of \$2,380,000,000 for transportation projects in the Northern Virginia Regional 14 Transportation Program. 15 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That §§ 58.1-603, 58.1-604, 58.1-611.1, 58.1-614, 58.1-627, 58.1-628, and 58.1-638 of the Code of 16 17 Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 18 $\overline{\$}$ 58.1-603. Imposition of sales tax. A. There is hereby levied and imposed, in addition to all other taxes and fees of every kind now 19 20 imposed by law, a license or privilege tax upon every person who engages in the business of selling at retail or distributing tangible personal property in this Commonwealth, or who rents or furnishes any of 21 the things or services taxable under this chapter, or who stores for use or consumption in this 22 23 Commonwealth any item or article of tangible personal property as defined in this chapter, or who 24 leases or rents such property within this Commonwealth, in the amount of three and one-half percent: 25 1. Of the gross sales price of each item or article of tangible personal property when sold at retail or 26 distributed in this Commonwealth. 27 2. Of the gross proceeds derived from the lease or rental of tangible personal property, where the 28 lease or rental of such property is an established business, or part of an established business, or the 29 same is incidental or germane to such business. 30 3. Of the cost price of each item or article of tangible personal property stored in this 31 Commonwealth for use or consumption in this Commonwealth. 32 4. Of the gross proceeds derived from the sale or charges for rooms, lodgings or accommodations furnished to transients as set out in the definition of "retail sale" in § 58.1-602. 33 34 5. Of the gross sales of any services which are expressly stated as taxable within this chapter. B. Beginning April 1, 2003, through December 31, 2012, in addition to the tax imposed under 35 36 subsection A, an additional tax of one percent is hereby levied and imposed on the property and activities described in subsection Å in (i) all counties having a population of more than 800,000, as 37 38 determined by the 1990 U.S. Census; (ii) all counties and cities adjacent thereto; and (iii) all cities 39 contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities. 40 Beginning January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2037, in addition to the tax imposed under 41 subsection A, an additional tax of one-half of one percent is hereby levied and imposed on the property and activities described in subsection A in (i) all counties having a population of more than 800,000, as 42 determined by the 1990 U.S. Census; (ii) all counties and cities adjacent thereto; and (iii) all cities 43 44 contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities. 45 § 58.1-604. Imposition of use tax. A. There is hereby levied and imposed, in addition to all other taxes and fees now imposed by law, a 46 47 tax upon the use or consumption of tangible personal property in this Commonwealth, or the storage of such property outside the Commonwealth for use or consumption in this Commonwealth, in the amount **48** 49 of three and one-half percent: 50 1. Of the cost price of each item or article of tangible personal property used or consumed in this 51 Commonwealth. Tangible personal property which has been acquired for use outside this Commonwealth and subsequently becomes subject to the tax imposed hereunder shall be taxed on the basis of its cost 52 53 price if such property is brought within this Commonwealth for use within six months of its acquisition; 54 but if so brought within this Commonwealth six months or more after its acquisition, such property shall 55 be taxed on the basis of the current market value (but not in excess of its cost price) of such property at the time of its first use within this Commonwealth. Such tax shall be based on such proportion of the 56 57 cost price or current market value as the duration of time of use within this Commonwealth bears to the

58 total useful life of such property (but it shall be presumed in all cases that such property will remain
59 within this Commonwealth for the remainder of its useful life unless convincing evidence is provided to

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60 the contrary).

61 2. Of the cost price of each item or article of tangible personal property stored outside this62 Commonwealth for use or consumption in this Commonwealth.

63 3. A transaction taxed under § 58.1-603 shall not also be taxed under this section, nor shall the same transaction be taxed more than once under either section.

4. The use tax shall not apply with respect to the use of any article of tangible personal property brought into this Commonwealth by a nonresident individual, visiting in Virginia, for his personal use, while within this Commonwealth.

5. The use tax shall not apply to out-of-state mail order catalog purchases totaling \$100 or less during any calendar year.

B. Beginning April 1, 2003, through December 31, 2012, in addition to the tax imposed under
subsection A, an additional tax of one percent is hereby levied and imposed on the property and
activities described in subsection A in (i) all counties having a population of more than 800,000, as
determined by the 1990 U.S. Census; (ii) all counties and cities adjacent thereto; and (iii) all cities
contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities.

Beginning January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2037, in addition to the tax imposed under
subsection A, an additional tax of one-half of one percent is hereby levied and imposed on the property
and activities described in subsection A in (i) all counties having a population of more than 800,000, as
determined by the 1990 U.S. Census; (ii) all counties and cities adjacent thereto; and (iii) all cities

79 contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities.

80 § 58.1-611.1. Rate of tax on sales of food purchased for human consumption; Food Tax Reduction
81 Program.

A. Subject to the conditions of subsections D and E, the tax imposed by §§ subsection A of 58.1-603
and subsection A of 58.1-604 on food purchased for human consumption shall be levied and distributed
as follows:

1. From January 1, 2000, through March 31, 2001, the tax rate on such food shall be three percent of the gross sales price. The revenue from the tax shall be distributed as follows: (i) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one-half percent shall be distributed as provided in subsection A of § 58.1-638, (ii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one percent shall be distributed as provided in subsections B, C and D of § 58.1-638, and (iii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one and one-half percent shall be used for general fund purposes.

2. From April 1, 2001, through March 31, 2002, the tax rate on such food shall be two and one-half
percent of the gross sales price. The revenue from the tax shall be distributed as follows: (i) the revenue
from the tax at the rate of one-half percent shall be distributed as provided in subsection A of
§ 58.1-638, (ii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one percent shall be distributed as provided in
subsections B, C and D of § 58.1-638, and (iii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one percent shall
be used for general fund purposes.

97 3. From April 1, 2002, through March 31, 2003, the tax rate on such food shall be two percent of the gross sales price. The revenue from the tax shall be distributed as follows: (i) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one-half percent shall be distributed as provided in subsection A of § 58.1-638, (ii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one percent shall be distributed as provided in subsections B, C and D of § 58.1-638, and (iii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one-half percent shall be used for general fund purposes.

4. On and after April 1, 2003, the tax rate on such food shall be one and one-half percent of the gross sales price. The revenue from the tax shall be distributed as follows: (i) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one-half percent shall be distributed as provided in subsection A of § 58.1-638 and (ii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one percent shall be distributed as provided in subsections B, C and D of § 58.1-638.

B. The provisions of this section shall not affect the imposition of tax on food purchased for humanconsumption pursuant to §§ 58.1-605 and 58.1-606.

C. As used in this section, "food purchased for human consumption" has the same meaning as "food"
defined in the Food Stamp Act of 1977, 7 U.S.C. § 2012, as amended, and federal regulations adopted
pursuant to that Act, except it shall not include seeds and plants which produce food for human
consumption.

114 D. Notwithstanding the tax rates set forth in subsection A, the rate of tax on sales of food purchased 115 for human consumption for any twelve-month period beginning on or after April 1, 2001, shall not be 116 reduced below the rate then in effect for the Commonwealth's current fiscal year if:

117 1. Actual general fund revenues for the fiscal year preceding a fiscal year in which a rate reduction
118 is contemplated in subsection A do not exceed the official general fund revenue estimates for such
119 preceding fiscal year, as estimated in the most recently enacted and approved general appropriation act,
120 by at least one percent; or

121 2. Any of the events listed in subsection C of § 58.1-3524 or subsection B of § 58.1-3536 have

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122 occurred during the then current fiscal year.

E. If the tax rate on food purchased for human consumption remains the same for the period January 124 1, 2000, through March 31, 2001, and the subsequent twelve-month period beginning on April 1, 2001, 125 or with respect to any consecutive twelve-month periods beginning on and after April 1, 2001, the tax 126 rate on such food shall remain the same unless none of the conditions described in subsection D have 127 occurred, in which event the tax rate on food purchased for human consumption for the immediately 128 following twelve-month period shall be equal to the next lowest tax rate listed in subsection A.

129 F. There is hereby created on the books of the Comptroller a nonreverting fund entitled the Food 130 Tax Reserve Fund which shall be used solely for the statutory purposes of the Food Tax Reduction 131 Program as established by this section, and as may be provided for in the general appropriation act. For 132 the purpose of the Comptroller's preliminary and final annual reports required by § 2.1-207, all balances 133 remaining in the Fund on June 30 of each year shall be considered a portion of the fund balance of the 134 general fund of the state treasury.

135 *G.* The tax imposed by subsection *B* of § 58.1-603 and by subsection *B* of § 58.1-604 shall not apply **136** to food purchased for human consumption.

137 § 58.1-614. Vending machine sales.

138 A. Notwithstanding the provisions of §§ 58.1-603 and 58.1-604, whenever a dealer makes sales of 139 tangible personal property through vending machines, or in any other manner making collection of the 140 tax impractical, as determined by the Tax Commissioner, such dealer shall be required to report his 141 wholesale purchases for sale at retail from vending machines and shall be required to remit an amount 142 based on four and one-half percent of such wholesale purchases, except that such wholesale purchases 143 shall be taxed at the following rates in the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 and 144 subsection B of § 58.1-604: (i) beginning April 1, 2003, through December 31, 2012, at a rate of five 145 and one-half percent; (ii) beginning January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2037, at a rate of five percent; and (iii) beginning January 1, 2038, at a rate of four and one-half percent. 146

B. Notwithstanding the provisions of §§ 58.1-605 and 58.1-606, dealers making sales of tangible personal property through vending machines shall report and remit the one percent local sales and use tax computed as provided in subsection A of this section.

150 C. The provisions of subsections A and B of this section shall not be applicable to vending machine 151 operators all of whose machines are under contract to nonprofit organizations. Such operators shall 152 report only the gross receipts from machines selling items for more than ten cents and shall be required 153 to remit an amount based on a percentage of their remaining gross sales established by the Tax 154 Commissioner to take into account the inclusion of sales tax.

D. Notwithstanding any other provisions in this section or § 58.1-628, when the Tax Commissioner
determines that it is impractical to collect the tax in the manner provided by those sections, such dealer
shall be required to remit an amount based on a percentage of gross receipts which takes into account
the inclusion of the sales tax.

E. The provisions of this section shall not be applicable to any dealer who fails to maintain records satisfactory to the Tax Commissioner. A dealer making sales of tangible personal property through vending machines shall obtain a certificate of registration under § 58.1-613 in relevant form for each county or city in which he has machines.

186 Except in the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of § 58.1-604, On 187 on transactions over greater than five dollars, the tax shall be computed at three and one-half percent, 188 one-half cent or more being treated as one cent. In the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603189 and subsection B of § 58.1-604, on transactions greater than five dollars, the tax shall be computed at 190 four and one-half percent beginning April 1, 2003, through December 31, 2012; four percent beginning 191 January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2037; and three and one-half percent beginning January I, 192 2038, one half cent or more being treated as one cent. If a dealer can show to the satisfaction of the 193 Tax Commissioner that more than eighty-five percent of the total dollar volume of his gross taxable 194 sales during the taxable month was from individual sales at prices of ten cents or less each, and that he 195 was unable to adjust his prices in such manner as to prevent the economic incidence of the sales tax 196 from falling on him, the Tax Commissioner shall determine the proper tax liability of the dealer based on that portion of the dealer's gross taxable sales which was from sales at prices of eleven cents or 197 198 more. 199

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227 Except in the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of § 58.1-604, On on transactions over greater than five dollars, the tax shall be computed at four and one-half percent, 228 229 one half cent or more being treated as one cent. In the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 230 and subsection B of § 58. \overline{I} -604, on transactions greater than five dollars, the tax shall be computed at five and one-half percent beginning April 1, 2003, through December 31, 2012; five percent beginning 231 232 January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2037; and four and one-half percent beginning January 1, 233 2038, one half cent or more being treated as one cent. The foregoing bracket system shall not relieve 234 the dealer from the duty and liability to remit an amount equal to four and one-half percent of his gross 235 taxable sales as provided in this chapter. If the dealer, however, can show to the satisfaction of the Tax 236 Commissioner that more than eighty-five percent of the total dollar volume of his gross taxable sales 237 during the taxable month was from individual sales at prices of ten cents or less each and that he was 238 unable to adjust his prices in such manner as to prevent the economic incidence of the sales tax from 239 falling on him, the Tax Commissioner shall determine the proper tax liability of the dealer based on that portion of the dealer's gross taxable sales which was from sales at prices of eleven cents or more. 240

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§ 58.1-638. Disposition of state sales and use tax revenue; Transportation Trust Fund; localities' 241 242 share; Game Protection Fund.

243 A. The Comptroller shall designate a specific revenue code number for all the state sales and use tax 244 revenue collected under the preceding sections of this chapter.

245 1. The sales and use tax revenue generated by the one-half percent sales and use tax increase enacted 246 by the 1986 Special Session of the General Assembly shall be paid, in the manner hereinafter provided 247 in this section, to the Transportation Trust Fund as defined in § 33.1-23.03:1. Of the funds paid to the 248 Transportation Trust Fund, an aggregate of 4.2 percent shall be set aside as the Commonwealth Port 249 Fund as provided in this section; an aggregate of 2.4 percent shall be set aside as the Commonwealth 250 Airport Fund as provided in this section; and an aggregate of 14.5 percent in fiscal year 1998-1999 and 14.7 percent in fiscal year 1999-2000 and thereafter shall be set aside as the Commonwealth Mass 251 252 Transit Fund as provided in this section. The Fund's share of such net revenue shall be computed as an 253 estimate of the net revenue to be received into the state treasury each month, and such estimated 254 payment shall be adjusted for the actual net revenue received in the preceding month. All payments shall 255 be made to the Fund on the last day of each month.

256 2. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund which shall 257 be a part of the Transportation Trust Fund and which shall be known as the Commonwealth Port Fund.

258 a. The Commonwealth Port Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and the funds 259 remaining in such Fund at the end of a biennium shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in 260 the Fund. Interest earned on such funds shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Funds may be 261 paid to any authority, locality or commission for the purposes hereinafter specified.

262 b. The amounts allocated pursuant to this section shall be allocated by the Commonwealth Transportation Board to the Board of Commissioners of the Virginia Port Authority to be used to 263 264 support port capital needs and the preservation of existing capital needs of all ocean, river, or tributary 265 ports within the Commonwealth.

266 c. Commonwealth Port Fund revenue shall be allocated by the Board of Commissioners to the 267 Virginia Port Authority in order to foster and stimulate the flow of maritime commerce through the ports of Virginia, including but not limited to the ports of Richmond, Hopewell and Alexandria. 268

269 3. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund which shall 270 be part of the Transportation Trust Fund and which shall be known as the Commonwealth Airport Fund. 271 The Commonwealth Airport Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and any funds 272 remaining in such Fund at the end of a biennium shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in 273 the Fund. Interest earned on the funds shall be credited to the Fund. The funds so allocated shall be 274 allocated by the Commonwealth Transportation Board to the Virginia Aviation Board. The funds shall 275 be allocated by the Virginia Aviation Board to any Virginia airport which is owned by the 276 Commonwealth, a governmental subdivision thereof, or a private entity to which the public has access 277 for the purposes enumerated in § 5.1-2.16, or is owned or leased by the Metropolitan Washington 278 Airports Authority (MWAA), as follows:

279 Any new funds in excess of \$12.1 million which are available for allocation by the Virginia Aviation 280 Board from the Commonwealth Transportation Fund, shall be allocated as follows: sixty percent to 281 MWAA, up to a maximum annual amount of two million dollars, and forty percent to air carrier airports 282 as provided in subdivision A 3 a. Except for adjustments due to changes in enplaned passengers, no air 283 carrier airport sponsor, excluding MWAA, shall receive less funds identified under subdivision A 3 a 284 than it received in fiscal year 1994-1995. 285

Of the remaining amount:

286 a. Forty percent of the funds shall be allocated to air carrier airports, except airports owned or leased 287 by MWAA, based upon the percentage of enplanements for each airport to total enplanements at all air 288 carrier airports, except airports owned or leased by MWAA. No air carrier airport sponsor, however, 289 shall receive less than \$50,000 nor more than \$2 million per year from this provision.

290 b. Forty percent of the funds shall be allocated by the Aviation Board for air carrier and reliever 291 airports on a discretionary basis, except airports owned or leased by MWAA.

292 c. Twenty percent of the funds shall be allocated by the Aviation Board for general aviation airports 293 on a discretionary basis.

294 4. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund which shall 295 be a part of the Transportation Trust Fund and which shall be known as the Commonwealth Mass 296 Transit Fund.

297 a. The Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and 298 any funds remaining in such Fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the general fund but 299 shall remain in the Fund. Interest earned on such funds shall be credited to the Fund. Funds may be 300 paid to any local governing body, transportation district commission, or public service corporation for 301 the purposes hereinafter specified.

302 b. The amounts allocated pursuant to this section may be used to support a maximum of fifty percent 303 of the public transportation administrative costs and up to eighty percent of the costs of ridesharing 304 programs borne by the locality. These amounts may be used to support up to ninety-five percent of the 305 local or nonfederal share of capital project costs for public transportation and ridesharing equipment, 306 facilities, and associated costs. Capital costs may include debt service payments on local or agency 307 transit bonds. Further, these amounts may be used to support a maximum of ninety-five percent of the 308 costs borne by the locality for the purchase of fuels, lubricants, tires and maintenance parts and supplies 309 for public transportation. The term "borne by the locality" means the local share eligible for state assistance consisting of costs in excess of the sum of fares and other operating revenues plus federal 310 311 assistance received by the locality.

312 c. Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund revenue shall be allocated by the Commonwealth313 Transportation Board as follows:

(1) Funds for special programs, which shall include ridesharing, experimental transit, and technical
 assistance, shall not exceed 1.5 percent of the Fund.

(2) The Board may allocate these funds to any locality or planning district commission to finance up
 to eighty percent of the local share of all costs associated with the development, implementation, and
 continuation of ridesharing programs.

319 (3) Funds allocated for experimental transit projects may be paid to any local governing body,
 320 transportation district commission, or public corporation or may be used directly by the Department of
 321 Rail and Public Transportation for the following purposes:

(a) To finance up to ninety-five percent of the capital costs related to the development,
 implementation and promotion of experimental public transportation and ridesharing projects approved
 by the Board.

325 (b) To finance up to ninety-five percent of the operating costs of experimental mass transportation326 and ridesharing projects approved by the Board for a period of time not to exceed twelve months.

(c) To finance up to ninety-five percent of the cost of the development and implementation of any
other project designated by the Board where the purpose of such project is to enhance the provision and
use of public transportation services.

d. Funds allocated for public transportation promotion and operation studies may be paid to any local
 governing body, planning district commission, transportation district commission, or public transit
 corporation, or may be used directly by the Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the
 following purposes and aid of public transportation services:

(1) At the approval of the Board to finance a program administered by the Department of Rail and
 Public Transportation designed to promote the use of public transportation and ridesharing throughout
 Virginia.

(2) To finance up to fifty percent of the local share of public transportation operations planning andtechnical study projects approved by the Board.

e. At least 73.5 percent of the Fund shall be distributed to each transit property in the same proportion as its operating expenses bear to the total statewide operating expenses and shall be spent for the purposes specified in subdivision 4 b.

f. The remaining twenty-five percent shall be distributed for capital purposes on the basis of
ninety-five percent of the nonfederal share for federal projects and ninety-five percent of the total costs
for nonfederal projects. In the event that total capital funds available under this subdivision are
insufficient to fund the complete list of eligible projects, the funds shall be distributed to each transit
property in the same proportion that such capital expenditure bears to the statewide total of capital
projects.

g. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund known as 348 349 the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. The Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall be part of the 350 Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund. The Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund subaccount shall be 351 established on the books of the Comptroller and consist of such moneys as are appropriated to it by the 352 General Assembly and of all donations, gifts, bequests, grants, endowments, and other moneys given, 353 bequeathed, granted, or otherwise made available to the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. Any funds 354 remaining in the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the 355 general fund, but shall remain in the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. Interest earned on funds 356 within the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall remain in and be credited to the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. Proceeds of the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund may be paid to any political 357 358 subdivision, another public entity created by an act of the General Assembly, or a private entity as 359 defined in § 56-557 and for purposes as enumerated in subdivision 4c of § 33.1-269 or expended by the 360 Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the purposes specified in this subdivision. Revenues of the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall be used to support capital expenditures involving the 361 establishment, improvement, or expansion of public transportation services through specific projects 362 approved by the Commonwealth Transportation Board. Projects financed by the Commonwealth Transit 363

364 Capital Fund shall receive local, regional or private funding for at least twenty percent of the nonfederal365 share of the total project cost.

5. Funds for Metro shall be paid by the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) to the
Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) and be a credit to the Counties of
Arlington and Fairfax and the Cities of Alexandria, Falls Church and Fairfax in the following manner:

a. Local obligations for debt service for WMATA rail transit bonds apportioned to each locality
using WMATA's capital formula shall be paid first by NVTC. NVTC shall use ninety-five percent state
aid for these payments.

b. The remaining funds shall be apportioned to reflect WMATA's allocation formulas by using the
related WMATA-allocated subsidies and relative shares of local transit subsidies. Capital costs shall
include twenty percent of annual local bus capital expenses. Hold harmless protections and obligations
for NVTC's jurisdictions agreed to by NVTC on November 5, 1998, shall remain in effect.

Appropriations from the Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund are intended to provide a stable andreliable source of revenue as defined by Public Law 96-184.

B. The sales and use tax revenue generated by a one percent sales and use tax shall be distributed among the counties and cities of this Commonwealth in the manner provided in subsections C and D.

C. The localities' share of the net revenue distributable under this section among the counties and cities shall be apportioned by the Comptroller and distributed among them by warrants of the Comptroller drawn on the Treasurer of Virginia as soon as practicable after the close of each month during which the net revenue was received into the state treasury. The distribution of the localities' share of such net revenue shall be computed with respect to the net revenue received into the state treasury during each month, and such distribution shall be made as soon as practicable after the close of each such month.

387 D. The net revenue so distributable among the counties and cities shall be apportioned and 388 distributed upon the basis as certified to the Comptroller by the Department of Education, of the number 389 of children in each county and city according to the most recent statewide census of school population 390 taken by the Department of Education pursuant to § 22.1-284, as adjusted in the manner hereinafter provided. No special school population census, other than a statewide census, shall be used as the basis 391 392 of apportionment and distribution except that in any calendar year in which a statewide census is not 393 reported, the Department of Education shall adjust such school population figures by the same percent of 394 annual change in total population estimated for each locality by The Center for Public Service. The 395 revenue so apportionable and distributable is hereby appropriated to the several counties and cities for 396 maintenance, operation, capital outlays, debt and interest payments, or other expenses incurred in the 397 operation of the public schools, which shall be considered as funds raised from local resources. In any 398 county, however, wherein is situated any incorporated town constituting a school division, the county 399 treasurer shall pay into the town treasury for maintenance, operation, capital outlays, debt and interest 400 payments, or other expenses incurred in the operation of the public schools, the proper proportionate 401 amount received by him in the ratio that the school population of such town bears to the school 402 population of the entire county. If the school population of any city or of any town constituting a school 403 division is increased by the annexation of territory since the last preceding school population census, 404 such increase shall, for the purposes of this section, be added to the school population of such city or 405 town as shown by the last such census and a proper reduction made in the school population of the 406 county or counties from which the annexed territory was acquired.

407 E. Beginning July 1, 2000, of the remaining sales and use tax revenue, the revenue generated by a 408 two percent sales and use tax, up to an annual amount of \$13 million, collected from the sales of 409 hunting equipment, auxiliary hunting equipment, fishing equipment, auxiliary fishing equipment, 410 wildlife-watching equipment, and auxiliary wildlife-watching equipment in Virginia, as estimated by the most recent U.S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service and U.S. Department of 411 Commerce, Bureau of the Census National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated 412 Recreation, shall be paid into the Game Protection Fund established under § 29.1-101 and shall be used, 413 414 in part, to defray the cost of law enforcement. Not later than thirty days after the close of each quarter, 415 the Comptroller shall transfer to the Game Protection Fund the appropriate amount of collections to be 416 dedicated to such Fund. At any time that the balance in the Capital Improvement Fund, established 417 under § 29.1-101.1, is equal to or in excess of \$35 million, any portion of sales and use tax revenues 418 that would have been transferred to the Game Protection Fund, established under § 29.1-101, in excess 419 of the net operating expenses of the Board, after deduction of other amounts which accrue to the Board 420 and are set aside for the Game Protection Fund, shall remain in the general fund until such time as the 421 balance in the Capital Improvement Fund is less than \$35 million.

422 F. If errors are made in any distribution, or adjustments are otherwise necessary, the errors shall be 423 corrected and adjustments made in the distribution for the next quarter or for subsequent quarters.

424 G. 1. The revenue generated and collected from the additional one percent tax, beginning April 1,

425 2003, through December 31, 2012, pursuant to subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of
426 § 58.1-604, shall be paid into the state treasury to the credit of a special fund that is hereby created on
427 the Comptroller's books under the name "Collections of Additional Sales and Use Taxes." Such revenue
428 shall be distributed as follows:

429 a. One-half of the amount of such revenue generated in each such county and city described in 430 subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of § 58.1-604 shall be distributed to the respective county 431 or city from which such revenue was generated in accordance with the same procedures for the collection of sales tax moneys pursuant to subsection E of § 58.1-605 and the same procedures for the 432 collection of use tax moneys pursuant to subsections E and F of § 58.1-606. Such revenue shall be used 433 solely within the respective county or city and only for capital projects for public school construction 434 and infrastructure improvements including, but not limited to, technology infrastructure; additions, 435 renovations, and retrofitting of existing school buildings; new school construction; site acquisition; and 436 437 debt service payments, but only for debt service payments on such capital projects completed subsequent 438 to July 1, 1991, but prior to July 1, 2002.

b. The remaining revenue generated and collected from such additional one percent tax shall be
distributed to a regional transportation authority established to address and act upon the transportation
needs of any or all of the counties and cities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B
of § 58.1-604. Such regional transportation authority shall have been created by legislation passed by
the 2001 Session of the General Assembly or the 2002 Session of the General Assembly, and such
legislation shall have been signed into law by the Governor. Such revenue shall be used exclusively for
transportation projects and purposes.

2. The revenue generated and collected from the additional one-half of one percent tax, beginning
January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2037, pursuant to subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B
of § 58.1-604, shall be paid into the state treasury to the credit of the "Collections of Additional Sales
and Use Taxes" fund and shall be distributed to such regional transportation authority and shall be
used by the authority exclusively for transportation projects and purposes.

451 3. The revenue distributed under this subsection to the counties and cities described in subsection B 452 of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of § 58.1-604 and to such regional transportation authority shall be 453 considered funds raised from local sources. Such revenue shall be distributed by warrant of the 454 Comptroller drawn on the Treasurer of Virginia as soon as practicable after the close of each month 455 during which it was received into the state treasury. The revenue credited and distributed pursuant to 456 this subsection shall be the gross revenue generated and collected from the additional taxes provided 457 under this subsection less the applicable portion of any refunds to taxpayers.

458 GH. The term "net revenue," as used in this section, means the gross revenue received into the general fund or the Transportation Trust Fund of the state treasury under the preceding sections of this chapter, less refunds to taxpayers.

461 2. That the additional state sales and use taxes provided under this act shall be levied and imposed only if approved in a referendum. The referendum shall be held in accordance with § 24.2-684. 462 463 Only the qualified voters in the following counties and cities shall vote on the referendum question: all counties having a population of more than 800,000, as determined by the 1990 U.S. 464 465 Census; all counties and cities adjacent thereto; and all cities contiguous to such adjacent counties 466 and cities. The clerks of the circuit courts for such counties and cities shall publish notice of the 467 referendum in a newspaper of general circulation in the respective county or city once a week for three consecutive weeks prior to the referendum. The referendum shall be held on the Tuesday 468 469 after the first Monday in November 2002. The regular election officers of such counties and cities 470 shall open the polls on such day and shall take the sense of the qualified voters on such additional 471 state sales and use taxes in such counties and cities, as provided under this act.

472 The ballot used shall be printed to read as follows:

473 "Shall an additional state sales and use tax be imposed in Arlington County, Fairfax County, 474 Loudoun County, Prince William County, the City of Alexandria, the City of Fairfax, the City of 475 Falls Church, the City of Manassas, and the City of Manassas Park beginning April 1, 2003, in accordance with Chapter (...Chapter number...) of the 2001 Acts of Assembly in the following 476 amounts: (i) one-half of one percent until December 31, 2012, with the revenues generated in each 477 478 locality to be used by each locality solely for capital projects for public school construction and infrastructure improvements and (ii) one-half of one percent until December 31, 2037, to be used 479 solely for transportation projects and purposes as specified in Chapter (...Chapter number...) of 480 481 the 2001 Acts of Assembly?

- 3. That the regional transportation authority described in this act, if created under law, shall issue
 bonds for the following transportation projects and purposes as follows:
- **486** § 1. Title. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Northern Virginia Regional Transportation"

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487 Program Bond Act of 2001."

488 § 2. For purposes of this act, the following definitions shall apply:

489 "Authority" means a regional transportation authority (i) established to address and act upon the transportation needs of any or all of the following: all counties having a population of more than 800,000, as determined by the 1990 U.S. Census, all counties and cities adjacent thereto, and all cities contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities, and (ii) created by legislation passed by the 2001
493 Session of the General Assembly or the 2002 Session of the General Assembly, with such legislation having been signed into law by the Governor.

495 "Program" means the Northern Virginia Regional Transportation Program.

496 "Project" means the transportation projects included in the program.

497 § 3. The Program shall consist of the following projects: Dulles Corridor Transit (local share for
498 Fairfax and Loudoun counties), I-66 improvements and rail extension (west of I-495), I-95 improvements
499 and rail extension, Route 1 improvements, Techway/Eastern Potomac River crossing, I-495 highway and
500 transit improvements, Fairfax County Parkway, Tri-County/Loudoun Parkway, VRE new railcars, Route
501 234 Bypass extended/Route 659 relocated, Metrorail capital improvements (including railcar purchase
502 and station enhancements), secondary system improvements, urban system improvements (including
503 Arlington County), Route 7 Loudoun, Route 7 Fairfax, Columbia Pike/Route 7 Transit, Cities of
504 Alexandria and Fairfax transit (bus) capital improvements, and PRTC Bus purchase/facilities.

505 § 4. The Authority is hereby authorized to issue at one time or from time to time bonds in an aggregate 506 principal amount not exceeding \$2,380,000,000 to finance the costs of the projects plus an amount for 507 the issuance costs, capitalized interest, reserve funds, and other financing expenses (the "Bonds"). The 508 proceeds of the Bonds shall be used exclusively for the purpose of providing funds, with any other 509 available funds, for paying the costs incurred or to be incurred for construction or funding of the projects which comprise the program, consisting of environmental and engineering studies, rights-of-way 510 511 acquisition, improvements to all modes of transportation, construction and related improvements (the "projects"). Such costs may include the payment of interest on the Bonds for a period during 512 construction and not exceeding one year after completion of construction of the projects. 513

514 § 5. The projects, and the amount of bonds authorized to be issued for each such project, are as follows

566 Bond proceeds allocated for Secondary System Improvements shall be allocated on the basis of
567 population as determined by the 2000 U.S. Census for improvements in the following counties: Fairfax
568 County, Loudoun County, and Prince William County. Bond proceeds allocated for Urban System
569 Improvements shall be allocated on the basis of population as determined by the 2000 U.S. Census for
570 improvements in the following counties, cities, and towns: Arlington County, Alexandria, Fairfax City,
571 Falls Church, Manassas, Manassas Park, Dumfries, Leesburg, Vienna, and Herndon.

572 To the extent that the sales and use tax revenues distributed to the Authority pursuant to subsection G 573 of § 58.1-638 of the Code of Virginia exceed the amount needed to pay annual debt service on bonds issued to support the Program projects in any particular fiscal year, the Authority may allocate a 574 575 portion of such excess funds to transportation projects subject to the following conditions: (a) upon the 576 recommendations of the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of 577 § 58.1-604 of the Code of Virginia, up to twenty percent of such portion shall be allocated to new or 578 expanded transit operational costs, (b) the remaining portion of such funds shall be allocated to the 579 Program projects provided that the Commonwealth Transportation Board determines such allocations will materially advance the construction of such Program projects, and (c) upon the recommendations of 580 581 the localities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 and subsection B of § 58.1-604 of the Code of 582 Virginia, any remaining portion of such funds shall be allocated to fund other transit, primary, urban, 583 or secondary project or projects.

584 § 6. The Authority is further authorized to borrow money in anticipation of the issuance of the bonds
585 authorized under § 4 by the issuance of bond anticipation notes ("BANs"), including BANS as
586 commercial paper.

587 § 7. Application of Proceeds. Proceeds (including any premium) of the bonds and any BANs (except the 588 proceeds of (i) bonds the issuance of which has been anticipated by BANs, (ii) refunding bonds and (iii) 589 refunding BANs) shall be deposited in a special capital outlay fund of the Authority and shall be 590 disbursed only for the purpose for which the bonds or any BANs have been issued. In the event that the 591 proceeds of the bonds or BANs exceed the cost of the projects specified in § 5, the Authority shall cause 592 such excess proceeds to be applied to the retirement of the bonds or BANs. The proceeds of (i) bonds the issuance of which has been anticipated by BANs, (ii) refunding bonds and (iii) refunding BANs and 593 594 any funds provided by the General Assembly, or available from any other source, for the purpose, shall 595 be used to pay such BANs, refunded bonds and refunded BANs. 596 The Authority is hereby authorized to increase the appropriation for any project listed in § 5 by the

596 The Authority is hereby authorized to increase the appropriation for any project listed in § 5 by the
 597 amount of the proceeds of donations, gifts, grants or other source of moneys paid to the Authority in
 598 excess of such appropriation.

599 § 8. Details, sale of bonds and BANs. The bonds shall be dated, shall mature at such time or times not
600 exceeding thirty-five years from their date or dates and may be made redeemable before their maturity
601 or maturities at such price or prices or within such price parameters, all as may be determined by the
602 Authority. The principal of the bonds shall be amortized, by payment into a sinking fund or otherwise,
603 in annual installments. The first annual installment of principal of the bonds shall be more than
604 than one-tenth of the term of the bonds, and no installment of principal of the bonds shall be more than

605 twice the smallest previous installment. Any such sinking fund shall not be appropriated for any other

606 *purpose*.

607 The bonds shall be in such form, shall bear interest at such rate or rates, either at fixed rates or at 608 rates established by formula or other method, and may contain such other provisions, all as the 609 Authority may determine. The principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the bonds and BANs 610 shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America. Bonds and BANs may be certificated or uncertificated as determined by the Authority. The Authority may contract for services of such 611 612 registrars, transfer agents, or other authenticating agents as it deems appropriate to maintain a record 613 of the persons entitled to the bonds and BANs. Bonds and BANs may be issued under a system of book 614 entry for recording the ownership and transfer of ownership of rights to receive payments on the bonds 615 and BANs. The Authority shall fix the denomination or denominations of the bonds and the place or places of payment of principal, premium, if any, and interest, which may be at the office of the 616 617 Authority or at any one or more banks or trust companies within or without the Commonwealth.

618 The Authority may sell the bonds and any BANs in such manner, either by competitive bidding, 619 negotiated sale or private placement, and for such price as it may determine.

620 The bonds and BANs shall be signed on behalf of the Authority by the chairman of the Authority, or 621 shall bear his facsimile signature. In the event that the bonds or BANs bear the facsimile signature of 622 the chairman, they shall be signed by such administrative assistant as the chairman shall determine or 623 by such registrar or paying agent as may be designated to sign them by the Authority. If any officer 624 whose signature or facsimile signature shall appear on any bonds or BANs shall cease to be such 625 officer before the delivery, such signature or such facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for 626 all purposes the same as if such officer had remained in office until such delivery, and any bond or 627 BAN may bear the facsimile signature of, or may be signed by, such persons as at the actual time of the 628 execution are the proper officers to sign such bond or BAN although, at the date of such bond or BAN, 629 such persons may not have been such officers.

630 § 9. Refunding. The Authority is hereby authorized to sell and issue, at one time or from time to time, 631 refunding bonds and BANs, to refund any or all of the bonds and BANs, respectively, issued under this 632 act. Refunding bonds or BANs may be issued in a principal amount up to the amount necessary to pay 633 at maturity or redeem the bonds and BANs to be refunded and pay all issuance costs and other 634 financing expenses of the refunding. Such refunding bonds and BANs may be issued whether or not the 635 bonds or BANs to be refunded are then subject to redemption. Any escrow or trust fund established with 636 the proceeds from the sale of refunding bonds shall be irrevocably pledged to the payment of the bonds 637 to be refunded, and shall be used solely to pay such bonds or BANs at maturity or upon redemption or 638 for the purchase of not less than all of the bonds or BANs to be refunded. 639 § 10. Authorized Investments. Pending the application of the proceeds of the bonds or BANs (including

640 refunding bonds and BANs) to the purpose for which they have been authorized and the application of
641 funds set aside for the purpose to the payment of bonds or BANs, they may be invested by the Authority
642 in legal investments under the laws of the Commonwealth for public funds and sinking funds, as the
643 case may be. Whenever the Authority receives interest from the investment of the proceeds of bonds or
644 any BANs, such interest shall become a part of the principal of the bonds or any BANs and shall be
645 used in the same manner as required for principal of the bonds or BANs.

646 § 11. The bonds authorized under § 4 may be issued without obtaining the consent of any commission, 647 board, bureau or agency of the Commonwealth or of any political subdivision, and without any 648 proceedings or the happening of conditions or things other than those proceedings, conditions or things 649 that are specifically required under this act; however, each debt offering for such bonds shall be 650 submitted to the State Treasurer sufficiently prior to the sale of such offering to allow the State 651 Treasurer to undertake a review for the sole purposes of determining (i) whether the offering may 652 constitute tax-supported debt of the Commonwealth and (ii) the potential impact of the offering on the 653 debt capacity of the Commonwealth. After such review, the State Treasurer shall determine if the 654 offering constitutes tax-supported debt of the Commonwealth and the potential impact of the offering on 655 the debt capacity of the Commonwealth. If the State Treasurer determines that the debt offering may 656 constitute tax-supported debt of the Commonwealth, then the debt offering shall be submitted to the 657 General Assembly for approval of the issuance of such debt. Any debt offering submitted to the General 658 Assembly under this act may be issued only upon approval of such issuance by both houses of the 659 General Assembly. The Authority may issue such types of bonds as it may determine consistent with the provisions of §§ 4 and 5 of this act and subject to § 14 of this act, including, without limitation, bonds 660 661 payable as to principal and interest from any one or more of the following sources: (a) its revenues 662 generally, including distributions paid or payable to the Authority pursuant to § 58.1-638 of the Code of 663 Virginia; (b) income and revenues derived from the operation, sale or lease of a particular project or 664 projects, whether or not they are financed from the proceeds of such bonds; (c) funds realized from the enforcement of security interests or other liens or obligations securing such bonds; (d) proceeds from 665 the sale of bonds; (e) payments under letters of credit, policies of bond insurance, guarantees or other 666

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667 *credit enhancements; (f) any reserve or sinking funds created to secure such payment; (g) accounts* **668** *receivable of the Authority; or (h) other available funds of the Authority.*

669 § 12. Security for bonds and BANs. The proceeds of (i) bonds the issuance of which has been
670 anticipated by BANs, (ii) refunding bonds and (iii) refunding BANs are hereby irrevocably pledged for
671 the payment of principal of and interest and any premium on such bonds or BANs to be refunded
672 thereby.

673 Any bond authorized under this act may be issued pursuant to or secured by a trust indenture, deed of 674 trust or mortgage of any property of the Authority, whether or not financed, in whole or in part, from 675 the proceeds of such bonds, by a trust or other agreement with a corporate trustee, which may be any 676 trust company or bank having the powers of a trust company within or without the Commonwealth, or 677 other agent for bondholders, or any combination thereof. Any such trust indenture or other agreement 678 may pledge or assign revenues, fees, rents and other charges to be received and may contain provisions 679 for protecting and enforcing the rights and remedies of the bondholders as may be reasonable and 680 proper and not in violation of law. Such provisions may include covenants: (i) providing for the collection and application of revenues and sale by the Authority, or any trustees under any trust 681 **682** indenture or agreement, of any property upon default; (ii) setting forth duties of the Authority in 683 relation to the acquisition, construction, maintenance, operation and insurance of any property of the **684** Authority and the amounts of fees, rents and other charges to be charged; (iii) providing for the 685 collection of revenues, fees, rents and other charges, and the custody, safeguarding and application of all moneys of the Authority; (iv) providing for the creation of sinking funds and the creation and 686 maintenance of reserves; and (v) setting forth conditions or limitations with respect to the incurrence of **687** 688 indebtedness or the granting of mortgages or other liens. Such trust indenture, trust or other agreement 689 may set forth the rights and remedies of the bondholders and of the trustee or other agent for 690 bondholders and may restrict the individual right of action by bondholders.

691 In addition, the Authority may grant mortgages, deeds of trust, security interests and other liens on its 692 real and personal property, including its accounts receivable, to secure bonds. All pledges of revenues 693 of the Authority for payment of bonds shall be valid and binding from the time when the pledge is 694 made, and the revenues pledged and thereafter received by the Authority shall be subject immediately to 695 the lien of such pledge without any physical delivery thereof or further act, and the lien of any such **696** pledge shall be valid and binding as against all parties having claims of any kind in tort, contract or 697 otherwise against the Authority, irrespective of whether such parties have notice thereof. The Authority 698 may also provide for the recording or filing of any mortgage, deed of trust, security interest or other 699 lien, or any financing statement or other instrument, necessary or desirable to create, perfect or 700 evidence any lien created pursuant to this act.

701 It shall be lawful for any bank or trust company within or without the Commonwealth to serve as
702 depository of the proceeds of bonds or of other revenues of the Authority and to furnish indemnifying
703 bonds or to pledge such securities as may be required by the Authority.

704 All expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of such trust indenture or agreement or resolution 705 or other agreements relating to any project may be treated as a part of the costs of a project.

706 § 13. Except to the extent that the rights herein given may be restricted by such trust indenture or trust 707 or other agreement, any holder of bonds or coupons authorized under this act and the trustee or other 708 agent for bondholders under any trust indenture or trust or other agreement may, either at law or in 709 equity, by suit, action, injunction, mandamus or other proceedings, protect and enforce any and all 710 rights under the laws of the Commonwealth or granted under this act or under such trust indenture, 711 trust or other agreement, and may enforce and compel the performance of all duties required under this 712 act or by such trust indenture, trust or other agreement to be performed by the Authority or by any 713 officer or agent thereof, including the fixing, charging and collecting of revenues, fees, rents and other 714 charges.

715 § 14. No member, officer, employee or agent of the Authority or any person executing bonds of the 716 Authority shall be liable personally on the bonds by reason of their issuance or execution. Bonds of the 717 Authority shall not be a debt or pledge of the full faith and credit of the Commonwealth or any political 718 subdivision thereof other than the Authority and shall so state on their face. Neither the Commonwealth 719 nor any political subdivision thereof other than the Authority shall be obligated to pledge taxing power 720 or appropriate or otherwise be liable for payment of bonds of the Authority, nor shall such bonds be 721 payable out of any funds or properties of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof other 722 than those of the Authority. Bonds of the Authority are declared to be issued for an essential public and 723 governmental purpose. 724

§ 15. Expenses. All expenses incurred under this act shall be paid from the proceeds of the bonds, or*any refunding bonds or BANs, or from any other available funds as the Authority may determine.*

726 § 16. Bonds issued by the Authority under the provisions of this act are hereby made securities in which
 727 all public officers and public bodies of the Commonwealth and its political subdivisions, all insurance

728 companies, trust companies, banking associations, investment companies, executors, administrators,

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- 729 trustees and other fiduciaries may properly and legally invest funds, including capital in their control or 730 belonging to them. Such bonds are hereby made securities that may properly and legally be deposited 731 with and received by any state or municipal officer or any agency or political subdivision of the 732 Commonwealth for any purpose for which the deposit of bonds or obligations is now or may hereafter
- 733 be authorized by law.
- 734 § 17. Exemption of interest from tax. The bonds and BANs issued under the provisions of this act, their 735 transfer, and the income therefrom, including any profit made on the sale thereof, shall at all times be 736 exempt from taxation by the Commonwealth and by any political subdivision thereof. The interest on the 737 bonds and any refunding bonds or BANs may be subject to inclusion in gross income of the holders 738 thereof for federal income tax purposes.
- 739 § 18. Severability. The provisions of this act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance 740 which are held invalid shall not affect the validity of other provisions or applications of this act which 741 can be given effect without the invalid provisions or applications.
- 742 4. Except as provided in this act, no state or local agency, department, board, commission, office 743 or other body shall have any control over the use of any revenues distributed to the regional 744 transportation authority described in this act or over the amount of such revenues distributed to 745 the authority pursuant to this act.
- 746 5. That the Department of Taxation, in accordance with the state sales and use tax increase 747 provided in this act, shall promulgate regulations, pursuant to the Administrative Process Act 748 (§ 9-6.14:1 et seq.), establishing brackets of prices and associated state and combined state and 749 local sales and use taxes on transactions of five dollars or less.
- 750 6. That the revenues distributed to counties and cities and to the regional transportation authority 751 pursuant to subsection G of § 58.1-638 shall not diminish or replace allocations or appropriations 752 for educational or transportation purposes made by any locality within the counties or cities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 or subsection B of § 58.1-604, the Commonwealth, or any 753 754 other source, but shall be supplemental to all such other allocations. In addition, the revenues 755 dedicated to transportation purposes pursuant to subsection G of § 58.1-638 shall not be used to 756 calculate or reduce the share of local, federal, or state revenues otherwise available to any locality within the counties or cities described in subsection B of § 58.1-603 or subsection B of § 58.1-604 757
- 758 or to the Northern Virginia construction district.
- 759 7. That if any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part of this act or the application thereof to any person, entity, or circumstance is adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, 760 761 such judgment shall not affect the validity of the remainder hereof but shall be confined to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part hereof directly involved in the controversy in which 762 763 such judgment shall have been rendered, and to this end the provisions of this act are severable.
- 764 8. That, except for the referendum in the second enactment of this act, the provisions of this act 765 shall be effective on April 1, 2003, only if (i) a majority of those voting at the election and upon 766 the question described in the second enactment of this act vote in the affirmative on the question 767 presented, and (ii) a regional transportation authority established to address and act upon the 768 transportation needs of any or all of the localities described in the second enactment of this act 769 shall have been created by legislation passed by the 2001 Session of the General Assembly or the 770 2002 Session of the General Assembly, and signed into law by the Governor. For purposes of this act, "a majority of those voting at the election" means a majority of those voting in the entire 771 772 region constituted by the localities described in such second enactment, and does not require a 773 majority of those voting in each locality. The referendum described in the second enactment of 774 this act shall not be held if the regional transportation authority described under this act is not 775 created by legislation passed by the 2001 Session of the General Assembly or the 2002 Session of 776 the General Assembly, and signed into law by the Governor.
