014698400 1 **SENATE BILL NO. 1331** 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 3 (Proposed by the Senate Committee on Education and Health 4 5 6 7 on January 25, 2001) (Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Barry) A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-202 of the Code of Virginia, relating to the Pledge of Allegiance in the public schools of the Commonwealth. 8 Whereas, Congress enacted the statute setting out the Pledge of Allegiance during the early stages of 9 World War II at a time when national unity and concentrated effort were essential; and 10 Whereas, during the difficult days of World War II and the decades that have followed, the Pledge 11 of Allegiance has symbolized our strength; and Whereas, the Pledge of Allegiance is recited daily by many children and adults in the United States; 12 13 and 14 Whereas, the Pledge of Allegiance symbolizes our national ideals and is an expression of our 15 patriotic sentiment; and 16 Whereas, it is in our national and state interest to teach the children of our country about the history 17 and values of the United States; now, therefore Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 18 1. That § 22.1-202 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 19 20 § 22.1-202. Instruction in history and principles of flags of United States and Virginia; pledge of 21 allegiance to American flag; guidelines developed by the Board. 22 A. Instruction in the history and principles of the flag of the United States and the flag of the 23 Commonwealth shall be given in one or more grades in every school division. The instruction shall 24 include the pledge of allegiance and the appropriate etiquette and conventions for respecting the dignity 25 and appropriate display of such flags. 26 In recognition of the civic heritage of the United States of America, all students shall be required to 27 learn the Pledge of Allegiance and to demonstrate such knowledge. B. To promote compliance with constitutional restrictions as well as observance of constitutional 28 29 rights, the Board of Education shall, in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General, develop 30 guidelines on constitutional rights and restrictions relating to the recitation of the pledge of allegiance to 31 the American flag in public schools. 32 The Board's guidelines shall include, but shall not be limited to, provisions which address the 33 following: the initiative and involvement of local school boards, individual schools, administrators, 34 teachers, and students; the propriety and constitutionality of any recitation or participation requirements; 35 appropriate etiquette and conventions for respecting the dignity and appropriate display of the flag of the 36 United States and the flag of the Commonwealth; and relevant state and federal constitutional concerns, 37 such as freedom of speech and religion. 38 These guidelines shall not be subject to the requirements of the Administrative Process Act 39 (§ 9-6.14:1 et seq.). However, to provide appropriate opportunity for involvement by the general public, 40 teachers, and local school boards, the Board of Education shall conduct public hearings prior to 41 establishing such guidelines. Thirty days prior to conducting such hearings, the Board shall give written 42 notice by mail of the date, time, and place of the hearings to all local school boards and any other persons requesting to be notified of the hearings and publish notice of its intention to hold such hearings 43 in the Virginia Register of Regulations. Interested parties shall be given reasonable opportunity to be 44 45 heard and present information prior to the adoption of such guidelines. C. Each school board shall require the daily recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance in each 46 classroom of the school division and shall ensure that an American flag is in place in each such 47 classroom. Each school board shall determine the appropriate time during the school day for the **48** recitation of the Pledge. During such Pledge of Allegiance, students shall stand and recite the Pledge 49 50 while facing the flag with their right hands over their hearts or in an appropriate salute if in uniform; 51 however, no student shall be compelled to recite the Pledge if he, his parent or legal guardian objects on religious or philosophical grounds to his participating in this exercise. Students who are thus exempt 52 53 from reciting the Pledge shall remain quietly standing or sitting at their desks while others recite the 54 Pledge and shall make no display that disrupts or distracts others who are reciting the Pledge. School boards shall provide appropriate accommodations for students who are unable to comply with the 55 procedures described herein due to disability. School boards shall establish rules of conduct that 56 57 prohibit disruptive behavior during the recitation of the Pledge and shall provide, after observing the due process requirements of § 22.1-277, a penalty in the form of suspension from regular school 58 59 attendance until such time as the student has provided satisfactory assurances that he will conform to

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- 60 the Pledge procedure or exemption procedure provided herein.
 61 D. The Office of the Attorney General shall intervene and shall provide legal defense of the provisions of this section.
