014399404 **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 373** 1 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 3 (Proposed by the House Committee on Rules 4 5 6 7 on February 19, 2001) (Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Bolling) Continuing the Commission Studying the Future of Virginia's Environment. WHEREAS, the 1996 Session of the General Assembly passed House Joint Resolution 221, creating 8 a study to examine the history of environmental and natural resources programs and funding for such 9 programs in the Commonwealth and to develop a long-term vision and plan for the future management 10 of Virginia's natural resources; and 11 WHEREAS, the 1998 Session of the General Assembly passed House Joint Resolution 136 and the 1999 Session of the General Assembly passed House Joint Resolution 719 continuing the study on the 12 13 future of Virginia's environment; and 14 WHEREAS, the 2000 Session of the General Assembly passed House Joint Resolution 76 continuing 15 the study on the future of Virginia's environment; and WHEREAS, two Senate Joint Resolutions, Senate Joint Resolution 133, requesting a study of the 16 17 strategies to reduce the amount of solid waste being deposited in Virginia's landfills, and Senate Joint Resolution 217, requesting a study of the need to expand the best management practices for the 18 nonpoint program to include urban land uses, were referred to the Commission; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the Commission has formed subcommittees on the Chesapeake 2000 Agreement, solid 21 waste, and parks and land conservation to receive testimony not only on the two resolutions but on such 22 timely environmental issues as the tributaries strategies, the total maximum daily load (TMDL) 23 requirements, land use and growth, oyster replenishment, the regulatory programs for medical waste and 24 nontidal wetlands, and the Water Quality Improvement Act; and 25 WHEREAS, the Commission has not completed its work on the two resolutions and on the numerous 26 issues before it this year; and 27 WHEREAS, due to a continuing desire to monitor the implementation of the Commission's numerous 28 recommendations and a recognition of the role the Commission has established for itself as a body of 29 experts on emerging environmental issues, the Commission members agree that the Commission should 30 continue for an additional year; now, therefore, be it 31 RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Commission Studying the 32 Future of Virginia's Environment be continued. The Commission shall consist of 18 members, which 33 shall include 10 legislative members, seven nonlegislative members, and one ex officio member, to be 34 appointed as follows: four members of the Senate to be appointed by the Senate Committee on 35 Privileges and Elections; six members of the House of Delegates to be appointed by the Speaker of the House in accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the 36 37 House of Delegates; seven citizen members, three to be appointed by the Senate Committee on 38 Privileges and Elections and four to be appointed by Speaker of the House; and the Secretary of Natural 39 Resources, or his designee, who shall serve ex officio without voting privileges. 40 In conducting its study, the Commission shall continue to monitor the implementation of its 41 recommendations and create opportunities for the members of the Commission to become educated on environmental issues that may require legislative action. 42 The direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$16,000. 43 The Division of Legislative Services shall provide staff support for the study. All agencies of the 44 Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Commission, upon request. 45 The Commission shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and recommendations by 46 47 November 30, 2001, to the Governor and the 2002 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative **48** 49 documents. 50 Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint Rules Committee. The Committee may withhold expenditures or delay the period for the conduct of the 51 52 study.

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
