022607796 **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 90** 1 2 Offered January 9, 2002 3 Prefiled January 8, 2002 4 Continuing the Joint Commission on Prescription Drug Assistance. 5 Patrons—Jones, S.C. and McQuigg 6 7 Referred to Committee on Rules 8 9 WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution No. 810 established a joint commission to study and develop 10 ways and means to provide prescription drug assistance to needy senior citizens and to coordinate state and federal programs providing such assistance; and 11 WHEREAS, during the course of the study the joint commission examined the approaches being 12 13 used by at least 29 other states who have established or authorized some type of program to provide 14 pharmaceutical coverage or assistance, primarily to low-income elderly or persons with disabilities who 15 do not qualify for Medicaid; and 16 WHEREAS, these programs are of great importance to the individuals that fall into these income categories because it is estimated that health care expenditures accounted for 32 percent of income for 17 18 older persons in the lowest fifth of the income distribution scale and prescription drug costs accounted 19 for 40 percent of out-of-pocket payments for health care goods and services; and 20 WHEREAS, although enrollment across the country has increased over the last year, still only about 21 three percent of Medicare beneficiaries are covered by such programs; and WHEREAS, in Virginia, the Medicare-eligible population is approximately 930,000, with approximately 400,000 of those people without any form of prescription assistance from Medigap, 22 23 24 employer-sponsored, or other type of prescription assistance plan, and many of those plans cover only a 25 fraction of the cost; and 26 WHEREAS, because of their age and accompanying physical ailments, Medicare beneficiaries are 27 more vulnerable to high prescription costs because of their disproportionate use of prescription 28 medication: and 29 WHEREAS, Medicaid is a health insurance entitlement program funded jointly by federal and state government for certain low-income populations, including about 12 percent of Medicare beneficiaries 30 31 nationwide; and 32 WHEREAS, participants in the Medicaid program receive prescription drug assistance but the 33 program in Virginia is limited to those eligible persons whose income is 80 percent of the federal 34 poverty level or less; and 35 WHEREAS, Virginia, in FY 2000, spent approximately \$223 million, 2.2 percent of it total general 36 fund budget, on prescription drugs, accounting for an 86 percent increase over what was spent in 1996 37 for persons receiving services from the Departments of Medical Assistance Services, Mental Health, 38 Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services, Health, Corrections, Juvenile Justice, and Human 39 Resource Management; and 40 WHEREAS, although the federal government has made some preliminary commitments towards 41 instituting a Medicare prescription program or providing funding to the states to enable them to initiate their own programs, a recent court issued an injunction halting the proposed federal program and recent 42 events of the fall have preempted funding for any programs at the current time; and 43 WHEREAS, the joint commission, after analyzing a number of approaches, planned to issue interim 44 45 recommendations to address the needs of those persons in the lowest income range to help them meet 46 the high cost of their prescription drugs, but felt that it was premature for a number of reasons to offer a 47 final recommendation for a comprehensive prescription drug plan; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Joint Commission on 48 49 Prescription Drug Assistance be continued. The Commission shall be composed of eight members, which shall include six legislative members and two nonlegislative members as follows: four members 50 51 of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House, in accordance with the 52 principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the House of Delegates; two members 53 of the Senate, to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; one nonlegislative member at-large to be appointed by the Speaker of the House; and, one nonlegislative member at-large 54 55 to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections. Staffing shall continue to be provided by the Division of Legislative Services. 56 All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Joint Commission, upon request. 57 58 The direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$10,200.

The Joint Commission shall complete its work by November 30, 2002, and shall submit its written 59 60

findings and recommendations to the Governor and the 2003 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents. 61 62
