Summary/Purpose: Thislegislation proposes to require that each applicant for initial registration, licensure, or certification as a compliance agent, priv at esecurity services training school, instructor, or unarmed security of ficer submithis finger prints for the conduct of a criminal record scheck. The billals or equires an unarmed security of ficer applying for renewal between January 1,2003 and Decembe r31,2004 to submithis finger prints for the purpose of a criminal record scheck. The billals oauthorizes the Department to suspenda registration, license, or certification based on the conviction of certain misdemean or sor any felony and provides that making a false statement on the finger print cards hall be a Class 5 felony. In addition, the billest ablishes compulsory minimum standards for armored car personnel and exempts from the requirement for licensure, registration, or certification persons en gaged in the business of a consumer reporting agency as defined by the Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act.

- **8. Fiscalimplications:** The fiscalimpact of this legislation is uncreased in the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) advises that the inclusion of unarmed security of ficers will increase the number of finger print cards coming into the agency by approximately 9,000 each year. The agency also advises that it only yreceives approximately \$40 fthe \$41 feech arged to process these finger prints as the remaining \$37 goes to the general fund via the Virginia Department of State Police (DSP). DCJS advises that its processing costs exceed the \$4 they collect.

Revised

The Dep artment of State Police advises that it estimates approximately 8,500 new finger print cards would need to be processed to meet this new requirement.

Related to the proposed Class 5 felony penalty for will fulviolation of this proposed provision, there is no expected be dimpact on the state's adultor juvenile correctional systems from the proposed legislation.

TheGeneralAssemblydidnotprovideanyfundingorpositionsforthisbill. The Private Security Services Section of DCJS is presently not gener at ing sufficient revenue to fully cover its operating expenses. This proposed legislation could exacerbate this problem, as expenditures are expected to be higher than the revenue generated by this action.
