Themaximumsentencefora Class 6 felony is five years; for a Class 5 felony, tenyears. Although the proposed legislation would increase the penalty for solicitation to commit murder, it is expected to have little or no impact on prison bedspace. According to the Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission, none of the convictions for criminal solicitation during the most recent two years for which data is available involved physical injury or death of a victim. Because solicitation cases involving death are rare, the Commission concluded that any impact on prison bedspace, while it could not be determined, would be very small.
