Background

DSSoperatesthecurrentenergyassistanceprogramwithfourFTEcentralofficestaff,22 centralofficepart -timestaff,noregionalstaff,andpart -timestaffin122localdepartmentsof socialse rvices. The totalisroughly equivalent to approximately 45FTEs working year -round (the work is concentrated during the heating season and the total number of individuals working during that periodisconsiderably larger).

InFY2001,theDepartmentpro vided\$2.1milliontolocalitiesforlocalenergy administration.ActualLowIncomeHomeEnergyAssistanceProgram(LIHEAP)benefitsto low-incomefamiliesneedingenergyassistancetotalsabout\$35million.Localagencies generallyusetemporary(seasona l)workerstoaccept,review,anddetermineeligibilityforthe existingenergyassistanceprogram.Theselocalagenciesindicatethatcurrentfundingis

inadequatetoconductsuchalabor -intensive programand that they are subsidizing energy assistance activities from their eligibility budgets for other programs.

Staffin the DSS energy assistance unit will absorb these new responsibilities within existing resources.

ProgramActivities

Theresponsibilitiesmandatedin§63.1 -339.A.2through4willb einitiatedduringFY2003 andwouldbeacontinuingpartoftheprogram.Responsibilitieswouldinvolvecentraloffice staff,butwouldnotinitiallyaffectlocaldepartmentsofsocialservicesorrequireregional staff.Thesepositionswouldhaverespo nsibilityforthefollowingnon -benefitaspectsofthe legislativemandate:

- Interagencyandpublic/privatecoordination(§63.1 -339.A.2)
- Designandsupervisetheneedsassessmentofenergyservicesstatewide,includingunmet need(§63.1 -339.A.3)
- Developa ndmaintainastatewidelistofavailableprivateandgovernmentalresourcesfor lowincomeVirginiansinneedofenergyassistance(§63.1 -339.A.4)
