5. Summary/Purpose:

 $The bill remo \ vest he Department for Rights of Virginians with Disabilities from the executive branch and makes it an independent state agency renamed the Virginia Office for Protection and Advocacy. The bill creates a governing board for the Office consisting of 11 me mbers who are appointed by the Governor and the General Assembly for staggered terms. The Office is given the authority to access facilities and programs, receive notification of deaths in state facilities and to protect the confidentiality of records. In addition to making it an independent agency, the bill adds two additional responsibilities: (1) Monitor compliance with human rights regulations and make the reports available to the publicand (2) Establish within the Office anom buds man program and create the Protection and Advocacy Fund.$

- 7. Budgetamend mentnecessary: Yes, Items 86 -89 and new items under Independent Agencies starting at Item 532
- 8. Fiscalimplications: The proposal to create an independent agency from the Department for the Rights of Virginians with Disabilities (DRVD) can be accomplished with minimal fiscal impact that can be absorbed by the agency's federal funding. Annual costs for four meetings of the governing board are estimated at \$17,056 in federal funds.

However, this bill also createst wonew duties and responsibilities for the new agency that will require additional state funding and positions. This revision changes the estimated costs for the agency to implement these new duties and responsibilities. The revision assumes that the new agency can monitor compliance with uman rights regulations using the compliance monitoring results of the Office of Human Rights in the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services (DMHMRSAS).

Because of the number of additional people assigned to the agency may have to relocate. Any relocation expenses are not included.

Monitorhumanrightsregulations .Thebillrequiresthenewagencytomonitorcompliance withhumanrightsregulationspursuanttoArticle3ofChapter2ofTitle37.1.These regulations applynotonlytothe15statefacilitiesundertheDepartmentofMentalHealth,Mental RetardationandSubstanceAbuseServices(DMHMRSAS),butalsotoallprovidersthatare licensedbyorhaveacontractwithDMHMRSAS.Thisincludesprivate providers,the40 CommunityServicesBoards,andgrouphomes,orapproximately500additionalproviders including49privatehospitalsatapproximately1,200locations.

Section 37.1 -84.1 currently requires DMHMRSAS to monitor compliance with the human rights regulations by these providers. DMHMRSAS estimates that approximately one -third of the work for 25 staffinits Office of Human Rights is required to monitor compliance with human rights regulations. This office also receives assistance in monitor in geompliance from staff members assigned to the licensing function.

The estimated costs for the new agency to monitor compliance with human rights regulations assume that the new agency can perform the monitoring through review of the DMHMRSAS efforts. The estimated costs assume that two compliance investigators are hired as of July 10, 2002.

Createombudsmenprogram .Thebil lalsorequiresthenewagencytodevelopandestablishan ombudsmanprogramandcreateanombudsmensection.Thisunitwouldreceivecomplaintsand conductinvestigationstoresolveandmediatecomplaintsregardingactivities, practices, policies, orpro ceduresofanyhospital, facility, orprogramoperated, funded, orlicensed by stateorlocal agencies that affect the health, safety, welfare, or civil or human rightsofany disabled person. It is estimated that at between three and four ombudsmen and the woad ditional staff for both units (a support person and a supervisor) will be needed. The estimated costs assume three ombudsmen positions, a support person, and a supervisor with the positions filled by July 10, 2002.
