2 An Act to amend and reenact § 3.1-796.93:1 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of 3 Virginia by adding a section numbered 3.1-796.127:1, relating to dogs injuring or killing other 4 companion animals.

7 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

8 1. That § 3.1-796.93:1 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted, and that the Code of 9 Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 3.1-796.127:1 as follows: 10

§ 3.1-796.93:1. Authority to control dangerous or vicious dogs.

11 A. The governing body of any county, city or town may enact an ordinance regulating dangerous dogs and vicious dogs. 12 13

B. As used in this section,.

"Dangerous dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed which that has bitten, attacked, or inflicted 14 15 injury on a person or companion animal, other than a dog, or killed a companion animal, and; however, when a dog attacks or bites another dog, the attacking or biting dog shall not be deemed dangerous (i)16 17 if no serious physical injury as determined by a licensed veterinarian has occurred to the other dog as a result of the attack or bite or (ii) both dogs are owned by the same person. No dog shall be found to 18 19 be a dangerous dog as a result of biting, attacking or inflicting injury on another dog while engaged 20 with an owner or custodian as part of lawful hunting or participating in an organized, lawful dog 21 handling event.

22 "Vicious dog" means a canine or canine crossbreed which that has (i) killed a person; (ii) inflicted 23 serious injury to a person, including multiple bites, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, 24 or serious impairment of a bodily function; or (iii) continued to exhibit the behavior which resulted in a 25 previous finding by a court that it is a dangerous dog, provided that its owner has been given notice of 26 that finding. 27

C. Any ordinance enacted pursuant to this section shall prescribe the following provisions:

28 1. Any animal control officer who has reason to believe that a canine or canine crossbreed within his 29 jurisdiction is a dangerous dog or vicious dog shall apply to a magistrate of the jurisdiction for the 30 issuance of a summons requiring the owner or custodian, if known, to appear before a general district 31 court at a specified time. The summons shall advise the owner of the nature of the proceeding and the 32 matters at issue. The animal control officer shall confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be 33 heard and a verdict rendered. If the animal control officer determines that the owner or custodian can 34 confine the animal in a manner that protects the public safety, he may permit the owner or custodian to 35 confine the animal until such time as evidence shall be heard and a verdict rendered. The court, through its contempt powers, may compel the owner, custodian or harborer of the animal to produce the animal. 36 37 If, after hearing the evidence, the court finds that the animal is a dangerous dog, the court shall order 38 the animal's owner to comply with the provisions of the ordinance. If, after hearing the evidence, the 39 court finds that the animal is a vicious dog, the court shall order the animal euthanized in accordance 40 with the provisions of § 3.1-796.119.

41 2. No canine or canine crossbreed shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog solely 42 because it is a particular breed, nor shall the local governing body prohibit the ownership of a particular 43 breed of canine or canine crossbreed. No animal shall be found to be a dangerous dog or vicious dog if 44 the threat, injury or damage was sustained by a person who was (i) committing, at the time, a crime 45 upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, (ii) committing, at the time, a willful trespass or other tort upon the premises occupied by the animal's owner or custodian, or (iii) provoking, 46 47 tormenting, or physically abusing the animal, or can be shown to have repeatedly provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the animal at other times. No police dog which that was engaged in the 48 49 performance of its duties as such at the time of the acts complained of shall be found to be a dangerous 50 dog or a vicious dog. No animal which, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury, or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, or its owner or owner's property, shall be 51 52 found to be a dangerous dog or a vicious dog.

53 3. The owner of any animal found to be a dangerous dog shall, within ten 10 days of such finding, 54 obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the local animal control officer for a fee of fifty 55 dollars \$50 in addition to other fees that may be authorized by law. The local animal control officer 56 shall also provide the owner with a uniformly designed tag which that identifies the animal as a ENROLLED

dangerous dog. The owner shall affix the tag to the animal's collar and ensure that the animal wears the 57 58 collar and tag at all times. All certificates obtained pursuant to this subdivision shall be renewed 59 annually for the same fee and in the same manner as the initial certificate was obtained.

60 4. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued 61 to persons eighteen 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence (i) of the animal's current 62 rables vaccination, if applicable, and (ii) that the animal is and will be confined in a proper enclosure or is and will be confined inside the owner's residence or is and will be muzzled and confined in the 63 64 owner's fenced-in yard until the proper enclosure is constructed. In addition, owners who apply for certificates or renewals thereof under this section shall not be issued a certificate or renewal thereof 65 66 unless they present satisfactory evidence that (i) their residence is and will continue to be posted with 67 clearly visible signs warning both minors and adults of the presence of a dangerous dog on the property 68 and (ii) the animal has been permanently identified by means of a tattoo on the inside thigh or by electronic implantation. 69

70 5. While on the property of its owner, an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be confined 71 indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked structure of sufficient height and design to prevent its 72 escape or direct contact with or entry by minors, adults, or other animals. The structure shall be 73 designed to provide the animal with shelter from the elements of nature. When off its owner's property, 74 an animal found to be a dangerous dog shall be kept on a leash and muzzled in such a manner as not to 75 cause injury to the animal or interfere with the animal's vision or respiration, but so as to prevent it 76 from biting a person or another animal.

77 6. If the owner of an animal found to be a dangerous dog is a minor, the custodial parent or legal 78 guardian shall be responsible for complying with all requirements of this section.

79 7. After an animal has been found to be a dangerous dog, the animal's owner shall immediately, 80 upon learning of same, notify the local animal control authority if the animal (i) is loose or unconfined; (ii) bites a person or attacks another animal; (iii) is sold, given away, or dies; or (iv) has been moved to 81 82 a different address.

83 8. The owner of any animal which that has been found to be a dangerous dog who willfully fails to 84 comply with the requirements of the ordinance shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

85 9. All fees collected pursuant to the ordinance, less the costs incurred by the animal control authority in producing and distributing the certificates and tags required by the ordinance, shall be paid into a 86 special dedicated fund in the treasury of the locality for the purpose of paying the expenses of any 87 88 training course required under § 3.1-796.104:1. 89

D. Any ordinance enacted pursuant to this section may prescribe the following provisions:

90 1. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued 91 to persons eighteen 18 years of age or older who present satisfactory evidence that the animal has been 92 neutered or spayed.

93 2. All certificates or renewals thereof required to be obtained under this section shall only be issued 94 to persons who present satisfactory evidence that the owner has liability insurance coverage, to the value 95 of at least \$50,000, that covers animal bites.

E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision C 1, any ordinance enacted pursuant to this section 96 97 may provide that an animal control officer may determine, after investigation, whether a dog is a 98 dangerous dog. If the animal control officer determines that a dog is a dangerous dog, he may order the 99 animal's owner to comply with the provisions of the ordinance. If the animal's owner disagrees with the 100 animal control officer's determination, he may appeal the determination to the general district court for a 101 trial on the merits. 102

§ 3.1-796.127:1. Dog injuring or killing other companion animals.

103 The owner of any companion animal that is injured or killed by a dog shall be entitled to recover

104 damages consistent with the provisions of § 3.1-796.127 from the owner of such dog in an appropriate 105 action at law if (i) the injury occurred on the premises of the companion animal's owner, and (ii) the 106 owner of the offending dog did not have the permission of the companion animal's owner for the dog to

107 be on the premises at the time of the attack.
