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VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend and reenact § 18.2-186.3 of the Code of Virginia, relating to theft of personal 3 identifying information; penalty.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 6

7 1. That § 18.2-186.3 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 8

§ 18.2-186.3. Identity fraud; penalty; victim assistance.

9 A. It shall be unlawful for any person, without the authorization or permission of the person who is 10 the subject of the identifying information, with the intent to defraud, for his own use or the use of a third person, to: 11

12 1. Obtain, record or access identifying information which is not available to the general public that 13 would assist in accessing financial resources, obtaining identification documents, or obtaining benefits of 14 such other person; or 15

2. Obtain goods or services through the use of identifying information of such other person; or

3. Obtain identification documents in such other person's name.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person to use identification documents or identifying information of 17 18 another person, whether that person is dead or alive, to avoid summons, arrest, prosecution, or to 19 impede a criminal investigation.

20 C. As used in this section, "identifying information" shall include but not be limited to: (i) name; (ii) 21 date of birth; (iii) social security number; (iv) driver's license number; (v) bank account numbers; (vi) credit or debit card numbers; (vii) personal identification numbers (PIN); (viii) electronic identification 22 23 codes; (ix) automated or electronic signatures; (x) biometric data; (xi) fingerprints; (xii) passwords; or 24 (xiii) any other numbers or information that can be used to access a person's financial resources, obtain 25 identification, act as identification, or obtain goods or services.

26 D. Violations of this section shall be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor. Any violation resulting 27 in financial loss of greater than \$200 shall be punishable as a Class 6 felony. Any second or subsequent conviction shall be punishable as a Class 6 felony. Any violation resulting in the arrest and detention of 28 29 the person whose identification documents or identifying information were used to avoid summons, 30 arrest, prosecution, or to impede a criminal investigation shall be punishable as a Class 6 felony. In any 31 proceeding brought pursuant to this section, the crime shall be considered to have been committed in 32 any locality where the person whose identifying information was appropriated resides, or in which any 33 part of the offense took place, regardless of whether the defendant was ever actually in such locality.

34 E. Upon conviction, in addition to any other punishment, a person found guilty of this offense shall be ordered by the court to make restitution as the court deems appropriate to any person whose 35 identifying information was appropriated or to his estate. Such restitution may include the person's or 36 37 his estate's actual expenses associated with correcting inaccuracies or errors in his credit report or other 38 identifying information.

39 F. Upon the request of a person whose identifying information was appropriated, the Attorney 40 General may provide assistance to the victim in obtaining information necessary to correct inaccuracies 41 or errors in his credit report or other identifying information; however, no legal representation shall be 42 afforded such person.

43 2. That the provisions of this act may result in a net increase in periods of imprisonment or commitment. Pursuant to § 30-19.1:4, the estimated amount of the necessary appropriation cannot 44 be determined for periods of imprisonment in state adult correctional facilities and is \$0 for 45

periods of commitment to the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice. 46

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
