That § 23-9.6:1 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 11 § 23-9.6:1. Duties of Council generally. 12 13 In addition to such other duties as may be prescribed elsewhere, the State Council of Higher 14 Education shall have the duty, responsibility and authority: 15 1. To prepare plans under which the several state-supported institutions of higher education of Virginia shall constitute a coordinating system. In developing such plans, the Council shall consider the 16 future needs for higher education in Virginia at both the undergraduate and the graduate levels, as well 17 as the mission, programs, facilities and location of each of the existing institutions of higher education, 18 and such other matters as the Council deems appropriate. The Council shall revise such plans at least 19 20 once every four years and shall submit such recommendations as are necessary for the implementation 21 of the plan to the Governor and the General Assembly. 22 2. To review and approve or disapprove any proposed change in the statement of mission of any 23 presently existing public institution of higher education and to define the mission of all public institutions of higher education created after the effective date of this provision. The Council shall, 24 25 within the time prescribed in subdivision 1, make a report to the Governor and the General Assembly with respect to its actions hereunder. No such actions shall become effective until thirty days after 26 27 adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next following the filing of such a report. Nothing 28 contained in this provision shall be construed to authorize the Council to modify any mission statement 29 adopted by the General Assembly, nor to empower the Council to affect, either directly or indirectly, the 30 selection of faculty or the standards and criteria for admission of any public institution, whether related 31 to academic standards, residence or other criteria; it being the intention of this section that faculty selection and student admission policies shall remain a function of the individual institutions. 32 33 3. To study any proposed escalation of any public institution to a degree-granting level higher than 34 that level to which it is presently restricted and to submit a report and recommendation to the Governor 35 and the General Assembly relating to the proposal. The study shall include the need for and benefits or 36 detriments to be derived from the escalation. No such institution shall implement any such proposed 37 escalation until the Council's report and recommendation have been submitted to the General Assembly 38 and the General Assembly approves the institution's proposal. 4. To review and approve or disapprove all enrollment projections proposed by each public 39 40 institution of higher education. The Council's projections shall be in numerical terms by level of enrollment and shall be used for budgetary and fiscal planning purposes only. The student admissions 41 policies for the institutions and their specific programs shall remain the sole responsibility of the 42 43 individual boards of visitors. 44 5. To review and approve or disapprove (i) all new undergraduate or graduate academic programs 45 which that any public institution of higher education proposes. As used herein, "academic programs" include both undergraduate and graduate programs.; and (ii) the proposed closure of any undergraduate 46 or graduate academic program in a high demand or critical shortage area, as defined by the Council, 47 by any public institution of higher education. 48 49 6. To review and require the discontinuance of any *undergraduate or graduate* academic program which that is presently offered by any public institution of higher education when the Council 50 51 determines that such academic program is (i) nonproductive in terms of the number of degrees granted, 52 the number of students served by the program, the program's effectiveness, and budgetary considerations, 53 or (ii) supported by state funds and is unnecessarily duplicative of academic programs offered at other public institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth. As used herein, "academic programs" 54 55 includes both undergraduate and graduate programs. The Council shall make a report to the Governor and the General Assembly with respect to the discontinuance of any such academic program. No such 56 discontinuance shall become effective until thirty days after the adjournment of the session of the 57 58 General Assembly next following the filing of such report.

59 7. To review and approve or disapprove the creation and establishment of any department, school, college, branch, division or extension of any public institution of higher education which that such institution proposes to create and establish. This duty and responsibility shall be applicable to the 60 61 62 proposed creation and establishment of departments, schools, colleges, branches, divisions and 63 extensions, whether located on or off the main campus of the institution in question. If any 64 organizational change is determined by the Council to be proposed solely for the purpose of internal 65 management and the institution's curricular offerings remain constant, the Council shall approve the proposed change. Nothing in this provision shall be construed to authorize the Council to disapprove the 66 creation and establishment of any department, school, college, branch, division or extension of any 67 institution which that has been created and established by the General Assembly. 68

8. To develop a uniform, comprehensive data information system designed to gather all information necessary to the performance of the Council's duties. The system shall include information on admissions, enrollments, self-identified students with documented disabilities, personnel, programs, financing, space inventory, facilities and such other areas as the Council deems appropriate.

9. To develop in cooperation with institutions of higher education guidelines for the assessment of
student achievement. An institution shall use an approved program which that complies with the
guidelines of the Council and is consistent with the institution's mission and educational objectives in
the development of such assessment. The Council shall report the institutions' assessments of student
achievement in the biennial revisions to the state's master plan for higher education.

10. To develop in cooperation with the appropriate state financial and accounting officials and to
establish uniform standards and systems of accounting, record keeping and statistical reporting for the
public institutions of higher education.

11. To review biennially and approve or disapprove all changes in the inventory of educational and
general space which that any public institution of higher education may propose, and to make a report
to the Governor and the General Assembly with respect thereto. No such change shall be made until
thirty days after the adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next following the filing of
such report.

86 12. To visit and study the operations of each of the public institutions of higher education at such times as the Council shall deem appropriate and to conduct such other studies in the field of higher education as the Council deems appropriate or as may be requested by the Governor or the General Assembly.

90 13. To provide advisory services to private, accredited and nonprofit institutions of higher education,
91 whose primary purpose is to provide collegiate or graduate education and not to provide religious
92 training or theological education, on academic, administrative, financial and space utilization matters.
93 The Council may also review and advise on joint activities, including contracts for services between
94 such public and private institutions of higher education or between such private institutions and any
95 agency of the Commonwealth or political subdivision thereof.

96 14. To adopt such rules and regulations as the Council believes necessary to implement all of the
97 Council's duties and responsibilities as set forth in this Code. The various public institutions of higher
98 education shall comply with such rules and regulations.

99 15. To issue guidelines consistent with the provisions of the federal Family Education Rights and
100 Privacy Act (FERPA), 20 U.S.C. § 1232g requiring public institutions of higher education to release a
101 student's academic and disciplinary record to a student's parent.

102 16. To develop and revise, as it deems necessary, in consultation with the Coordinator of Emergency
 103 Management, a model institutional crisis and emergency management plan for the purpose of assisting
 104 public and private two-year and four-year institutions of higher education in establishing, operating, and
 105 maintaining emergency services and disaster preparedness activities.

17. To require that each institution of higher education formed, chartered, or established in the 106 107 Commonwealth after July 1, 1980, shall ensure the preservation of student transcripts in the event of 108 institutional closure or revocation of approval to operate in the Commonwealth of Virginia. An 109 institution may provide for the preservation of student transcripts by binding agreement with another 110 institution of higher education with which it is not corporately connected or in such other way as the 111 Council may authorize by regulation. In the event an institution closes, or has its approval to operate in the Commonwealth revoked, the Council, through its Director, may take such action as is necessary to 112 113 secure and preserve the student transcripts until such time as an appropriate institution accepts all or some of the transcripts. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to interfere with the right of a student 114 115 to his own transcripts; nor shall this section authorize disclosure of student records except as may 116 otherwise be authorized by law.

117 In carrying out its duties and responsibilities, the Council, insofar as practicable, shall preserve the 118 individuality, traditions and sense of responsibility of the respective institutions. The Council, insofar as 119 practicable, shall seek the assistance and advice of the respective institutions in fulfilling all of its duties 120 and responsibilities.
