## 8 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

## 9 1. That § 34-17 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 34-17. When exemption may be set apart.

A. The real or personal estate which a householder is entitled to hold as exempt may be set apart at 11 any time before it is subjected by sale under creditor process, or, if such creditor process does not 12 require sale of the property, before it is turned over to the creditor. To claim an exemption in 13 bankruptcy, a householder who (i) files a voluntary petition in bankruptcy or (ii) against whom an 14 15 involuntary petition in bankruptcy is filed shall set such real or personal property apart on or before the fifth day after the date initially set for the meeting held pursuant to 11 USC § 341, but not thereafter. A 16 householder who converts a case from Chapters 11, 12, or 13 to Chapter 7 shall set such real or 17 personal property apart on or before the fifth day after the date initially set for the meeting held 18 19 pursuant to 11 U.S.C. § 341 in the Chapter 7 case, but not thereafter. Nothing in this section shall affect 20 the right of the trustee in bankruptcy, with the approval of the court, to proceed immediately with the sale or other disposition of personal property which the trustee determines to be perishable or 21 22 particularly susceptible to price deterioration.

23 B. A claim of homestead exemption to protect garnished wages may be filed and shall be recognized 24 by the garnishing court at any time after the garnishment summons is served on the employer; and when 25 so filed shall protect wages for the entire period of the garnishment, up to the limit of the claimed exemption, and the amount to be garnished during the garnishment period shall apply toward the limits 26

27 of the homestead exemption. HB2740
