4. Title Paymentofmedicalfeesincertaincriminalcases.

5. Summary/Purpose: Provides that upon conviction of the defendant in any case in which medical fees were incurred in the process of gathering evidence, the court shall or der that the defendant reimburse the Common wealth.

6. FiscalImpactEstimatesare: Final, see item 8.

7. Budgetamendmentnecessary: No

8. Fiscalimplications: Currently, medical fees incurred in the course of gathering evidence either (i) to establish whether a crime has occurred or (ii) incases involving the abuse of children shall be paidout of the Criminal Fund. This legislation equires that, upon conviction of a defendant in a criminal case in which medical fees were incurred in the process of gathering evidence, the court shall or der that the defendant reimburse the Common wealth for the fees incurred.

According to the Supreme C ourt, during fiscal year 2002, there were 1,977 claims formed ical fees submitted by the Common wealth's attorneys for payment. Atotal of \$1.4 million was paid out of the Criminal Fund for the seclaims.

While the proposed legislation offers the prospect of recouping at least some of the monies expended by the Common wealth for these medical fees, two aspects of the payment of these fees will decrease the total recovery and make it impossible to estimate what the eventual recovery might be.

First, claimsf or paymentare submitted during the investigation phase prior to a court proceeding and notal linvestigations will result in a civil proceeding and some innoproceeding at all. In these situations there can be no criminal conviction and therefore no reimbursement.

Second, the assessment of medical costs against a defendant convicted in a criminal case will not insure reimbursement. Evidences hows that collections rates are lower formore seriou soffenses.

In summary, while this legislation will have some positive fiscal impact, either on the general fundor as an expenditure refund, it is impossible to estimate the extent of the impact at this time.
