8. Fiscalimplications: Currently, medical fees in curred in the course of gathering evidence either (i) to establish whether a crime has occurred or (ii) in cases involving the abuse of children shall be paid out of the Criminal Fund. This legislation requires that, upon conviction of a defendant in a criminal case in which medical fees were incurred in the process of gathering evidence, the court shall order that the defendant reimburs ethe Common we although the fees in curred.

According to the Supreme Court, during fiscal year 2002, therewere 1,977 claims formed ical fees submitted by the common wealth's attorneys for payment. A total of \$1.4 million was paid out of the Criminal Fund for the seclaims.

Whiletheproposedlegisla tionofferstheprospectofrecoupingatleastsomeofthemonies expendedbytheCommonwealthforthesemedicalfees,twoaspectsofthepaymentofthesefees willdecreasethetotalrecoveryandmakeitimpossibletoestimatewhattheeventualrecovery mightbe.

First, claims for paymentare submitted during the investigation phase prior to a court proceeding and not all investigations will result in a civil proceeding and some inno proceeding tall. In these situations there can be no criminal conviction and therefore no reimbursement.

Second, the assessment of medical costs against a defendant convicted in a criminal case will not insure reimbursement. Evidence shows that collections rates are lower form or eserious of fenses.

In summary, while this legislation will have some positive fiscal impact, either on the general fundor as an expenditure refund, it is impossible to estimate the extent of the impact at this time.
