3. Committee: Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources

4. Title: Erosion and sediment control law; certificate of competence

5. Summary/Purpose: This bill grants plan -approving authorities the option to waive the certificate of competence requirement for land -disturbing activity for agreements in lieu of a plan. Currently, all plan -approving authorities must require that the name of an individual, who holds a certificate of competence and who will be in charge of and responsible for carrying out the land -disturbing activity, be provided for both erosion and sediment control plans and agreements in lieu of a plan. An agreement in lieu of a plan is a contract between the plan -approving authority and the landowner used for ensuring proper implementation of conservation measures during construction of a single -family residence.

8. Fiscal implications: The Department of Conservation and Recreation estimates that any loss of revenue from this bill would be minimal as there may be some contractors that would not have to be certified.
