That § 15.2-1727 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 10 § 15.2-1727. Reciprocal agreements with localities outside the Commonwealth. A locality or a state-supported or private institution of higher learning may, in its discretion, enter 11 into reciprocal agreements for such periods as it deems advisable with any locality outside the 12 Commonwealth, including the District of Columbia, in order to establish and carry into effect a plan to 13 14 provide mutual aid through the furnishing of its police and other employees and agents, together with all necessary equipment, in the event of such need or emergency as provided herein. No locality or 15 state-supported or private institution of higher learning shall enter into such agreement unless the 16 agreement provides that each of the parties to such agreement shall: (i) waive any and all claims against 17 all the other parties thereto which may arise out of their activities outside their respective jurisdictions 18 19 under such agreement and (ii) indemnify and save harmless the other parties to such agreement from all 20 claims by third parties for property damage or personal injury which may arise out of the activities of 21 the other parties to such agreement outside their respective jurisdictions under such agreement. 22 The principal law-enforcement officer in any locality or of a state-supported or private institution of 23 higher learning having a reciprocal agreement with a jurisdiction outside the Commonwealth for police 24 mutual aid under the provisions hereof shall be responsible for directing the activities of all police 25 officers and other officers and agents coming into his jurisdiction under the reciprocal agreement. While operating under the terms of the reciprocal agreement, the principal law-enforcement officer is 26 27 empowered to authorize all police officers and other officers and agents from outside the Commonwealth to enforce the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia to the same extent as if they were 28 29 duly authorized law-enforcement officers of the locality or a state-supported or private institution of 30 higher learning in Virginia. 31 The governing body of any locality or a state-supported or private institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth is authorized to procure or extend the necessary public liability insurance to cover 32 33 claims arising out of mutual aid agreements executed with other localities outside the Commonwealth.

34 The police officers, and other officers, agents and employees of a locality or a state-supported or 35 private institution of higher learning serving in a jurisdiction outside the Commonwealth under a 36 reciprocal agreement entered into pursuant hereto are authorized to carry out the duties and functions 37 provided for in the agreement under the command and supervision of the chief law-enforcement officer 38 of the jurisdiction outside the Commonwealth.

39 In counties where no police department has been established and the sheriff is the chief 40 law-enforcement officer, the sheriff may enter into mutual aid agreements and furnish and receive such assistance as provided by this section. Sheriffs and their deputies providing assistance pursuant to such a 41 mutual aid agreement shall enjoy all of the authority, immunities and benefits as provided herein for 42 police officers, including full police powers. 43
