That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 15.2-1609.1:01 as follows: § 15.2-1609.1:01. Number of jail deputies. 10 The Compensation Board shall allocate additional permanent jail deputy positions, established on or 11 12 after July 1, 2004, at the lesser of the sheriff or superintendent's request, as recommended by the Department of Corrections, or at a ratio of not more than one jail deputy for every three beds of 13 operational capacity. Operational capacity shall be determined by the Department of Corrections. In 14 those jails experiencing overcrowding, the Compensation Board shall allocate jail deputy positions at 15 16 the lesser of the sheriff or the superintendent's request, as recommended by the Department of Corrections, or at a ratio of not more than one additional jail deputy for every five average annual 17 daily prisoners above operation capacity. Should there be any disagreement between the sheriff and the 18 Compensation Board regarding staffing for the jail, then the local governing body may address such 19 20 objections under the provisions of § 15.2-1636.8. 21 For the purposes of this section, "overcrowding" is defined as when the average annual daily 22 population exceeds the operational capacity. 23 Should overcrowding be reduced or eliminated in any jail, the Compensation Board shall reallocate 24 jail deputy positions previously assigned due to the overcrowding in accordance with the Board's

staffing standards for alternatives to incarceration programs or court services within the sheriff's office
or among other jails in the Commonwealth.
