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SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 90

Offered January 14, 2004

Establishing a joint subcommittee to study the administrative and financial relationships between the Commonwealth and its institutions of higher education. Report.

9 WHEREAS, the Commonwealth is fortunate to have outstanding public institutions of higher 10 education; and

WHEREAS, through education, training, and research, Virginia's colleges and universities provide a 11 12 public good to the people of the Commonwealth that improves their lives and productivity; and 13

WHEREAS, Virginia is a leader in innovation with respect to higher education policy; and

WHEREAS, across the United States, the structure and policy of higher education is evolving to 14 15 meet the changing needs of students and society; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth's best interests are served by facilitating the ability of its public 16 higher education institutions to compete successfully with colleges and universities nationally; and 17

WHEREAS, Virginia's public colleges and universities have already demonstrated their ability to 18 19 manage their operations more effectively when accorded flexibility through selected delegation of authority and decentralized pilot programs; now, therefore, be it 20

RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That a joint subcommittee be 21 22 established to study the administrative and financial relationships between the Commonwealth and its 23 institutions of higher education. The joint subcommittee shall consist of 10 members that include eight 24 legislative members, two nonlegislative citizen members, and two ex officio members. Members shall be 25 appointed as follows: three members of the Senate to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; five members of the House of Delegates to be appointed by the Speaker of the 26 27 House of Delegates in accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the House of Delegates; one nonlegislative citizen member who shall be a member of the State 28 29 Council of Higher Education to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; one 30 nonlegislative citizen member who shall represent a board of visitors of a Virginia public institution of 31 higher education to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and the Secretary of Finance or his designee and the Secretary of Education or her designee to serve ex officio with voting 32 33 privileges. Nonlegislative citizen members of the joint subcommittee shall be citizens of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Unless otherwise approved in writing by the chairman of the joint 34 35 subcommittee and the respective Clerk, nonlegislative citizen members shall only be reimbursed for 36 travel originating and ending within the Commonwealth of Virginia for the purpose of attending 37 meetings. If a companion joint resolution of the other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both 38 Clerks shall be required. The joint subcommittee shall elect a chairman and vice chairman from among 39 its membership, who shall be members of the General Assembly.

40 In conducting its study, the joint subcommittee shall examine the issues and law relating to the 41 feasibility and practicability of restructuring the administrative and financial relationships between the Commonwealth and its public institutions of higher education. 42

Administrative staff support shall be provided by the Office of the Clerk of the Senate. Staff support 43 to the joint subcommittee shall be provided by the Senate Committee on Finance and the House 44 Committee on Appropriations. Technical assistance shall be provided by the Department of Human Resource Management, the Virginia Retirement System, the Department of Administration, the 45 46 47 Department of Planning and Budget, the State Treasurer, the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia, and the Department of General Services. All other agencies of the Commonwealth shall 48 49 provide assistance to the joint subcommittee for this study, upon request.

The joint subcommittee shall be limited to four meetings for the 2004 interim and four meetings for 50 51 the 2005 interim, and the direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$11,200 per year for a total of 52 \$22,400, without approval as set out in this resolution. Approval for unbudgeted nonmember-related 53 expenses shall require the written authorization of the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective Clerk. If a companion joint resolution of the other chamber is agreed to, written authorization 54 55 of both Clerks shall be required.

No recommendation of the joint subcommittee shall be adopted if a majority of the House members 56 57 or a majority of the Senate members appointed to the joint subcommittee (i) vote against the recommendation and (ii) vote for the recommendation to fail notwithstanding the majority vote of the 58

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59 joint subcommittee.

60 The joint subcommittee shall complete its meetings for the first year by November 30, 2004, and for 61 the second year by November 30, 2005, and the chairman shall submit to the Division of Legislative 62 Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and recommendations no later than the first day of the next Regular Session of the General Assembly for each year. Each executive summary shall 63 64 state whether the joint subcommittee intends to submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a report of its findings and recommendations for publication as a document. The executive summaries and 65 reports shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated 66 Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be posted on the General 67 **68** Assembly's website. Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint 69

70 Rules Committee. The Committee may approve or disapprove expenditures for this study, extend or

71 delay the period for the conduct of the study, or authorize additional meetings during the 2004 and 2005

72 interims.
