The drill shall include the participation of local governments, affected state agencies, public utilities, law-enforcement agencies, and other entities as determined by the Governor. The bill also requires the Governor to report to the General Assembly the results of the drill by December 31 of each year.

- **8. Fiscal implications:** The Department of Emergency Management provided the estimated costs in Item 6. As reflected in the Item, there is a significant range in the potential cost to implement the proposal. The actual cost will depend on the type of statewide drill that is implemented. For instance, a statewide drill that involves only disaster communications could be significantly less costly than a drill that fully implements a hurricane evacuation of the Tidewater area.
