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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 33.1-12 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 33.1-12. General powers and duties of Board, etc.; definitions.
13	The Commonwealth Transportation Board shall be vested with the following powers and shall have
14	the following duties:
15	(1) Location of routes To locate and establish the routes to be followed by the roads comprising
16	systems of state highways between the points designated in the establishment of such systems.
17	(2) Construction and maintenance contracts and activities related to passenger and freight rail and
18	public transportation.
19	(a) To let all contracts to be administered by the Virginia Department of Transportation or the
20	Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the construction, maintenance, and improvement of
21	the roads comprising systems of state highways and for all activities related to passenger and freight rail
22	and public transportation in excess of \$2 million. The Commonwealth Transportation Commissioner
$\frac{12}{23}$	shall have authority to let all Virginia Department of Transportation-administered contracts for highway
24	construction, maintenance, and improvements up to \$2 million in value. The Director of the Department
25	of Rail and Public Transportation shall have the authority to let contracts for passenger and freight rail
2 6	and public transportation improvements up to \$2 million in value. The Commonwealth Transportation
27	Commissioner is authorized to enter into agreements with localities, authorities, and transportation
28	districts to administer projects and to allow those localities, authorities, and transportation districts to let
2 9	contracts up to \$2 million in value for highway construction, maintenance, and improvements within
30	their jurisdictions. The Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation is authorized to
31	enter into agreements with localities, authorities, and transportation districts to administer projects and to
32	allow those localities, authorities, and transportation districts to let contracts up to \$2 million in value
33	for passenger and freight rail and public transportation activities within their jurisdictions. The
34	Commonwealth Transportation Commissioner and the Director of the Department of Rail and Public
35	Transportation shall report on their respective transportation contracting activities at least quarterly to the
36	Board.
37	(b) The Commonwealth Transportation Board may award contracts for the construction of
38	transportation projects on a design-build basis. The Board may annually award five design-build
39	contracts valued no more than \$20 million. The Board may also award design-build contracts valued
40	more than \$20 million, provided that no more than five of these latter contracts are in force at the same
41	time. These contracts may be awarded after a written determination is made by the Commonwealth
42	Transportation Commissioner or the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation,
43	pursuant to objective criteria previously adopted by the Board regarding the use of design-build, that
44	delivery of the projects must be expedited and that it is not in the public interest to comply with the
45	design and construction contracting procedures normally followed. Such objective criteria will include
46	requirements for prequalification of contractors and competitive bidding processes. These contracts shall
47	be of such size and scope to encourage maximum competition and participation by agency prequalified
48	and otherwise qualified contractors. Such determination shall be retained for public inspection in the
49 50	official records of the Department of Transportation or the Department of Rail and Public
50	Transportation, as the case may be, and shall include a description of the nature and scope of the project
51 52	and the reasons for the Commissioner's or Director's determination that awarding a design-build contract
52 53	will best serve the public interest. The provisions of this section shall supersede contrary provisions of subdivision 2 of subsection C D of $\$$ 11 41 $\$$ 2.2 4203 and $\$$ 11 41 2 $\$$ 2.2 4205

54	(c) For transportation construction projects valued in excess of \$100 million, the Commonwealth
55	Transportation Board shall require that a financial plan be prepared. This plan shall include, but not be

17ansportation Board shall require that a financial plan be prepared. This plan shall include, but not be limited to, the following: (i) a complete cost estimate for all major project elements; (ii) an implementation plan with the project schedule and cost-to-complete information presented for each year;
(iii) identified revenues by funding source available each year to meet project costs; and (iv) a detailed

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59 cash-flow analysis for each year of the proposed project.

60 (3) Traffic regulations. - To make rules and regulations, from time to time, not in conflict with the laws of this Commonwealth, for the protection of and covering traffic on and the use of systems of state 61 62 highways and to add to, amend or repeal the same.

(4) Naming highways. - To give suitable names to state highways and change the names of any 63 64 highways forming a part of the systems of state highways, except such roads as have been or may 65 hereafter be named by the General Assembly.

66 (5) Compliance with federal acts. - To comply fully with the provisions of the present or future federal aid acts. The Board may enter into all contracts or agreements with the United States 67 68 government and may do all other things necessary to carry out fully the cooperation contemplated and 69 provided for by present or future acts of Congress in the area of transportation.

70 (6) Information and statistics. - To gather and tabulate information and statistics relating to 71 transportation and disseminate the same throughout the Commonwealth. In addition, the Commissioner 72 shall provide a report to the Governor, the General Assembly, the Commonwealth Transportation Board, 73 and the public concerning the current status of all highway construction projects in the Commonwealth. 74 This report shall be posted at least four times each fiscal year, but may be updated more often as 75 circumstances allow. The report shall contain, at a minimum, the following information for every project 76 in the Six-Year Improvement Program: (i) project description; (ii) total cost estimate; (iii) funds 77 expended to date; (iv) project timeline and completion date; (v) statement of whether project is ahead of, 78 on, or behind schedule; and (vi) the name of the prime contractor. Use of one or more Internet websites 79 may be used to satisfy this requirement. Project specific information posted on the Internet shall be 80 updated daily as information is available.

81 (7) Policies and operation of Departments. - To review and approve policies and transportation objectives of the Department of Transportation and the Department of Rail and Public Transportation, to 82 83 assist in establishing such policies and objectives, to oversee the execution thereof, and to report thereon 84 to the Commonwealth Transportation Commissioner and the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation, respectively. 85 86

(8) Cooperation with other agencies and local governments.

87 (a) To cooperate with the federal government, the American Association of State Highway and 88 Transportation Officials and any other organization in the numbering, signing and marking of highways, 89 in the taking of measures for the promotion of highway safety, in research activities, in the preparation 90 of standard specifications, in the testing of highway materials and otherwise with respect to 91 transportation projects.

92 (b) To offer technical assistance and coordinate state resources to work with local governments, upon 93 their request, in developing sound transportation components for their local comprehensive plans. 94

(9) Transportation.

95 (a) To monitor and, where necessary, approve actions taken by the Department of Rail and Public 96 Transportation pursuant to Chapter 10.1 (§ 33.1-391.1 et seq.) of this title in order to ensure the efficient 97 and economical development of public transportation, the enhancement of rail transportation, and the 98 coordination of such rail and public transportation plans with highway programs.

99 (b) To coordinate the planning for financing of transportation needs, including needs for highways, 100 railways, seaports, airports, and public transportation and to set aside funds as provided in 101 § 33.1-23.03:1. To allocate funds for these needs pursuant to §§ 33.1-23.1 and 58.1-638, the Board shall 102 adopt a Six-Year Improvement Program of anticipated projects and programs by July 1 of each year. This program shall be based on the most recent official Transportation Trust Fund revenue forecast and 103 104 shall be consistent with a debt management policy adopted by the Board in consultation with the Debt Capacity Advisory Committee and the Department of the Treasury. 105

(c) To recommend to the General Assembly for their consideration at the next session of the General 106 107 Assembly, objective criteria to be used by the Board in selecting those transportation projects to be advanced from the feasibility to the construction stage. If such criteria are enacted into law, such 108 109 objectives shall apply to the interstate, primary, and urban systems of highways.

110 (d) To enter into contracts with local districts, commissions, agencies, or other entities created for 111 transportation purposes.

112 (10) Contracts with other states. - To enter into all contracts with other states necessary for the 113 proper coordination of the location, construction, maintenance, improvement and operation of 114 transportation systems, including the systems of state highways with the highways of such other states 115 and, where necessary, to seek the approval of such contracts by the Congress of the United States.

116 (11) Use of funds. - To administer, distribute, and allocate funds in the Transportation Trust Fund as 117 provided by law.

118 (12) Financial and investment advisors. - With the advice of the Secretary of Finance and the State Treasurer, to engage a financial advisor and investment advisor who may be anyone within or without 119 120 the government of the Commonwealth, to assist in planning and making decisions concerning the investment of funds and the use of bonds for transportation purposes. The work of these advisors shallbe coordinated with the Secretary of Finance and the State Treasurer.

(13) The powers of the Virginia Aviation Board set out in Chapter 1 (§ 5.1-1 et seq.) of Title 5.1
and the Virginia Port Authority set out in Chapter 10 (§ 62.1-128 et seq.) of Title 62.1 are in no way
diminished by the provisions of this title.

(14) To enter into payment agreements with the Treasury Board related to payments on bonds issuedby the Commonwealth Transportation Board.

- 128 (15) Outdoor theaters. By regulation:
- (a) To prevent the erection of moving picture screens of outdoor theaters in such a manner as to be ordinarily visible from any highway;
- (b) To require that a sufficient space is left between any highway and the entrance to any outdoortheater to prevent congestion on the highway; and
- 133 (c) To require that outdoor theater entrances and exits are adequately lighted and marked.
- 134 Throughout this title the term "systems of state highways" shall have the meaning ascribed thereto by135 § 1-13.40.

136 The term "public transportation" or "mass transit" as used in this title means passenger transportation 137 by rubber-tired, rail, or other surface conveyance which provides shared ride services open to the general 138 public on a regular and continuing basis. The term does not include school buses; charter or sight-seeing 139 service; vehicular ferry service which serves as a link in the highway network; or human service agency or other aliont restricted transportation

140 or other client-restricted transportation.
