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## **SENATE BILL NO. 804**

AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the House Committee on Rules

on February 16, 2005)

(Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Marsh)

A BILL to amend and reenact § 30-192.7 and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Chapter 27 of Title 2.2, an article numbered 8, consisting of sections numbered 2.2-2725 through 2.2-2731, and to amend the Code of Virginia by repealing §§ 30-192.8 through 30-192.14, relating to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Living History and Public Policy Center Board of Trustees.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

11 1. That § 30-192.7 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 27 of Title 2.2, an article numbered 8, consisting of 12 sections numbered 2.2-2725 through 2.2-2731, as follows: 13 14

Article 8.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Living History and Public Policy Center.

§ 2.2-2725. Martin Luther King, Jr. Living History and Public Policy Center created; purpose.

17 The Martin Luther King, Jr. Living History and Public Policy Center, hereinafter referred to as the "Center," is hereby created as an independent, nonprofit corporation exempt from taxation pursuant to 18 § 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, for the purpose of implementing the provisions of 19 20 subdivision 6 of § 30-192.4. The Board of Trustees of the Center shall seek, receive, and expend such 21 gifts, grants, donations, bequests, and other funds as may be received or made available for the establishment, administration, operation, and maintenance of the Center. The Center shall be funded 22 23 solely through nonstate funds. Initially, the Center shall be composed of nine four-year public and 24 private institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth as partner and regional institutions to 25 ensure full access to the Center's programs, activities, scholarship, and resources throughout the Commonwealth. The initial partner institutions shall be Norfolk State University, Old Dominion University, the University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University, and Virginia Polytechnic 26 27 28 Institute and State University. The initial regional institutions shall be Eastern Virginia Medical School, 29 Hampton University, James Madison University, and Virginia State University. Virginia Commonwealth 30 University shall be designated as the home site and coordinator of the Center for administrative 31 purposes.

§ 2.2-2726. Board of Trustees membership; terms; vacancies; chairman and vice-chairman.

33 The Center shall be governed by a 19-member Board of Trustees consisting of six legislative 34 members and 13 nonlegislative citizen members to be appointed as follows: two members of the Senate, 35 to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; four members of the House of Delegates, to be 36 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates in accordance with the principles of proportional 37 representation contained in the Rules of the House of Delegates; one representative each of Eastern 38 Virginia Medical School, Hampton University, James Madison University, and Norfolk State University, 39 upon the recommendation of the president of the respective institution of higher education; and two 40 nonlegislative citizen members who shall represent the business and corporate community, to be 41 appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; one representative each of Old Dominion University, the 42 University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, and Virginia State University, who shall be an employee of the relevant institution, upon the 43 recommendation of the president of the respective institution of higher education; and two nonlegislative 44 45 citizen members who shall represent private, nonprofit foundations in the Commonwealth, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates. 46

47 Each representative of an institution of higher education shall be employed by the institution he **48** represents, and shall be familiar with the purpose of the Center and possess specific knowledge or skills to contribute to the work of the Board. 49

50 Legislative members and representatives of the named institutions of higher education shall serve 51 terms coincident with their terms of office. Nonlegislative citizen members shall serve two-year terms. 52 All members may be reappointed for successive terms. However, members shall be eligible for 53 reappointment only if they have attended at least one-half of all meetings of the Board during their 54 current term of service. Appointments to fill vacancies, other than by expiration of a term, shall be for 55 the unexpired terms. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments.

The Board shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, and such other officers as it may 56 57 determine necessary from among its members and may establish bylaws as necessary.

§ 2.2-2727. *Quorum*; meetings of the Board. 58

59 A majority of the voting members shall constitute a quorum. The meetings of the Board shall be held

at the call of the chairman or whenever the majority of the voting members so request. 60

61 § 2.2-2728. Compensation; expenses.

62 Legislative members of the Board shall receive such compensation as provided in § 30-19.12, and 63 nonlegislative citizen members shall receive such compensation for the performance of their duties as provided in § 2.2-2813. All members shall be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses 64 incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813 and 2.2-2825. However, all such 65 66 compensation and expenses shall be paid from existing nonpublic funds as may be received by the 67 Board.

68 § 2.2-2729. Powers and duties of the Board of Trustees and the Center.

69 A. The Board of Trustees shall:

70 1. Manage, control, maintain, and operate the Martin Luther King, Jr. Living History and Public 71 Policy Center;

- 72 2. Establish the Center as a nonprofit corporation exempt from taxation pursuant to § 501 (c) (3) of 73 the Internal Revenue Code to conduct the activities, within existing available funds, enumerated in this 74 section:
- 75 3. Establish the Center, initially, as a virtual center to facilitate statewide access and links to the 76 partner institutions and regional participants:

77 4. Employ and establish the qualifications and duties, and fix salaries and compensation of staff for 78 the Center from such funds as may be received. Technical support for the Center shall be provided 79 through the assistance of those partner institutions with high technological capabilities;

- 5. Establish a procedure to allow additional institutions to apply to become participants in the 80 81 Center with appropriate roles and responsibilities;
- 6. Seek, receive, and expend gifts, grants, donations, or bequests from public or private sources on behalf of the Center for its support and to enable it to carry out its duties pursuant to this section; 82 83
- 84 7. Receive, expend, and administer donations, bequests, or devises of real and personal property for 85 the endowment of the Center or for any special purpose designated by the donor that is consistent with 86 the purposes of the Center set forth in this chapter;
- 87 8. Have, in addition to its other powers, all the corporate powers given to corporations by the 88 provisions of Title 13.1;
- 89 9. Enter into contracts with respect to the duties and responsibilities imposed upon the Center 90 herein:
- 91 10. Have the authority to enter into and administer agreements with institutions of higher education 92 in the Commonwealth to effectuate the provisions of this section;
- 93 11. Have the authority to request and accept the cooperation of agencies of the Commonwealth or 94 local governments in the performance of its duties:
- 95 12. Adopt a logo or other emblems for use in connection with the Center;
- 13. Adopt policies, set fees as may be necessary for the use of the Center, and determine 96 97 revenue-generating programs and activities that may be conducted by the Center; and
- 98 14. Perform any lawful acts necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes of the Center. 99

B. The Center shall:

- 100 1. Preserve and advance Dr. King's philosophy and memory through the analysis of public policy 101 relative to principles associated with Dr. King: justice, nonviolence, peace, equality, and the concept of 102 the "Beloved Community;"
- 103 2. Determine and implement programs and services consistent with the King legacy and principles. 104 To commence the Center's activities and future endeavors, such programs and services shall include, but not be limited to, education, social policy, politics, economics, and culture and shall be designed to 105 make a permanent contribution to embedding the principles associated with Dr. King into the fabric of 106 107 Virginia life;
- 108 3. Develop and implement programs and services that facilitate fund-raising and revenue generation 109 and provide visibility to the Center. The programs and services shall be a collaborative effort between 110 the partner and regional institutions;
- 4. Serve as a catalyst for social, economic, and community transformation by leveraging and 111 112 brokering resources that support scholarly, multidisciplinary research consistent with the purposes of the 113 Center:
- 114 5. Promote public education, dialogue, research, scholarship, and the acquisition and preservation of memorabilia to (i) foster an understanding and appreciation of the totality of Dr. King, (ii) enable the 115 examination of a range of matters relevant to King principles and his legacy, (iii) provide available 116 resources to supplement and support the curricula of public and private schools, and (iv) aid the conduct of various research and other projects focused on K-12 education and minority students to promote a better understanding of the needs of educationally at-risk students and the identification of 117 118 119 120 successful strategies to promote their academic achievement;
- 6. Extend the Center's educational, cultural, and community outreach programs to public and private 121

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schools, institutions of higher education, public libraries, appropriate public and private educational and
cultural organizations, the religious community, and the public through various media and available
technologies such as, TELETECHNET, an interactive distance education program, digital website links,
online degree programs, digital exhibits, and other state-of-the-art technologies;

126 7. Provide for affiliations with undergraduate and graduate degree programs at all participating
 127 institutions of higher education, and, through the existing technological infrastructure and capacity of
 128 the institutions, enable the delivery of online degree programs, and make available the academic
 129 resources and staff of the Center to assist and support such programs;

8. Expand access to higher education in Virginia by providing undergraduate, graduate and
 professional programs through partnerships with the Commonwealth's private and public institutions of
 higher education;

133 9. Support research in areas consistent with the mission of the Center by eminent or visiting
134 scholars, nationally and internationally, and collaborate with other national and international
135 institutions of higher education and public policy centers on matters of mutual concern;

136 10. Establish a doctoral fellowship program in which one doctoral or faculty fellowship is supported
137 at each partner institution annually. These fellows shall examine issues relevant to the principles of
138 Martin Luther King, Jr., and shall be recruited carefully to ensure, as much as possible, the production
139 of enduring scholarly publications. At least once each year, the Center shall convene a forum or other
140 appropriate setting in which the work of such fellows may be shared with other scholars and the public;

141 11. Produce policy analyses of issues specific to Virginia and contemporary issues relative to
142 principles associated with Dr. King to further the development of sound, feasible, and fair policies for
143 all Virginians. These analyses may involve, but not be limited to, the assessment of education and health
144 care for the poor and minorities, economic development, the nexus between public policies and quality
145 of life, and other issues with the intent to provide viable and important decision-making information;

146 12. Conduct public forums, conferences, lectures, and research to address contemporary issues and public policies, including, but not limited to, disparity in health care, economic development, education, ethics, religion, social and environmental justice, civil and human rights, the criminal justice system, the global economic system, community and race relations, and racial, ethnic and cultural diversity;

150 13. Design and implement a comprehensive database to provide information on minority populations 151 in Virginia. The database shall include, but not be limited to, accurate and reliable information and 152 data concerning demographics, educational attainment, labor and economic development statistics, 153 housing and criminal justice data, a profile of minority businesses, social and cultural issues, health 154 status and chronic conditions and diseases prevalent among minority groups represented in Virginia. 155 The database shall be accessible to researchers, the business and corporate community, and policy 156 makers, in a centralized location, to facilitate and enhance planning and the targeting of resources. 157 Significant works on the history, culture, achievements, and contributions of minorities to society shall 158 be acquired to provide access for research, educational and cultural purposes;

159 14. Serve as a resource and referral center and living history museum in which electronic media, 160 including, but not limited to, films, digital audio and video recordings, and a digital library, as well as 161 records, oral histories, and memorabilia documenting Dr. King's relationship with and impact on the 162 Commonwealth shall be acquired and preserved. In addition to information concerning his life, work, 163 teachings, writings, and philosophy, the Center shall acquire and maintain historical documents, 164 records, artifacts, and memorabilia related to the Civil Rights Movement, the African Diaspora, and 165 African Americans and other minority populations in the United States for educational purposes. The 166 Center shall establish a working relationship with and a website link to The King Center in Atlanta, The 167 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Papers Project at Stanford University, and Boston University to facilitate 168 research and scholarship;

169 15. Actively seek and obtain nonstate funding through gifts, public and private grants, donations,
170 federal support, endowments, in-kind services, and revenue-generating enterprises, such as contract
171 research or subscription processes with local governments, local school boards, private organizations,
172 and other entities, creative collaborations between various public and private institutions, and the
173 provision of local programming and training modules for public and private entities. All such funds and
174 resources as may be received or made available to the Center shall be used to provide the financial
175 support for the Center, its staff, and its work in accordance with the provisions of this section; and

176 16. Submit to the Board of Trustees such reports concerning the status of the Center's programs,177 activities, cooperative relationships, and fund-raising endeavors as the Board may require.

**178** § 2.2-2730. Staffing.

179 The Board may, at its pleasure, appoint, employ, or remove an executive director and a
180 fund-raiser/grant writer for the Center, each of whom may be an employee of one of the participating
181 institutions of higher education, and such other persons as it deems necessary to assist it in carrying out
182 its duties as set forth in this chapter. The Board shall determine the duties of all staff and fix the

183 salaries and compensation of such persons within the amounts allocated therefor from such nonpublic 184 funds as may be received by the Board. During the initial development and implementation phase of the 185 Center, additional staff to support the functions of the Center may be provided by the participating 186 institutions through an arrangement approved by the Board. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall 187 provide assistance to the Board, upon request.

188 § 2.2-2731. Annual report.

189 The chairman of the Board shall submit to the General Assembly and the Governor an annual 190 executive summary of the interim activity and work of the Center and the Board, and the status and 191 sources of funding for the Center no later than the first day of each regular session of the General 192 Assembly. The executive summary shall state whether the Board intends to submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a report of its findings and recommendations for publication as a state 193 194 document. The executive summary shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of 195 Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be 196 posted on the General Assembly's website. 197

§ 30-192.7. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Commission Fund established.

198 There is hereby created in the state treasury a special nonreverting fund to be known as the Dr. 199 Martin Luther King, Jr. Commission Fund, hereafter referred to as "the Fund." The Fund shall be 200 established on the books of the Comptroller. All moneys, including gifts, donations, grants, bequests, 201 and other funds from any source as may be received by the Commission, shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the Fund. Interest earned on moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and 202 203 be credited to it. Any moneys remaining in the Fund, including interest thereon, at the end of each fiscal 204 year shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in the Fund. Moneys in the Fund shall be used 205 solely for the purposes of supporting the Commission's work, the Martin Luther King, Jr. Living History and Public Policy Center, and as seed money to generate additional funds. Expenditures and 206 disbursements from the Fund shall be made by the State Treasurer on warrants issued by the 207 208 Comptroller upon written request signed by the chairman, upon the approval of a majority of the 209 members of the Commission.

210 2. That §§ 30-192.8 through 30-192.14 of the Code of Virginia are repealed.

211 3. That the provisions of Article 8 (§§ 2.2-2725 through 2.2-2731) of Chapter 27 of Title 2.2 shall 212 expire on July 1, 2007.
