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## SENATE BILL NO. 851

AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the House Committee on Finance

on February 21, 2005)

(Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Cuccinelli)

A BILL to amend and reenact § 58.1-3211 of the Code of Virginia, relating to exemptions on deferral of taxes for certain elderly and handicapped persons; disability benefits.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That § 58.1-3211 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 58.1-3211. Restrictions and exemptions.

11 Any exemption or deferral program enacted by a county, city or town pursuant to § 58.1-3210 shall 12 be subject to the following restrictions and conditions:

13 1. a. Subject to subdivision 1 b of this section, the total combined income received from all sources during the preceding calendar year by (i) owners of the dwelling who use it as their principal residence 14 and (ii) owners' relatives who live in the dwelling, shall not exceed the greater of \$50,000, or the 15 income limits based upon family size for the respective metropolitan statistical area, annually published 16 17 by the Department of Housing and Urban Development for qualifying for federal housing assistance pursuant to § 235 of the National Housing Act (12 U.S.C. § 1715z). Any amount up to \$10,000 of 18 income of each relative who is not the spouse of an owner living in the dwelling and who does not 19 20 qualify for the exemption provided by subdivision 1 b hereof may be excluded from the total combined 21 income calculation. The local government may exclude up to \$5,000 of any permanent or temporary disability benefit, from whatever source, received by an owner. The local government may also exclude 22 23 up to \$10,000 of income for an owner who is permanently disabled.

24 b. Notwithstanding subdivision 1 a of this section, if a person qualifies for an exemption or deferral under this article, and if the person can prove by clear and convincing evidence that the person's 25 physical or mental health has deteriorated to the point that the only alternative to permanently residing 26 27 in a hospital, nursing home, convalescent home or other facility for physical or mental care is to have a 28 relative move in and provide care for the person, and if a relative does then move in for that purpose, 29 then none of the income of the relative or of the relative's spouse shall be counted towards the income 30 limit, provided the owner of the residence has not transferred assets in excess of \$10,000 without 31 adequate consideration within a three-year period prior to or after the relative moves into such residence. 32

2. The net combined financial worth, including the present value of all equitable interests, as of
December 31 of the immediately preceding calendar year, of the owners, and of the spouse of any
owner, excluding the value of the dwelling and the land, not exceeding 10 acres, upon which it is
situated shall not exceed \$200,000. The local government may also exclude furnishings. Such
furnishings shall include furniture, household appliances and other items typically used in a home.

37 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivisions 1 and 2, in the Cities of Charlottesville, 38 Chesapeake, Portsmouth, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach and the Counties of Chesterfield, Fauquier, 39 Goochland, Henrico, and Stafford, the board of supervisors or council may, by ordinance, raise the 40 income and financial worth limitations for any exemption or deferral program to a maximum of the 41 greater of \$52,000 or the income limits based upon family size for the respective metropolitan statistical area, annually published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development for qualifying for 42 federal housing assistance pursuant to § 235 of the National Housing Act (12 U.S.C. § 1715z), for the 43 total combined income amount, and \$200,000 for the maximum net combined financial worth amount, 44 which shall exclude the value of the dwelling and the land, not exceeding 10 acres, upon which it is 45 situated. Any amount up to \$10,000 of income of each relative who is not the spouse of an owner living 46 47 in the dwelling may be excluded under this subdivision.

4. Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivisions 1 and 2, in (i) any county having a population of **48** more than 800,000, as determined by the 1990 United States Census; (ii) any county or city adjacent 49 50 thereto; (iii) any city contiguous to such adjacent counties and cities; and (iv) any incorporated town located in the counties described in clauses (i) and (ii), the respective board of supervisors or council 51 may, by ordinance, raise the income and financial worth limitations for any exemption or deferral 52 53 program to a maximum of the greater of \$72,000 or the income limits based upon family size for the 54 respective metropolitan statistical area, annually published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development for qualifying for federal housing assistance pursuant to § 235 of the National Housing Act 55 (12 U.S.C. § 1715z), for the total combined income amount, and \$340,000 for the maximum net 56 57 combined financial worth amount, which shall exclude the value of the dwelling and the land, up to but not exceeding 25 acres, all of which shall be non-income producing, upon which it is situated. Any 58 59 amount up to \$10,000 of income of each relative who is not the spouse of an owner living in the

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dwelling may be excluded under this subdivision. 60

5. For purposes of this article, income shall mean total gross income from all sources, without regard to whether a tax return is actually filed. Income shall not include life insurance benefits or receipts from borrowing or other debt. 61 62

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
