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11	WHERAS, several recent United States Supreme Court cases have raised questions about established
12	criminal procedures of the Commonwealth; and
13	Whereas, on March 8, 2004, the United States Supreme Court rendered an opinion in <u>Crawford v.</u>
14	Washington that overturned decades of jurisprudence concerning exceptions to a defendant's Sixth
15	Amendment right to confrontation; and
16	Whereas, current Virginia law allows for the introduction of crime lab certificates and affidavits in
17	criminal trials as proof of certain facts; and
18	WHEREAS, under Crawford, criminal defendants have a right to confront witnesses providing
19	testimony, used at trial, against them; and
20	Whereas, the Crawford decision now casts doubt on the constitutionality of crime lab certificates and
21	uncontested affidavits used at trial because these statements may be testimonial in nature; and
22	WHEREAS, starting with Apprendi v. New Jersey decided on June 26, 2002, and continuing with
23	Blakely v. Washington on June 24, 2004, and U.S. v. Booker and U.S. v. Fanfan on January 12, 2005,
24	the United States Supreme Court has issued opinions that call into question the enhancement of
25	sentences on the basis of facts that have not been found by a jury; now therefore be it
26	RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Virginia State Crime
27	Commission be directed to study the [implications of Crawford v. Washington, United States v. Booker,
28	and other related recent United States Supreme Court cases. The Commission shall determine the
29	impact of the above-mentioned U.S. Supreme Court cases on Virginia's statutes [- The Crime
30	Commission and] shall survey Virginia statutes and Rules of Court and identify those that may be in
31	need of amendment or repeal.
32	All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Virginia State Crime Commission

for this study, upon request.
The Virginia State Crime Commission shall complete its meetings by November 30, 2005, and the chairman shall submit to the Division of Legislative Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and recommendations no later than the first day of the 2006 Regular Session of the General Assembly. The executive summary shall state whether the Virginia State Crime Commission intends to

submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a report of its findings and recommendations for
publication as a House or Senate document. The executive summary and report shall be submitted as
provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of
