4. Title SCHEV to adopt guidelines for textbook designation and sale of textbooks

5. Summary/Purpose: Directs that no employee at a public Virginia college or university shall demand or receive any payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, services or anything, present or promised, as an incentive for requiring students to purchase specific textbooks required for coursework or instruction. The legislation provides that employees may receive (i) sample copies, instructor's copies, or instructional material, not to be sold; and (ii) royalties or other compensation from sales of textbooks that include such instructor's own writing or work.

7. Budget amendment necessary: No.

8. Fiscal implications: The substitute legislation requires boards of visitors to implement procedures to list on the institutional website, in a standard format, all textbooks required or assigned for particular courses at the institution. Bookstores, whether supported by auxiliary services or operated by a private contractor, must post the listing of textbooks when the instructor identifies the required textbooks for order and subsequent student purchase. Institutions of higher education may incur minimal costs to implement the provisions of the bill.
