065472336 HOUSE BILL NO. 1608 1 2 Offered January 27, 2006 3 A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 15.2-2223 and 15.2-2224 of the Code of Virginia, relating to the 4 comprehensive plan. 5 Patrons—Valentine and Hull 6 7 Unanimous consent to introduce 8 9 Referred to Committee on Counties, Cities and Towns 10 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 11 1. That §§ 15.2-2223 and 15.2-2224 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 12 13 § 15.2-2223. Comprehensive plan to be prepared and adopted; scope and purpose. The local planning commission shall prepare and recommend a comprehensive plan for the physical 14 development of the territory within its jurisdiction and every governing body shall adopt a 15 comprehensive plan for the territory under its jurisdiction. 16 In the preparation of a comprehensive plan, the commission shall make careful and comprehensive 17 surveys and studies of the existing conditions and trends of growth, and of the probable future 18 19 requirements of its territory and inhabitants. The comprehensive plan shall be made with the purpose of 20 guiding and accomplishing a coordinated, adjusted and harmonious development of the territory which 21 will, in accordance with present and probable future needs and resources, best promote the health, 22 safety, morals, order, convenience, recreational and sports opportunities, prosperity and general welfare 23 of the inhabitants, including the elderly and persons with disabilities. 24 The comprehensive plan shall be general in nature, in that it shall designate the general or 25 approximate location, character, and extent of each feature shown on the plan and shall indicate where existing lands or facilities are proposed to be extended, widened, removed, relocated, vacated, narrowed, 26 27 abandoned, or changed in use as the case may be. 28 The comprehensive plan shall include a transportation element that designates a system of 29 transportation infrastructure needs and recommendations that shall include, as appropriate, but not be 30 limited to, roadways, bicycle accommodations, pedestrian accommodations, railways, bridges, waterways, 31 airports, ports, and public transportation facilities. The Virginia Department of Transportation shall, upon request, provide localities with technical assistance in preparing such transportation element. 32 33 The plan, with the accompanying maps, plats, charts, and descriptive matter, shall show the locality's 34 long-range recommendations for the general development of the territory covered by the plan. It may 35 include, but need not be limited to: 36 1. The designation of areas for various types of public and private development and use, such as 37 different kinds of residential, including age-restricted, housing; business; industrial; agricultural; mineral 38 resources; conservation; recreation; sports facilities; public service; flood plain and drainage; and other 39 areas: 40 2. The designation of a system of community service facilities such as parks, sports playing fields, 41 forests, schools, playgrounds, public buildings and institutions, hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, community centers, waterworks, sewage disposal or waste disposal areas, and the like; 42 3. The designation of historical areas and areas for urban renewal or other treatment; 43 4. The designation of areas for the implementation of reasonable ground water protection measures; 44 45 5. An official map, a capital improvements program, a subdivision ordinance, a zoning ordinance and 46 zoning district maps, mineral resource district maps and agricultural and forestal district maps, where 47 applicable: 6. The location of existing or proposed recycling centers; and 48 49 7. The location of military bases, military installations, and military airports and their adjacent safety 50 areas. 51 The plan shall include: the designation of areas and implementation of measures for the construction, 52 rehabilitation and maintenance of affordable housing, which is sufficient to meet the current and future 53 needs of residents of all levels of income in the locality while considering the current and future needs 54 of the planning district within which the locality is situated. 55 § 15.2-2224. Surveys and studies to be made in preparation of plan; implementation of plan. A. In the preparation of a comprehensive plan, the local planning commission shall survey and study 56 57 such matters as the following: 1. Use of land, preservation of agricultural and forestal land, production of food and fiber, 58

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characteristics and conditions of existing development, trends of growth or changes, natural resources, historic areas, ground water, surface water, geologic factors, population factors, employment, environmental and economic factors, existing public facilities, *characteristics and conditions of existing recreational and sports facilities and future needs*, drainage, flood control and flood damage prevention measures, transportation facilities, the need for affordable housing in both the locality and planning district within which it is situated, and any other matters relating to the subject matter and general purposes of the comprehensive plan.

66 However, if a locality chooses not to survey and study historic areas, then the locality shall include 67 historic areas in the comprehensive plan, if such areas are identified and surveyed by the Department of 68 Historic Resources. Furthermore, if a locality chooses not to survey and study mineral resources, then 69 the locality shall include mineral resources in the comprehensive plan, if such areas are identified and 69 surveyed by the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy. The requirement to study the production of 70 food and fiber shall apply only to those plans adopted on or after January 1, 1981.

2. Probable future economic and population growth of the territory and requirements therefor.

B. The comprehensive plan shall recommend methods of implementation and shall include a current map of the area covered by the comprehensive plan. Unless otherwise required by this chapter, the methods of implementation may include but need not be limited to:

76 1. An official map;

- 77 2. A capital improvements program;
- **78** 3. A subdivision ordinance;
- 79 4. A zoning ordinance and zoning district maps; and
- **80** 5. A mineral resource map; and
- 81 6. A recreation and sports resource map.
