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HOUSE BILL NO. 601**AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE**(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Rehabilitation and Social Services
on February 24, 2006)

*A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 4.1-112.1, 4.1-207, 4.1-208, 4.1-209, and 4.1-231 of the Code of Virginia, relating to alcoholic beverage control; licenses.***Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:****1. That §§ 4.1-112.1, 4.1-207, 4.1-208, 4.1-209, and 4.1-231 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:**

§ 4.1-112.1. Direct shipments of beer and wine authorized; regulations of the Board.

A. Holders of wine shippers' licenses and beer shippers' licenses issued pursuant to this section may sell and ship not more than two cases of wine per month nor more than two cases of beer per month to any person in Virginia to whom alcoholic beverages may be lawfully sold. All such sales and shipments must be for personal consumption only and not for resale. A case of wine shall mean any combination of packages containing not more than nine liters of wine. A case of beer shall mean any combination of packages containing not more than 288 ounces of beer. Any winery or farm winery located within or outside the Commonwealth may apply to the Board for issuance of a wine shipper's license that shall authorize the shipment of brands of wine and farm wine identified in such application. Any brewery located within or outside the Commonwealth may apply to the Board for issuance of a beer shipper's license that shall authorize the shipment of brands of beer identified in such application. Any person located within or outside the Commonwealth who is authorized to sell wine or beer at retail in their state of domicile and who is not a winery, farm winery, or brewery may nevertheless apply for a wine or beer shipper's license, or both, if such person satisfies the requirements of subsection B. Any brewery, winery or farm winery that applies for a shipper's license or authorizes any other person, other than a retail off-premises licensee, to apply for a license to ship such brewery's, winery's or farm winery's brands of wine or beer shall notify any wholesale licensees that have been authorized to distribute such brands that an application has been filed for a shipper's license. The notice shall be in writing and in a form prescribed by the Board. The Board may adopt such regulations as it reasonably deems necessary to implement the provisions of this section, including regulations that permit the holder of a shipper's license to amend the same by, among other things, adding or deleting any brands of wine, farm wine, or beer identified in such shipper's license.

B. Any applicant for a wine or beer shipper's license that does not own or have the right to control the distribution of the brands of wine, farm wine, or beer identified in such person's application may be issued a shipper's license for wine or beer or both, if the applicant has obtained and filed with its application for a shipper's license, and with any subsequent application for renewal thereof, the written consent of the winery, farm winery, or brewery whose brands of wine, farm wine, or beer are identified therein. ~~Any retail off-premises licensee that purchases wine or beer from anyone authorized to sell wine or beer at wholesale for resale in Virginia shall be presumed to have the authorization of such winery, farm winery, or brewery to ship its brands.~~ Any winery, farm winery, or brewery that has provided written authorization to a shipper licensed pursuant to this section to sell and ship its brand or brands of wine, farm wine, or beer shall not be restricted by any provision of this section from withdrawing such authorization at any time. If such authorization is withdrawn, the winery, farm winery, or brewery shall promptly notify such shipper licensee and the Board in writing of its decision to withdraw from such shipper licensee the authority to sell and ship any of its brands, whereupon such shipper licensee shall promptly file with the Board an amendment to its license eliminating any such withdrawn brand or brands from the shipper's license.

C. The direct shipment of beer and wine by holders of licenses issued pursuant to this section shall be by approved common carrier only. The Board shall develop regulations pursuant to which common carriers may apply for approval to provide common carriage of wine or beer, or both, shipped by holders of licenses issued pursuant to this section. Such regulations shall include provisions that require (i) the recipient to demonstrate, upon delivery, that he is at least 21 years of age; (ii) the recipient to sign an electronic or paper form or other acknowledgement of receipt as approved by the Board; and (iii) the Board-approved common carrier to submit to the Board such information as the Board may prescribe. The Board-approved common carrier shall refuse delivery when the proposed recipient appears to be under the age of 21 years and refuses to present valid identification. All licensees shipping wine or beer pursuant to this section shall affix a conspicuous notice in 16-point type or larger to the outside of each package of wine or beer shipped within or into the Commonwealth, in a conspicuous location stating: "CONTAINS ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES; SIGNATURE OF PERSON AGED 21 YEARS OR

60 OLDER REQUIRED FOR DELIVERY." Any delivery of alcoholic beverages to a minor by a common
61 carrier shall constitute a violation by the common carrier. The common carrier and the shipper licensee
62 shall be liable only for their independent acts.

63 D. For purposes of §§ 4.1-234 and 4.1-236 and Chapter 6 (§ 58.1-600 et seq.) of Title 58.1, each
64 shipment of wine or beer by a wine shipper licensee or a beer shipper licensee shall constitute a sale in
65 Virginia. The licensee shall collect the taxes due to the Commonwealth and remit any excise taxes
66 monthly to the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control and any sales taxes to the Department of
67 Taxation.

68 § 4.1-207. Wine licenses.

69 The Board may grant the following licenses relating to wine:

70 1. Winery licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture wine and to sell and deliver or
71 ship the wine, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers, to persons licensed to sell the
72 wine so manufactured at wholesale for the purpose of resale, and to persons outside the Commonwealth
73 for resale outside the Commonwealth. In addition, such license shall authorize the licensee to (i) operate
74 distilling equipment on the premises of the licensee in the manufacture of spirits from fruit or fruit
75 juices only, which shall be used only for the fortification of wine produced by the licensee, and (ii)
76 store wine in bonded warehouses on or off the licensed premises upon permit issued by the Board.

77 2. Wholesale wine licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to acquire and receive deliveries and
78 shipments of wine and to sell and deliver or ship the wine, in accordance with Board regulations, in
79 closed containers, to (i) persons licensed to sell such wine in the Commonwealth, (ii) persons outside
80 the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth, (iii) religious congregations for use only for
81 sacramental purposes, and (iv) owners of boats registered under the laws of the United States sailing for
82 ports of call of a foreign country or another state.

83 No wholesale wine licensee shall purchase wine for resale from a person outside the Commonwealth
84 who does not hold a wine importer's license unless such wholesale wine licensee holds a wine importer's
85 license and purchases wine for resale pursuant to the privileges of such wine importer's license.

86 3. Wine importers' licenses, which shall authorize persons located within or outside the
87 Commonwealth to sell and deliver or ship wine, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed
88 containers, to persons in the Commonwealth licensed to sell wine at wholesale for the purpose of resale,
89 and to persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth.

90 4. Retail off-premises winery licenses to persons holding winery licenses, which shall authorize the
91 licensee to sell wine at the place of business designated in the winery license, in closed containers, for
92 off-premises consumption and to deliver the wine to the purchasers in accordance with Board
93 regulations. All such deliveries of wine shall be performed by the owner or any agent, officer, director,
94 shareholder or employee of the licensee.

95 5. Farm winery licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture wine containing 18
96 percent or less of alcohol by volume and to sell, deliver or ship the wine, in accordance with Board
97 regulations, in closed containers, to (i) the Board, (ii) persons licensed to sell the wine so manufactured
98 at wholesale or retail for the purpose of resale, § 4.1-326 notwithstanding, or (iii) persons outside the
99 Commonwealth. In addition, the licensee may (a) acquire and receive deliveries and shipments of wine
100 manufactured by the licensee and to sell and deliver or ship this wine, in accordance with Board
101 regulations, to persons licensed to sell wine in the Commonwealth, § 4.1-326 notwithstanding and (b)
102 store wine in bonded warehouses located on or off the licensed premises upon permits issued by the
103 Board. For the purposes of this title, a farm winery license shall be designated either as a Class A or
104 Class B farm winery license in accordance with the limitations set forth in § 4.1-219.

105 Such licenses shall also authorize the licensee to sell wine at retail at the places of business
106 designated in the licenses, which may include no more than five additional retail establishments of the
107 licensee. Wine may be sold at these business places for on-premises consumption and in closed
108 containers for off-premises consumption, including delivery of such wine to purchasers in accordance
109 with Board regulations. All such deliveries of wine shall be performed by the owner or any agent,
110 officer, director, shareholder or employee of the licensee.

111 § 4.1-208. Beer licenses.

112 The Board may grant the following licenses relating to beer:

113 1. Brewery licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture beer and to sell and deliver or
114 ship the beer so manufactured, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers to (i) persons
115 licensed to sell the beer at wholesale, (ii) persons licensed to sell beer at retail for the purpose of resale,
116 only as provided in subdivision B 4 of § 4.1-216, (iii) owners of boats registered under the laws of the
117 United States sailing for ports of call of a foreign country or another state, and (iv) and (ii) persons
118 outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth. Such license may also authorize
119 individuals holding a brewery license to operate a facility designed for and utilized exclusively for the
120 education of persons in the manufacture of beer, including sampling by such individuals of beer
121 products, within a theme or amusement park located upon the premises occupied by such brewery, or

upon property of such person contiguous to such premises, or in a development contiguous to such premises owned and operated by such person or a wholly owned subsidiary. Provided, however, that such samples may be provided only to individuals for consumption on the premises of such facility and only to individuals to whom such products may be lawfully sold.

2. Bottlers' licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to acquire and receive deliveries and shipments of beer in closed containers and to bottle, sell and deliver or ship it, in accordance with Board regulations to (i) wholesale beer licensees for the purpose of resale, (ii) owners of boats registered under the laws of the United States sailing for ports of call of a foreign country or another state, and (iii) persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth.

3. Wholesale beer licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to acquire and receive deliveries and shipments of beer and to sell and deliver or ship it, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers to (i) persons licensed under this chapter to sell such beer at wholesale or retail for the purpose of resale, (ii) owners of boats registered under the laws of the United States sailing for ports of call of a foreign country or another state, and (iii) persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth.

No wholesale beer licensee shall purchase beer for resale from a person outside the Commonwealth who does not hold a beer importer's license unless such wholesale beer licensee holds a beer importer's license and purchases beer for resale pursuant to the privileges of such beer importer's license.

4. Beer importers' licenses, which shall authorize persons licensed within or outside the Commonwealth to sell and deliver or ship beer into the Commonwealth, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers, to persons in the Commonwealth licensed to sell beer at wholesale for the purpose of resale.

5. Retail on-premises beer licenses to:

a. Hotels, restaurants and clubs, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer, either with or without meals, only in dining areas and other designated areas of such restaurants, or in dining areas, private guest rooms, and other designated areas of such hotels or clubs, for consumption only in such rooms and areas.

b. Persons operating dining cars, buffet cars, and club cars of trains, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer, either with or without meals, in the dining cars, buffet cars, and club cars so operated by them for on-premises consumption when carrying passengers.

c. Persons operating sight-seeing boats, or special or charter boats, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer, either with or without meals, on such boats operated by them for on-premises consumption when carrying passengers.

d. Grocery stores located in any town or in a rural area outside the corporate limits of any city or town, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer for on-premises consumption in such establishments. No license shall be granted unless it appears affirmatively that a substantial public demand for such licensed establishment exists and that public convenience and the purposes of this title will be promoted by granting the license.

e. Persons operating food concessions at coliseums, stadia, or similar facilities, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer, in paper, plastic, or similar disposable containers, during the performance of professional sporting exhibitions, events or performances immediately subsequent thereto, to patrons within all seating areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, and additional locations designated by the Board in such coliseums, stadia, or similar facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the license.

f. Persons operating food concessions at any outdoor performing arts amphitheater, arena or similar facility which has seating for more than 3,500 persons and is located in any county with a population between 65,000 and 70,000. Such license shall authorize the licensee to sell beer during the performance of any event, in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers to patrons within all seating areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, or similar facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the license.

g. Persons operating food concessions at exhibition or exposition halls, convention centers or similar facilities located in any county operating under the urban county executive form of government or any city which is completely surrounded by such county, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer during the event, in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers to patrons or attendees within all seating areas, exhibition areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, and such additional locations designated by the Board in such facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the license. For purposes of this subsection, "exhibition or exposition halls" and "convention centers" mean facilities conducting private or public trade shows or

183 exhibitions in an indoor facility having in excess of 100,000 square feet of floor space.

184 6. Retail off-premises beer licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer in closed
185 containers for off-premises consumption ~~and to deliver the beer to purchasers in accordance with Board~~
186 ~~regulations. All such deliveries of beer shall be performed by the owner or any agent, officer, director,~~
187 ~~shareholder or employee of the licensee.~~

188 7. Retail off-premises brewery licenses to persons holding a brewery license which shall authorize
189 the licensee to ~~(i) sell beer at the place of business designated in the brewery license, in closed~~
190 ~~containers which shall include growlers and other reusable containers, for off-premises consumption and~~
191 ~~(ii) deliver the beer to purchasers in accordance with Board regulations. All such deliveries of beer shall~~
192 ~~be performed by the owner or any agent, officers, directors, shareholders or employee of the licensee.~~

193 8. Retail on-and-off premises beer licenses to persons enumerated in subdivisions 5 a and d, which
194 shall accord all the privileges conferred by retail on-premises beer licenses and in addition, shall
195 authorize the licensee to sell beer in closed containers for off-premises consumption ~~and to deliver the~~
196 ~~beer to purchasers in accordance with Board regulations. All such deliveries of beer shall be performed~~
197 ~~by the owner or any agent, officer, director, shareholder or employee of the licensee.~~

198 § 4.1-209. Wine and beer licenses; advertising.

199 A. The Board may grant the following licenses relating to wine and beer:

200 1. Retail on-premises wine and beer licenses to:

201 a. Hotels, restaurants and clubs, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer, either with
202 or without meals, only in dining areas and other designated areas of such restaurants, or in dining areas,
203 private guest rooms, and other designated areas of such hotels or clubs, for consumption only in such
204 rooms and areas. However, with regard to a hotel classified by the Board as a resort complex, the Board
205 may authorize the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages in all areas within the resort complex
206 deemed appropriate by the Board;

207 b. Persons operating dining cars, buffet cars, and club cars of trains, which shall authorize the
208 licensee to sell wine and beer, either with or without meals, in the dining cars, buffet cars, and club cars
209 so operated by them, for on-premises consumption when carrying passengers;

210 c. Persons operating sight-seeing boats, or special or charter boats, which shall authorize the licensee
211 to sell wine and beer, either with or without meals, on such boats operated by them for on-premises
212 consumption when carrying passengers;

213 d. Persons operating as air carriers of passengers on regular schedules in foreign, interstate or
214 intrastate commerce, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer for consumption by
215 passengers in such airplanes anywhere in or over the Commonwealth while in transit and in designated
216 rooms of establishments of such carriers at airports in the Commonwealth, § 4.1-129 notwithstanding;

217 e. Hospitals, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer in the rooms of patients for
218 their on-premises consumption only in such rooms, provided the consent of the patient's attending
219 physician is first obtained;

220 f. Persons operating food concessions at coliseums, stadia, or similar facilities, which shall authorize
221 the licensee to sell wine and beer in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers, during any event and
222 immediately subsequent thereto, to patrons within all seating areas, concourses, walkways, concession
223 areas and additional locations designated by the Board in such coliseums, stadia or similar facilities, for
224 on-premises consumption. Upon authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his
225 own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the
226 license;

227 g. Persons operating food concessions at any outdoor performing arts amphitheater, arena or similar
228 facility which (i) has seating for more than 20,000 persons and is located in any county with a
229 population between 210,000 and 216,000 or in any city with a population between 392,000 and 394,000,
230 (ii) has capacity for more than 3,500 persons and is located in any county with a population between
231 65,000 and 70,000 or in a city with a population between 40,000 and 47,000, or (iii) has capacity for
232 more than 9,500 persons and is located in any county operated under the county manager form of
233 government. Such license shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer during the performance of
234 any event, in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers to patrons within all seating areas,
235 concourses, walkways, concession areas, or similar facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon
236 authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic
237 beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the license; and

238 h. Persons operating food concessions at exhibition or exposition halls, convention centers or similar
239 facilities located in any county operating under the urban county executive form of government or any
240 city which is completely surrounded by such county, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and
241 beer during the event, in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers to patrons or attendees within all
242 seating areas, exhibition areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, and such additional locations
243 designated by the Board in such facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon authorization of the
244 licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the

premises in all areas and locations covered by the license. For purposes of this subsection, "exhibition or exposition hall" and "convention centers" mean facilities conducting private or public trade shows or exhibitions in an indoor facility having in excess of 100,000 square feet of floor space.

2. Retail off-premises wine and beer licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer in closed containers for off-premises consumption and to deliver the same to purchasers in accordance with Board regulations. All such deliveries of wine or beer shall be performed by the owner or any agent, officer, director, shareholder or employee of the licensee.

3. Gourmet shop licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer in closed containers for off-premises consumption and, the provisions of § 4.1-308 notwithstanding, to give to any person to whom wine or beer may be lawfully sold, (i) a sample of wine, not to exceed one ounce by volume or (ii) a sample of beer not to exceed two ounces by volume, for on-premises consumption.

4. Convenience grocery store licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer in closed containers for off-premises consumption.

5. Retail on-and-off premises wine and beer licenses to persons enumerated in subdivision 1 a, which shall accord all the privileges conferred by retail on-premises wine and beer licenses and in addition, shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer in closed containers for off-premises consumption and to deliver the same to the purchasers, in accordance with Board regulations. All such deliveries of wine or beer shall be performed by the owner or any agent, officer, director, shareholder or employee of the licensee.

6. Banquet licenses to persons in charge of banquets, and to duly organized nonprofit corporations or associations in charge of special events, which shall authorize the licensee to sell or give wine and beer in rooms or areas approved by the Board for the occasion for on-premises consumption in such rooms or areas. Except as provided in § 4.1-215, a separate license shall be required for each day of each banquet or special event. For the purposes of this subdivision, when the location named in the original application for a license is outdoors, the application may also name an alternative location in the event of inclement weather. However, no such license shall be required of any hotel, restaurant, or club holding a retail wine and beer license.

7. Gift shop licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell wine and beer unchilled, only within the interior premises of the gift shop in closed containers for off-premises consumption and to deliver the wine and beer to purchasers in accordance with Board regulations. All such deliveries of wine or beer shall be performed by the owner or any agent, officer, director, shareholder or employee of the licensee.

8. Gourmet brewing shop licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell to any person to whom wine or beer may be lawfully sold, ingredients for making wine or brewing beer, including packaging, and to rent to such persons facilities for manufacturing, fermenting, and bottling such wine or beer, for off-premises consumption in accordance with subdivision 6 of § 4.1-200.

9. Annual banquet licenses, to duly organized private nonprofit fraternal, patriotic or charitable membership organizations that are exempt from state and federal taxation and in charge of banquets conducted exclusively for its members and their guests, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine and beer in rooms or areas approved by the Board for the occasion for on-premises consumption in such rooms or areas. Such license shall authorize the licensee to conduct no more than 12 banquets per calendar year. For the purposes of this subdivision, when the location named in the original application for a license is outdoors, the application may also name an alternative location in the event of inclement weather. However, no such license shall be required of any hotel, restaurant, or club holding a retail wine and beer license.

B. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, persons granted a wine and beer license pursuant to this section may display within their licensed premises point-of-sale advertising materials that incorporate the use of any professional athlete or athletic team, provided that such advertising materials: (i) otherwise comply with the applicable regulations of the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms; and (ii) do not depict any athlete consuming or about to consume alcohol prior to or while engaged in an athletic activity; do not depict an athlete consuming alcohol while the athlete is operating or about to operate a motor vehicle or other machinery; and do not imply that the alcoholic beverage so advertised enhances athletic prowess.

§ 4.1-231. Taxes on state licenses.

A. The annual fees on state licenses shall be as follows:

1. Alcoholic beverage licenses. For each:

a. Distiller's license, if not more than 5,000 gallons of alcohol or spirits, or both, manufactured during the year in which the license is granted, \$450; and if more than 5,000 gallons manufactured during such year, \$3,725;

322 3. Beer licenses. For each:
323 a. Brewery license, if not more than 10,000 barrels of beer manufactured during the year in which
324 the license is granted, \$2,150, and if more than 10,000 barrels manufactured during such year, \$4,300;
325 b. Bottler's license, \$1,430;
326 c. Wholesale beer license, \$930 for any wholesaler who sells 300,000 cases of beer a year or less,
327 and \$1,430 for any wholesaler who sells more than 300,000 but not more than 600,000 cases of beer a
328 year, and \$1,860 for any wholesaler who sells more than 600,000 cases of beer a year;
329 d. Beer importer's license, \$370;
330 e. Retail on-premises beer license to a hotel, restaurant, club or other person, except a common
331 carrier of passengers by train or boat, \$145; for each such license to a common carrier of passengers by
332 train or boat, \$145 per annum for each of the average number of boats, dining cars, buffet cars or club
333 cars operated daily in the Commonwealth;
334 f. Retail off-premises beer license, \$120;
335 g. Retail on-and-off premises beer license to a hotel, restaurant, club or grocery store located in a
336 town or in a rural area outside the corporate limits of any city or town, \$300; and
337 h. Beer shipper's license, \$65.
338 4. Wine and beer licenses. For each:
339 a. Retail on-premises wine and beer license to a hotel, restaurant, club or other person, except a
340 common carrier of passengers by train, boat or airplane, \$300; for each such license to a common
341 carrier of passengers by train or boat, \$300 per annum for each of the average number of boats, dining
342 cars, buffet cars or club cars operated daily in the Commonwealth, and for each such license granted to
343 a common carrier of passengers by airplane, \$750;
344 b. Retail on-premises wine and beer license to a hospital, \$145;
345 c. Retail off-premises wine and beer license, including each gift shop, gourmet shop and convenience
346 grocery store license, \$230;
347 d. Retail on-and-off premises wine and beer license to a hotel, restaurant or club, \$600;
348 e. Banquet license, \$40 per license granted by the Board, except for banquet licenses granted by the
349 Board pursuant to subsection A of § 4.1-215 for events occurring on more than one day, which shall be
350 \$100 per license;
351 f. Gourmet brewing shop license, \$230;
352 g. Wine and beer shipper's license, \$65; and
353 h. Annual banquet license, \$150.
354 5. Mixed beverage licenses. For each:
355 a. Mixed beverage restaurant license granted to persons operating restaurants, including restaurants
356 located on premises of and operated by hotels or motels, or other persons:
357 (i) With a seating capacity at tables for up to 100 persons, \$560;
358 (ii) With a seating capacity at tables for more than 100 but not more than 150 persons, \$975; and
359 (iii) With a seating capacity at tables for more than 150 persons, \$1,430.
360 b. Mixed beverage restaurant license for restaurants located on the premises of and operated by
361 private, nonprofit clubs:
362 (i) With an average yearly membership of not more than 200 resident members, \$750;
363 (ii) With an average yearly membership of more than 200 but not more than 500 resident members,
364 \$1,860; and
365 (iii) With an average yearly membership of more than 500 resident members, \$2,765.
366 c. Mixed beverage caterer's license, \$1,860;
367 d. Mixed beverage special events license, \$45 for each day of each event;

e. Mixed beverage club events licenses, \$35 for each day of each event;
 f. Annual mixed beverage special events license, \$560;
 g. Mixed beverage carrier license:
 (i) \$190 for each of the average number of dining cars, buffet cars or club cars operated daily in the Commonwealth by a common carrier of passengers by train;
 (ii) \$560 for each common carrier of passengers by boat;
 (iii) \$1,475 for each license granted to a common carrier of passengers by airplane.
 h. Annual mixed beverage amphitheater license, \$560;
 i. Annual mixed beverage motor sports race track license, \$560; and
 j. Annual mixed beverage banquet license, \$500.

6. Temporary licenses. For each temporary license authorized by § 4.1-211, one-half of the tax imposed by this section on the license for which the applicant applied.

B. The tax on each such license, except banquet and mixed beverage special events licenses, shall be subject to proration to the following extent: If the license is granted in the second quarter of any year, the tax shall be decreased by one-fourth; if granted in the third quarter of any year, the tax shall be decreased by one-half; and if granted in the fourth quarter of any year, the tax shall be decreased by three-fourths.

If the license on which the tax is prorated is a distiller's license to manufacture not more than 5,000 gallons of alcohol or spirits, or both, during the year in which the license is granted, or a winery license to manufacture not more than 5,000 gallons of wine during the year in which the license is granted, the number of gallons permitted to be manufactured shall be prorated in the same manner.

Should the holder of a distiller's license or a winery license to manufacture not more than 5,000 gallons of alcohol or spirits, or both, or wine, apply during the license year for an unlimited distiller's or winery license, such person shall pay for such unlimited license a license tax equal to the amount that would have been charged had such license been applied for at the time that the license to manufacture less than 5,000 gallons of alcohol or spirits or wine, as the case may be, was granted, and such person shall be entitled to a refund of the amount of license tax previously paid on the limited license.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the tax on each license granted or reissued for a period of less than 12 months shall be equal to one-twelfth of the taxes required by subsection A computed to the nearest cent, multiplied by the number of months in the license period.

C. Nothing in this chapter shall exempt any licensee from any state merchants' license or state restaurant license or any other state tax. Every licensee, in addition to the taxes imposed by this chapter, shall be liable to state merchants' license taxation and state restaurant license taxation and other state taxation the same as if the alcoholic beverages were nonalcoholic. In ascertaining the liability of a beer wholesaler to merchants' license taxation, however, and in computing the wholesale merchants' license tax on a beer wholesaler, the first \$163,800 of beer purchases shall be disregarded; and in ascertaining the liability of a wholesale wine distributor to merchants' license taxation, and in computing the wholesale merchants' license tax on a wholesale wine distributor, the first \$163,800 of wine purchases shall be disregarded.
