9 10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That § 18.2-57 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
10	§ 18.2-57. Assault and battery.
12	A. Any person who commits a simple assault or assault and battery shall be guilty of a Class 1
13	misdemeanor, and if the person intentionally selects the person against whom a simple assault is
14	committed because of his race, religious conviction, color or national origin, the penalty upon conviction
15	shall include a term of confinement of at least six months, 30 days of which shall be a mandatory
16	minimum term of confinement.
17	B. However, if a person intentionally selects the person against whom an assault and battery resulting
18	in bodily injury is committed because of his race, religious conviction, color or national origin, the
19	person shall be guilty of a Class 6 felony, and the penalty upon conviction shall include a term of
20	confinement of at least six months, 30 days of which shall be a mandatory minimum term of
21	confinement.
22	C. In addition, if any person commits an assault or an assault and battery against another knowing or
23	having reason to know that such other person is a law-enforcement officer as defined hereinafter, a
24	correctional officer as defined in § 53.1-1, a person employed by the Department of Corrections directly
25 26	involved in the care, treatment or supervision of inmates in the custody of the Department, a firefighter as defined in § 65.2-102, or a volunteer firefighter or lifesaving or rescue squad member who is a
20 27	member of a bona fide volunteer fire department or volunteer rescue or emergency medical squad
28	regardless of whether a resolution has been adopted by the governing body of a political subdivision
2 9	recognizing such firefighters or members as employees, engaged in the performance of his public duties
30	as such, such person shall be guilty of a Class 6 felony, and, upon conviction, the sentence of such
31	person shall include a mandatory minimum term of confinement of six months.
32	Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to affect the right of any person charged with a
33	violation of this section from asserting and presenting evidence in support of any defenses to the charge
34	that may be available under common law.
35	D. In addition, if any person commits a battery against another knowing or having reason to know
36	that such other person is a full-time or part-time teacher, principal, assistant principal, [or] guidance
37 38	counselor [, or school bus driver] of any public or private elementary or secondary school and is engaged in the performance of his duties as such, he shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor and the
30 39	sentence of such person upon conviction shall include a sentence of 15 days in jail, two days of which
40	shall be a mandatory minimum term of confinement. However, if the offense is committed by use of a
41	firearm or other weapon prohibited on school property pursuant to § 18.2-308.1, the person shall serve a
42	mandatory minimum sentence of confinement of six months.
43	E. As used in this section:
44	"Law-enforcement officer" means any full-time or part-time employee of a police department or
45	sheriff's office which is part of or administered by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision
46	thereof, who is responsible for the prevention or detection of crime and the enforcement of the penal,
47	traffic or highway laws of this Commonwealth, and any conservation officer of the Department of
48 40	Conservation and Recreation commissioned pursuant to § 10.1-115, and game wardens appointed
49 50	pursuant to § 29.1-200, and such officer also includes jail officers in local and regional correctional facilities, all deputy sheriffs, whether assigned to law-enforcement duties, court services or local jail
50 51	responsibilities, auxiliary police officers appointed or provided for pursuant to §§ 15.2-1731 and
52	15.2-1733 and auxiliary deputy sheriffs appointed pursuant to § 15.2-1603.
53	"School security officer" means an individual who is employed by the local school board for the
54	purpose of maintaining order and discipline, preventing crime, investigating violations of school board
55	policies and detaining persons violating the law or school board policies on school property, a school
56	bus or at a school-sponsored activity and who is responsible solely for ensuring the safety, security and
57	welfare of all students, faculty and staff in the assigned school.
58	F. "Simple assault" or "assault and battery" shall not be construed to include the use of, by any

teacher, principal, assistant principal, guidance counselor, school bus driver, or school security officer, in 59 60 the course and scope of his acting official capacity, any of the following: (i) incidental, minor or 61 reasonable physical contact or other actions designed to maintain order and control; (ii) reasonable and 62 necessary force to quell a disturbance or remove a student from the scene of a disturbance that threatens 63 physical injury to persons or damage to property; (iii) reasonable and necessary force to prevent a student from inflicting physical harm on himself; (iv) reasonable and necessary force for self-defense or 64 65 the defense of others; or (v) reasonable and necessary force to obtain possession of weapons or other dangerous objects or controlled substances or associated paraphernalia that are upon the person of the 66 67 student or within his control.

68 In determining whether a person was acting within the exceptions provided in this subsection, due
69 deference shall be given to reasonable judgments that were made by a teacher, principal, assistant
70 principal, guidance counselor, *school bus driver*, or school security officer at the time of the event.
