8 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

9 1. That §§ 2.2-2101, as it is currently effective and as it shall become effective, and 2.2-2666.1 of 10 the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Title 2.2 a chapter numbered 3.1, consisting of sections numbered 2.2-304 through 11 12 2.2-306, as follows:

CHAPTER 3.1.

OFFICE OF COMMONWEALTH PREPAREDNESS.

15 § 2.2-304. Office created; purpose; appointment of Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness; staff. 16

A. There is created in the Office of the Governor, the Office of Commonwealth Preparedness (the 17 18 Office). The purpose of the Office is to work with and through others, including federal, state, and local 19 officials, as well as the private sector, to develop a seamless, coordinated security and preparedness 20 strategy and implementation plan. The Office shall serve as the liaison between the Governor and the 21 federal Department of Homeland Security.

22 B. The Office shall consist of an Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness (the 23 Assistant to the Governor) who shall be appointed by the Governor, for a term commencing on the 24 Monday after the third Wednesday in January, after the Governor's inauguration. The Assistant to the 25 Governor shall be appointed for a term of four years. The appointment shall be subject to confirmation 26 by the General Assembly as provided in § 2.2-106. After the Assistant to the Governor is confirmed by 27 the General Assembly, the Governor shall fill vacancies only in the event of the Assistant to the 28 Governor's resignation, death, disability, or upon removal by the Governor after notification to the 29 Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President pro tempore of the Senate of the reason for 30 removal. Upon such vacancy, the Governor shall appoint a successor for the remainder of the unexpired 31 term that shall be effective until 30 days after the next meeting of the ensuing General Assembly and, if 32 confirmed, thereafter for the remainder of the term.

33 The Assistant to the Governor shall, by reason of professional background have knowledge of 34 military, law enforcement, public safety, or emergency management and preparedness issues, in addition to familiarity with the structure and operations of the federal government and of the Commonwealth. 35 The Assistant to the Governor shall be responsible for the general management of the Office and shall 36 37 perform such duties as may be provided by law or assigned by the Governor. The Assistant to the 38 Governor may appoint such persons as he deems necessary for the efficient conduct of the Office, and 39 apportion, out of the appropriation for the Office, such salaries among such persons as he deems 40 proper, but the aggregate amount paid them shall not exceed the amount provided by law. The Assistant 41 to the Governor shall appoint an interoperability coordinator to review all communications-related grant 42 requests from state agencies and localities to ensure federal grants are used to enhance interoperability. 43 § 2.2-305. Duties of the Office.

44 It shall be the responsibility of the Office, through the Assistant to the Governor, to:

1. Provide oversight, coordination, and review of all disaster, emergency management, and terrorism 45 46 management plans for the state and its agencies.

2. Work with federal officials to obtain additional federal resources and coordinate policy 47 48 development and information exchange.

3. Coordinate working relationships between state agencies and the Governor's Cabinet. 49 50

4. Serve as the point of contact with the federal Department of Homeland Security.

51 5. Serve as the Governor's representative on regional efforts to develop a coordinated security and preparedness strategy, including the National Capitol Region security group organized as part of the 52 53 federal Urban Areas Security Initiative.

54 6. Serve as a direct liaison between the Governor and local governments and first responders on 55 issues of emergency prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery.

56 7. Educate the public on homeland security and overall preparedness issues. REENROLLED

57 8. Serve as chairman of the Secure Commonwealth Panel.

58 9. Encourage public safety volunteer efforts throughout the state.

59 10. Serve as vice-chairman of the Virginia Military Advisory Council to establish a working 60 relationship with Virginia's active duty military bases.

61 11. Coordinate the development of a formula for allocation of State Homeland Security Program 62 funds to localities and state agencies in compliance with federal grant guidance and constraints and which formula shall be, to the extent permissible under federal constraints, based on actual risk and 63 64 threat.

65 12. Establish regional working groups to meet regularly and focus on regional initiatives in training, 66 equipment, and strategy to ensure ready access to response teams in times of emergency and facilitate 67 testing and training exercises for emergencies and mass casualty preparedness.

13. Provide oversight and review of the Virginia Department of Emergency Management's annual 68 statewide assessment of local and regional capabilities, including equipment, training, personnel, 69 70 response times, and other factors.

71 14. Do all acts necessary to ensure that available federal and state resources are directed toward 72 safeguarding Virginia and its citizens. 73

§ 2.2-306. Secure Commonwealth Panel; membership; duties; compensation; staff.

74 A. The Secure Commonwealth Panel (the Panel), is established as an advisory board, within the 75 meaning of § 2.2-2100, in the executive branch of state government. The Panel shall consist of 29 members as follows: three members of the House of Delegates and two nonlegislative citizens to be 76 77 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates; three members of the Senate of Virginia and two 78 nonlegislative citizens to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; the Lieutenant Governor; the 79 Attorney General; the Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness, the Secretaries of Commerce and Trade, Health and Human Resources, Public Safety, Technology and Transportation; two 80 local first responders; three local government representatives; two physicians with knowledge of public 81 health; and four additional members from the private sector. Except for appointments made by the 82 Speaker of the House of Delegates and the Senate Committee on Rules, all other appointments shall be 83 84 made by the Governor. Additional ex officio members may be appointed to the Panel by the Governor at 85 his discretion. The Assistant to the Governor of the Office shall be the chairman of the Panel.

B. The Panel shall monitor and assess the implementation of statewide prevention, preparedness, 86 response, and recovery initiatives and where necessary to review, evaluate, and make recommendations 87 relating to the emergency preparedness of government at all levels in the Commonwealth. Additionally, 88 89 the Panel shall facilitate cabinet-level coordination among the various agencies of state government 90 related to emergency preparedness and shall facilitate private sector preparedness and communication. 91 The Panel shall make quarterly reports to the Governor concerning the state's emergency preparedness, 92 response, recovery, and prevention efforts.

93 C. Members of the Panel shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for all 94 reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties as provided in § 2.2-2825. 95

D. Staff support for the Panel shall be provided by the Office of Commonwealth Preparedness. § 2.2-2101. (Effective until July 1, 2008) Prohibition against service by legislators on boards, 96 97 commissions, and councils within the executive branch; exceptions.

98 Members of the General Assembly shall be ineligible to serve on boards, commissions, and councils 99 within the executive branch of state government who are responsible for administering programs established by the General Assembly. Such prohibition shall not extend to boards, commissions, and 100 councils engaged solely in policy studies or commemorative activities. If any law directs the 101 102 appointment of any member of the General Assembly to a board, commission, or council in the 103 executive branch of state government that is responsible for administering programs established by the 104 General Assembly, such portion of such law shall be void, and the Governor shall appoint another 105 person from the Commonwealth at large to fill such a position.

128 § 2.2-2101. (Effective July 1, 2008) Prohibition against service by legislators on boards,
 129 commissions, and councils within the executive branch; exceptions.

Members of the General Assembly shall be ineligible to serve on boards, commissions, and councils within the executive branch of state government who are responsible for administering programs established by the General Assembly. Such prohibition shall not extend to boards, commissions, and councils engaged solely in policy studies or commemorative activities. If any law directs the appointment of any member of the General Assembly to a board, commission, or council in the executive branch of state government that is responsible for administering programs established by the General Assembly, such portion of such law shall be void, and the Governor shall appoint another person from the Commonwealth at large to fill such a position.

\$ 2.2-2666.1. Council created; composition; compensation and expenses; meetings; chairman's
 executive summary.

A. The Virginia Military Advisory Council (the Council) is hereby created as an advisory council, within the meaning of § 2.2-2100, in the executive branch of state government, to maintain a cooperative and constructive relationship between the Commonwealth and the leadership of the several Armed Forces of the United States and the military commanders of such Armed Forces stationed in the commonwealth, and to encourage regular communication on continued military facility viability, the exploration of privatization opportunities and issues affecting preparedness, public safety and security.

B. The Council shall be composed of 25 members as follows: the Lieutenant Governor, the Attorney 167 168 General, the Adjutant General, the Chairman of the House Committee on Militia, Police and Public 169 Safety and the Chairman of the Senate Committee on General Laws, or their designees; four members, 170 one of whom shall be a representative of the Virginia State Defense Force, to be appointed by and serve 171 at the pleasure of the Governor; and 16 members, including representatives of major military commands 172 and installations located in the Commonwealth or in jurisdictions adjacent thereto, who shall be 173 appointed by the Governor after consideration of the persons nominated by the Secretaries of the Armed 174 Forces of the United States and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. However, any 175 legislative member who is appointed by the Governor shall serve a term coincident with his term of office. The provisions of § 49-1 shall not apply to federal civilian officials and military personnel 176 177 appointed to the Council.

178 C. Legislative members of the Council shall receive such compensation as provided in § 30-19.12,

and nonlegislative members shall receive such compensation as provided in § 2.2-2813 for the performance of their duties. All members shall be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813 and 2.2-2825. Funding for the costs of compensation and expenses of the members shall be provided by the Department of Military Affairs.

184 D. The Council shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership. The vice-chairman of the Council shall be the Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness.
186 The meetings of the Council shall be held at the call of the chairman or whenever the majority of members so request. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

E. The chairman of the Council shall submit to the Governor and the General Assembly an annual
 executive summary of the interim activity and work of the Council no later than the first day of each
 regular session of the General Assembly. The executive summary shall be submitted as provided in the
 procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents
 and reports and shall be posted on the General Assembly's website.
