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065359836 1 **SENATE BILL NO. 363** 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 3 (Proposed by the Senate Committee on General Laws and Technology 4 on February 1, 2006) 5 (Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Wampler) 6 A BILL amend and reenact § 2.2-2666.1 and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Title 2.2 a 7 chapter numbered 3.1, consisting of sections numbered 2.2-304 through 2.2-306, relating to the 8 Office of Commonwealth Preparedness; Secure Commonwealth Panel. 9 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That § 2.2-2666.1 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Title 2.2 a chapter numbered 3.1, consisting of sections 10 11 numbered 2.2-304 through 2.2-306, as follows: 12 13 CHAPTER 3.1. 14 OFFICE OF COMMONWEALTH PREPAREDNESS. 15 § 2.2-304. Office created; purpose; appointment of Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth 16 Preparedness: staff. 17 A. There is created in the Office of the Governor, the Office of Commonwealth Preparedness (the Office). The purpose of the Office is to work with and through others, including federal, state, and local 18 19 officials, as well as the private sector, to develop a seamless, coordinated security and preparedness 20 strategy and implementation plan. The Office shall serve as the liaison between the Governor and the 21 federal Department of Homeland Security. 22 B. The Office shall consist of an Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness (the 23 Assistant to the Governor) who shall be appointed by the Governor, for a term commencing on the 24 Monday after the third Wednesday in January after the Governor's inauguration. The Assistant to the 25 Governor shall be appointed for a term of four years. The appointment shall be subject to confirmation by the General Assembly as provided in § 2.2-106. After the Assistant to the Governor is confirmed by 26 27 the General Assembly, the Governor shall fill vacancies only in the event of the Assistant to the 28 Governor's resignation, death, disability, or upon removal of the Governor after notification to the Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President pro tempore of the Senate of the reason for 29 30 removal. Upon such vacancy, the Governor shall appoint a successor for the remainder of the unexpired term which shall be effective until 30 days after the next meeting of the ensuing General Assembly and, 31 32 if confirmed, thereafter for the remainder of the term. The Assistant to the Governor shall, by reason of professional experience, be familiar with the structure and operations of the federal government and of the Commonwealth. The Assistant to the 33 34 35 Governor shall be responsible for the general management of the Office and shall perform such duties 36 as may be provided by law or assigned by the Governor. The Assistant to the Governor may appoint 37 such persons as he deems necessary for the efficient conduct of the Office, and apportion, out of the 38 appropriation for the Office, such salaries among such persons as he deems proper, but the aggregate 39 amount paid them shall not exceed the amount provided by law. The Assistant to the Governor shall 40 appoint an interoperability coordinator to review all communications-related grant requests from state agencies and localities to ensure federal grants are used to enhance interoperability. § 2.2-305. Duties of the Office. It shall be the responsibility of the Office, through the Assistant to the Governor, to: 1. Provide oversight, coordination, and review of all disaster, emergency management, and terrorism 45 management plans for the state and its agencies. 2. Work with federal officials to obtain additional federal resources and coordinate policy 46 47 development and information exchange. **48** 3. Coordinate working relationships between state agencies and the Governor's Cabinet. 49 4. Serve as the point of contact with the federal Department of Homeland Security. 50 5. Serve as the Governor's representative on regional efforts to develop a coordinated security and 51 preparedness strategy, including the National Capitol Region security group organized as part of the 52 federal Urban Areas Security Initiative. 53 6. Serve as a direct liaison between the Governor and local governments and first responders on issues of emergency prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery. 54 55 7. Educate the public on homeland security and overall preparedness issues. 8. Serve as chairman of the Secure Commonwealth Panel. 56 57 9. Encourage public safety volunteer efforts throughout the state. 10. Serve as vice-chairman of the Virginia Military Advisory Council to establish a working 58 59 relationship with Virginia's active duty military bases.

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60 11. Coordinate the development of a formula for allocation of State Homeland Security Program 61 funds to localities and state agencies in compliance with federal grant guidance and constraints and 62 which formula shall be, to the extent permissible under federal constraints, based on actual risk and 63 threat.

64 12. Establish regional working groups to meet regularly and focus on regional initiatives in training, 65 equipment, and strategy to ensure ready access to response teams in times of emergency and facilitate 66 testing and training exercises for emergencies and mass casualty preparedness.

13. Provide oversight and review of the Virginia Department of Emergency Management's annual 67 statewide assessment of local and regional capabilities, including equipment, training, personnel, 68 69 response times, and other factors.

70 14. Do all acts necessary to ensure that available federal and state resources are directed toward 71 safeguarding Virginia and its citizens. 72

§ 2.2-306. Secure Commonwealth Panel; membership; duties; compensation; staff.

A. The Secure Commonwealth Panel (the Panel), is established as an advisory board, within the 73 74 meaning of § 2.2-2100, in the executive branch of state government. The Panel shall consist of 28 75 members as follows: three members of the House of Delegates and two nonlegislative citizens to be 76 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates; three members of the Senate of Virginia and two 77 nonlegislative citizens to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; the Lieutenant Governor; the 78 Attorney General; the Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness, the Secretaries of 79 Commerce and Trade, Health and Human Resources, Public Safety, and Transportation; two local first 80 responders; three local government representatives; two physicians with knowledge of public health; and four additional members from the private sector. Except for appointments made by the Speaker of the House of Delegates and the Senate Committee on Rules, all other appointments shall be made by the 81 82 83 Governor. Additional ex officio members may be appointed to the Panel by the Governor at his discretion. The Assistant to the Governor of the Office shall be the chairman of the Panel. 84

85 B. The Panel shall monitor and assess the implementation of statewide prevention, preparedness, 86 response, and recovery initiatives and where necessary to review, evaluate, and make recommendations 87 relating to the emergency preparedness of government at all levels in the Commonwealth. Additionally, 88 the Panel shall facilitate cabinet-level coordination among the various agencies of state government 89 related to emergency preparedness and shall facilitate private sector preparedness and communication. 90 The Panel shall make quarterly reports to the Governor concerning the state's emergency preparedness, 91 response, recovery, and prevention efforts.

92 C. Members of the Panel shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for all 93 reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties as provided in § 2.2-2825. 94

D. Staff support for the Panel shall be provided by the Office of Commonwealth Preparedness.

§ 2.2-2666.1. Council created; composition; compensation and expenses; meetings; chairman's 95 96 executive summary.

A. The Virginia Military Advisory Council (the Council) is hereby created as an advisory council, within the meaning of § 2.2-2100, in the executive branch of state government, to maintain a 97 98 99 cooperative and constructive relationship between the Commonwealth and the leadership of the several 100 Armed Forces of the United States and the military commanders of such Armed Forces stationed in the Commonwealth, and to encourage regular communication on continued military facility viability, the 101 102 exploration of privatization opportunities and issues affecting preparedness, public safety and security.

103 B. The Council shall be composed of 25 members as follows: the Lieutenant Governor, the Attorney General, the Adjutant General, the Chairman of the House Committee on Militia, Police and Public 104 Safety and the Chairman of the Senate Committee on General Laws, or their designees; four members, 105 one of whom shall be a representative of the Virginia State Defense Force, to be appointed by and serve 106 at the pleasure of the Governor; and 16 members, including representatives of major military commands 107 108 and installations located in the Commonwealth or in jurisdictions adjacent thereto, who shall be 109 appointed by the Governor after consideration of the persons nominated by the Secretaries of the Armed 110 Forces of the United States and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. However, any legislative member who is appointed by the Governor shall serve a term coincident with his term of 111 office. The provisions of § 49-1 shall not apply to federal civilian officials and military personnel 112 113 appointed to the Council.

114 C. Legislative members of the Council shall receive such compensation as provided in § 30-19.12, and nonlegislative members shall receive such compensation as provided in § 2.2-2813 for the 115 performance of their duties. All members shall be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses 116 incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813 and 2.2-2825. Funding for the 117 118 costs of compensation and expenses of the members shall be provided by the Department of Military 119 Affairs.

120 D. The Council shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership. The 121 vice-chairman of the Council shall be the Assistant to the Governor for Commonwealth Preparedness. 122 The meetings of the Council shall be held at the call of the chairman or whenever the majority of 123 members so request. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

E. The chairman of the Council shall submit to the Governor and the General Assembly an annual executive summary of the interim activity and work of the Council no later than the first day of each regular session of the General Assembly. The executive summary shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be posted on the General Assembly's website.

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
