## AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Finance  
on February 9, 2006)

A *BILL to amend and reenact §§ 2.2-3706, 2.2-3802, 9.1-102, 9.1-902 through 9.1-910, 9.1-913, 9.1-914, 9.1-918, 18.2-48, 18.2-61, 18.2-67.1, 18.2-67.2, 18.2-370.2, 18.2-472.1, 19.2-169.3, 19.2-299, 19.2-303, 19.2-390.1, 22.1-79, 22.1-79.3, 37.2-900, 37.2-903, 37.2-904, 37.2-905, 37.2-906, 37.2-907, 37.2-908, 37.2-910, 37.2-912, 37.2-919, 46.2-323, 46.2-324, 46.2-330, 46.2-345, 46.2-348, 53.1-115.1, 53.1-116.1, 53.1-121, 53.1-160.1, and 63.2-105 of the Code of Virginia, and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Chapter 9 of Title 9.1 a section numbered 9.1-921, and by adding sections numbered 16.1-249.1, 16.1-278.7:01, 16.1-278.7:02, 18.2-370.3, 18.2-370.4, 19.2-295.2:1 23-2.2:1, 37.2-900.1, 37.2-920, 53.1-23.2, and 53.1-116.1:01, relating to the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry; sex crimes; civil commitment of sexual predators; penalties.*

**Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:**

1. That §§ 2.2-3706, 2.2-3802, 9.1-102, 9.1-902 through 9.1-910, 9.1-913, 9.1-914, 9.1-918, 18.2-48, 18.2-61, 18.2-67.1, 18.2-67.2, 18.2-370.2, 18.2-472.1, 19.2-169.3, 19.2-299, 19.2-303, 19.2-390.1, 22.1-79, 22.1-79.3, 37.2-900, 37.2-903, 37.2-904, 37.2-905, 37.2-906, 37.2-907, 37.2-908, 37.2-910, 37.2-912, 37.2-919, 46.2-323, 46.2-324, 46.2-330, 46.2-345, 46.2-348, 53.1-115.1, 53.1-116.1, 53.1-121, 53.1-160.1, and 63.2-105 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted, and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 9 of Title 9.1 a section numbered 9.1-921, and by adding sections numbered 16.1-249.1, 16.1-278.7:01, 16.1-278.7:02, 18.2-370.3, 18.2-370.4, 19.2-295.2:1, 23-2.2:1, 37.2-900.1, 37.2-920, 53.1-23.2, and 53.1-116.1:01, as follows:

§ 2.2-3706. Disclosure of criminal records; limitations.

A. As used in this section:

"Criminal incident information" means a general description of the criminal activity reported, the date and general location the alleged crime was committed, the identity of the investigating officer, and a general description of any injuries suffered or property damaged or stolen.

B. Law-enforcement agencies shall make available upon request criminal incident information relating to felony offenses. However, where the release of criminal incident information is likely to jeopardize an ongoing investigation or prosecution, or the safety of an individual; cause a suspect to flee or evade detection; or result in the destruction of evidence, such information may be withheld until the above-referenced damage is no longer likely to occur from release of the information. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to prohibit the release of those portions of such information that are not likely to cause the above-referenced damage.

C. Information in the custody of law-enforcement agencies relative to the identity of any individual, other than a juvenile, who is arrested and charged, and the status of the charge or arrest shall be released.

D. The identity of any victim, witness or undercover officer, or investigative techniques or procedures need not but may be disclosed unless disclosure is prohibited or restricted under § 19.2-11.2.

E. The identity of any individual providing information about a crime or criminal activity under a promise of anonymity shall not be disclosed.

F. The following records are excluded from the provisions of this chapter, but may be disclosed by the custodian, in his discretion, except where such disclosure is prohibited by law:

1. Complaints, memoranda, correspondence, case files or reports, witness statements, and evidence relating to a criminal investigation or prosecution, other than criminal incident information as defined in subsection A;

2. Adult arrestee photographs when necessary to avoid jeopardizing an investigation in felony cases until such time as the release of the photograph will no longer jeopardize the investigation;

3. Reports submitted in confidence to (i) state and local law-enforcement agencies, (ii) investigators authorized pursuant to § 53.1-16 or § 66-3.1, and (iii) campus police departments of public institutions of higher education established pursuant to Chapter 17 (§ 23-232 et seq.) of Title 23;

4. Portions of records of local government crime commissions that would identify individuals providing information about crimes or criminal activities under a promise of anonymity;

5. Records of local law-enforcement agencies relating to neighborhood watch programs that include the names, addresses, and operating schedules of individual participants in the program that are provided to such agencies under a promise of anonymity;

6. All records of persons imprisoned in penal institutions in the Commonwealth provided such

60 records relate to the imprisonment;

61 7. Records of law-enforcement agencies, to the extent that such records contain specific tactical  
62 plans, the disclosure of which would jeopardize the safety or security of law-enforcement personnel or  
63 the general public;

64 8. All records of adult persons under (i) investigation or supervision by a local pretrial services  
65 agency in accordance with Article 5 (§ 19.2-152.2 et seq.) of Chapter 9 of Title 19.2; (ii) investigation,  
66 probation supervision or monitoring by a local community-based probation program in accordance with  
67 Article 9 (§ 9.1-173 et seq.) of Chapter 1 of Title 9.1; or (iii) investigation or supervision by state  
68 probation and parole services in accordance with Article 2 (§ 53.1-141 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title  
69 53.1; and

70 9. Records of a law-enforcement agency to the extent that they disclose the telephone numbers for  
71 cellular telephones, pagers, or comparable portable communication devices provided to its personnel for  
72 use in the performance of their official duties.

73 G. Records kept by law-enforcement agencies as required by § 15.2-1722 shall be subject to the  
74 provisions of this chapter except:

75 1. Those portions of noncriminal incident or other investigative reports or materials containing  
76 identifying information of a personal, medical or financial nature provided to a law-enforcement agency  
77 where the release of such information would jeopardize the safety or privacy of any person;

78 2. Those portions of any records containing information related to plans for or resources dedicated to  
79 undercover operations; or

80 3. Records of background investigations of applicants for law-enforcement agency employment or  
81 other confidential administrative investigations conducted pursuant to law.

82 H. *Records of the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry maintained by the Department*  
83 *of State Police pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900) of Title 9.1 are excluded from the provisions of this*  
84 *chapter, including information obtained from state, local and regional officials, except to the extent that*  
85 *information is required to be posted on the internet pursuant to § 9.1-913.*

86 I. In the event of conflict between this section as it relates to requests made under this section and  
87 other provisions of law, this section shall control.

88 § 2.2-3802. Systems to which chapter inapplicable.

89 The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to personal information systems:

90 1. Maintained by any court of the Commonwealth;

91 2. Which may exist in publications of general circulation;

92 3. Contained in the Criminal Justice Information System as defined in §§ 9.1-126 through 9.1-137 or  
93 *in the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry maintained by the Department of State Police*  
94 *pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, except to the extent that information is required to*  
95 *be posted on the internet pursuant to § 9.1-913;*

96 4. Contained in the Virginia Juvenile Justice Information System as defined in §§ 16.1-222 through  
97 16.1-225;

98 5. Maintained by agencies concerning persons required by law to be licensed in the Commonwealth  
99 to engage in the practice of any profession, in which case the names and addresses of persons applying  
100 for or possessing the license may be disseminated upon written request to a person engaged in the  
101 profession or business of offering professional educational materials or courses for the sole purpose of  
102 providing the licensees or applicants for licenses with informational materials relating solely to available  
103 professional educational materials or courses, provided the disseminating agency is reasonably assured  
104 that the use of the information will be so limited;

105 6. Maintained by the Parole Board, the Crime Commission, the Judicial Inquiry and Review  
106 Commission, the Virginia Racing Commission, and the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control;

107 7. Maintained by the Department of State Police; police departments of cities, counties, and towns;  
108 and the campus police departments of public institutions of higher education as established by Chapter  
109 17 (§ 23-232 et seq.) of Title 23, and that deal with investigations and intelligence gathering relating to  
110 criminal activity; and maintained by local departments of social services regarding alleged cases of child  
111 abuse or neglect while such cases are also subject to an ongoing criminal prosecution;

112 8. Maintained by the Virginia Port Authority as provided in § 62.1-134.1 or 62.1-132.4;

113 9. Maintained by the Virginia Tourism Authority in connection with or as a result of the promotion  
114 of travel or tourism in the Commonwealth, in which case names and addresses of persons requesting  
115 information on those subjects may be disseminated upon written request to a person engaged in the  
116 business of providing travel services or distributing travel information, provided the Virginia Tourism  
117 Authority is reasonably assured that the use of the information will be so limited;

118 10. Maintained by the Division of Consolidated Laboratory Services of the Department of General  
119 Services and the Department of Forensic Science, which deal with scientific investigations relating to  
120 criminal activity or suspected criminal activity, except to the extent that § 9.1-1104 may apply;

121 11. Maintained by the Department of Corrections that deal with investigations and intelligence

gathering by persons acting under the provisions of § 53.1-16; and

12. Maintained by the Department of the State Internal Auditor or internal audit departments of state agencies or institutions that deal with communications and investigations relating to the State Employee Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline.

§ 9.1-102. Powers and duties of the Board and the Department.

The Department, under the direction of the Board, which shall be the policy-making body for carrying out the duties and powers hereunder, shall have the power and duty to:

1. Adopt regulations, pursuant to the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), for the administration of this chapter including the authority to require the submission of reports and information by law-enforcement officers within the Commonwealth. Any proposed regulations concerning the privacy, confidentiality, and security of criminal justice information shall be submitted for review and comment to any board, commission, or committee or other body which may be established by the General Assembly to regulate the privacy, confidentiality, and security of information collected and maintained by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof;

2. Establish compulsory minimum training standards subsequent to employment as a law-enforcement officer in (i) permanent positions, and (ii) temporary or probationary status, and establish the time required for completion of such training;

3. Establish minimum training standards and qualifications for certification and recertification for law-enforcement officers serving as field training officers;

4. Establish compulsory minimum curriculum requirements for in-service and advanced courses and programs for schools, whether located in or outside the Commonwealth, which are operated for the specific purpose of training law-enforcement officers;

5. Establish (i) compulsory minimum training standards for law-enforcement officers who utilize radar or an electrical or microcomputer device to measure the speed of motor vehicles as provided in § 46.2-882 and establish the time required for completion of the training and (ii) compulsory minimum qualifications for certification and recertification of instructors who provide such training;

6. Establish compulsory training courses for law-enforcement officers in laws and procedures relating to entrapment, search and seizure, evidence, and techniques of report writing, which training shall be completed by law-enforcement officers who have not completed the compulsory training standards set out in subdivision 2, prior to assignment of any such officers to undercover investigation work. Failure to complete the training shall not, for that reason, constitute grounds to exclude otherwise properly admissible testimony or other evidence from such officer resulting from any undercover investigation;

7. Establish compulsory minimum entry-level, in-service and advanced training standards for those persons designated to provide courthouse and courtroom security pursuant to the provisions of § 53.1-120, and to establish the time required for completion of such training;

8. Establish compulsory minimum entry-level, in-service and advanced training standards for deputy sheriffs designated to serve process pursuant to the provisions of § 8.01-293, and establish the time required for the completion of such training;

9. Establish compulsory minimum entry-level, in-service, and advanced training standards for persons employed as deputy sheriffs and jail officers by local criminal justice agencies and for correctional officers employed by the Department of Corrections under the provisions of Title 53.1, and establish the time required for completion of such training;

10. Establish compulsory minimum training standards for all dispatchers employed by or in any local or state government agency, whose duties include the dispatching of law-enforcement personnel. Such training standards shall apply only to dispatchers hired on or after July 1, 1988;

11. Consult and cooperate with counties, municipalities, agencies of the Commonwealth, other state and federal governmental agencies, and with universities, colleges, community colleges, and other institutions, whether located in or outside the Commonwealth, concerning the development of police training schools and programs or courses of instruction;

12. Approve institutions, curricula and facilities, whether located in or outside the Commonwealth, for school operation for the specific purpose of training law-enforcement officers; but this shall not prevent the holding of any such school whether approved or not;

13. Establish and maintain police training programs through such agencies and institutions as the Board deems appropriate;

14. Establish compulsory minimum qualifications of certification and recertification for instructors in criminal justice training schools approved by the Department;

15. Conduct and stimulate research by public and private agencies which shall be designed to improve police administration and law enforcement;

16. Make recommendations concerning any matter within its purview pursuant to this chapter;

17. Coordinate its activities with those of any interstate system for the exchange of criminal history record information, nominate one or more of its members to serve upon the council or committee of any

183 such system, and participate when and as deemed appropriate in any such system's activities and  
184 programs;

185 18. Conduct inquiries and investigations it deems appropriate to carry out its functions under this  
186 chapter and, in conducting such inquiries and investigations, may require any criminal justice agency to  
187 submit information, reports, and statistical data with respect to its policy and operation of information  
188 systems or with respect to its collection, storage, dissemination, and usage of criminal history record  
189 information and correctional status information, and such criminal justice agencies shall submit such  
190 information, reports, and data as are reasonably required;

191 19. Conduct audits as required by § 9.1-131;

192 20. Conduct a continuing study and review of questions of individual privacy and confidentiality of  
193 criminal history record information and correctional status information;

194 21. Advise criminal justice agencies and initiate educational programs for such agencies with respect  
195 to matters of privacy, confidentiality, and security as they pertain to criminal history record information  
196 and correctional status information;

197 22. Maintain a liaison with any board, commission, committee, or other body which may be  
198 established by law, executive order, or resolution to regulate the privacy and security of information  
199 collected by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof;

200 23. Adopt regulations establishing guidelines and standards for the collection, storage, and  
201 dissemination of criminal history record information and correctional status information, and the privacy,  
202 confidentiality, and security thereof necessary to implement state and federal statutes, regulations, and  
203 court orders;

204 24. Operate a statewide criminal justice research center, which shall maintain an integrated criminal  
205 justice information system, produce reports, provide technical assistance to state and local criminal  
206 justice data system users, and provide analysis and interpretation of criminal justice statistical  
207 information;

208 25. Develop a comprehensive, statewide, long-range plan for strengthening and improving law  
209 enforcement and the administration of criminal justice throughout the Commonwealth, and periodically  
210 update that plan;

211 26. Cooperate with, and advise and assist, all agencies, departments, boards and institutions of the  
212 Commonwealth, and units of general local government, or combinations thereof, including planning  
213 district commissions, in planning, developing, and administering programs, projects, comprehensive  
214 plans, and other activities for improving law enforcement and the administration of criminal justice  
215 throughout the Commonwealth, including allocating and subgranting funds for these purposes;

216 27. Define, develop, organize, encourage, conduct, coordinate, and administer programs, projects and  
217 activities for the Commonwealth and units of general local government, or combinations thereof, in the  
218 Commonwealth, designed to strengthen and improve law enforcement and the administration of criminal  
219 justice at every level throughout the Commonwealth;

220 28. Review and evaluate programs, projects, and activities, and recommend, where necessary,  
221 revisions or alterations to such programs, projects, and activities for the purpose of improving law  
222 enforcement and the administration of criminal justice;

223 29. Coordinate the activities and projects of the state departments, agencies, and boards of the  
224 Commonwealth and of the units of general local government, or combination thereof, including planning  
225 district commissions, relating to the preparation, adoption, administration, and implementation of  
226 comprehensive plans to strengthen and improve law enforcement and the administration of criminal  
227 justice;

228 30. Do all things necessary on behalf of the Commonwealth and its units of general local  
229 government, to determine and secure benefits available under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe  
230 Streets Act of 1968 (P.L. 90-351, 82 Stat. 197), as amended, and under any other federal acts and  
231 programs for strengthening and improving law enforcement, the administration of criminal justice, and  
232 delinquency prevention and control;

233 31. Receive, administer, and expend all funds and other assistance available to the Board and the  
234 Department for carrying out the purposes of this chapter and the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe  
235 Streets Act of 1968, as amended;

236 32. Apply for and accept grants from the United States government or any other source in carrying  
237 out the purposes of this chapter and accept any and all donations both real and personal, and grants of  
238 money from any governmental unit or public agency, or from any institution, person, firm or  
239 corporation, and may receive, utilize and dispose of the same. Any arrangements pursuant to this section  
240 shall be detailed in the annual report of the Board. Such report shall include the identity of the donor,  
241 the nature of the transaction, and the conditions, if any. Any moneys received pursuant to this section  
242 shall be deposited in the state treasury to the account of the Department. To these ends, the Board shall  
243 have the power to comply with conditions and execute such agreements as may be necessary;

244 33. Make and enter into all contracts and agreements necessary or incidental to the performance of

its duties and execution of its powers under this chapter, including but not limited to, contracts with the United States, units of general local government or combinations thereof, in Virginia or other states, and with agencies and departments of the Commonwealth;

34. Adopt and administer reasonable regulations for the planning and implementation of programs and activities and for the allocation, expenditure and subgranting of funds available to the Commonwealth and to units of general local government, and for carrying out the purposes of this chapter and the powers and duties set forth herein;

35. Certify and decertify law-enforcement officers in accordance with §§ 15.2-1706 and 15.2-1707;

36. Establish training standards and publish a model policy for law-enforcement personnel in the handling of family abuse, domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking cases, including standards for determining the predominant physical aggressor in accordance with § 19.2-81.3;

37. Establish training standards and publish a model policy for law-enforcement personnel in communicating with and facilitating the safe return of individuals diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease;

38. Establish compulsory training standards for basic training and the recertification of law-enforcement officers to ensure sensitivity to and awareness of cultural diversity and the potential for biased policing;

39. Review and evaluate community-policing programs in the Commonwealth, and recommend where necessary statewide operating procedures, guidelines, and standards which strengthen and improve such programs, including sensitivity to and awareness of cultural diversity and the potential for biased policing;

40. Publish and disseminate a model policy or guideline that may be used by state and local agencies to ensure that law-enforcement personnel are sensitive to and aware of cultural diversity and the potential for biased policing;

41. [Expired.]

42. Establish a Virginia Law-Enforcement Accreditation Center. The Center shall, in cooperation with Virginia law-enforcement agencies, provide technical assistance and administrative support, including staffing, for the establishment of voluntary state law-enforcement accreditation standards. The Center may provide accreditation assistance and training, resource material, and research into methods and procedures that will assist the Virginia law-enforcement community efforts to obtain Virginia accreditation status;

43. Promote community policing philosophy and practice throughout the Commonwealth by providing community policing training and technical assistance statewide to all law-enforcement agencies, community groups, public and private organizations and citizens; developing and distributing innovative policing curricula and training tools on general community policing philosophy and practice and contemporary critical issues facing Virginia communities; serving as a consultant to Virginia organizations with specific community policing needs; facilitating continued development and implementation of community policing programs statewide through discussion forums for community policing leaders, development of law-enforcement instructors; promoting a statewide community policing initiative; and serving as a statewide information source on the subject of community policing including, but not limited to periodic newsletters, a website and an accessible lending library;

44. Establish, in consultation with the Department of Education and the Virginia State Crime Commission, compulsory minimum standards for employment and job-entry and in-service training curricula and certification requirements for school security officers, which training and certification shall be administered by the Virginia Center for School Safety pursuant to § 9.1-184. Such training standards shall include, but shall not be limited to, the role and responsibility of school security officers, relevant state and federal laws, school and personal liability issues, security awareness in the school environment, mediation and conflict resolution, disaster and emergency response, and student behavioral dynamics. The Department shall establish an advisory committee consisting of local school board representatives, principals, superintendents, and school security personnel to assist in the development of these standards and certification requirements;

45. Establish training standards and publish a model policy and protocols for local and regional sexual assault response teams;

46. License and regulate property bail bondsmen and surety bail bondsmen in accordance with Article 11 (§ 9.1-185 et seq.) of this chapter;

47. (Effective October 1, 2005) License and regulate bail enforcement agents in accordance with Article 12 (§ 9.1-186 et seq.) of this chapter; ~~and~~

48. *In conjunction with the Virginia State Police and the State Compensation Board, advise criminal justice agencies regarding investigation, registration, and dissemination of information requirements as they pertain to the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Act (§ 9.1-900 et seq.); and*

49. Perform such other acts as may be necessary or convenient for the effective performance of its

346 *jurisdiction* where the offender was convicted.

347 C. Juveniles adjudicated delinquent shall not be required to register; however, where the offender is a  
348 juvenile over the age of 13 at the time of the offense who is tried as a juvenile and is adjudicated  
349 delinquent of any offense enumerated in subdivisions A 1 through A 4 on or after July 1, 2005, the  
350 court may, in its discretion and upon motion of the attorney for the Commonwealth, find that the  
351 circumstances of the offense require offender registration. In making its determination, the court shall  
352 consider all of the following factors that are relevant to the case: (i) the degree to which the delinquent  
353 act was committed with the use of force, threat or intimidation, (ii) the age and maturity of the  
354 complaining witness, (iii) the age and maturity of the offender, (iv) the difference in the ages of the  
355 complaining witness and the offender, (v) the nature of the relationship between the complaining witness  
356 and the offender, (vi) the offender's prior criminal history, and (vii) any other aggravating or mitigating  
357 factors relevant to the case.

358 § 9.1-903. Registration procedures.

359 A. Every person convicted, including juveniles tried and convicted in the circuit courts pursuant to  
360 § 16.1-269.1, whether sentenced as an adult or juvenile, of an offense for which registration is required  
361 and every juvenile found delinquent of an offense for which registration is required under subsection C  
362 of § 9.1-902 shall be required upon conviction to register and reregister with the Department of State  
363 Police. The court shall order the person to provide to the local law-enforcement agency of the county or  
364 city where he physically resides all information required by the State Police for inclusion in the  
365 Registry. The court shall *immediately* remand the person to the custody of the local law-enforcement  
366 agency for the purpose of obtaining the person's fingerprints and photographs of a type and kind  
367 specified by the State Police for inclusion in the Registry. ~~The~~ *Upon conviction, the local*

law-enforcement agency shall *forthwith* forward to the State Police all the necessary registration information ~~within seven days of the date of sentencing.~~

B. Every person required to register shall register in person within ~~10~~ *three* days of his release from confinement in a state, local or juvenile correctional facility, in a state civil commitment program for sexually violent predators or, if a sentence of confinement is not imposed, within ~~10~~ *three* days of suspension of the sentence or in the case of a juvenile of disposition. *A person required to register shall register, submit to be photographed as part of the registration, and submit to have a sample of his blood, saliva, or tissue taken for DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) analysis to determine identification characteristics specific to the person, and provide information regarding place of employment.* The local law-enforcement agency shall obtain from the person who presents himself for registration or reregistration ~~two sets~~ *one set* of fingerprints, *place of employment information*, proof of residency and ~~two photographs~~ *a photograph* of a type and kind specified by the State Police for inclusion in the Registry and advise the person of his duties regarding reregistration. *The local law-enforcement agency shall obtain from the person who presents himself for registration a sample of his blood, saliva or tissue taken for DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) analysis to determine identification characteristics specific to the person. If a sample has been previously taken from the person, as indicated by the Local Inmate Data System (LIDS), no additional sample shall be taken.* The local law-enforcement agency shall ~~promptly~~ *forthwith* forward to the State Police all necessary registration information.

C. To establish proof of residence in Virginia, a person shall present one photo-identification form issued by a governmental agency of the Commonwealth which contains the person's complete name, gender, date of birth and complete *physical* address.

D. Any person required to register shall also reregister in person with the local law-enforcement agency following any change of residence, whether within or without the Commonwealth. If his new residence is within the Commonwealth, the person shall register in person with the local law-enforcement agency where his new residence is located within ~~10~~ *three* days following his change in residence. If the new residence is located outside of the Commonwealth, the person shall register in person with the local law-enforcement agency where he previously registered within 10 days prior to his change of residence. If a probation or parole officer becomes aware of a change of residence for any of his probationers or parolees required to register, the probation or parole officer shall notify the State Police within ~~10 days~~ *forthwith* of learning of the change of residence. Whenever a person subject to registration changes residence to another state, the State Police shall notify the designated law-enforcement agency of that state.

E. Any person required to register shall reregister in person with the local law-enforcement agency where his residence is located within three days following any change of the place of employment, whether within or without the Commonwealth. *If a probation or parole officer becomes aware of a change of the place of employment for any of his probationers or parolees required to register, the probation or parole officer shall notify the State Police forthwith upon learning of the change of the person's place of employment. Whenever a person subject to registration changes his place of employment to another state, the State Police shall notify the designated law-enforcement agency of that state.*

F. The registration shall be maintained in the Registry and shall include the person's name, all aliases that he has used or under which he may have been known, the date and locality of the conviction for which registration is required, his fingerprints and a photograph of a type and kind specified by the State Police, his date of birth, social security number, current physical and mailing address and a description of the offense or offenses for which he was convicted. The registration shall also include the locality of the conviction and a description of the offense or offenses for previous convictions for the offenses set forth in § 9.1-902.

~~F~~ G. The local law-enforcement agency shall ~~promptly~~ *forthwith* forward to the State Police all necessary registration or reregistration information received by it. Upon receipt of registration or reregistration information the State Police shall forthwith notify the chief law-enforcement officer of the locality listed as the person's address on the registration and reregistration.

§ 9.1-904. Reregistration.

Every person required to register, other than a person convicted of a sexually violent offense *or murder*, shall reregister with the State Police on an annual basis from the date of the initial registration. Every person convicted of a sexually violent offense *or murder* shall reregister with the State Police every 90 days from the date of initial registration. Reregistration means that the person has notified the State Police, confirmed his current physical and mailing address and provided such other information, including identifying information, which the State Police may require. Upon registration and as may be necessary thereafter, the State Police shall provide the person with an address verification form to be used for reregistration. The form shall contain in bold print a statement indicating that failure to comply with the registration required is punishable as a ~~Class 4 misdemeanor~~ *or a Class 6 felony* as provided in

429 § 18.2-472.1.

430 *B. Any person convicted of a violation of § 18.2-472.1, other than a person convicted of a sexually*  
431 *violent offense or murder, shall register with the State Police every 180 days from the date of such*  
432 *conviction. Any person convicted of a violation of § 18.2-472.1, in which such person was included on*  
433 *the Registry for a conviction of a sexually violent offense or murder, shall reregister with the State*  
434 *Police every 30 days from the date of conviction. Reregistration means the person has notified the State*  
435 *Police, confirmed his current physical and mailing address and provided such other information,*  
436 *including identifying information, which the State Police may require. Upon registration and as may be*  
437 *necessary thereafter, the State Police shall provide the person with an address verification form to be*

441 *C. Every person required to register pursuant to this chapter shall submit to be photographed by a*

443 *Photographs shall be in color, be taken with the registrant facing the camera, and clearly show the*  
444 *registrant's face and shoulders only. No person other than the registrant may appear in the photograph*  
445 *submitted. The photograph shall indicate the registrant's full name, date of birth and the date the*  
446 *photograph was taken. The local law-enforcement agency shall forthwith forward the photograph and*  
447 *the registration form to the State Police. Where practical, the local law-enforcement agency may*  
448 *electronically transfer a digital photograph containing the required information to the Sex Offender and*  
449 *Crimes Against Minors Registry within the State Police.*

450 § 9.1-905. New residents and nonresident offenders; registration required.

451 A. All persons required to register shall register within ~~40~~ *three* days of establishing a residence in  
452 the Commonwealth.

453 B. Nonresident offenders entering the Commonwealth for an extended visit, for employment, to carry  
454 on a vocation, or as a student attending school who are required to register in their state of residence or  
455 who would be required to register if a resident of the Commonwealth shall, within ~~40~~ *three* days of  
456 entering the Commonwealth for an extended visit, accepting employment or enrolling in school in the  
457 Commonwealth, be required to register and reregister in person with the local law-enforcement agency.

458 C. To document employment or school attendance in Virginia a person shall present proof of  
459 enrollment as a student or suitable proof of temporary employment in the Commonwealth and one  
460 photo-identification form issued by a governmental agency of the person's state of residence which  
461 contains the person's complete name, gender, date of birth and complete address.

462 D. For purposes of this section:

463 "Employment" and "carry on a vocation" include employment that is full-time or part-time for a  
464 period of time exceeding 14 days or for an aggregate period of time exceeding 30 days during any  
465 calendar year, whether financially compensated, volunteered, or for the purpose of government or  
466 educational benefit.

467 "Extended visit" means a period of visitation for any purpose in the Commonwealth of 30 days or  
468 more.

469 "Student" means a person who is enrolled on a full-time or part-time basis, in any public or private  
470 educational institution, including any secondary school, trade or professional institution, or institution of  
471 higher education.

472 § 9.1-906. Enrollment or employment at institution of higher learning; information required.

473 A. Persons required to register or reregister who are enrolled in or employed at institutions of higher  
474 learning shall, in addition to other registration requirements, indicate on their registration and  
475 reregistration form the name and location of the institution attended by or employing the registrant  
476 whether such institution is within or without the Commonwealth. In addition, persons required to register  
477 or reregister shall notify the local law-enforcement agency in person within ~~40~~ *three* days of any change  
478 in their enrollment or employment status with an institution of higher learning. The local  
479 law-enforcement agency shall ~~promptly~~ *forthwith* forward to the State Police all necessary registration or  
480 reregistration information received by it.

481 B. Upon receipt of a registration or reregistration indicating enrollment or employment with an  
482 institute of higher learning or notification of a change in status, the State Police shall notify the chief  
483 law-enforcement officer of the institution's law-enforcement agency or, if there is no institutional  
484 law-enforcement agency, the local law-enforcement agency serving that institution, of the registration,  
485 reregistration, or change in status. The law-enforcement agency receiving notification under this section  
486 shall make such information available upon request.

487 C. For purposes of this section:

488 "Employment" includes full- or part-time, temporary or permanent or contractual employment at an  
489 institution of higher learning either with or without compensation.

490 "Enrollment" includes both full- and part-time.



"Institution of higher learning" means any post-secondary school, trade or professional institution, or institution of higher education.

§ 9.1-907. Procedures upon a failure to register or reregister.

A. Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with the duty to register or reregister, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant *or assist in obtaining an indictment* charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person last registered or reregistered or, if the person failed to comply with the duty to register, in the jurisdiction in which the person was last convicted of an offense for which registration or reregistration is required *or if the person was convicted of an offense requiring registration outside the Commonwealth, in the jurisdiction in which the person resides*. The State Police shall forward to the jurisdiction an affidavit signed by the custodian of the records that such person failed to comply with the duty to register or reregister. Such affidavit shall be admitted into evidence as prima facie evidence of the failure to comply with the duty to register or reregister in any trial for the violation of § 18.2-472.1. The State Police shall also promptly notify the local law-enforcement agency of the jurisdiction of the person's last known residence as shown in the records of the State Police.

B. Nothing in this section shall prohibit a law-enforcement officer employed by a sheriff's office or police department of a locality from enforcing the provisions of this chapter, *including obtaining a warrant, or assisting in obtaining an indictment for a violation of § 18.2-472.1. The local law-enforcement agency shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this chapter or under the authority granted pursuant to this section.*

C. *The State Police shall physically verify or cause to be physically verified the registration information within 30 days of the initial registration and semi-annually each year thereafter and within 30 days of a change of address of all persons required to register pursuant to this chapter. Whenever it appears that a person has provided false registration information, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe that a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person last registered or reregistered. The State Police shall forward to the jurisdiction an affidavit signed by the custodian of the records that such person failed to comply with the provisions of this chapter. Such affidavit shall be admitted into evidence as prima facie evidence of the failure to comply with the provisions of this chapter in any trial for the violation of § 18.2-472.1. The State Police shall also promptly notify the local law-enforcement agency of the jurisdiction of the person's last known residence as shown in the records of the State Police.*

§ 9.1-908. Duration of registration requirement.

Any person required to register or reregister shall be required to register for a period of 10 years from the date of initial registration *or for a period of 10 years from the date of his last conviction for a violation of § 18.2-472.1*, except that any person who has been convicted of (i) any sexually violent offense, ~~or~~ (ii) *murder or* (iii) former § 18.2-67.2:1 shall have a continuing duty to reregister for life.

Any period of confinement in a federal, state or local correctional facility, hospital or any other institution or facility during the otherwise applicable 10-year period shall toll the registration period and the duty to reregister shall be extended. Persons confined in a federal, state, or local correctional facility shall not be required to reregister until released from custody.

§ 9.1-909. Relief from registration or reregistration.

A. Upon expiration of three years from the date upon which the duty to register as a sexually violent offender *or murderer* is imposed, the person required to register may petition the court in which he was convicted *or, if the conviction occurred outside of the Commonwealth, the circuit court in the jurisdiction where he currently resides*, for relief from the requirement to reregister every 90 days. *After five years from the date of his last conviction for a violation of § 18.2-472.1, a sexually violent offender or murderer may petition for relief from the requirement to reregister every 30 days. A person who is required to register may similarly petition the circuit court for relief from the requirement to reregister every 180 days after five years from the date of his last conviction for a violation of § 18.2-472.1.* The court shall hold a hearing on the petition, on notice to the attorney for the Commonwealth, to determine whether the person suffers from a mental abnormality or a personality disorder that makes the person a menace to the health and safety of others or significantly impairs his ability to control his sexual behavior. Prior to the hearing the court shall order a comprehensive assessment of the applicant by a panel of three certified sex offender treatment providers as defined in § 54.1-3600. A report of the assessment shall be filed with the court prior to the hearing. The costs of the assessment shall be taxed as costs of the proceeding.

If, after consideration of the report and such other evidence as may be presented at the hearing, the court finds by clear and convincing evidence that the person does not suffer from a mental abnormality or a personality disorder that makes the person a menace to the health and safety of others or

552 significantly impairs his ability to control his sexual behavior, the petition shall be granted and the duty  
553 to reregister ~~every 90 days more frequently than once a year~~ shall be terminated. The court shall  
554 promptly notify the State Police upon entry of an order granting the petition ~~and the State Police shall~~  
555 ~~remove Registry information on the offender from the Internet system.~~ The person shall, however, be  
556 under a continuing duty to register annually for life. If the petition is denied, the duty to reregister ~~every~~  
557 ~~90 days with the same frequency as before~~ shall continue. An appeal from the denial of a petition shall  
558 lie to the Supreme Court.

559 A petition for relief pursuant to this subsection may not be filed within three years from the date on  
560 which any previous petition for such relief was denied.

561 B. The duly appointed guardian of a person convicted of an offense requiring registration or  
562 reregistration as either a sex offender ~~or~~, sexually violent offender *or murderer*, who due to a physical  
563 condition is incapable of (i) reoffending and (ii) reregistering, may petition the court in which the person  
564 was convicted for relief from the requirement to reregister. The court shall hold a hearing on the  
565 petition, on notice to the attorney for the Commonwealth, to determine whether the person suffers from  
566 a physical condition that makes the person (i) no longer a menace to the health and safety of others and  
567 (ii) incapable of reregistering. Prior to the hearing the court shall order a comprehensive assessment of  
568 the applicant by at least two licensed physicians other than the person's primary care physician. A report  
569 of the assessment shall be filed with the court prior to the hearing. The costs of the assessment shall be  
570 taxed as costs of the proceeding.

571 If, after consideration of the report and such other evidence as may be presented at the hearing, the  
572 court finds by clear and convincing evidence that due to his physical condition the person (i) no longer  
573 poses a menace to the health and safety of others and (ii) is incapable of reregistering, the petition shall  
574 be granted and the duty to reregister shall be terminated. However, for a person whose duty to reregister  
575 was terminated under this subsection, the Department of State Police shall, annually for sex offenders  
576 and quarterly for *persons convicted of sexually violent offenders offenses and murder*, verify and report  
577 to the attorney for the Commonwealth in the jurisdiction in which the person resides that the person  
578 continues to suffer from the physical condition that resulted in such termination.

579 The court shall promptly notify the State Police upon entry of an order granting the petition to  
580 terminate the duty to reregister ~~and the State Police shall remove any Registry information on the~~

582 If the petition is denied, the duty to reregister shall continue. An appeal from the denial of a petition  
583 shall be to the Virginia Supreme Court.

584 A petition for relief pursuant to this subsection may not be filed within three years from the date on  
585 which any previous petition for such relief was denied.

586 If, at any time, the person's physical condition changes so that he is capable of reoffending or  
587 reregistering, the attorney for the Commonwealth shall file a petition with the circuit court in the  
588 jurisdiction where the person resides and the court shall hold a hearing on the petition, with notice to  
589 the person and his guardian, to determine whether the person still suffers from a physical condition that  
590 makes the person (i) no longer a menace to the health and safety of others and (ii) incapable of  
591 reregistering. If the petition is granted, the duty to reregister shall commence from the date of the court's  
592 order. An appeal from the denial or granting of a petition shall be to the Virginia Supreme Court. Prior  
593 to the hearing the court shall order a comprehensive assessment of the applicant by at least two licensed  
594 physicians other than the person's primary care physician. A report of the assessment shall be filed with  
595 the court prior to the hearing. The costs of the assessment shall be taxed as costs of the proceeding.

596 § 9.1-910. Removal of name and information from Registry.

597 A. Any person required to register, other than a person who has been convicted of any (i) sexually  
598 violent offense, (ii) two or more offenses for which registration is required ~~or~~, (iii) a violation of former  
599 § 18.2-67.2:1, *or (iv) murder*, may petition the circuit court in which he was convicted or the circuit  
600 court in the jurisdiction where he then resides for removal of his name and all identifying information  
601 from the Registry. A petition may not be filed earlier than 10 years after the date of initial registration  
602 *nor earlier than 10 years from the date of his last conviction for a violation of § 18.2-472.1.* The court  
603 shall hold a hearing on the petition at which the applicant and any interested persons may present  
604 witnesses and other evidence. If, after such hearing, the court is satisfied that such person no longer  
605 poses a risk to public safety, the court shall grant the petition. In the event the petition is not granted,  
606 the person shall wait at least 24 months from the date of the denial to file a new petition for removal  
607 from the Registry.

608 B. The State Police shall remove from the Registry the name of any person and all identifying  
609 information upon receipt of an order granting a petition pursuant to subsection A or at the end of the  
610 period for which the person is required to register under § 9.1-908.

611 § 9.1-913. Public dissemination by means of the Internet.

612 The State Police shall develop and maintain a system for making certain Registry information on  
613 persons convicted of ~~murder of a minor and violent sex offenders~~ *an offense for which registration is*

required publicly available by means of the Internet. The information to be made available shall include the offender's name; all aliases that he has used or under which he may have been known; the date and locality of the conviction and a brief description of the offense; his age, current address and photograph; and such other information as the State Police may from time to time determine is necessary to preserve public safety including but not limited to the fact that an individual is wanted for failing to register or reregister. The system shall be secure and not capable of being altered except by the State Police. The system shall be updated each business day with newly received registrations and reregistrations. The State Police shall remove all information that it knows to be inaccurate from the Internet system.

§ 9.1-914. Automatic notification of registration to certain entities; electronic notification to requesting persons.

Any school, day-care service and child-minding service, and any state-regulated or state-licensed child day center, child day program, children's residential facility, family day home or foster home as defined in § 63.2-100, *nursing home or certified nursing facility as defined in § 32.1-123 and any institution of higher education* may request from the State Police and, upon compliance with the requirements therefor established by the State Police, shall be eligible to receive from the State Police electronic notice of the registration or reregistration of any sex offender. ~~Entities that request and are entitled to this notification, and that~~ *and if such entities* do not have the capability of receiving such electronic notice, *the entity* may register with the State Police to receive written notification of sex offender registration or reregistration. Within three business days of receipt by the State Police of registration or reregistration, the State Police shall electronically or in writing notify an entity *listed above* that has requested such notification, has complied with the requirements established by the State Police and is located in the same or a contiguous zip code area as the address of the offender as shown on the registration.

*Any person may request from the State Police and, upon compliance with the requirements therefor established by the State Police, shall be eligible to receive from the State Police electronic notice of the registration or reregistration of any sex offender. Within three business days of receipt by the State Police of registration or reregistration, the State Police shall electronically notify a person who has requested such notification, has complied with the requirements established by the State Police and is located in the same or a contiguous zip code area as the address of the offender as shown on the registration.*

The State Police shall establish reasonable guidelines governing the automatic dissemination of Registry information, which may include the payment of a fee, whether a one-time fee or a regular assessment, to maintain the electronic access. The fee, if any, shall defray the costs of establishing and maintaining the electronic notification system and notice by mail.

For the purposes of this section,:

*"Child-minding service" means provision of temporary custodial care or supervisory services for the minor child of another;*

*"day-care Day-care service" means provision of supplementary care and protection during a part of the day for the minor child of another; "child-minding service" means provision of temporary custodial care or supervisory services for the minor child of another; and*

*"school School" means any public, religious or private educational institution, including any preschool, elementary school, secondary school, post-secondary school, trade or professional institution, or institution of higher education.*

§ 9.1-918. Misuse of registry information; penalty.

Use of registry information for purposes not authorized by this chapter is prohibited, the unlawful use of the information contained in or derived from the Registry for purposes of intimidating or harassing another is prohibited, and a willful violation of this chapter is a Class 1 misdemeanor. *For purposes of this section, absent other aggravating circumstances, the mere republication or reasonable distribution of material contained on or derived from the publicly available Internet sex offender database shall not be deemed intimidation or harassment.*

§ 9.1-921. Exemption of information systems from provisions related to the Virginia Information Technologies Agency.

*The provisions of Chapter 20.1 (§ 2.2-2005 et seq.) of Title 2.2 shall not apply to the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, operated by the Department of State Police or to information technology as defined in § 2.2-2006 operated by the Department of Juvenile Justice, Department of Corrections or the Virginia Compensation Board that interact, furnish, update, contain or exchange information with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry.*

§ 16.1-249.1 *Places of confinement to give notice of intake of certain persons.*

A. *At the time of receipt of any person, for whom registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1 into a secure*

675 facility, the secure facility shall obtain from that person all necessary registration information, including  
676 fingerprints and photographs of a type and kind approved by the Department of State Police. A person  
677 required to register shall register and submit to be photographed as part of the registration. The  
678 facility shall forthwith forward the registration information to the Department of State Police on the  
679 date of the receipt of the prisoner.

680 B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A,  
681 the facility shall promptly investigate or request the State Police promptly investigate and, if there is  
682 probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant, or assist in obtaining an  
683 indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was received.  
684 The facility shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this section.

685 § 16.1-278.7:01. Department to give notice of the receipt of certain persons.

686 A. At the time or receipt of any person, for whom registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes  
687 Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the  
688 Department shall obtain from that person all necessary registration information, including fingerprints  
689 and photographs of a type and kind approved by the Department of State Police. A person required to  
690 register shall register and submit to be photographed as part of the registration. The Department shall  
691 forthwith forward the registration information and photograph to the Department of State Police on the  
692 date of the receipt of the person.

693 B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A,  
694 the Department shall promptly investigate or request the State Police promptly investigate and, if there  
695 is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or petition or assist in obtaining  
696 an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was received.  
697 The Department shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this section.

698 § 16.1-278.7:02. Department to give notice of Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry  
699 requirements to certain persons.

700 A. Prior to the release or discharge of any persons for whom registration with the Sex Offender and  
701 Crimes Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the  
702 Department shall give notice to the persons of his duty to register with the State Police. A person  
703 required to register shall register, submit to be photographed as part of the registration, and provide  
704 information regarding place of employment, if available, to the Department. The Department shall also  
705 obtain from that person all necessary registration information, including fingerprints and photographs of  
706 a type and kind approved by the Department of State Police; inform the person of his duties regarding  
707 reregistration and change of address; and inform the person of his duty to register. The Department of  
708 Juvenile Justice shall forward the registration information to the Department of State Police on the date  
709 of the person's release or discharge.

710 B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A,  
711 the Department shall promptly investigate or request the State Police promptly investigate and, if there  
712 is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an  
713 indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was discharged.  
714 The Department shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this section.

715 § 18.2-48. Abduction with intent to extort money or for immoral purpose.

716 Abduction (i) with the intent to extort money or pecuniary benefit, (ii) of any person with intent to  
717 defile such person, or (iii) of any child under sixteen years of age for the purpose of concubinage or  
718 prostitution, shall be a Class 2 felony. If the sentence imposed for a violation of (ii) or (iii) includes a  
719 term of confinement less than life imprisonment, the judge shall impose, in addition to any active  
720 sentence, a suspended sentence of no less than 40 years. This suspended sentence shall be suspended for  
721 the remainder of the defendant's life subject to revocation by the court.

722 § 18.2-61. Rape.

723 A. If any person has sexual intercourse with a complaining witness, whether or not his or her spouse,  
724 or causes a complaining witness, whether or not his or her spouse, to engage in sexual intercourse with  
725 any other person and such act is accomplished (i) against the complaining witness's will, by force, threat  
726 or intimidation of or against the complaining witness or another person; or (ii) through the use of the  
727 complaining witness's mental incapacity or physical helplessness; or (iii) with a child under age 13 as  
728 the victim, he or she shall be guilty of rape.

729 B. A violation of this section shall be punishable, in the discretion of the court or jury, by  
730 confinement in a state correctional facility for life or for any term not less than five years; the penalty  
731 for a violation of subdivision A (iii), where the offender is more than three years older than the victim,  
732 if done in the commission of, or as part of the same course of conduct as, or as part of a common  
733 scheme or plan as a violation of (i) subsection A of § 18.2-47 or § 18.2-48, (ii) § 18.2-89, 18.2-90 or  
734 18.2-91, or (iii) § 18.2-51.2, shall include a mandatory minimum term of confinement of 25 years. If the  
735 term of confinement imposed for any violation of subdivision A (iii), where the offender is more than  
736 three years older than the victim, is for a term less than life imprisonment, the judge shall impose, in

addition to any active sentence, a suspended sentence of no less than 40 years. This suspended sentence shall be suspended for the remainder of the defendant's life, subject to revocation by the court.

. There shall be a rebuttable presumption that a juvenile over the age of 10 but less than 12, does not possess the physical capacity to commit a violation of this section. In any case deemed appropriate by the court, all or part of any sentence imposed for a violation under this section against a spouse may be suspended upon the defendant's completion of counseling or therapy, if not already provided, in the manner prescribed under § 19.2-218.1 if, after consideration of the views of the complaining witness and such other evidence as may be relevant, the court finds such action will promote maintenance of the family unit and will be in the best interest of the complaining witness.

C. Upon a finding of guilt under this section, when a spouse is the complaining witness in any case tried by the court without a jury, the court, without entering a judgment of guilt, upon motion of the defendant who has not previously had a proceeding against him for violation of this section dismissed pursuant to this subsection and with the consent of the complaining witness and the attorney for the Commonwealth, may defer further proceedings and place the defendant on probation pending completion of counseling or therapy, if not already provided, in the manner prescribed under § 19.2-218.1. 2. The act is accomplished against the will of the complaining witness, by force, threat or intimidation of or against the complaining witness or another person, or through the use of the complaining witness's mental incapacity or physical helplessness.

B. Forcible sodomy is a felony punishable by confinement in a state correctional facility for life or for any term not less than five years. *The penalty for a violation of subdivision A 1, where the offender is more than three years older than the victim, if done in the commission of, or as part of the same course of conduct as, or as part of a common scheme or plan as a violation of (i) subsection A of § 18.2-47 or § 18.2-48, (ii) § 18.2-89, 18.2-90 or 18.2-91, or (iii) § 18.2-51.2, shall include a mandatory minimum term of confinement of 25 years. If the term of confinement imposed for any violation of subdivision A 1, where the offender is more than three years older than the victim, is for a term less than life imprisonment, the judge shall impose, in addition to any active sentence, a suspended sentence of no less than 40 years. This suspended sentence shall be suspended for the remainder of the defendant's life, subject to revocation by the court.*

In any case deemed appropriate by the court, all or part of any sentence imposed for a violation under this section against a spouse may be suspended upon the defendant's completion of counseling or therapy, if not already provided, in the manner prescribed under § 19.2-218.1 if, after consideration of the views of the complaining witness and such other evidence as may be relevant, the court finds such action will promote maintenance of the family unit and will be in the best interest of the complaining witness.

C. 836 subsection B of § 18.2-366, where the victim of one of the foregoing offenses was a minor, or (ii)  
837 subsection A (iii) of § 18.2-61, §§ 18.2-63, 18.2-64.1, subdivision A 1 of § 18.2-67.1, subdivision A 1 of  
838 § 18.2-67.2, or subdivision A 1 or A 4 (a) of § 18.2-67.3, or §§ 18.2-370, 18.2-370.1, clause (ii) of  
839 § 18.2-371, §§ 18.2-374.1, 18.2-374.1:1 or § 18.2-379. *As of July 1, 2006, "offense prohibiting proximity*  
840 *to children" shall include a violation of § 18.2-472.1, when the offense requiring registration was one of*  
841 *the foregoing offenses.*

842 B. Every adult who is convicted of an offense prohibiting proximity to children when the offense  
843 occurred on or after July 1, 2000, shall as part of his sentence be forever prohibited from loitering  
844 within 100 feet of the premises of any place he knows or has reason to know is a primary, secondary or  
845 high school. *In addition, every adult who is convicted of an offense prohibiting proximity to children*  
846 *when the offense occurred on or after July 1, 2006, shall as part of his sentence be forever prohibited*  
847 *from loitering within 100 feet of the premises of any place he knows or has reason to know is a child*  
848 *day program as defined in § 63.2-100.*

849 A violation of this section is punishable as a Class 6 felony.

850 § 18.2-370.3. Sex offenses prohibiting residing in proximity to children; penalty.

851 A. Every adult who is convicted of an offense occurring on or after July 1, 2006, where the offender  
852 is more than three years older than the victim, of one of the following qualifying offenses: (i)  
853 subdivision A (iii) of § 18.2-61, (ii) subdivision A 1 of § 18.2-67.1 or (iii) subdivision A 1 of § 18.2-67.2,  
854 shall be forever prohibited from residing within 500 feet of the premises of any place he knows or has  
855 reason to know is a child day center as defined in § 63.2-100, or a primary, secondary, or high school.  
856 A violation of this section is a Class 6 felony. The provisions of this section shall only apply if the  
857 qualifying offense was done in the commission of, or as part of the same course of conduct as, or as  
858 part of a common scheme or plan as a violation of (i) subsection A of § 18.2-47 or § 18.2-48, (ii)  
859 § 18.2-89, 18.2-90 or 18.2-91, or (iii) § 18.2-51.2,

*B. An adult whose residence is within 500 feet of a child day center or a primary, secondary, or high school at the time of conviction of an offense listed in subsection A may continue to reside at such residence and may return to such residence following incarceration without being in violation of this section. However, an adult who moves away from such a residence that he occupied at the time of conviction is in violation of this section if he reoccupies his residence at such location. An adult who is convicted of an offense listed in subsection A and has established a residence shall not be in violation of this section if a child day center or a primary, secondary, or high school is established within 500 feet of his residence subsequent to his conviction.*

*§ 18.2-370.4. Sex offenses prohibiting working on school property; penalty.*

*A. Every adult who has been convicted of an offense occurring on or after July 1, 2006, where the offender is more than three years older than the victim, of one of the following qualifying offenses: (i) subdivision A (iii) of § 18.2-61, (ii) subdivision A 1 of § 18.2-67.1 or (iii) subdivision A 1 of § 18.2-67.2, shall be forever prohibited from working or engaging in any volunteer activity on property he knows or has reason to know is public or private elementary or secondary school or child day center property. A violation of this section is punishable as a Class 6 felony. The provisions of this section shall only apply if the qualifying offense was done in the commission of, or as part of the same course of conduct as, or as part of a common scheme or plan as a violation of (i) subsection A of § 18.2-47 or § 18.2-48, (ii) § 18.2-89, 18.2-90 or 18.2-91, or (iii) § 18.2-51.2,*

*B. Both the person who employs or procures as a volunteer a convicted person who violated this section, and the school or child day center where the violation of this section occurred, are immune from civil liability unless they had actual knowledge that such person had been convicted of an offense listed in subsection A.*

*§ 18.2-472.1. Providing false information or failing to provide registration information; penalty; prima facie evidence.*

*A. Any person subject to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, other than a person convicted of a sexually violent offense or murder as defined in § 9.1-902, who knowingly fails to register or reregister, or who knowingly provides materially false information to the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. A second or subsequent conviction for an offense under this subsection is a Class 6 felony.*

*However, any B. Any person convicted of a sexually violent offense or murder, as defined in § 9.1-902, who knowingly fails to register or reregister, or who knowingly provides materially false information to the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is guilty of a Class 6 felony. A second or subsequent conviction for an offense under this subsection is a Class 5 felony.*

*C. A prosecution pursuant to this section shall be brought in the city or county where the offender can be found or where the offender last registered or reregistered or, if the offender failed to comply with the duty to register, where the offender was last convicted of an offense for which registration or reregistration is required.*

*D. At any trial pursuant to this section, an affidavit from the State Police issued as required in § 9.1-907 shall be admitted into evidence as prima facie evidence of the failure to comply with the duty to register or reregister and a copy of such affidavit shall be provided to the registrant or his counsel seven days prior to hearing or trial by the attorney for the Commonwealth.*

*E. For the purposes of this section any conviction for a substantially similar offense under the laws of (i) any foreign country or any political subdivision thereof, (ii) any state or territory of the United States or any political subdivision thereof, the District of Columbia, or the United States shall be considered a prior conviction.*

*§ 19.2-169.3. Disposition of the unrestorably incompetent defendant; capital murder charge; referral to Commitment Review Committee.*

*A. If, at any time after the defendant is ordered to undergo treatment pursuant to subsection A of § 19.2-169.2, the director of the treating facility concludes that the defendant is likely to remain incompetent for the foreseeable future, he shall send a report to the court so stating. The report shall also indicate whether, in the director's opinion, the defendant should be released, committed pursuant to Article 5 (§ 37.2-814 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 37.2, committed pursuant to ~~§ 37.2-908~~ Chapter 9 (§ 37.2-900 et seq.) of Title 37.2, or certified pursuant to § 37.2-806 in the event he is found to be unrestorably incompetent. Upon receipt of the report, the court shall make a competency determination according to the procedures specified in subsection E of § 19.2-169.1. If the court finds that the defendant is incompetent and is likely to remain so for the foreseeable future, it shall order that he be (i) released, (ii) committed pursuant to Article 5 (§ 37.2-814 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 37.2, (iii) reviewed for commitment pursuant to ~~§ 37.2-905~~ Chapter 9 (§ 37.2-900 et seq.) of Title 37.2, or (iv) certified pursuant to § 37.2-806. If the court finds the defendant incompetent but restorable to competency in the foreseeable future, it may order treatment continued until six months have elapsed from the date of the defendant's initial admission under subsection A of § 19.2-169.2.*



921 B. At the end of six months from the date of the defendant's initial admission under subsection A of  
922 § 19.2-169.2 if the defendant remains incompetent in the opinion of the director, the director shall so  
923 notify the court and make recommendations concerning disposition of the defendant as described above.  
924 The court shall hold a hearing according to the procedures specified in subsection E of § 19.2-169.1 and,  
925 if it finds the defendant unrestorably incompetent, shall order one of the dispositions described above. If  
926 the court finds the defendant incompetent but restorable to competency, it may order continued treatment

935 D. If the court orders an unrestorably incompetent defendant to be reviewed for commitment  
936 pursuant to ~~§ 37.2-905~~ § 37.2-904, it shall order the attorney for the Commonwealth in the jurisdiction  
937 wherein the defendant was charged and the Commissioner of the Department of Mental Health, Mental  
938 Retardation and Substance Abuse Services to provide the ~~Attorney General~~ *Commitment Review*  
939 *Committee established pursuant to § 37.2-902* with any information relevant to the review, including, but  
940 not limited to: (i) a copy of the warrant or indictment, (ii) a copy of the defendant's criminal record, (iii)

948 violent predator after conducting a review pursuant to § 37.2-905, the court shall order that the  
949 defendant be released, committed pursuant to Article 5 (§ 37.2-814 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 37.2,  
950 or certified pursuant to § 37.2-806.

951 E. In any case when an incompetent defendant is charged with capital murder, notwithstanding any  
952 other provision of this section, the charge shall not be dismissed and the court having jurisdiction over  
953 the capital murder case may order that the defendant receive continued treatment under subsection A of  
954 § 19.2-169.2 for additional six-month periods without limitation, provided that (i) a hearing pursuant to  
955 subsection E of § 19.2-169.1 is held at the completion of each such period, (ii) the defendant remains  
956 incompetent, (iii) the court finds continued treatment to be medically appropriate, and (iv) the defendant  
957 presents a danger to himself or others.

958 F. The attorney for the Commonwealth may bring charges that have been dismissed against the

962 A. *For offenses committed on or after July 1, 2006:*

963 1. *At the time the court imposes a sentence upon a conviction for a first violation of subsection A of*  
964 *§ 18.2-472.1 the court shall impose an added term of postrelease supervision of six months.*

965 2. *For a second or subsequent violation of subsection A of § 18.2-472.1 when both violations*  
966 *occurred after July 1, 2006, or a first violation of subsection B of § 18.2-472.1, the court shall impose*  
967 *an added term of postrelease supervision by the Department of Corrections of two years.*

968 3. *For a second or subsequent violation of subsection B of § 18.2-472.1 when both violations*  
969 *occurred after July 1, 2006, the court shall impose an added term of supervision by the Department of*  
970 *Corrections of five years.*

971 *Any terms of postrelease supervision imposed pursuant to this section shall be in addition to any*  
972 *other punishment imposed, including any periods of active incarceration or suspended periods of*  
973 *incarceration, if any.*

974 B. *The court shall order that any term of postrelease supervision imposed pursuant to this section*  
975 *be suspended, and the defendant be placed on active supervision under a postrelease supervision*

1086 § 19.2-299. Investigations and reports by probation officers in certain cases.

1087 A. Unless waived by the court and the defendant and the attorney for the Commonwealth, when a  
 1088 person is tried in a circuit court (i) upon a charge of assault and battery in violation of § 18.2-57 or  
 1089 18.2-57.2, stalking in violation of § 18.2-60.3, sexual battery in violation of § 18.2-67.4, attempted  
 1090 sexual battery in violation of § 18.2-67.5, or driving while intoxicated in violation of § 18.2-266, and is  
 1091 adjudged guilty of such charge, the court may, or on motion of the defendant shall; or (ii) upon a felony  
 1092 charge not set forth in subdivision (iii) below, the court may when there is a plea agreement between  
 1093 the defendant and the Commonwealth and shall when the defendant pleads guilty without a plea  
 1094 agreement or is found guilty by the court after a plea of not guilty; or (iii) the court shall when a person  
 1095 is charged and adjudged guilty of a felony violation, or conspiracy to commit or attempt to commit a  
 1096 felony violation, of § 18.2-46.2, 18.2-46.3, 18.2-48, 18.2-61, 18.2-63, 18.2-64.1, 18.2-64.2, 18.2-67.1,

 1110 counsel or advised of its contents and be given the right to cross-examine the investigating officer as to  
 1111 any matter contained therein and to present any additional facts bearing upon the matter. The report of  
 1112 the investigating officer shall at all times be kept confidential by each recipient, and shall be filed as a  
 1113 part of the record in the case. Any report so filed shall be made available only by court order and shall  
 1114 be sealed upon final order by the court, except that such reports or copies thereof shall be available at  
 1115 any time to any criminal justice agency, as defined in § 9.1-101, of this or any other state or of the  
 1116 United States; to any agency where the accused is referred for treatment by the court or by probation  
 1117 and parole services; and to counsel for any person who has been indicted jointly for the same felony as  
 1118 the person subject to the report. Any report prepared pursuant to the provisions hereof shall without  
 1119 court order be made available to counsel for the person who is the subject of the report if that person is  
 1120 charged with a felony subsequent to the time of the preparation of the report. The presentence report  
 1121 shall be in a form prescribed by the Department of Corrections. In all cases where such report is not  
 1122 ordered, a simplified report shall be prepared on a form prescribed by the Department of Corrections.  
 1123 For the purposes of this subsection, information regarding the accused's participation or membership in a  
 1124 criminal street gang may include the characteristics, specific rivalries, common practices, social customs  
 1125 and behavior, terminology, and types of crimes that are likely to be committed by that criminal street  
 1126 gang.

1127 B. As a part of any presentence investigation conducted pursuant to subsection A when the offense  
 1128 for which the defendant was convicted was a felony, the court probation officer shall advise any victim  
 1129 of such offense in writing that he may submit to the Virginia Parole Board a written request (i) to be  
 1130 given the opportunity to submit to the Board a written statement in advance of any parole hearing  
 1131 describing the impact of the offense upon him and his opinion regarding the defendant's release and (ii)  
 1132 to receive copies of such other notifications pertaining to the defendant as the Board may provide  
 1133 pursuant to subsection B of § 53.1-155.

1134 C. As part of any presentence investigation conducted pursuant to subsection A when the offense for  
 1135 which the defendant was convicted was a felony drug offense set forth in Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.)  
 1136 of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2, the presentence report shall include any known association of the defendant  
 1137 with illicit drug operations or markets.

1138 D. As a part of any presentence investigation conducted pursuant to subsection A, when the offense  
 1139 for which the defendant was convicted was a felony, not a capital offense, committed on or after  
 1140 January 1, 2000, the defendant shall be required to undergo a substance abuse screening pursuant to  
 1141 § 18.2-251.01.

1142 § 19.2-303. Suspension or modification of sentence; probation; taking of fingerprints as condition of  
 1143 probation.

1044 After conviction, whether with or without jury, the court may suspend imposition of sentence or  
1045 suspend the sentence in whole or part and in addition may place the ~~accused~~ defendant on probation  
1046 under such conditions as the court shall determine or may, as a condition of a suspended sentence,  
1047 require the ~~accused~~ defendant to make at least partial restitution to the aggrieved party or parties for  
1048 damages or loss caused by the offense for which convicted, or to perform community service, or both,  
1049 under terms and conditions which shall be entered in writing by the court. The judge, after convicting  
1050 the ~~accused~~ defendant of a felony, shall determine whether a copy of the ~~accused's~~ defendant's  
1051 fingerprints are on file at the Central Criminal Records Exchange. In any case where fingerprints are not  
1052 on file, the judge shall require that fingerprints be taken as a condition of probation. Such fingerprints  
1053 shall be submitted to the Central Criminal Records Exchange under the provisions of subsection D of  
1054 § 19.2-390.

1055 *In any case where a defendant is convicted of a violation of § 18.2-48, 18.2-61, 18.2-63, 18.2-67.1,*  
1056 *18.2-67.2, 18.2-67.3, 18.2-370, or 18.2-370.1, committed on or after July 1, 2006, and some portion of*  
1057 *the sentence is suspended, the judge shall order that the period of suspension shall be for a length of*  
1058 *time at least equal to the statutory maximum period for which the defendant might originally have been*  
1059 *sentenced to be imprisoned, and the defendant shall be placed on probation for that period of*  
1060 *suspension subject to revocation by the court. The conditions of probation may include such conditions*  
1061 *as the court shall determine, including active supervision. Where the conviction is for a violation of*  
1062 *clause (iii) of subsection A of §18.2-61, subdivision A 1 of § 18.2-67.1, or subdivision A 1 of*  
1063 *§ 18.2-67.2, the court shall order that at least three years of the probation include active supervision of*  
1064 *the defendant under a postrelease supervision program operated by the Department of Corrections, and*  
1065 *for at least three years of such active supervision, the defendant shall be subject to electronic*  
1066 *monitoring by means of a GPS (Global Positioning System) tracking device, or other similar device.*

1067 If a person is sentenced to jail upon conviction of a misdemeanor or a felony, the court may, at any  
1068 time before the sentence has been completely served, suspend the unserved portion of any such sentence,  
1069 place the person on probation for such time as the court shall determine, or otherwise modify the  
1070 sentence imposed.

1071 If a person has been sentenced for a felony to the Department of Corrections but has not actually  
1072 been transferred to a receiving unit of the Department, the court which heard the case, if it appears  
1073 compatible with the public interest and there are circumstances in mitigation of the offense, may, at any  
1074 time before the person is transferred to the Department, suspend or otherwise modify the unserved  
1075 portion of such a sentence. The court may place the person on probation for such time as the court shall  
1076 determine.

1077 § 19.2-390.1. Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry; maintenance; access.

1078 The Department of State Police shall keep and maintain a Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors  
1079 Registry, separate and apart from all other records maintained by it.

1080 *The Superintendent of State Police shall organize, equip, and staff, within the Department of State*  
1081 *Police, the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry. The Superintendent shall appoint and*  
1082 *designate personnel as he deems necessary to carry out all duties and assignments related to the Sex*  
1083 *Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry as required by Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1.*

1084 § 22.1-79. Powers and duties.

1085 A school board shall:

1086 1. See that the school laws are properly explained, enforced and observed;

1087 2. Secure, by visitation or otherwise, as full information as possible about the conduct of the public  
1088 schools in the school division and take care that they are conducted according to law and with the  
1089 utmost efficiency;

1090 3. Care for, manage and control the property of the school division and provide for the erecting,  
1091 furnishing, equipping, and noninstructional operating of necessary school buildings and appurtenances  
1092 and the maintenance thereof by purchase, lease, or other contracts;

1093 4. Provide for the consolidation of schools or redistricting of school boundaries or adopt pupil  
1094 assignment plans whenever such procedure will contribute to the efficiency of the school division;

1095 5. Insofar as not inconsistent with state statutes and regulations of the Board of Education, operate  
1096 and maintain the public schools in the school division and determine the length of the school term, the  
1097 studies to be pursued, the methods of teaching and the government to be employed in the schools;

1098 6. In instances in which no grievance procedure has been adopted prior to January 1, 1991, establish  
1099 and administer by July 1, 1992, a grievance procedure for all school board employees, except the  
1100 division superintendent and those employees covered under the provisions of Article 2 (§ 22.1-293 et  
1101 seq.) and Article 3 (§ 22.1-306 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of this title, who have completed such  
1102 probationary period as may be required by the school board, not to exceed 18 months. The grievance  
1103 procedure shall afford a timely and fair method of the resolution of disputes arising between the school  
1104 board and such employees regarding dismissal, suspension, or other disciplinary actions and shall be  
1105 consistent with the provisions of the Board of Education's procedures for adjusting grievances except

that there shall be no right to a hearing before a fact-finding panel;

7. Perform such other duties as shall be prescribed by the Board of Education or as are imposed by law;

8. Obtain public comment through a public hearing not less than 10 days after reasonable notice to the public in a newspaper of general circulation in the school division prior to providing (i) for the consolidation of schools; (ii) the transfer from the public school system of the administration of all instructional services for any public school classroom or all noninstructional services in the school division pursuant to a contract with any private entity or organization; or (iii) in school divisions having 15,000 pupils or more in average daily membership, for redistricting of school boundaries or adopting any pupil assignment plan affecting the assignment of 15 percent or more of the pupils in average daily membership in the affected school. Such public hearing may be held at the same time and place as the meeting of the school board at which the proposed action is taken if the public hearing is held before the action is taken. If a public hearing has been held prior to the effective date of this provision on a proposed consolidation, redistricting or pupil assignment plan which is to be implemented after the effective date of this provision, an additional public hearing shall not be required; ~~and~~

9. (Expires July 1, 2010) At least annually, survey the school division to identify critical shortages of teachers and administrative personnel by subject matter, and report such critical shortages to the Superintendent of Public Instruction and to the Virginia Retirement System; however, the school board may request the division superintendent to conduct such survey and submit such report to the school board, the Superintendent, and the Virginia Retirement System; *and*

10. *Ensure that the public schools within the school division are registered with the Department of State Police to receive from the State Police electronic notice of the registration or reregistration of any sex offender within that school division pursuant to § 9.1-914.*

§ 22.1-79.3. Policies regarding certain activities.

A. No later than January 1, 2001, local school boards shall develop and implement policies to ensure that public school students are not required to convey or deliver any materials that (i) advocate the election or defeat of any candidate for elective office, (ii) advocate the passage or defeat of any referendum question, or (iii) advocate the passage or defeat of any matter pending before a local school board, local governing body or the General Assembly of Virginia or the Congress of the United States.

This section shall not be construed to prohibit the discussion or use of political or issue-oriented materials as part of classroom discussions or projects or to prohibit the delivery of informational materials.

B. Local school boards shall develop and implement policies to prohibit the administration of questionnaires or surveys to public school students during the regular school day or at school-sponsored events without written, informed parental consent for the student's participation when participation in such questionnaire or survey may subsequently result in the sale for commercial purposes of personal information regarding the individual student.

C. *Local school boards shall develop and implement policies to provide information to the parent or legal guardian of a student regarding the registration of sex offenders in the Commonwealth and the availability of information in the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry. Local school boards shall also develop protocols governing the release of children to persons who are not their parent or legal guardian.*

D. No local school board providing access and opportunity to use school facilities or to distribute literature may deny equal access or fair opportunity to use such school facilities or to distribute literature, or otherwise discriminate against the Boy Scouts of America or the Girl Scouts of the USA.

Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to require any school or school division to sponsor the Boy Scouts of America or the Girl Scouts of the USA, or to exempt any such groups from school board policies governing access to and use of school facilities and distribution of literature.

§ 23-2.2:1. *Reporting of enrollment information to Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minor Registry.*

*Each public and private two- and four-year institution of higher education physically located in the Commonwealth shall electronically transmit enrollment data including (i) complete name, (ii) social security number, (iii) date of birth and (iv) gender to the Department of State Police by September 1 of each year, in a format approved by the State Police, for comparison with information contained in the Virginia Criminal Information Network and National Crime Information Center Convicted Sexual Offender Registry File when a student has been accepted for admission and enrolls in classes at such an educational institution.*

*Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with the duty to register or reregister pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was enrolled with the educational institution.*

1167 § 37.2-900. Definitions.

1168 As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

1169 "Defendant" means any person charged with a sexually violent offense who is deemed to be an  
1170 unrestorably incompetent defendant pursuant to § 19.2-169.3 and is referred for commitment review  
1171 pursuant to § 37.2-905 *this chapter*.

1172 "Director" means the Director of the Department of Corrections.

1173 "Mental abnormality" or "personality disorder" means a congenital or acquired condition that affects  
1174 a person's emotional or volitional capacity and renders the person so likely to commit sexually violent  
1175 offenses that he constitutes a menace to the health and safety of others.

1176 "Sexually violent offense" means (i) a felony conviction under former § 18-54, former § 18.1-44,  
1177 § 18.2-61, 18.2-67.1, 18.2-67.2; (ii) a conviction under § 18.2-48 (ii), 18.2-48 (iii), 18.2-63, 18.2-64.1, or  
1178 18.2-67.3 ~~where the complaining witness is less than 13 years of age; or~~ (iii) a felony conviction under  
1179 the laws of the Commonwealth for a forcible sexual offense committed prior to July 1, 1981, where the  
1180 criminal behavior on which the conviction is based is set forth in § 18.2-67.1 or 18.2-67.2, or is set  
1181 forth in § 18.2-67.3 ~~where the complaining witness is less than 13 years of age; or~~ (iv) a felony  
1182 conviction for conspiracy to commit or attempt to commit any of the above offenses.

1183 "Sexually violent predator" means any person who (i) has been convicted of a sexually violent  
1184 offense or has been charged with a sexually violent offense and is unrestorably incompetent to stand  
1185 trial pursuant to § 19.2-169.3 and (ii) because of a mental abnormality or personality disorder, finds it  
1186 difficult to control his predatory behavior, which makes him likely to engage in sexually violent acts.

1187 § 37.2-900.1. Office of Sexually Violent Predator Services.

1188 *There is hereby established within the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and*  
1189 *Substance Abuse Services, the Office of Sexually Violent Predator Services for the purpose of*  
1190 *administering the duties of the Department under this chapter.*

1191 § 37.2-903. Treatment plans; database of prisoners convicted of sexually violent offenses; maintained  
1192 by Department of Corrections; notice of pending release to CRC.

1193 A. The Director shall establish and maintain a treatment program for prisoners convicted pursuant to  
1194 Article 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2 and committed to the custody of the Department  
1195 of Corrections. This program shall include a clinical assessment of all such prisoners upon receipt into  
1196 the custody of the Department of Corrections and the development of appropriate treatment plans, if  
1197 indicated. This program shall be operated under the direction of a licensed psychiatrist or licensed  
1198 clinical psychologist who is experienced in the diagnosis and treatment of mental abnormalities and  
1199 disorders associated with criminal sexual offenders.

1200 B. The Director shall establish and maintain a database of ~~prisoners~~ *each prisoner* in his custody  
1201 ~~who are~~ *is* (i) incarcerated for a sexually violent ~~offenses~~ *offense* or (ii) serving or will serve concurrent  
1202 or consecutive time for ~~other offenses~~ *another offense* in addition to time for a sexually violent offense.  
1203 The database shall include the following information regarding each prisoner: (a) the prisoner's criminal  
1204 record and (b) the prisoner's sentences and scheduled date of release. A prisoner who is serving or will  
1205 serve concurrent or consecutive time for other offenses in addition to his time for a sexually violent  
1206 offense, shall remain in the database until such time as he is released from the custody or supervision of  
1207 the Department of Corrections or Virginia Parole Board for all of his charges. *Prior to the initial*  
1208 *assessment of a prisoner under subsection C, the Director shall order a national criminal history*  
1209 *records check to be conducted on the prisoner.*

1210 C. Each month, the Director shall review the database and identify all such prisoners who are  
1211 scheduled for release from prison within 10 months from the date of such review who receive a score of  
1212 four or more on the ~~Rapid Risk Assessment for Sexual Offender Recidivism~~ *Static-99* or a like score on  
1213 a comparable, scientifically validated instrument designated by the Commissioner.

1214 *D. If the Director and the Commissioner agree that no specific scientifically validated instrument*  
1215 *exists to measure the risk assessment of a prisoner, the prisoner may instead be evaluated by a licensed*  
1216 *psychiatrist or licensed clinical psychologist for an initial determination of whether or not the prisoner*  
1217 *may meet the definition of a sexually violent predator.*

1218 E. Upon the identification of such prisoners, the Director shall forward their names, their scheduled  
1219 dates of release, and copies of their files to the CRC for assessment.

1220 § 37.2-904. CRC assessment of prisoners or incompetent defendants eligible for commitment as  
1221 sexually violent predators; mental health examination; recommendation.

1222 A. Within 90 days of receiving notice from the Director pursuant to § 37.2-903 regarding a prisoner  
1223 who is in the database, *or from a court referring an incompetent defendant pursuant to § 19.2-169.3*, the  
1224 CRC shall (i) complete its assessment of the prisoner *or defendant* for possible commitment pursuant to  
1225 subsection B and (ii) forward its written recommendation regarding the prisoner to the Attorney General  
1226 pursuant to subsection C.

1227 B. CRC assessments of eligible prisoners *or incompetent defendants* shall include a mental health  
1228 examination, including a personal interview, of the prisoner *or incompetent defendant* by a licensed

psychiatrist or a licensed clinical psychologist who is designated by the Commissioner, skilled in the diagnosis and treatment of mental abnormalities and disorders associated with violent sex offenders, and not a member of the CRC. *If the prisoner's or defendant's name was forwarded to the CRC based upon an evaluation by a licensed psychiatrist or licensed clinical psychologist, a different licensed psychiatrist or licensed clinical psychologist shall perform the examination for the CRC.* The licensed psychiatrist or licensed clinical psychologist shall determine whether the prisoner or incompetent defendant is a sexually violent predator, as defined in § 37.2-900, and forward the results of this evaluation and any supporting documents to the CRC for its review.

The CRC assessment shall also include:  
 consideration 1. Consideration of the prisoner's score on the ~~Rapid Risk Assessment for Sexual Offender Recidivism~~ Static-99 or a comparable, scientifically validated instrument designated by the Commissioner; and

a 2. A review of (i) the prisoner's or incompetent defendant's institutional history and treatment record, if any; (ii) the prisoner's his criminal background; and (iii) any other factor that is relevant to the determination of whether the prisoner he is a sexually violent predator.

Notwithstanding § 19.2-299.1 or any other provision of law, the CRC is authorized to possess, copy, and use presentence reports, postsentence reports, and victim impact statements for all lawful purposes.

C. Following the examination and review of a prisoner conducted pursuant to subsection B, the CRC shall recommend that the prisoner or incompetent defendant (i) be committed as a sexually violent predator pursuant to this chapter; (ii) not be committed, but be placed in a conditional release program as a less restrictive alternative; or (iii) not be committed because he does not meet the definition of a sexually violent predator. To assist the Attorney General in his review, the Department of Corrections, the CRC, and the psychiatrist or psychologist who conducts the mental health examination pursuant to this section shall provide the Attorney General with all evaluation reports, prisoner records, criminal records, medical files, and any other documentation relevant to determining whether a prisoner or incompetent defendant is a sexually violent predator.

D. Pursuant to clause (ii) of subsection C, the CRC shall recommend that a prisoner or incompetent defendant enter a conditional release program if it finds that (i) the prisoner he does not need inpatient treatment, but needs outpatient treatment and monitoring to prevent his condition from deteriorating to a degree that he would need inpatient treatment; (ii) appropriate outpatient supervision and treatment are reasonably available; (iii) there is significant reason to believe that the prisoner, if conditionally released, he would comply with the conditions specified; and (iv) conditional release will not present an undue risk to public safety.

E. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all state and local courts, clerks, departments, agencies, boards, and commissions shall provide to the CRC all requested records, documents, notes, recordings, or other information of any kind, including presentence or postsentence reports, victim impact statements, and child abuse registry records, within 20 days of receiving such request.

F. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any mental health professional employed or appointed pursuant to subsection B or § 37.2-907 shall be permitted to copy and possess any presentence or postsentence reports and victim impact statements for use in examinations, creating reports, and testifying in any proceedings pursuant to this article. However, at the conclusion of the examiner's testimony or service in such proceedings, the examiner shall return all presentence reports, postsentence reports and victim impact statements to the Office of the Attorney General.

G. Any mental health professional appointed or employed pursuant to subsection B or § 37.2-907 shall be permitted to testify at the probable cause hearing and at the trial as to his diagnosis, his opinion as to whether the prisoner or incompetent defendant meets the definition of a sexually violent predator, his recommendation as to treatment and his reasoning therefor. Such opinion shall not be dispositive of whether the person is a sexually violent predator.

H. *If the CRC deems it necessary to have the services of additional experts in order to complete its review of the prisoner, the Commissioner shall appoint such qualified experts as are needed.*

§ 37.2-905. Review of prisoners convicted of a sexually violent offense; review of unrestorably incompetent defendants charged with sexually violent offenses; petition for commitment; notice to Department of Corrections or referring court regarding disposition of review.

A. Upon receipt of a recommendation by the CRC regarding an eligible prisoner or upon receipt of a court order referring an unrestorably incompetent defendant for review pursuant to § 19.2-169.3, the Attorney General shall have 90 days to conduct a review of the prisoner or defendant and (i) file a petition for the civil commitment of the prisoner or defendant as a sexually violent predator and stating sufficient facts to support such allegation or (ii) notify the Director and Commissioner, in the case of a prisoner, or the referring court and the Commissioner, in the case of an unrestorably incompetent defendant, that he will not file a petition for commitment. Petitions for commitment shall be filed in the circuit court in which the prisoner was last convicted of a sexually violent offense or in which the

1290 defendant was deemed unrestorably incompetent and referred for commitment review pursuant to  
1291 § 19.2-169.3.

1292 B. In determining whether to file a petition to civilly commit a prisoner under this chapter, the  
1293 Attorney General shall review (i) the CRC recommendation and its reasoning; (ii) the results of the  
1294 mental health examination conducted pursuant to § 37.2-904; (iii) the prisoner's institutional history and  
1295 treatment record, if any; (iv) the prisoner's criminal offense history; and (v) any other factor relevant to  
1296 the determination of whether the prisoner should be civilly committed. Although the Attorney General  
1297 shall consider the CRC recommendation as part of the review, the CRC recommendation is not binding  
1298 upon the Attorney General.

1299 C. In determining whether to file a petition to civilly commit a defendant under this chapter, the  
1300 Attorney General shall review (i) *the CRC recommendation and its reasoning*, (ii) the defendant's  
1301 warrant or indictment, ~~(ii)~~ (iii) the competency report completed pursuant to § 19.2-169.1, ~~(iii)~~ (iv) the  
1302 report and recommendations prepared by the director of the defendant's treating facility pursuant to  
1303 § 19.2-169.3, ~~(iv)~~ (v) *the mental health evaluation completed pursuant to § 37.2-904*, (vi) the defendant's

1307 D. Notwithstanding § 19.2-299.1 or any other provision of law, the Attorney General is authorized to  
1308 possess, copy, and use presentence reports, postsentence reports, and victim impact statements for all  
1309 lawful purposes.

1310 E. ~~Whenever a court refers an incompetent defendant to the Attorney General for review, the court~~  
1311 ~~shall also appoint a licensed psychiatrist or licensed clinical psychologist from the list maintained by the~~  
1312 ~~Commissioner pursuant to subsection B of § 37.2-904 to conduct a mental health evaluation, including a~~  
1313 ~~personal interview, of the incompetent defendant. The licensed psychiatrist or licensed clinical~~  
1314 ~~psychologist shall determine whether the incompetent defendant is a sexually violent predator as defined~~  
1315 ~~in § 37.2-900 and shall forward the results of this evaluation and any supporting documents to the~~

1317 *If the Attorney General decides not to file a petition for the civil commitment of a prisoner or*  
1318 *incompetent defendant, or if a petition is filed but is dismissed for any reason, and the prisoner or*  
1319 *incompetent defendant has outstanding probation or parole time to serve, the Attorney General and the*  
1320 *Director may share any relevant information with the probation and parole officer to the extent allowed*  
1321 *by state and federal law.*

1322 § 37.2-906. Probable cause hearing.

1323 A. Upon the filing of a petition alleging that a person is a sexually violent predator, the circuit court  
1324 shall (i) forthwith order that until a final order is entered in the proceeding, in the case of a prisoner, he  
1325 remain in the secure custody of the Department of Corrections or, in the case of a defendant, he remain  
1326 in the secure custody of the Department and (ii) schedule a hearing within 60 days to determine whether  
1327 probable cause exists to believe that the person named in the petition is a sexually violent predator. A  
1328 *continuance extending the case beyond the 60 days may be granted to either the Attorney General or*  
1329 *the person who is the subject of the petition only upon good cause shown.* A copy of the petition shall  
1330 be mailed by the clerk to the attorney appointed or retained for the person named in the petition and, in  
1331 those cases in which the person named in the petition is a prisoner, to the warden or superintendent of  
1332 the correctional facility in which the person is then confined. The warden or superintendent shall cause  
1333 the petition to be delivered to the person and shall certify the delivery to the clerk. In addition, a written  
1334 explanation of the sexually violent predator involuntary commitment process and the statutory  
1335 protections associated with the process shall be given to the person at the time the petition is delivered.

1336 B. Prior to any hearing under this section, the judge shall ascertain if the person whose commitment  
1337 is sought is represented by counsel and, if he is not represented by counsel, the judge shall appoint an  
1338 attorney to represent him. However, if the person requests an opportunity to employ counsel, the court  
1339 shall give him a reasonable opportunity to employ counsel at his own expense.

1340 C. At the probable cause hearing, the judge shall (i) verify the person's identity and (ii) determine  
1341 whether probable cause exists to believe that the person is a sexually violent predator. In the case of a  
1342 prisoner in the custody of the Department of Corrections, if the judge finds that there is not probable  
1343 cause to believe that the person is a sexually violent predator, the judge shall dismiss the petition, and  
1344 the person shall remain in the custody of the Department of Corrections until his scheduled date of  
1345 release from prison. In the case of a defendant, if the judge finds that there is not probable cause to  
1346 believe the defendant is a sexually violent predator, the judge shall dismiss the petition and order that  
1347 the defendant be discharged, involuntarily admitted pursuant to §§ 37.2-814 through 37.2-819, or  
1348 certified for admission pursuant to § 37.2-806.

1349 § 37.2-907. Right to assistance of experts; compensation.

1350 A. Any person who is the subject of a petition under this chapter shall have, prior to trial, the right  
1351 to employ experts at his own expense to perform examinations and testify on his behalf. However, if a

person has not employed an expert and requests expert assistance, the judge shall appoint such experts as he deems necessary to perform examinations and participate in the trial on the person's behalf. Any expert appointed to assist the person on matters relating to the person's mental health, including examination, evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment, shall have the qualifications required by subsection B of § 37.2-904. Any expert employed to assist the person on matters relating to the person's mental health shall be a licensed psychiatrist or licensed clinical psychologist who is skilled in the diagnosis and treatment of mental abnormalities and disorders associated with violent sex offenders and who is not a member of the CRC. Any expert employed or appointed pursuant to this section shall have reasonable access to all relevant medical and psychological records and reports pertaining to the person he has been employed or appointed to assist.

B. Each psychiatrist, psychologist, or other expert appointed by the court to render professional service pursuant to this chapter who is not regularly employed by the Commonwealth, except by the University of Virginia School of Medicine and the Virginia Commonwealth University School of Medicine, shall receive a reasonable fee for such service. The fee shall be determined in each instance by the court that appointed the expert, in accordance with guidelines established by the Supreme Court after consultation with the Department. The fee shall not exceed \$5,000. However, in addition, if any such expert is required to appear as a witness in any hearing held pursuant to this chapter, he shall receive mileage and a fee of \$750 for each day during which he is required to serve. An itemized account of expenses, duly sworn to, must be presented to the court, and, when allowed, shall be certified to the Supreme Court for payment out of the state treasury, and shall be charged against the appropriations made to pay criminal charges. Allowance for the fee and for the per diem authorized shall also be made by order of the court, duly certified to the Supreme Court, for payment out of the appropriation to pay criminal charges.

§ 37.2-908. Trial; right to trial by jury; standard of proof; discovery.

A. Within 90 days after the completion of the probable cause hearing held pursuant to § 37.2-906, the court shall conduct a trial to determine whether the person who is the subject of the petition is a sexually violent predator. *A continuance extending the case beyond the 90 days may be granted to either the Attorney General or the person who is the subject of the petition only upon good cause shown.*

B. The Attorney General or the person who is the subject of the petition shall have the right to a trial by jury. Seven persons from a panel of 13 shall constitute a jury in such cases. If a jury determines a person to be a sexually violent predator, a unanimous verdict shall be required. If no demand is made by either party for a trial by jury, the trial shall be before the court.

C. The court or jury shall determine whether, by clear and convincing evidence, the person who is the subject of the petition is a sexually violent predator. If the court or jury does not find clear and convincing evidence that the person is a sexually violent predator, the court shall, in the case of a prisoner, direct that he be returned to the custody of the Department of Corrections. The Department of Corrections shall immediately release him if his scheduled release date has passed, or hold him until his scheduled release date. In the case of a defendant, if the court or jury does not find by clear and convincing evidence that the defendant is a sexually violent predator, the court shall order that the defendant be discharged, involuntarily admitted pursuant to §§ 37.2-814 through 37.2-819, or certified for admission pursuant to § 37.2-806.

D. If the court or jury finds the person to be a sexually violent predator, the court shall then determine whether the person shall be fully committed or placed on conditional release. If the court finds, in its determination of treatment needs, that alternatives to involuntary secure inpatient treatment have been investigated and deemed unsuitable and there is no less restrictive alternative to involuntary secure inpatient treatment, the judge shall by written order and specific findings so certify and order that the person be committed to the custody of the Department for appropriate inpatient treatment in a secure facility designated by the Commissioner. Persons committed pursuant to this chapter are subject to the provisions of § 19.2-174.1 and Chapter 11 (§ 37.2-1100 et seq.).

E. If the court determines not to order full commitment, the court shall continue the case for not less than 30 days *nor more than 60 days* and shall require the Commissioner to submit a report to the court, the Attorney General, and counsel for the person suggesting possible alternatives to full commitment. The court shall then reconvene the hearing and receive testimony on the possible alternatives to full commitment. At the conclusion of the hearing, if the court finds, in determining the treatment needs of a person found to be a sexually violent predator, that less restrictive alternatives to involuntary secure inpatient treatment have been investigated and are deemed suitable, and if the judge finds specifically that the person meets the criteria for conditional release set forth in § 37.2-912, the judge shall order outpatient treatment, day treatment in a hospital, night treatment in a hospital, outpatient involuntary treatment with anti-psychotic medication pursuant to Chapter 11 (§ 37.2-1100 et seq.), or such other appropriate course of treatment as may be necessary to meet the needs of the individual. *The court shall also order the person to be subject to electronic monitoring of his location by means of a GPS (Global*

1413 *Positioning System) tracking device, or other similar device, at all times while he is on conditional*  
1414 *release.*

1415 F. The Department shall recommend a specific course of treatment and programs for provision of  
1416 such treatment and shall monitor the person's compliance with such treatment as may be ordered by the  
1417 court under this section, unless the person is on parole or probation, in which case the parole or  
1418 probation officer shall monitor the person's compliance. The person's failure to comply with involuntary  
1419 outpatient treatment as ordered by the court may be admitted into evidence in subsequent hearings held  
1420 pursuant to the provisions of this chapter. Upon failure of the person to adhere to the terms of the  
1421 involuntary outpatient treatment, the judge may revoke the same and, upon notice to the person  
1422 undergoing involuntary outpatient treatment and after a hearing, order the person committed as a  
1423 sexually violent predator for inpatient treatment at a secure facility designated by the Commissioner.

1424 G. In the event of a mistrial, the court shall direct that the prisoner remain in the secure custody of  
1425 the Department of Corrections or the defendant remain in the secure custody of the Department until  
1426 another trial is conducted. Any subsequent trial following a mistrial shall be held within 90 days of the  
1427 previous trial.

1428 H. All proceedings conducted hereunder are civil proceedings. However, no discovery other than that  
1429 provided in § 37.2-901 shall be allowed without prior leave of the court, which may deny or limit  
1430 discovery in any such proceeding. No less than 30 days prior to the trial of the matter, any expert  
1431 employed or appointed pursuant to § 37.2-907 shall prepare a written report detailing his findings and  
1432 conclusions and shall submit the report, along with all supporting data, to the court, the Attorney  
1433 General, and counsel for the person. Under no circumstances shall the prisoner or defendant be entitled  
1434 to receive a copy of the victim impact statement or the presentence investigation report. However,  
1435 counsel for the prisoner or defendant and any expert employed or appointed pursuant to § 37.2-907 may  
1436 review the victim impact statement or presentence investigation report outside the presence of the  
1437 prisoner or defendant. The Attorney General shall file with the clerk copies of any relevant presentence  
1438 reports, postsentence reports, and victim impact statements in his possession, withholding identifying  
1439 information about victims. Such filings shall be held by the court in confidence and reviewable only by  
1440 the court, the Attorney General, and the counsel for the prisoner or defendant pursuant to this section  
1441 possess and copy the victim impact statement or presentence or postsentence report for use at the trial.  
1442 Within 30 days after the case is finally disposed of, counsel for the prisoner or defendant and any  
1443 expert employed or appointed pursuant to § 37.2-907 shall return all copies of the victim impact  
1444 statements and presentence and postsentence reports to the Attorney General. However, in no event  
1445 shall the prisoner or defendant be permitted to possess or copy a victim impact statement or presentence  
1446 or postsentence report.

1447 § 37.2-910. Review of continuation of secure inpatient treatment hearing; procedure and reports;  
1448 disposition.

1449 A. The committing court shall conduct a hearing 12 months after the date of commitment to assess  
1450 each committed person's need for secure inpatient treatment. A hearing for assessment shall be  
1451 conducted at yearly intervals for five years and at biennial intervals thereafter. The court shall schedule  
1452 the matter for hearing as soon as possible after it becomes due, giving the matter priority over all  
1453 pending matters before the court.

1454 B. Prior to the hearing, the Commissioner shall provide to the court a report reevaluating the  
1455 committed person's condition and recommending treatment. The report shall be prepared by a licensed  
1456 psychiatrist or a licensed clinical psychologist skilled in the diagnosis and treatment of mental  
1457 abnormalities and personality disorders associated with violent sex offenders and qualified by training  
1458 and experience to perform forensic evaluations. If the Commissioner's report recommends discharge or  
1459 the committed person requests discharge, the committed person's condition and need for secure inpatient  
1460 treatment shall be evaluated by a second person with such credentials who is not currently treating the  
1461 committed person. Any professional person who conducts a second evaluation of a committed person  
1462 shall submit a report of his findings to the court and the Commissioner. A copy of any report submitted  
1463 pursuant to this subsection shall be sent to the Attorney General.

1464 C. The burden of proof at the hearing shall be upon the Commonwealth to prove to the court by  
1465 clear and convincing evidence that the committed person remains a sexually violent predator.

1466 D. If the court finds, based upon the report and other evidence provided at the hearing, that the  
1467 committed person's condition has so changed that he person is no longer a sexually violent predator, the  
1468 court shall (i) release the committed person from secure inpatient treatment if he does not need it and  
1469 does not meet the criteria for conditional release set forth in § 37.2-912, provided the court has approved  
1470 a discharge plan prepared by the Department or (ii) place the committed person on conditional release if  
1471 he meets the criteria for conditional release and the court has approved a conditional release plan  
1472 prepared by the Department. However, if . If the court finds that the committed person remains a  
1473 sexually violent predator, it shall order that he remain in the custody of the Commissioner for secure  
1474 inpatient hospitalization and treatment or that he be conditionally released. To determine if the



committed person shall be conditionally released, the court shall determine if the person meets the criteria for conditional release set forth in § 37.2-912. If the court orders that the person be conditionally released, the court shall allow the Department no less than 30 days and no more than 60 days to prepare a conditional release plan.

If the court places the person on conditional release, the court shall order the person to be subject to electronic monitoring of his location by means of a GPS (Global Positioning System) tracking device, or other similar device, at all times while he is on conditional release.

§ 37.2-912. Conditional release; criteria; conditions; reports.

A. At any time the court considers the committed person's need for secure inpatient treatment pursuant to this chapter, it shall place the committed person on conditional release if it finds that (i) based on consideration of the factors that the court must consider in its commitment decision, he does not need secure inpatient treatment but needs outpatient treatment or monitoring to prevent his condition from deteriorating to a degree that he would need secure inpatient treatment; (ii) appropriate outpatient supervision and treatment are reasonably available; (iii) there is significant reason to believe that the committed person, if conditionally released, would comply with the conditions specified; and (iv) conditional release will not present an undue risk to public safety. The court shall subject a conditionally released committed person to the orders and conditions it deems will best meet the committed person's need for treatment and supervision and best serve the interests of justice and society. *In all cases of conditional release, the court shall order the person to be subject to electronic monitoring of his location by means of a GPS (Global Positioning System) tracking device, or other similar device, at all times while he is on conditional release.*

The Department or, if the person is on parole or probation, the person's parole or probation officer shall implement the court's conditional release orders and shall submit written reports to the court on the committed person's progress and adjustment in the community no less frequently than every six months. The Department or, if the person is on parole or probation, the person's parole or probation officer shall send a copy of each written report submitted to the court and copies of all correspondence with the court pursuant to this section to the Attorney General and the Commissioner.

B. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, when any person is placed on conditional release under this article, the Department of Corrections shall provide to the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services, or if the person is on parole or probation, the person's parole or probation officer, all relevant criminal history information, medical and mental health records, presentence and postsentence reports and victim impact statements, and the mental health evaluations performed pursuant to subsection B of § 37.2-904 and § 37.2-907, for use in the management and treatment of the person placed on conditional release. Any information or document provided pursuant to this subsection shall not be subject to disclosure under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 et seq.).

§ 37.2-919. Commission of new criminal offense by person committed to Department.

If a person committed to the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services is arrested for a felony or Class 1 or 2 misdemeanor offense, he shall be transported to a judicial officer forthwith for a bond determination in accordance with the provisions of § 19.2-80. If the judicial officer admits the accused to bail, he shall, upon his admission to bail, be immediately transported back into the custody of the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services. If, after trial for this offense, no active period of incarceration is imposed, or if the person is acquitted or the charges are withdrawn or dismissed, he shall be returned to the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services pursuant to his commitment. *If a period of active incarceration of 12 months or longer is imposed or any suspended sentence is revoked resulting in the person being returned to the Department of Corrections for a period of active incarceration of 12 months or longer, the person shall not be entitled to an annual or biennial review hearing pursuant to § 37.2-910 until 12 months after he has been returned to the custody of the Commissioner. Such reincarceration shall toll the provisions of § 37.2-910.*

§ 37.2-920. Appeal by Attorney General; emergency custody order.

*In any case in which the Attorney General successfully appeals the trial court's denial of probable cause, denial of civil commitment or conditional release, or discharge or placement on conditional release after an annual review hearing, upon the issuance of the mandate by the Supreme Court of Virginia, the trial court shall immediately issue an emergency custody order to any local law-enforcement official to have the person taken into custody and held in the local correctional facility, pending further appropriate proceedings.*

§ 46.2-323. Application for driver's license; proof of completion of driver education program; penalty.

A. Every application for a driver's license, temporary driver's permit, learner's permit, or motorcycle learner's permit shall be made on a form prescribed by the Department and the applicant shall write his usual signature in ink in the space provided on the form. The form shall include notice to the applicant

of the duty to register with the Department of State Police as provided in Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, if the applicant has been convicted of an offense for which registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is required.

B. Every application shall state the full legal name, year, month, and date of birth, social security number, sex, and residence address of the applicant; whether or not the applicant has previously been licensed as a driver and, if so, when and by what state, and whether or not his license has ever been suspended or revoked and, if so, the date of and reason for such suspension or revocation. The Department, as a condition for the issuance of any driver's license, temporary driver's permit, learner's permit, or motorcycle learner's permit may require the surrender of any driver's license or, in the case of a motorcycle learner's permit, a motorcycle license issued by another state and held by the applicant. The applicant shall also answer any questions on the application form or otherwise propounded by the Department incidental to the examination. The applicant may also be required to present to the person conducting the examination a birth certificate or other evidence, reasonably acceptable to the Department, of his name and date of birth.

The applicant shall also certify that he is a resident of the Commonwealth by signing a certification statement, on a form prescribed by the Commissioner, and by providing satisfactory proof that he is a resident of the Commonwealth. The Commissioner may adopt regulations to determine the process by which applicants prove that they are residents of the Commonwealth.

If the applicant either (i) fails or refuses to sign the certification statement or (ii) fails to follow the process determined by the Commissioner for proving residency, the Department shall not issue the applicant a driver's license, temporary driver's permit, learner's permit or motorcycle learner's permit.

Any applicant who knowingly makes a false certification of Virginia residency or supplies false or fictitious evidence of Virginia residency shall be punished as provided in § 46.2-348.

The Commissioner may, on a case-by-case basis, waive any provision of such regulations for good cause shown.

C. Every application for a driver's license shall include a color photograph of the applicant supplied under arrangements made by the Department. The photograph shall be processed by the Department so that the photograph can be made part of the issued license.

D. Notwithstanding the provisions of § 46.2-334, every applicant for a driver's license who is under 19 years of age shall furnish the Department with satisfactory proof of his successful completion of a driver education program approved by the State Department of Education.

*E. (Effective January 1, 2007) The Department shall electronically transmit application information to the Department of State Police, in a format approved by the State Police, for comparison with information contained in the Virginia Criminal Information Network and National Crime Information Center Convicted Sexual Offender Registry Files, at the time of issuance of a driver's license, temporary driver's permit, learner's permit, or motorcycle learner's permit. Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with the duty to register or reregister pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person made application of licensure.*

§ 46.2-324. Applicants and license holders to notify Department of change of address; fee.

A. Whenever any person, after applying for or obtaining a driver's license or special identification card shall move from the address shown in the application or on the license or special identification card, he shall, within thirty days, notify the Department of his change of address. If the Department receives notification from the person or any court or law-enforcement agency that a person's residential address has changed to a non-Virginia address, unless the person (i) is on active duty with the armed forces of the United States, (ii) provides proof that he is a U.S. citizen and resides outside the United States because of his employment or the employment of a spouse or parent, or (iii) provides proof satisfactory to the Commissioner that he is a bona fide resident of Virginia, the Department shall (i) mail, by first-class mail, no later than three days after the notice of address change is received by the Department, notice to the person that his license and/or special identification card will be cancelled by the Department and (ii) cancel the driver's license and/or special identification card thirty days after notice of cancellation has been mailed.

B. There may be imposed upon anyone failing to notify the Department of his change of address as required by this section a fee of five dollars, which fee shall be used to defray the expenses incurred by the Department.

*C. (Effective January 1, 2007) The Department shall electronically transmit change of address information to the Department of State Police, in a format approved by the State Police, for comparison with information contained in the Virginia Criminal Information Network and National Crime Information Center Convicted Sexual Offender Registry Files, at the time of the change of address. Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with the*

duty to register or reregister pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person last registered or reregistered or in the jurisdiction where the person made application for change of address.

§ 46.2-330. Expiration and renewal of licenses; examinations required.

A. Every driver's license shall expire on the applicant's birthday in years in which the applicant attains an age equally divisible by five. At no time shall any driver's license be issued for less than three nor more than seven years. Thereafter the driver's license shall be renewed on or before the birthday of the licensee and shall be valid for five years, expiring in the next year in which the licensee's age is equally divisible by five.

B. Within one year prior to the date shown on the driver's license as the date of expiration, the Department shall mail notice, to the holder thereof, at the address shown on the records of the Department in its driver's license file, that his license will expire on a date specified therein, whether he must be reexamined, and when he may be reexamined. Nonreceipt of the notice shall not extend the period of validity of the driver's license beyond its expiration date.

Any driver's license may be renewed by application, which shall include the applicant's certification of Virginia residency, after the applicant has taken and successfully completed those parts of the examination provided for in §§ 46.2-311, 46.2-325 and the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.), including vision and written tests, other than the parts of the examination requiring the applicant to drive a motor vehicle. All drivers applying in person for renewal of a license shall take and successfully complete the examination each renewal year.

C. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the Commissioner, in his discretion, may require any applicant for renewal to be fully examined as provided in §§ 46.2-311, 46.2-325 and the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.). Furthermore, if the applicant is less than 80 years old, the Commissioner may waive the vision examination for any applicant for renewal of a driver's license which is not a commercial driver's license, and the requirement or the taking of the written test as provided in subsection B of this section, § 46.2-325 and the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.), for any applicant for renewal who is at least 21 years old. Such written test shall not be waived for an applicant less than 21 years old if such applicant's driver's license record on file with the Department contains a record of one or more convictions for any offense reportable under §§ 46.2-382, 46.2-382.1, and 46.2-383. However, in no case shall there be any waiver of the vision examination for applicants for renewal of a commercial driver's license or of the knowledge test required by the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act for the hazardous materials endorsement on a commercial driver's license. No driver's license or learner's permit issued to any person who is 80 years old or older shall be renewed unless the applicant for renewal appears in person and either (i) passes a vision examination or (ii) presents a report of a vision examination, made within 90 days prior thereto by an ophthalmologist or optometrist, indicating that the applicant's vision meets or exceeds the standards contained in § 46.2-311.

D. Every applicant for renewal of a driver's license, whether renewal shall or shall not be dependent on any examination of the applicant, shall appear in person before the Department to apply for renewal, unless specifically notified by the Department that renewal may be accomplished in another manner as provided in the notice.

E. This section shall not modify the provisions of § 46.2-221.2.

F. (Effective January 1, 2007) The Department shall electronically transmit application information to the Department of State Police, in a format approved by the State Police, for comparison with information contained in the Virginia Criminal Information Network and National Crime Information Center Convicted Sexual Offender Registry Files, at the time of the renewal of a driver's license. Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with the duty to register or reregister pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the State Police shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person last registered or reregistered or in the jurisdiction where the person made application for licensure.

§ 46.2-345. Issuance of special identification cards; fee; confidentiality; penalties.

A. On the application of any person who is a resident of the Commonwealth or the parent or legal guardian of any such person who is under the age of 15, the Department shall issue a special identification card to the person provided:

1. Application is made on a form prescribed by the Department and includes the applicant's full legal name; year, month, and date of birth; sex; and residence address;
2. The applicant presents a birth certificate or other evidence acceptable to the Department of his

1659 name and date of birth;

1660 3. The Department is satisfied that the applicant needs an identification card or the applicant shows  
1661 he has a bona fide need for such a card; and

1662 4. The applicant does not hold a driver's license, commercial driver's license, temporary driver's  
1663 permit, learner's permit, or motorcycle learner's permit.

1664 Persons 70 years of age or older may exchange a valid Virginia driver's license for a special  
1665 identification card at no fee. Special identification cards subsequently issued to such persons shall be  
1666 subject to the regular fees for special identification cards.

1667 B. The fee for the issuance of an original or renewal special identification card is \$5. The fee for the  
1668 issuance of a duplicate or reissue of a special identification card is \$5. Persons 21 years old or older  
1669 may be issued a scenic special identification card for an additional fee of \$5.

1670 C. Every special identification card shall expire on the last day of the month of birth of the applicant  
1671 in years in which the applicant attains an age exactly divisible by five. At no time shall any special  
1672 identification card be issued for less than three nor more than seven years, except under the provisions  
1673 of subsection B of § 46.2-328.1 and except that those cards issued to children under the age of 15 shall  
1674 expire on the child's sixteenth birthday, thereafter the special identification card may be renewed on or  
1675 before the last day of the month of birth of the applicant and shall be valid for five years, expiring in  
1676 the next year in which the applicant's age is exactly divisible by five, except under the provisions of  
1677 subsection B of § 46.2-328.1.

1678 D. A special identification card issued under this section may be similar in size, shape, and design to  
1679 a driver's license, and include a color photograph of its holder, but the card shall be readily  
1680 distinguishable from a driver's license and shall clearly state that it does not authorize the person to  
1681 whom it is issued to drive a motor vehicle.

1682 E. Special identification cards, for persons at least 15 years old but less than 21 years old, shall be  
1683 immediately and readily distinguishable from those issued to persons 21 years old or older.  
1684 Distinguishing characteristics shall include unique design elements of the document and descriptors  
1685 within the photograph area to identify persons who are at least 15 years old but less than 21 years old.  
1686 These descriptors shall include the month, day, and year when the person will become 21 years old.

1687 F. Special identification cards for persons under age 15 shall bear a full face photograph. The special  
1688 identification card issued to persons under age 15 shall be readily distinguishable from a driver's license  
1689 and from other special identification cards issued by the Department. Such cards shall clearly indicate  
1690 that it does not authorize the person to whom it is issued to drive a motor vehicle.

1691 G. A valid Virginia driver's license may be surrendered for a special identification card without the  
1692 applicant's having to present proof of legal presence as required by § 46.2-328.1 if the Virginia driver's  
1693 license is unexpired and it has not been revoked, suspended, or cancelled. The special identification card  
1694 shall be considered a reissue and the expiration date shall be the last day of the month of the  
1695 surrendered driver's license's month of expiration.

1696 H. Any personal information, as identified in § 2.2-3801, which is retained by the Department from  
1697 an application for the issuance of a special identification card is confidential and shall not be divulged to  
1698 any person, association, corporation, or organization, public or private, except to the legal guardian or  
1699 the attorney of the applicant or to a person, association, corporation, or organization nominated in  
1700 writing by the applicant, his legal guardian, or his attorney. This subsection shall not prevent the  
1701 Department from furnishing the application or any information thereon to any law-enforcement agency.

1702 I. Any person who uses a false or fictitious name or gives a false or fictitious address in any  
1703 application for an identification card or knowingly makes a false statement or conceals a material fact or  
1704 otherwise commits a fraud in any such application shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. However,  
1705 where the name or address is given, or false statement is made, or fact is concealed, or fraud committed,  
1706 with the intent to purchase a firearm or where the identification card is obtained for the purpose of  
1707 committing any offense punishable as a felony, a violation of this section shall constitute a Class 4  
1708 felony.

1709 J. The Department may promulgate regulations necessary for the effective implementation of the  
1710 provisions of this section.

1711 K. The Department shall utilize the various communications media throughout the Commonwealth to  
1712 inform Virginia residents of the provisions of this section and to promote and encourage the public to  
1713 take advantage of its provisions.

1714 L. *(Effective January 1, 2007) The Department shall electronically transmit application information*  
1715 *to the Department of State Police, in a format approved by the State Police, for comparison with*  
1716 *information contained in the Virginia Criminal Information Network and National Crime Information*  
1717 *Center Convicted Sexual Offender Registry Files, at the time of issuance of a special identification*  
1718 *card. Whenever it appears from the records of the State Police that a person has failed to comply with*  
1719 *the duty to register or reregister pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the State Police*  
1720 *shall promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a*

warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person made application for the special identification card.

§ 46.2-348. Fraud or false statements in applications for license; penalties.

Any person who uses a false or fictitious name or gives a false or fictitious address in any application for a driver's license, or any renewal or duplicate thereof, or knowingly makes a false statement or conceals a material fact or otherwise commits a fraud in his application shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. However, where the license is used, or the fact concealed, or fraud is done, with the intent to purchase a firearm or use as proof of residency under § 9.1-903, a violation of this section shall be punishable as a Class 4 felony.

§ 53.1-23.2. Department to give notice of the receipt of certain prisoners.

A. At the time of receipt of any prisoner for whom registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the Department shall obtain from that person all necessary registration information, including fingerprints and photographs of a type and kind approved by the Department of State Police. A person required to register shall register and submit to be photographed as part of the registration. The Department shall forthwith forward the registration information and photograph to the Department of State Police on the date of the receipt of the prisoner.

B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A, the Department shall promptly investigate or request the State Police promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was received. The Department shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this section.

§ 53.1-115.1. Superintendents of regional jails and regional jail-farms to make daily reports to Compensation Board.

(Effective October 1, 2006) The superintendent of every regional jail and every regional jail-farm shall report on the first each day of each month to the Compensation Board, giving the record of each prisoner received during the preceding month on blank forms to be furnished day in an electronic format approved by the Compensation Board, stating whether the offense for each prisoner is for violation of state law or of a city or town ordinance. The computer-generated report shall be signed and authenticated by both the superintendent and chairman of the regional jail-farm board. Either signer found guilty of person who authenticates such report and willfully falsifying falsifies the information contained in such report shall be is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

If any superintendent fails to send such report within ten business days after the date when the report should be forwarded, the Compensation Board shall notify the superintendent of such failure. If the superintendent fails to make the report within ten days from that date, then the Compensation Board shall cause the report to be prepared from the books of the superintendent and shall certify the cost thereof to the Comptroller. The Comptroller shall issue his warrant on the Treasurer for that amount, deducting the same from any funds that may be due the superintendent by the Commonwealth.

§ 53.1-116.1. Jailer to give notice of release of certain prisoners.

A. Prior to the release or discharge of any prisoner serving a sentence for an offense for which -for whom registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall give notice to the prisoner of his duty to register with the State Police. A person required to register shall register, submit to be photographed as part of the registration, and provide information regarding place of employment, if available, to the sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator. The sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall also obtain from that person all necessary registration information, including fingerprints and photographs of a type and kind approved by the Department of State Police; inform the person of his duties regarding reregistration and change of address; and inform the person of his duty to register. The sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall forthwith forward the registration information to the Department of State Police within seven days of receipt on the date of the prisoner's release.

B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A, the sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall promptly investigate or request the State Police to promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was discharged. The sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this section.

§ 53.1-116.1:01. Jailer to give notice of intake of certain prisoners.

A. At the time of intake of any prisoner, for whom registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall also obtain from that person all necessary

1782 registration information, including fingerprints and photographs of a type and kind approved by the  
1783 Department of State Police. A person required to register shall register, and submit to be photographed  
1784 as part of the registration. The sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall forthwith  
1785 forward the registration information to the Department of State Police on the date of the prisoner's  
1786 intake.

1787 B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A,  
1788 the sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall promptly investigate or request the State  
1789 Police promptly investigate and, if there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a  
1790 warrant or assist in obtaining an indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in  
1791 which the person was discharged. The sheriff, jail superintendent or other jail administrator shall notify  
1792 the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this section.

1793 § 53.1-121. Sheriffs to make daily reports to Compensation Board; failure to send report.

1794 (Effective October 1, 2006) The sheriff shall report ~~on the first each day of each month~~ to the  
1795 Compensation Board, giving the record of each prisoner received during the preceding month ~~on blank~~  
1796 ~~forms to be furnished~~ day in an electronic format approved by the Compensation Board, stating whether  
1797 the offense is for violation of state law or of city or town ordinance.

1798 If any sheriff fails to send such report ~~within ten business days after the date when the report should~~  
1799 ~~be forwarded~~, the Compensation Board shall notify the sheriff of such failure. If the sheriff fails to make  
1800 the report within ten days ~~from that date~~, then the Compensation Board shall cause the report to be

1807 § 53.1-160.1. Department to give notice of Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry  
1808 requirements to certain prisoners.

1809 A. Prior to the release or discharge of any prisoner ~~serving a sentence for an offense for which whom~~  
1810 registration with the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry is required pursuant to Chapter 9  
1811 (§ 9.1-900 et seq.) of Title 9.1, the Department shall give notice to the prisoner of his duty to register  
1812 with the State Police. A person required to register shall register, submit to be photographed as part of  
1813 the registration, and provide information regarding place of employment, if available, to the  
1814 Department. The Department shall also obtain from that person all necessary registration information,  
1815 including fingerprints and photographs of a type and kind approved by the Department of State Police,  
1816 inform the person of his duties regarding reregistration and change of address, and inform the person of  
1817 his duty to register. The Department shall forward the registration information to the Department of  
1818 State Police ~~within seven days of receipt~~ on the date of the prisoner's release or discharge.

1819 B. Whenever a person required to register has failed to comply with the provisions of subsection A,  
1820 the Department shall promptly investigate or request the State Police promptly investigate and, if there  
1821 is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, obtain a warrant or assist in obtaining an  
1822 indictment charging a violation of § 18.2-472.1 in the jurisdiction in which the person was release or  
1823 discharged. The Department shall notify the State Police forthwith of such actions taken pursuant to this  
1824 section.

1825 § 63.2-105. Confidential records and information concerning social services; child-protective services  
1826 and child-placing agencies.

1827 A. The local department may disclose the contents of records and information learned during the  
1828 course of a child-protective services investigation or during the provision of child-protective services to  
1829 a family, without a court order and without the consent of the family, to a person having a legitimate  
1830 interest when in the judgment of the local department such disclosure is in the best interest of the child  
1831 who is the subject of the records. Persons having a legitimate interest in child-protective services records  
1832 of local departments include, but are not limited to, (i) any person who is responsible for investigating a  
1833 report of known or suspected abuse or neglect or for providing services to a child or family that is the  
1834 subject of a report, including multidisciplinary teams and family assessment and planning teams  
1835 referenced in subsections J and K of § 63.2-1503, law-enforcement agencies and attorneys for the  
1836 Commonwealth; (ii) child welfare or human services agencies of the Commonwealth or its political  
1837 subdivisions when those agencies request information to determine the compliance of any person with a  
1838 child-protective services plan or an order of any court; (iii) personnel of the school or child day program  
1839 as defined in § 63.2-100 attended by the child so that the local department can receive information from  
1840 such personnel on an ongoing basis concerning the child's health and behavior, and the activities of the  
1841 child's custodian; ~~and~~ (iv) a parent, grandparent, or any other person when such parent, grandparent or  
1842 other person would be considered by the local department as a potential caretaker of the child in the  
1843 event the local department has to remove the child from his custodian; *and (v) the Commitment Review*

*Committee and the Office of the Attorney General for the purposes of sexually violent predator civil commitments pursuant to Chapter 9 (§ 37.2-900 et seq.) of Title 37.2.*

Whenever a local department exercises its discretion to release otherwise confidential information to any person who meets one or more of these descriptions, the local department shall be presumed to have exercised its discretion in a reasonable and lawful manner.

B. Any person who has not been legally adopted in accordance with the provisions of this title and who was a child for whom all parental rights and responsibilities have been terminated, shall not have access to any information from a child-placing agency with respect to the identity of the biological family, except (i) upon application of the child who is 18 or more years of age, (ii) upon order of a circuit court entered upon good cause shown, and (iii) after notice to and opportunity for hearing by the applicant for such order and the child-placing agency or local board that had custody of the child.

An eligible person who is a resident of Virginia may apply for the court order provided for herein to (a) the circuit court of the county or city where the person resides or (b) the circuit court of the county or city where the principal office of the child-placing agency or local board that controls the information sought by the person is located. An eligible person who is not a resident of Virginia shall apply for such a court order to the circuit court of the county or city where the principal office of the child-placing agency or local board that controls the information sought by the person is located.

If the identity and whereabouts of the biological family are known to the agency or local board, the court may require the agency or local board to advise the biological parents of the pendency of the application for such order. In determining good cause for the disclosure of such information, the court shall consider the relative effects of such action upon the applicant for such order and upon the biological parents.

**2. That the amendments to §§ 53.1-115.1 and 53.1-121 shall become effective on October 1, 2006.**

**3. That the amendments to §§ 46.2-323, 46.2-324, 46.2-330 and 46.2-345 shall become effective on January 1, 2007.**

**4. That the amendments to § 37.2-900 shall not become effective unless an appropriation of general funds effectuating the purposes of these amendments is included in the general appropriations act passed by the 2006 Session of the General Assembly, which become law.**

**5. That the amendments to subsection C of § 37.2-903 and subdivision B 1 of § 37.2-904 shall not become effective unless an appropriation of general funds effectuating the purposes of these provisions is included in the general appropriations act passed by the 2006 Session of the General Assembly, which become law.**

**6. That the provisions of this act may result in a net increase in periods of imprisonment or commitment. Pursuant to § 30-19.1:4, the estimated amount of the necessary appropriation is at least \$2,419,496 for periods of imprisonment in state adult correctional facilities and is \$0 for periods of commitment to the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice.**
