7 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That §§ 2.2-4002. 4.1-203, 4.1-207, 4.1-208, 4.1-223, and 4.1-231 of the Code of Virginia are 8 9 amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding sections numbered 10 3.1-14.01 and 4.1-207.1 as follows: 11

§ 2.2-4002. Exemptions from chapter generally.

12 A. Although required to comply with § 2.2-4103 of the Virginia Register Act (§ 2.2-4100 et seq.), the following agencies shall be exempted from the provisions of this chapter, except to the extent that they are specifically made subject to §§ 2.2-4024, 2.2-4030 and 2.2-4031: 13 14

15 1. The General Assembly.

2. Courts, any agency of the Supreme Court, and any agency that by the Constitution is expressly 16 17 granted any of the powers of a court of record.

3. The Department of Game and Inland Fisheries in promulgating regulations regarding the 18 19 management of wildlife and for all case decisions rendered pursuant to any provisions of Chapters 2 20 (§ 29.1-200 et seq.), 3 (§ 29.1-300 et seq.), 4 (§ 29.1-400 et seq.), 5 (§ 29.1-500 et seq.), and 7 (§ 29.1-700 et seq.) of Title 29.1. 21 22

4. The Virginia Housing Development Authority.

23 5. Municipal corporations, counties, and all local, regional or multijurisdictional authorities created 24 under this Code, including those with federal authorities.

25 6. Educational institutions operated by the Commonwealth, provided that, with respect to § 2.2-4031, 26 such educational institutions shall be exempt from the publication requirements only with respect to 27 regulations that pertain to (i) their academic affairs, (ii) the selection, tenure, promotion and disciplining 28 of faculty and employees, (iii) the selection of students, and (iv) rules of conduct and disciplining of 29 students.

30 7. The Milk Commission in promulgating regulations regarding (i) producers' licenses and bases, (ii) 31 classification and allocation of milk, computation of sales and shrinkage, and (iii) class prices for 32 producers' milk, time and method of payment, butterfat testing and differential. 33

9. Agencies expressly exempted by any other provision of this Code.

45 14. The Board of Optometry when specifying therapeutic pharmaceutical agents, treatment guidelines, and diseases and abnormal conditions of the human eye and its adnexa for TPA-certification of optometrists pursuant to Article 5 (§ 54.1-3222 et seq.) of Chapter 32 of Title 54.1. 46 47 48

15. The Virginia War Memorial Foundation.

49 16. The Virginia Medicaid Prior Authorization Advisory Committee in making recommendations to 50 the Board of Medical Assistance Services regarding prior authorization for prescription drug coverage pursuant to Article 4 (§ 32.1-331.12 et seq.) of Chapter 10 of Title 32.1. 51

17. The State Board of Education, in developing, issuing, and revising guidelines pursuant to 52 53 § 22.1-203.2.

54 18. The Virginia Racing Commission, (i) when acting by and through its duly appointed stewards or 55 in matters related to any specific race meeting or (ii) in promulgating technical rules regulating actual 56 live horse racing at race meetings licensed by the Commission.

- 58 20. The Virginia Economic Development Partnership Authority.
- 59 21. The Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services in adopting, amending or repealing regulations 60 pursuant to subsection A (ii) of § 59.1-156.

- 62 23. The Board of Health in promulgating the list of diseases that shall be reported to the Department

of Health pursuant to § 32.1-35 and in adopting, amending or repealing regulations pursuant to 63 subsection C of § 35.1-14 that incorporate the Food and Drug Administration's Food Code pertaining to 64 65 restaurants or food service.

66 The nonprofit, nonstock corporation established by the Commissioner of Agriculture and 24. 67 Consumer Services pursuant to § 3.1-14.01.

68 B. Agency action relating to the following subjects shall be exempted from the provisions of this 69 chapter:

- 70 1. Money or damage claims against the Commonwealth or agencies thereof.
- 71 2. The award or denial of state contracts, as well as decisions regarding compliance therewith. 72
 - 3. The location, design, specifications or construction of public buildings or other facilities.
- 73 4. Grants of state or federal funds or property.
- 74 5. The chartering of corporations.

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75 6. Customary military, naval or police functions.

76 7. The selection, tenure, dismissal, direction or control of any officer or employee of an agency of 77 the Commonwealth.

- 78 8. The conduct of elections or eligibility to vote. 79
 - 9. Inmates of prisons or other such facilities or parolees therefrom.
- 80 10. The custody of persons in, or sought to be placed in, mental, penal or other state institutions as 81 well as the treatment, supervision, or discharge of such persons.
- 82 11. Traffic signs, markers or control devices.
 - 12. Instructions for application or renewal of a license, certificate, or registration required by law.
 - 13. Content of, or rules for the conduct of, any examination required by law.
 - 14. The administration of pools authorized by Chapter 47 (§ 2.2-4700 et seq.) of this title.

15. Any rules for the conduct of specific lottery games, so long as such rules are not inconsistent 86 with duly adopted regulations of the State Lottery Board, and provided that such regulations are 87 88 published and posted.

89 16. Orders condemning or closing any shellfish, finfish, or crustacea growing area and the shellfish, 90 finfish or crustacea located thereon pursuant to Article 2 (§ 28.2-803 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 28.2.

91 17. Any operating procedures for review of child deaths developed by the State Child Fatality 92 Review Team pursuant to § 32.1-283.1.

- 93 18. The regulations for the implementation of the Health Practitioners' Intervention Program and the 94 activities of the Intervention Program Committee pursuant to Chapter 25.1 (§ 54.1-2515 et seq.) of Title 95 54.1.
- 96 19. The process of reviewing and ranking grant applications submitted to the Commonwealth 97 Neurotrauma Initiative Advisory Board pursuant to Chapter 3.1 (§ 51.5-12.1 et seq.) of Title 51.5.

20. Loans from the Small Business Environmental Compliance Assistance Fund pursuant to Article 4 98 99 (§ 10.1-1197.1 et seq.) of Chapter 11.1 of Title 10.1.

- 100 21. The Virginia Breeders Fund created pursuant to § 59.1-372.
- 22. The types of pari-mutuel wagering pools available for live or simulcast horse racing. 101
- 102 23. The administration of medication or other substances foreign to the natural horse.

103 C. Minor changes to regulations published in the Virginia Administrative Code under the Virginia 104 Register Act, Chapter 41 (§ 2.2-4100 et seq.) of this title, made by the Virginia Code Commission 105 pursuant to § 30-150, shall be exempt from the provisions of this chapter.

106 § 3.1-14.01. Power of Commissioner; nonstock corporation to assist distribution of farm winery wine. 107 A. The Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall establish and operate a nonprofit, nonstock corporation under Chapter 10 (§ 13.1-801 et seq.) of Title 13.1 as a public instrumentality 108 109 exercising public and essential governmental functions to promote, develop, and sustain markets for licensed Virginia wineries and farm wineries, as defined in § 4.1-100. Such corporation shall provide 110 wholesale wine distribution services for wineries and farm wineries licensed in accordance with 111 112 § 4.1-207.

113 B. The board of directors of such corporation shall be composed of the Commissioner of Agriculture 114 and Consumer Services and four members appointed by the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services (the Board), including one owner or manager of a winery or farm winery licensee that is not 115 served by a wholesaler when the owner or manger is appointed to the board; one owner or manager of 116

a winery or farm winery licensee that produces no more than 10,000 cases per year; and two owners or 117

118 managers of wine wholesaler licensees. In making appointments to the board of directors, the Board 119 shall consider nominations of winery and farm winery licensees submitted by the Virginia Wineries 120 Association and wine wholesale licensees submitted by the Virginia Wine Wholesalers Association. The Commissioner shall require such corporation to report to him at least annually on its activities, 121 122 including, but not limited to, reporting the quantity of wine distributed for each winery and farm winery 123 during the preceding year.

124 C. The provisions of the Virginia Public Procurement Act (§ 2.2-4300 et seq.) shall not apply to the 125 establishment of such corporation nor to the exercise of any of its powers granted under this section.

126 § 4.1-203. Separate license for each place of business; transfer or amendment; posting; expiration; 127 carriers.

128 A. Each license granted by the Board shall designate the place where the business of the licensee 129 will be carried on. A Except as otherwise provided in §§ 4.1-207 and 4.1-208, a separate license shall 130 be required for each separate place of business.

131 B. No license shall be transferable from one person to another, or from one location to another. The 132 Board may permit a licensee to amend the classification of an existing license without complying with the posting and publishing procedures required by § 4.1-230 if the effect of the amendment is to reduce 133 134 materially the privileges of an existing license. However, if (i) the Board determines that the amendment 135 is a device to evade the provisions of this chapter, (ii) a majority of the corporate stock of a retail 136 licensee is sold to a new entity, or (iii) there is a change of business at the premises of a retail licensee, 137 the Board may, within thirty days of receipt of written notice by the licensee of a change in ownership 138 or a change of business, require the licensee to comply with any or all of the requirements of § 4.1-230. 139 If the Board fails to exercise its authority within the thirty-day period, the licensee shall not be required 140 to reapply for a license. The licensee shall submit such written notice to the Secretary of the Board.

141 C. Each license shall be posted in a location conspicuous to the public at the place where the 142 licensee carries on the business for which the license is granted.

143 D. The privileges conferred by any license granted by the Board, except for temporary licenses, 144 banquet and mixed beverage special events licenses, shall continue until the last day of the twelfth 145 month next ensuing or the last day of the designated month of expiration, except the license may be 146 sooner terminated for any cause for which the Board would be entitled to refuse to grant a license, by 147 operation of law, voluntary surrender or order of the Board.

148 The Board may permit a licensee who fails to pay by midnight of the fifteenth day of the twelfth 149 month or of the designated month of expiration, whichever is applicable, the required license tax 150 covering the continuation or reissuance of his license, to pay the tax in lieu of posting and publishing 151 notice and reapplying, provided payment of the tax is made within thirty days following that date and is 152 accompanied by a civil penalty of twenty-five dollars or ten percent of such tax, whichever is greater.

153 E. Subsections A and C shall not apply to common carriers of passengers by train, boat, or airplane. 154

§ 4.1-207. Wine licenses.

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The Board may grant the following licenses relating to wine:

156 1. Winery licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture wine and to sell and deliver or ship the wine, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers, to persons licensed to sell the 157 158 wine so manufactured at wholesale for the purpose of resale, and to persons outside the Commonwealth 159 for resale outside the Commonwealth. In addition, such license shall authorize the licensee to (i) operate 160 distilling equipment on the premises of the licensee in the manufacture of spirits from fruit or fruit 161 juices only, which shall be used only for the fortification of wine produced by the licensee, and (ii) 162 store wine in bonded warehouses on or off the licensed premises upon permit issued by the Board.

2. Wholesale wine licenses, including those granted pursuant to § 4.1-207.1, which shall authorize 163 164 the licensee to acquire and receive deliveries and shipments of wine and to sell and deliver or ship the 165 wine from one or more premises identified in the license, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers, to (i) persons licensed to sell such wine in the Commonwealth, (ii) persons outside 166 167 the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth, (iii) religious congregations for use only for 168 sacramental purposes, and (iv) owners of boats registered under the laws of the United States sailing for 169 ports of call of a foreign country or another state.

170 No wholesale wine licensee shall purchase wine for resale from a person outside the Commonwealth 171 who does not hold a wine importer's license unless such wholesale wine licensee holds a wine importer's 172 license and purchases wine for resale pursuant to the privileges of such wine importer's license.

173 3. Wine importers' licenses, which shall authorize persons located within or outside the 174 Commonwealth to sell and deliver or ship wine, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed 175 containers, to persons in the Commonwealth licensed to sell wine at wholesale for the purpose of resale, 176 and to persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth.

177 4. Retail off-premises winery licenses to persons holding winery licenses, which shall authorize the 178 licensee to sell wine at the place of business designated in the winery license, in closed containers, for

179 off-premises consumption.

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180 5. Farm winery licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture wine containing 18 181 percent or less of alcohol by volume and to sell, deliver or ship the wine, in accordance with Board 182 regulations, in closed containers, to (i) the Board, (ii) persons licensed to sell the wine so manufactured 183 at wholesale for the purpose of resale, § 4.1-326 notwithstanding, or (iii) persons outside the 184 Commonwealth. In addition, the licensee may (a) acquire and receive deliveries and shipments of wine manufactured by the licensee and to sell and deliver or ship this wine, in accordance with Board 185 186 regulations, to persons licensed to sell wine in the Commonwealth, § 4.1-326 notwithstanding and (b) 187 store wine in bonded warehouses located on or off the licensed premises upon permits issued by the 188 Board. For the purposes of this title, a farm winery license shall be designated either as a Class A or 189 Class B farm winery license in accordance with the limitations set forth in § 4.1-219.

190 Such licenses shall also authorize the licensee to sell wine at retail at the places of business 191 designated in the licenses, which may include no more than five additional retail establishments of the 192 licensee. Wine may be sold at these business places for on-premises consumption and in closed 193 containers for off-premises consumption.

§ 4.1-207.1. Restricted wholesale wine licenses.

195 The Board may grant a wholesale wine license to a nonprofit, nonstock corporation created in 196 accordance with § 3.1-14.01, which shall authorize the licensee to provide wholesale wine distribution 197 services to winery and farm winery licensees, provided that no more than 3,000 cases of wine produced 198 by a winery or farm winery licensee shall be distributed by the corporation in any one year. The 199 corporation shall provide such distribution services in accordance with the terms of a written agreement 200 approved by the corporation between it and the winery or farm winery licensee, which shall comply with 201 the provisions of this title and Board regulations. The corporation shall receive all of the privileges of, and be subject to, all laws and regulations governing wholesale wine licenses granted under subdivision 202 203 2 of § 4.1-207. 204

§ 4.1-208. Beer licenses.

The Board may grant the following licenses relating to beer:

206 1. Brewery licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture beer and to sell and deliver or 207 ship the beer so manufactured, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers to (i) persons 208 licensed to sell the beer at wholesale; (ii) persons licensed to sell beer at retail for the purpose of resale 209 within a theme or amusement park owned and operated by the brewery or a parent, subsidiary or a 210 company under common control of such brewery, or upon property of such brewery or a parent, 211 subsidiary or a company under common control of such brewery contiguous to such premises, or in a 212 development contiguous to such premises owned and operated by such brewery or a parent, subsidiary 213 or a company under common control of such brewery; and (iii) persons outside the Commonwealth for 214 resale outside the Commonwealth. Such license may also authorize individuals holding a brewery license 215 to operate a facility designed for and utilized exclusively for the education of persons in the manufacture 216 of beer, including sampling by such individuals of beer products, within a theme or amusement park 217 located upon the premises occupied by such brewery, or upon property of such person contiguous to 218 such premises, or in a development contiguous to such premises owned and operated by such person or 219 a wholly owned subsidiary. Provided, however, that such samples may be provided only to individuals 220 for consumption on the premises of such facility and only to individuals to whom such products may be 221 lawfully sold.

222 2. Bottlers' licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to acquire and receive deliveries and 223 shipments of beer in closed containers and to bottle, sell and deliver or ship it, in accordance with 224 Board regulations to (i) wholesale beer licensees for the purpose of resale, (ii) owners of boats registered 225 under the laws of the United States sailing for ports of call of a foreign country or another state, and 226 (iii) persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth.

227 3. Wholesale beer licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to acquire and receive deliveries and 228 shipments of beer and to sell and deliver or ship it the beer from one or more premises identified in the 229 license, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers to (i) persons licensed under this 230 chapter to sell such beer at wholesale or retail for the purpose of resale, (ii) owners of boats registered 231 under the laws of the United States sailing for ports of call of a foreign country or another state, and 232 (iii) persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth.

233 No wholesale beer licensee shall purchase beer for resale from a person outside the Commonwealth 234 who does not hold a beer importer's license unless such wholesale beer licensee holds a beer importer's 235 license and purchases beer for resale pursuant to the privileges of such beer importer's license.

236 4. Beer importers' licenses, which shall authorize persons licensed within or outside the Commonwealth to sell and deliver or ship beer into the Commonwealth, in accordance with Board 237 238 regulations, in closed containers, to persons in the Commonwealth licensed to sell beer at wholesale for 239 the purpose of resale.

240 5. Retail on-premises beer licenses to:

241 a. Hotels, restaurants and clubs, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer, either with or without 242 meals, only in dining areas and other designated areas of such restaurants, or in dining areas, private 243 guest rooms, and other designated areas of such hotels or clubs, for consumption only in such rooms 244 and areas.

245 b. Persons operating dining cars, buffet cars, and club cars of trains, which shall authorize the 246 licensee to sell beer, either with or without meals, in the dining cars, buffet cars, and club cars so 247 operated by them for on-premises consumption when carrying passengers.

248 c. Persons operating sight-seeing boats, or special or charter boats, which shall authorize the licensee 249 to sell beer, either with or without meals, on such boats operated by them for on-premises consumption 250 when carrying passengers.

251 d. Grocery stores located in any town or in a rural area outside the corporate limits of any city or 252 town, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer for on-premises consumption in such establishments. 253 No license shall be granted unless it appears affirmatively that a substantial public demand for such 254 licensed establishment exists and that public convenience and the purposes of this title will be promoted 255 by granting the license.

256 e. Persons operating food concessions at coliseums, stadia, or similar facilities, which shall authorize 257 the licensee to sell beer, in paper, plastic, or similar disposable containers, during the performance of 258 professional sporting exhibitions, events or performances immediately subsequent thereto, to patrons 259 within all seating areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, and additional locations designated by 260 the Board in such coliseums, stadia, or similar facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon 261 authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic 262 beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the license.

263 f. Persons operating food concessions at any outdoor performing arts amphitheater, arena or similar 264 facility which has seating for more than 3,500 persons and is located in any county with a population 265 between 65,000 and 70,000. Such license shall authorize the licensee to sell beer during the performance 266 of any event, in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers to patrons within all seating areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, or similar facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon 267 268 authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic 269 beverages on the premises in all areas and locations covered by the license.

270 g. Persons operating food concessions at exhibition or exposition halls, convention centers or similar 271 facilities located in any county operating under the urban county executive form of government or any 272 city which is completely surrounded by such county, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer 273 during the event, in paper, plastic or similar disposable containers to patrons or attendees within all 274 seating areas, exhibition areas, concourses, walkways, concession areas, and such additional locations 275 designated by the Board in such facilities, for on-premises consumption. Upon authorization of the 276 licensee, any person may keep and consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the 277 premises in all areas and locations covered by the license. For purposes of this subsection, "exhibition or exposition halls" and "convention centers" mean facilities conducting private or public trade shows or 278 279 exhibitions in an indoor facility having in excess of 100,000 square feet of floor space.

280 6. Retail off-premises beer licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell beer in closed 281 containers for off-premises consumption.

282 7. Retail off-premises brewery licenses to persons holding a brewery license which shall authorize 283 the licensee to sell beer at the place of business designated in the brewery license, in closed containers 284 which shall include growlers and other reusable containers, for off-premises consumption.

285 8. Retail on-and-off premises beer licenses to persons enumerated in subdivisions 5 a and d, which 286 shall accord all the privileges conferred by retail on-premises beer licenses and in addition, shall 287 authorize the licensee to sell beer in closed containers for off-premises consumption. 288

§ 4.1-223. Conditions under which Board shall refuse to grant licenses.

The Board shall refuse to grant any:

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290 1. Wholesale beer or wine license to any person, unless such person has established or will establish 291 a place or places of business within the Commonwealth at which will be received and from which will 292 be distributed all alcoholic beverages sold by such person in the Commonwealth. However, in special 293 circumstances, the Board, subject to any regulations it may adopt, may permit alcoholic beverages to be 294 received into or distributed from places other than established places of business.

295 2. Wholesale beer license or wholesale wine license to any entity that is owned, in whole or in part, 296 by any manufacturer of alcoholic beverages, any subsidiary or affiliate of such manufacturer or any 297 person under common control with such manufacturer. This subdivision, however, shall not apply to (i)298 any applicant for a wholesale beer or wine license filed pursuant to subdivision 3 b of subsection B of 299 § 4.1-216 or (ii) the nonprofit, nonstock corporation established pursuant to § 3.1-14.01 in exercising 300 any privileges granted under § 4.1-207.1.

As used in this subdivision, the term "manufacturer" includes any person (i) who brews, vinifies or 301 302 distills alcoholic beverages for sale or (ii) engaging in business as a contract brewer, winery or distillery 303 that owns alcoholic beverage product brand rights, but arranges the manufacture of such products by 304 another person.

305 3. Mixed beverage license if the Board determines that in the licensed establishment there (i) is 306 entertainment of a lewd, obscene or lustful nature including what is commonly called stripteasing, topless entertaining, and the like, or which has employees who are not clad both above and below the 307 waist, or who uncommonly expose the body or (ii) are employees who solicit the sale of alcoholic 308 309 beverages.

310 4. Wholesale wine license until the applicant has filed with the Board a bond payable to the 311 Commonwealth, in a sum not to exceed 10,000, upon a form approved by the Board, signed by the 312 applicant or licensee and a surety company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth as surety, and conditioned upon such person's (i) securing wine only in a manner provided by law, (ii) remitting to 313 the Board the proper tax thereon, (iii) keeping such records as may be required by law or Board 314 regulations, and (iv) abiding by such other laws or Board regulations relative to the handling of wine by 315 wholesale wine licensees. The Board may waive the requirement of both the surety and the bond in 316 317 cases where the wholesaler has previously demonstrated his financial responsibility.

318 5. Mixed beverage license to any member, agent or employee of the Board or to any corporation or 319 other business entity in which such member, agent or employee is a stockholder or has any other 320 economic interest.

321 Whenever any other elective or appointive official of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision 322 thereof applies for such a license or continuance thereof, he shall state on the application the official 323 position he holds, and whenever a corporation or other business entity in which any such official is a 324 stockholder or has any other economic interests applies for such a license, it shall state on the 325 application the full economic interest of each such official in such corporation or other business entity.

6. License authorized by this chapter until the license tax required by § 4.1-231 is paid to the Board. 326

- 327 § 4.1-231. Taxes on state licenses.
- A. The annual fees on state licenses shall be as follows: 328

B. The tax on each such license, except banquet and mixed beverage special events licenses, shall be subject to proration to the following extent: If the license is granted in the second quarter of any year, the tax shall be decreased by one-fourth; if granted in the third quarter of any year, the tax shall be decreased by one-half; and if granted in the fourth quarter of any year, the tax shall be decreased by three-fourths.

421 If the license on which the tax is prorated is a distiller's license to manufacture not more than 5,000 gallons of alcohol or spirits, or both, during the year in which the license is granted, or a winery license

to manufacture not more than 5,000 gallons of wine during the year in which the license is granted, thenumber of gallons permitted to be manufactured shall be prorated in the same manner.

425 Should the holder of a distiller's license or a winery license to manufacture not more than 5,000 426 gallons of alcohol or spirits, or both, or wine, apply during the license year for an unlimited distiller's or 427 winery license, such person shall pay for such unlimited license a license tax equal to the amount that 428 would have been charged had such license been applied for at the time that the license to manufacture 429 less than 5,000 gallons of alcohol or spirits or wine, as the case may be, was granted, and such person 430 shall be entitled to a refund of the amount of license tax previously paid on the limited license.

431 Notwithstanding the foregoing, the tax on each license granted or reissued for a period of less than
432 12 months shall be equal to one-twelfth of the taxes required by subsection A computed to the nearest
433 cent, multiplied by the number of months in the license period.

434 C. Nothing in this chapter shall exempt any licensee from any state merchants' license or state 435 restaurant license or any other state tax. Every licensee, in addition to the taxes imposed by this chapter, shall be liable to state merchants' license taxation and state restaurant license taxation and other state 436 437 taxation the same as if the alcoholic beverages were nonalcoholic. In ascertaining the liability of a beer 438 wholesaler to merchants' license taxation, however, and in computing the wholesale merchants' license 439 tax on a beer wholesaler, the first \$163,800 of beer purchases shall be disregarded; and in ascertaining 440 the liability of a wholesale wine distributor to merchants' license taxation, and in computing the 441 wholesale merchants' license tax on a wholesale wine distributor, the first \$163,800 of wine purchases 442 shall be disregarded.

443 2. That an emergency exists and this act is in force from its passage.

3. That the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall implement the provisions of
this act consistent with an opinion of the Attorney General dated April 28, 2006, within 90 days of
the effective date of this act.

447 4. That the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board shall assist the Commissioner of Agriculture and 448 Consumer Services in the formation and operation of the nonprofit, nonstock corporation

449 established pursuant to § 3.1-14.01 of this act.
