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11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That § 37.2-416 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
13	§ 37.2-416. Background checks required.
14	A. As used in this section, the term "direct consumer care position" means any position that includes
15	responsibility for (i) treatment, case management, health, safety, development, or well-being of a
16	consumer or (ii) immediately supervising a person in a position with this responsibility.
17	As used in this section, "hire for compensated employment" does not include (i) a promotion from
18	one adult substance abuse treatment position to another such position within the same licensee licensed
19	pursuant to this article or (ii) new employment in an adult substance abuse treatment position in another
20	office or program licensed pursuant to this article if the person employed prior to July 1, 1999, in a
$\overline{21}$	licensed program had no convictions in the five years prior to the application date for employment. As
$\overline{22}$	used in this section, "hire for compensated employment" includes (a) a promotion or transfer from an
$\overline{23}$	adult substance abuse treatment position to any mental health or mental retardation direct consumer care
24	position within the same licensee licensed pursuant to this article or (b) new employment in any mental
25	health or mental retardation direct consumer care position in another office or program of the same
26	licensee licensed pursuant to this article for which the person has previously worked in an adult
27	substance abuse treatment position.
28	B. Every provider licensed pursuant to this article shall require any applicant who accepts
29	employment in any direct consumer care position to submit to fingerprinting and provide personal
30	descriptive information to be forwarded through the Central Criminal Records Exchange to the Federal
31	Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for the purpose of obtaining national criminal history record information
32	regarding the applicant. Except as otherwise provided in subsections C ΘE , D, or F, no provider
33	licensed pursuant to this article shall hire for compensated employment persons who have been
34	convicted of any offense listed in subsection B of § 37.2-314.
35	The Central Criminal Records Exchange, upon receipt of an individual's record or notification that no
36	record exists, shall submit a report to the requesting authorized officer or director of a provider licensed
37	pursuant to this article. If any applicant is denied employment because of information appearing on the
38	criminal history record and the applicant disputes the information upon which the denial was based, the
39	Central Criminal Records Exchange shall, upon written request, furnish to the applicant the procedures
40	for obtaining a copy of the criminal history record from the FBI. The information provided to the
41	authorized officer or director of a provider licensed pursuant to this article shall not be disseminated
42	except as provided in this section.
43	C. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B, a provider may hire for compensated employment
44	at adult substance abuse treatment facilities a person who was convicted of a misdemeanor violation
45	relating to (i) unlawful hazing, as set out in § 18.2-56; or (ii) reckless handling of a firearm, as set out
46	in § 18.2-56.1; or any misdemeanor or felony violation related to (a) reckless endangerment of others by
47	throwing objects, as set out in § 18.2-51.3; (b) threat, as set out in § 18.2-60; (c) breaking and entering a
48	dwelling house with intent to commit other misdemeanor, as set out in § 18.2-92; or (d) possession of
49	burglarious tools, as set out in § 18.2-94; or any felony violation relating to the distribution of drugs, as
50	set out in Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2, except an offense pursuant to
51	subsections H 1 and H 2 of § 18.2-248; or an equivalent offense in another state, if the hiring provider
52	determines, based upon a screening assessment, that the criminal behavior was substantially related to
53	the applicant's substance abuse and that the person has been successfully rehabilitated and is not a risk
54	to consumers based on his criminal history background and his substance abuse history.
55	D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B, a provider may hire for compensated employment
56	at adult substance abuse treatment facilities a person who has been convicted of not more than one
57	offense of assault and battery of a police officer under § 18.2-57, or an equivalent offense in another
58	state, if (i) more than five years have elapsed since the conviction and (ii) the hiring provider

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determines, based upon a screening assessment, that the criminal behavior was substantially related to
the applicant's substance abuse and that the person has been successfully rehabilitated and is not a risk
to consumers based on his criminal history background and his substance abuse history.

62 DE. The hiring provider and a screening contractor designated by the Department shall screen 63 applicants who meet the criteria set forth in subsection C subsections C and D to assess whether the 64 applicants have been rehabilitated successfully and are not a risk to consumers based on their criminal 65 history backgrounds and substance abuse histories. To be eligible for such screening, the applicant shall have completed all prison or jail terms, shall not be under probation or parole supervision, shall have no 66 pending charges in any locality, shall have paid all fines, restitution, and court costs for any prior 67 convictions, and shall have been free of parole or probation for at least five years for all convictions. In 68 addition to any supplementary information the provider or screening contractor may require or the applicant may wish to present, the applicant shall provide to the screening contractor a statement from 69 70 his most recent probation or parole officer, if any, outlining his period of supervision and a copy of any 71 pre-sentencing or post-sentencing report in connection with the felony conviction. The cost of this 72 73 screening shall be paid by the applicant, unless the licensed provider decides to pay the cost.

EF. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B, a provider may hire for compensated
employment persons who have been convicted of not more than one misdemeanor offense under
§ 18.2-57 or 18.2-57.2, if 10 years have elapsed following the conviction, unless the person committed
the offense while employed in a direct consumer care position.

FG. Providers licensed pursuant to this article also shall require, as a condition of employment for all applicants, written consent and personal information necessary to obtain a search of the registry of founded complaints of child abuse and neglect that is maintained by the Department of Social Services
pursuant to § 63.2-1515.

82 GH. The cost of obtaining the criminal history record and search of the child abuse and neglect
83 registry record shall be borne by the applicant, unless the provider licensed pursuant to this article
84 decides to pay the cost.

HI. A person who complies in good faith with the provisions of this section shall not be liable for any civil damages for any act or omission in the performance of duties under this section unless the act or omission was the result of gross negligence or willful misconduct.
