10	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, a majority of the members elected to
11	each house agreeing, That the following amendment to the Constitution of Virginia be, and the same
12	hereby is, proposed and referred to the General Assembly at its first regular session held after the next
13	general election of members of the House of Delegates for its concurrence in conformity with the
14 15	provisions of Section 1 of Article XII of the Constitution of Virginia, namely:
15 16	Amend Section 16 of Article I of the Constitution of Virginia as follows: ARTICLE I
17	BILL OF RIGHTS
18	Section 16. Free exercise of religion; no establishment of religion.
19	That religion or the duty which we owe to our Creator, and the manner of discharging it, can be
20	directed only by reason and conviction, not by force or violence; and, therefore, all men are equally
21	entitled to the free exercise of religion, according to the dictates of conscience; and that it is the mutual
22	duty of all to practice Christian forbearance, love, and charity towards each other. No man shall be
23	compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place, or ministry whatsoever, nor shall be
24	enforced, restrained, molested, or burthened in his body or goods, nor shall otherwise suffer on account
25 26	of his religious opinions or belief; but all men shall be free to profess and by argument to maintain their opinions in matters of religion and the same shall in newice diminish onlarge or affect their civil
20 27	opinions in matters of religion, and the same shall in nowise diminish, enlarge, or affect their civil capacities.
28	To secure further the people's right to acknowledge God according to the dictates of conscience,
29	neither the Commonwealth nor its political subdivisions shall establish any official religion, but the
30	people's right to pray and to recognize their religious beliefs, heritage, and traditions on public
31	property, including public schools, shall not be infringed.
32	And the General Assembly shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar
33	privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any

33 privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any 34 religious society, or the people of any district within this Commonwealth, to levy on themselves or 35 others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house of public worship, or for the support of any 36 church or ministry; but it shall be left free to every person to select his religious instructor, and to make 37 for his support such private contract as he shall please.
