10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 64.1-157 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 64.1-157. Order in which debts of decedents to be paid.
13	When the assets of the decedent in the hands of his personal representative are not sufficient for the
14	satisfaction of all demands against him, they shall be applied in the following order to the payment of:
15	1. Costs and expenses of administration;
16	2. The allowances provided in Article 5.1 (§ 64.1-151.1 et seq.) of this chapter;
17	3. Funeral expenses not to exceed \$2,000;
18	4. Debts and taxes with preference under federal law; 5. Medical and hearital expanses of the last illness of the decedent including componential of
19 20	5. Medical and hospital expenses of the last illness of the decedent, including compensation of persons attending him not to exceed \$400 for each hospital and nursing home and \$150 for each person
20 21	furnishing services or goods;
22	6. Debts and taxes due this Commonwealth or its political subdivisions, including localities and
23	municipal corporations;
24	7. Debts due as trustee for persons under disabilities, as receiver or commissioner under decree of
25	court of this Commonwealth, as personal representative, guardian, conservator or committee, when the
26	qualification was in this Commonwealth and for moneys collected by anyone to the credit of another
27	and not paid over, regardless of whether or not a bond has been executed for the faithful performance of
28	the duties of the party so collecting such funds;
29	8. All other claims.

30 No preference shall be given in the payment of any claim over any other claim of the same class, 31 and a claim due and payable shall not be entitled to a preference over a claim not due. INTRODUCED
