That §§ 22.1-60.1, 22.1-253.13:5, and 22.1-275.1 of the Code of Virginia are amended and 12 reenacted, and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 22.1-16.4 and 13 14 by adding in Chapter 6 of Title 22.1 a section numbered 22.1-70.4 as follows: 15 § 22.1-16.4. Joint regulations on childhood obesity prevention and reduction in the public schools. 16 The Board of Education, in cooperation with the State Health Department, shall promulgate regulations establishing standards to facilitate the prevention and reduction of childhood obesity in the 17 public schools. Such regulations shall include, but not be limited to, (i) statewide nutritional standards 18 for school breakfast and lunch programs and the sale of competitive food and beverages, (ii) 19 requirements for appropriate physical fitness and recreational activities designed to promote weight 20 21 control and weight loss for students, and (iii) guidelines establishing nutritionally acceptable alternatives 22 to the recommended Dietary Guidelines for Americans that accommodate students and school personnel 23 with special dietary needs and restrictions. 24 § 22.1-60.1. Evaluation of superintendent. 25 Each local school board shall evaluate the division superintendent annually consistent with the performance objectives set forth in Guidelines for Uniform Performance Standards and Evaluation 26 27 Criteria for Teachers, Administrators, and Superintendents as required by § 22.1-253.13:5. Such annual 28 evaluation by the school board shall include evidence of the superintendent's compliance with the 29 provisions of § 22.1-70.4. 30 § 22.1-70.4. Instruction on health and academic-related consequences of childhood obesity required 31 of division superintendents. 32 By July 1, 2008, each division superintendent shall complete instruction in the causes and health 33 consequences resulting from overweight and obesity, including the principles of good nutrition, the 34 benefits of lifelong physical fitness, exercise and recreation, and the relationship between nutrition, 35 health, and learning, to facilitate the prevention and reduction of childhood obesity among students. 36 Completion of the instruction required in this section may be satisfied through attendance at 37 conferences, seminars, or in-service training designed to inform educators concerning the relationship 38 between being overweight or obese, school health and physical fitness, and academic performance. 39 § 22.1-253.13:5. Standard 5. Quality of classroom instruction and educational leadership. 40 A. Each member of the Board of Education shall participate in high-quality professional development 41 programs on personnel, curriculum and current issues in education as part of his service on the Board. 42 B. Consistent with the finding that leadership is essential for the advancement of public education in the Commonwealth, teacher, administrator, and superintendent evaluations shall be consistent with the 43 performance objectives included in the Guidelines for Uniform Performance Standards and Evaluation 44 Criteria for Teachers, Administrators, and Superintendents. Teacher evaluations shall include regular 45 observation and evidence that instruction is aligned with the school's curriculum. Evaluations shall 46 47 include identification of areas of individual strengths and weaknesses and recommendations for appropriate professional activities. Evaluations of superintendents shall also include evidence of 48 49 compliance with the provisions of § 22.1-70.4, which requires completion of instruction to facilitate the 50 prevention and reduction of childhood obesity in the public schools. C. The Board of Education shall provide guidance on high-quality professional development for (i) 51 52 teachers, principals, supervisors, division superintendents and other school staff; (ii) administrative and 53 supervisory personnel in the evaluation and documentation of teacher and administrator performance based on student academic progress and the skills and knowledge of such instructional or administrative 54 55 personnel; (iii) school board members on personnel, curriculum and current issues in education; and (iv) programs in Braille for teachers of the blind and visually impaired, in cooperation with the Virginia 56 57 Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired. 58 The Board shall also provide technical assistance on high-quality professional development to local

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59 school boards designed to ensure that all instructional personnel are proficient in the use of educational 60 technology consistent with its comprehensive plan for educational technology.

D. Each local school board shall require (i) its members to participate annually in high-quality 61 62 professional development activities at the state, local, or national levels on governance, including, but 63 not limited to, personnel policies and practices; curriculum and instruction; use of data in planning and 64 decision making; and current issues in education as part of their service on the local board and (ii) the 65 division superintendent to participate annually in high-quality professional development activities at the 66 local, state or national levels.

E. Each local school board shall provide a program of high-quality professional development (i) in 67 68 the use and documentation of performance standards and evaluation criteria based on student academic 69 progress and skills for teachers and administrators to clarify roles and performance expectations and to facilitate the successful implementation of instructional programs that promote student achievement at 70 71 the school and classroom levels; (ii) as part of the license renewal process, to assist teachers and principals in acquiring the skills needed to work with gifted students, students with disabilities, and 72 73 students who have been identified as having limited English proficiency and to increase student 74 achievement and expand the knowledge and skills students require to meet the standards for academic 75 performance set by the Board of Education; (iii) in educational technology for all instructional personnel which is designed to facilitate integration of computer skills and related technology into the curricula, 76 77 and (iv) for administrative personnel designed to increase proficiency in instructional leadership and 78 management, including training in the evaluation and documentation of teacher and administrator 79 performance based on student academic progress and the skills and knowledge of such instructional or 80 administrative personnel.

81 In addition, each local school board shall also provide teachers and principals with high-quality 82 professional development programs each year in (i) instructional content; (ii) the preparation of tests and 83 other assessment measures; (iii) methods for assessing the progress of individual students, including Standards of Learning assessment materials or other criterion-referenced tests that match locally 84 85 developed objectives; (iv) instruction and remediation techniques in English, mathematics, science, and history and social science; (v) interpreting test data for instructional purposes; and (vi) technology 86 87 applications to implement the Standards of Learning.

F. Schools and school divisions shall include as an integral component of their comprehensive plans 88 89 required by § 22.1-253.13:6, high-quality professional development programs that support the 90 recruitment, employment, and retention of qualified teachers and principals. Each school board shall 91 require all instructional personnel to participate each year in these professional development programs.

92 G. Each local school board shall annually review its professional development program for quality, effectiveness, participation by instructional personnel, and relevancy to the instructional needs of 93 94 teachers and the academic achievement needs of the students in the school division. 95

§ 22.1-275.1. School health advisory board.

Each school board shall establish a school health advisory board of no more than twenty members 96 97 which shall consist of broad-based community representation including, but not limited to, parents, 98 students, health professionals, educators, and others. The school health advisory board shall assist with 99 the development of health policy in the school division and the evaluation of the status of school health, 100 health education, the school environment, and health services.

101 The school health advisory board shall hold meetings at least semi-annually and shall annually report 102 on the status and needs of student health in the school division to any relevant school, the school board, 103 the Virginia Department of Health, and the Virginia Department of Education.

The local school board may request that the school health advisory board recommend to the local 104 105 school board procedures relating to preventing and reducing the incidence of overweight and obese students in the public schools, and children with acute or chronic illnesses or conditions, including, but 106 107 not limited to, appropriate emergency procedures for any life-threatening conditions and designation of 108 school personnel to implement the appropriate emergency procedures. The procedures relating to children with acute or chronic illnesses or conditions shall be developed with due consideration of the 109 110 size and staffing of the schools within the jurisdiction.
