WHEREAS, Janett Williams, called "Mother Dear" by everyone who loved and admired her, was an amazing mother and a strong and compassionate woman who always looked after not only the needs of her own children but also the needs of other family members and friends; and

WHEREAS, as the spiritual partner of Bishop Williams and the first lady of Mason Memorial Church of God in Christ, Janett Williams was a dedicated and inspirational advocate for children in the church, as well as in the community; and

WHEREAS, as a devoted pastor's wife, Janett Williams lived a life of service to others and was actively involved in countless church ministries and activities; and

WHEREAS, Janett Williams will be fondly remembered for her kind and generous nature and greatly missed by her adoring children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and other family members, as well as her numerous friends and admirers in the church and in the Norfolk community; now, therefore, be it
