083320592 **HOUSE BILL NO. 118** 1 2 House Amendments in [] — January 23, 2008 3 A BILL to amend and reenact § 23-9.6.1 of the Code of Virginia, relating to academic freedom at 4 four-year public institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth. 5 Patron Prior to Engrossment—Delegate Landes 6 7 Referred to Committee on Education 8 9 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 10 1. That § 23-9.6:1 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: § 23-9.6:1. Duties of Council generally. 11 In addition to such other duties as may be prescribed elsewhere, the State Council of Higher 12 13 Education shall: 14 1. Develop a statewide strategic plan that reflects the goals set forth in subsection B of § 23-38.88 15 for higher education in the Commonwealth, identifies a coordinated approach to such state and regional 16 goals, and emphasizes the future needs for higher education in Virginia at both the undergraduate and the graduate levels, as well as the mission, programs, facilities and location of each of the existing 17 institutions of higher education, each public institution's six-year plan, and such other matters as the 18 Council deems appropriate. The Council shall revise such plans at least once every six years and shall 19 20 submit such recommendations as are necessary for the implementation of the plan to the Governor and 21 the General Assembly. 22 2. Review and approve or disapprove any proposed change in the statement of mission of any presently existing public institution of higher education and to define the mission of all public 23 institutions of higher education created after the effective date of this provision. The Council shall, 24 25 within the time prescribed in subdivision 1, make a report to the Governor and the General Assembly with respect to its actions hereunder. No such actions shall become effective until 30 days after 26 27 adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next following the filing of such a report. Nothing 28 contained in this provision shall be construed to authorize the Council to modify any mission statement 29 adopted by the General Assembly, nor to empower the Council to affect, either directly or indirectly, the 30 selection of faculty or the standards and criteria for admission of any public institution, whether related 31 to academic standards, residence or other criteria; it being the intention of this section that faculty selection and student admission policies shall remain a function of the individual institutions. 32 33 3. Study any proposed escalation of any public institution to a degree-granting level higher than that 34 level to which it is presently restricted and to submit a report and recommendation to the Governor and 35 the General Assembly relating to the proposal. The study shall include the need for and benefits or 36 detriments to be derived from the escalation. No such institution shall implement any such proposed 37 escalation until the Council's report and recommendation have been submitted to the General Assembly 38 and the General Assembly approves the institution's proposal. 4. Review and approve or disapprove all enrollment projections proposed by each public institution 39 40 of higher education. The Council's projections shall be in numerical terms by level of enrollment and shall be used for budgetary and fiscal planning purposes only. The Council shall develop estimates of 41 the number of degrees to be awarded by each institution and include those estimates in its reports of 42 enrollment projections. The student admissions policies for the institutions and their specific programs 43 44 shall remain the sole responsibility of the individual boards of visitors; however, all four-year institutions shall adopt dual admissions policies with the community colleges, as required by 45 46 § 23-9.2:3.02. 47 5. Review and approve or disapprove all new academic programs which any public institution of higher education proposes. As used herein, "academic programs" include both undergraduate and 48 49 graduate programs. 6. Review and require the discontinuance of any undergraduate or graduate academic program that is 50 51 presently offered by any public institution of higher education when the Council determines that such 52 academic program is (i) nonproductive in terms of the number of degrees granted, the number of 53 students served by the program, the program's effectiveness, and budgetary considerations, or (ii) supported by state funds and is unnecessarily duplicative of academic programs offered at other public 54 55 institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth. The Council shall make a report to the Governor and the General Assembly with respect to the discontinuance of any such academic program. No such 56 discontinuance shall become effective until 30 days after the adjournment of the session of the General 57 58 Assembly next following the filing of such report.

59 7. Review and approve or disapprove the creation and establishment of any department, school, 60 college, branch, division or extension of any public institution of higher education that such institution proposes to create and establish. This duty and responsibility shall be applicable to the proposed creation 61 62 and establishment of departments, schools, colleges, branches, divisions and extensions, whether located 63 on or off the main campus of the institution in question. If any organizational change is determined by 64 the Council to be proposed solely for the purpose of internal management and the institution's curricular 65 offerings remain constant, the Council shall approve the proposed change. Nothing in this provision shall be construed to authorize the Council to disapprove the creation and establishment of any department, 66 school, college, branch, division or extension of any institution that has been created and established by 67 68 the General Assembly.

8. Review the proposed closure of any academic program in a high demand or critical shortage area,as defined by the Council, by any public institution of higher education and assist in the development ofan orderly closure plan, when needed.

9. Develop a uniform, comprehensive data information system designed to gather all information necessary to the performance of the Council's duties. The system shall include information on admissions, enrollments, self-identified students with documented disabilities, personnel, programs, financing, space inventory, facilities and such other areas as the Council deems appropriate.

10. Develop in cooperation with institutions of higher education guidelines for the assessment of student achievement. An institution shall use an approved program that complies with the guidelines of the Council and is consistent with the institution's mission and educational objectives in the development of such assessment. The Council shall report the institutions' assessments of student achievement in the biennial revisions to the state's master plan for higher education.

81 11. Develop in cooperation with the appropriate state financial and accounting officials and to
 82 establish uniform standards and systems of accounting, record keeping and statistical reporting for the
 83 public institutions of higher education.

84 12. Review biennially and approve or disapprove all changes in the inventory of educational and
85 general space that any public institution of higher education may propose, and to make a report to the
86 Governor and the General Assembly with respect thereto. No such change shall be made until 30 days
87 after the adjournment of the session of the General Assembly next following the filing of such report.

88 13. Visit and study the operations of each of the public institutions of higher education at such times
89 as the Council shall deem appropriate and to conduct such other studies in the field of higher education
90 as the Council deems appropriate or as may be requested by the Governor or the General Assembly.

91 14. Provide advisory services to private, accredited and nonprofit institutions of higher education,
92 whose primary purpose is to provide collegiate or graduate education and not to provide religious
93 training or theological education, on academic, administrative, financial and space utilization matters.
94 The Council may also review and advise on joint activities, including contracts for services between
95 such public and private institutions of higher education or between such private institutions and any
96 agency of the Commonwealth or political subdivision thereof.

97 15. Adopt such rules and regulations as the Council believes necessary to implement all of the
98 Council's duties and responsibilities as set forth in this Code. The various public institutions of higher
99 education shall comply with such rules and regulations.

100 16. Issue guidelines consistent with the provisions of the federal Family Education Rights and
 101 Privacy Act (FERPA), 20 U.S.C. § 1232g requiring public institutions of higher education to release a
 102 student's academic and disciplinary record to a student's parent.

103 17. Develop and revise, as it deems necessary, in consultation with the Coordinator of Emergency
 104 Management, a model institutional crisis and emergency management plan for the purpose of assisting
 105 public and private two-year and four-year institutions of higher education in establishing, operating, and
 106 maintaining emergency services and disaster preparedness activities.

18. Require that each institution of higher education formed, chartered, or established in the 107 108 Commonwealth after July 1, 1980, shall ensure the preservation of student transcripts in the event of 109 institutional closure or revocation of approval to operate in the Commonwealth of Virginia. An institution may provide for the preservation of student transcripts by binding agreement with another 110 111 institution of higher education with which it is not corporately connected or in such other way as the Council may authorize by regulation. In the event an institution closes, or has its approval to operate in 112 113 the Commonwealth revoked, the Council, through its Director, may take such action as is necessary to secure and preserve the student transcripts until such time as an appropriate institution accepts all or 114 115 some of the transcripts. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to interfere with the right of a student 116 to his own transcripts; nor shall this section authorize disclosure of student records except as may 117 otherwise be authorized by law.

118 19. Develop, in cooperation with the institutions of higher education, the Board of Nursing, and the
119 Advisory Council on the Future of Nursing in Virginia, a strategic statewide plan to ensure an adequate
120 supply of nurses. The Council shall recommend to the Governor and the General Assembly such

121 changes in public policy as may be necessary to meet the state's current and future need for essential 122 nursing services.

123 20. Require the development and submission of articulation, transfer, and dual enrollment and 124 admissions agreements between two- and four-year public institutions of higher education in Virginia, 125 including programs for qualified students to be simultaneously accepted by a community college and a 126 four-year public institution of higher education and, upon successful completion of an associate degree 127 program from the community college, to be automatically enrolled in the four-year institution of higher 128 education. Dual admissions agreements shall set forth (i) the obligations of the students accepted in such 129 programs, including grade point average requirements, acceptable associate degree majors, and 130 completion timetables; and (ii) the student's access to the privileges of enrollment in both institutions 131 during the time enrolled in either institution. Such agreements shall be subject to the admissions 132 requirements of the four-year institutions, except as provided in § 23-9.2:3.02.

133 21. Provide periodic updates of base adequacy funding guidelines adopted by the Joint Subcommittee
 134 Studying Higher Education Funding Policies for the various public institutions.

135 22. Require that each public institution of higher education in the Commonwealth biennially report to the Council the policies the institution has adopted to ensure academic freedom and the free 136 137 exchange of ideas. The report shall address the specific policies adopted by the institution and may 138 include any policies assuring: (i) the protection of academic freedom as stated in institutional statements 139 and grievance procedures; (ii) the right of students and other members of the academic community to 140 invite and hear speakers of their choice; (iii) that speakers on campus are not only protected from 141 violence but are given an opportunity to be heard, and that those who exercise the right to call 142 attention to grievances do not do so in ways that significantly impede the functions of the institution; 143 (iv) that hiring, tenure, and promotion policies protect individuals from discrimination on grounds 144 unrelated to competence for the position under consideration and [decisions that are] inconsistent with 145 the institution's stated hiring policies; (v) safeguards for freedom of the press for students; or (vi) that 146 student codes of conduct do not restrict the content or manner of speech. The Council shall compile all reports and distribute the compilation to the General Assembly no later than December 31 of the last 147 148 year of each biennium, as well as post such compilation on the Council's website.

149 In carrying out its duties and responsibilities, the Council, insofar as practicable, shall preserve the 150 individuality, traditions and sense of responsibility of the respective institutions. The Council, insofar as 151 practicable, shall seek the assistance and advice of the respective institutions in fulfilling all of its duties 152 and responsibilities.
