12	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That §§ 23-31, 23-40, 23-49.1, and 23-214 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted
13	and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 5 of Title 23 a section numbered
14	23-49.1:2 as follows:
15	§ 23-31. Unfunded scholarships.
16	A. The corporate authorities of the University of Virginia, the University of Virginia's College at
17	Wise, Virginia Military Institute, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, The College of
18	William and Mary, Christopher Newport University, George Mason University, Longwood University,
19	the University of Mary Washington, James Madison University, Virginia Commonwealth University,
20	Radford University, Old Dominion University, the Virginia Community College System, Virginia State
21	University, and Norfolk State University, and Richard Bland College may establish scholarships,
22	hereafter to be designated as unfunded scholarships, in their respective institutions under such
23	regulations and conditions as they may prescribe, but subject to the following limitations and
24	restrictions:
25 26	1. All such scholarships shall be applied exclusively to the remission, in whole or in part, of tuition and required fees.
20 27	2. The respective corporate authorities shall determine the number of such scholarships annually
28	awarded to undergraduate Virginia and non-Virginia students.
29	The total value of all such scholarships annually awarded by an institution to undergraduate Virginia
30	students shall not exceed in any year the amount arrived at by multiplying the applicable figure for
31	undergraduate tuition and required fees by 20 percent of the enrollment of Virginia students in
32	undergraduate studies in the institution during the preceding academic year. The total value of all such
33	scholarships annually awarded by an institution to non-Virginia undergraduate students shall not exceed
34	in any year the amount of the applicable, per capita out-of-state differential paid by non-Virginia
35 36	undergraduate students for tuition and required fees multiplied by 20 percent of the enrollment of non-Virginia students in undergraduate studies in the institution during the preceding academic year.
30 37	All such scholarships awarded to undergraduate students shall be awarded only to undergraduate
38	students in the first four years of undergraduate work and shall be awarded and renewed on a selective
<b>39</b>	basis to students of character and ability who are in need of financial assistance. For purposes of
40	determining need under this section, a nationally recognized needs-analysis system approved by the State
41	Council of Higher Education shall be used.
42	3. The respective corporate authorities shall determine the number of such scholarships annually
43	awarded to graduate students or teachers serving as clinical faculty pursuant to § 22.1-290.1. The total
44	value of all such scholarships annually awarded to such graduate students and clinical faculty shall not
45	exceed in any year the amount arrived at by multiplying the applicable figure for graduate tuition and
46	required fees by the number of graduate students who are employed as teaching or research assistants with significant academic responsibilities and who are mid a stinger of at least \$2,000 in the particular
47 48	with significant academic responsibilities and who are paid a stipend of at least \$2,000 in the particular academic year and such clinical faculty. All graduate scholarships shall be awarded and renewed on a
<b>49</b>	selective basis to such graduate students and clinical faculty of character and ability.
50	4. A scholarship awarded under this program shall entitle the holder to the following award, as
51	appropriate:
52	a. A Virginia undergraduate student may receive an annual remission of an amount not to exceed the
53	cost of tuition and fees required to be paid by the student;
54	b. A non-Virginia undergraduate student may receive an annual remission not to exceed the amount
55	of the out-of-state differential required to be paid by the student for tuition and fees;
56 57	c. A qualified graduate student may receive an annual remission of an amount not to exceed the cost
57 58	of tuition and fees required to be paid by the student; d. A clinical faculty member may receive an award as determined by the governing body of the
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59 institution.

60 5. Notwithstanding the limitations on the awards of unfunded scholarships to undergraduate students pursuant to subdivision A 4 of this section, an institution may award additional unfunded scholarships to 61 62 visiting foreign exchange students; however, the number of such awards in any fiscal year shall not 63 exceed one quarter of one percent of the total institutional headcount enrollment.

64 B. No institution named herein shall remit any tuition or required fees or any special fees or charges 65 to any student at such institution except as authorized in this section. Each institution named herein shall make a report to the State Council of Higher Education, upon request, showing the number and value of 66 scholarships awarded under this section according to each student classification. 67

C. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent or limit in any way the admission of certain 68 69 students, known as state cadets, at the Virginia Military Institute or to affect the remission of tuition or required fees or other charges to such state cadets as permitted under existing law. 70

71 D. Nothing in this section shall be construed to affect or limit in any way the control of the 72 governing bodies of the respective institutions over any other scholarships; or over any gifts or 73 donations made to such institutions for scholarships or other special purposes; or over any funds provided by the federal government or otherwise for the purpose of career and technical education or 74 75 vocational rehabilitation in this Commonwealth; or over any funds derived from endowment or appropriations from the federal government for instruction in agriculture and mechanic arts in land grant 76 77 colleges.

78 E. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the governing bodies of the respective 79 institutions from fixing a reasonably lower tuition charge for Virginia students than for non-Virginia 80 students.

81 F. Nothing in this section or any other provision of law shall prohibit the awarding of 10 full tuition unfunded scholarships each year by Old Dominion University under the terms and conditions provided 82 83 for in a deed conveying certain property in Norfolk known as the Old Larchmont School made July 5, 1930, between the City of Norfolk and The College of William and Mary. 84

CHĂPTER 5.

## COLLEGE OF WILLIAM AND MARY

AND RICHARD BLAND COLLEGE.

§ 23-40. Property transferred to College of William and Mary and owned by State.

89 All the real estate and personal property relating to the College of William and Mary in Virginia, in 90 Williamsburg, or relating to the Richard Bland College in Petersburg now existing and standing in the 91 name of the corporate body designated "The Colleges of William and Mary" and all real estate and personal property standing in the name of or heretofore exclusively used by the Virginia Institute of 92 Marine Science shall be transferred to and be known and taken as standing in the name, and to be under 93 the control of the corporate body designated "The College of William and Mary in Virginia." Such real 94 95 estate and personal property shall be the property of the Commonwealth. 96

§ 23-49.1. Administration, bylaws, titles, etc.

97 A. The College of William and Mary in Virginia, in Williamsburg, and the Richard Bland College, 98 in Petersburg shall be subject to the supervision, management and control of the board of visitors of the 99 College of William and Mary in Virginia. Such colleges shall be separate from each other and each college The College shall report directly to the board of visitors through the president in the case of the 100 College of William and Mary in Virginia, and as the board of visitors may direct in the case of the 101 102 Richard Bland College.

103 B. All property, property rights, duties, contracts and agreements of the colleges College are vested in the board of visitors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia. The chief executive officer of 104 the College of William and Mary in Virginia shall be the president; the title of the chief executive 105 officer of the Richard Bland College shall be designated by the board of visitors. The board of visitors 106 107 of the College of William and Mary in Virginia is charged with the care and preservation of all property 108 belonging to the colleges College. With respect to the Richard Bland College, the board of visitors shall 109 have the same powers as to fixing tuitions, fees, and other charges, as to the appointment and removal of administrative officers, professors, agents and employees, and the making of rules and regulations, as 110 are now vested in them with respect to the College of William and Mary in Virginia. 111

C. Appropriations directly and indirectly from the Commonwealth to the colleges College shall be 112 113 expended as directed by the board of visitors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia.

D. The board of visitors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia is authorized and directed 114 115 to prepare the bylaws for the colleges College and to publish the same and to define the functions of the colleges College, and to specify the responsibilities of the chief executive officer, all professors, 116 117 teachers and agents of the colleges College, as the board may deem necessary.

E. The board of visitors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia shall designate the 118 119 organizational channel of coordination and supervision of the Richard Bland College for administration 120 by the board of visitors.

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**121** FE. The use of the library of the College of William and Mary in Virginia, in Williamsburg, shall be granted to the students and faculty of Christopher Newport University.

123 GF. The board of visitors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia shall make cooperative
124 agreements with the board of visitors of Christopher Newport University for the sharing of faculty and
125 of laboratory and other facilities.

**126** § 23-49.1:2. Conveyance of real estate; disposition of proceeds.

Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, in the month of July 2008, the president and
board of visitors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia shall transfer any and all real and
personal property held in the name of Richard Bland College as of July 1, 2008, to which it has
acquired title by gift, devise or purchase since the commencement of Richard Bland College to the State
Board for Community Colleges.

**132** § 23-214. Definitions.

133 As used in this chapter:

(a) "Comprehensive community college" means an institution of higher education, *including Richard Bland College*, which offers instruction in one or more of the following fields:

(1) Freshman and sophomore courses in arts and sciences acceptable for transfer in baccalaureatedegree programs;

- 138 (2) Diversified technical curricula including programs leading to the associate degree;
- (3) Career and technical education leading directly to employment;
- 140 (4) Courses in general and continuing education for adults in the above fields;
- (5) Noncredit training and retraining courses and programs of varying lengths to meet the needs ofbusiness and industry in the Commonwealth.
- 143 (b) "State Board" or "Board" means the State Board for Community Colleges.

(c) "Local community college board" means the board established to act in an advisory capacity to
the State Board and to perform such duties with respect to the operation of a single comprehensive
community college as may be delegated to it by the State Board.

(d) "Career and technical education" means the training, or retraining, which is given in school
classes (including field or laboratory work incidental thereto), under public supervision and control,
exclusive of those career and technical education programs provided and administered by, or through,
the public school system and is conducted as part of a program designed to fit individuals for gainful
employment as semiskilled or skilled, workers or technicians in recognized occupations.

(e) "Area career and technical school" means a career or technical school used exclusively, or
principally, for providing career and technical education to persons who have completed, or left, high
school, or are recommended for transfer by the school last attended, and who are available for full-time
study in preparation for entering the labor market, or for part-time study after entering the labor market.
(f) "System" means the Virginia Community College System.

157 2. That as of July 1, 2008, the State Board of Community Colleges shall be deemed successor in 158 interest to the board of visitors of the College of William and Mary to the extent that this act 159 transfers powers and duties related to Richard Bland College.

160 3. That the Governor may transfer an appropriation or any portion thereof within a state agency 161 established, abolished, or otherwise affected by the provisions of this act, or from one such agency 162 to another, to support the changes in organization or responsibility resulting from or required by 163 the provisions of this act.

164 4. Any entity, location, or precinct including the title "Richard Bland College" shall not be 165 affected by the provisions of this act.
