That §§ 24.2-101, 24.2-700, 24.2-701, 24.2-703.1, 24.2-703.2, 24.2-704, 24.2-705, and 24.2-705.1 of 11 the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 12 § 24.2-101. Definitions. 13 14 As used in this title, unless the context requires a different meaning: "Candidate" means a person who seeks or campaigns for an office of the Commonwealth or one of 15 its governmental units in a general, primary, or special election and who is qualified to have his name 16 placed on the ballot for the office. "Candidate" shall include a person who seeks the nomination of a 17 political party or who, by reason of receiving the nomination of a political party for election to an 18 office, is referred to as its nominee. For the purposes of Chapters 8 (§ 24.2-800 et seq.), 9.3 (§ 24.2-945 19 et seq.), and 9.5 (§ 24.2-955 et seq.), "candidate" shall include any write-in candidate. However, no write-in candidate who has received less than 15 percent of the votes cast for the office shall be eligible to initiate an election contest pursuant to Article 2 (§ 24.2-803 et seq.) of Chapter 8. For the purposes of Chapters 9.3 (§ 24.2-945 et seq.) and 9.5 (§ 24.2-955 et seq.), "candidate" shall include any person who 20 21 22 23 24 raises or spends funds in order to seek or campaign for an office of the Commonwealth, excluding 25 federal offices, or one of its governmental units in a party nomination process or general, primary, or special election; and such person shall be considered a candidate until a final report is filed pursuant to 26 27 Article 3 (§ 24.2-947 et seq.) of Chapter 9.3. 28 "Central absentee voter precinct" means a precinct established by a county or city pursuant to 29 § 24.2-712 for the processing of absentee ballots for the county or city or any combination of precincts 30 within the county or city. "Constitutional office" or "constitutional officer" means a county or city office or officer referred to 31 in Article VII, Section 4 of the Constitution of Virginia: clerk of the circuit court, attorney for the 32 33 Commonwealth, sheriff, commissioner of the revenue, and treasurer. 34 "Election" means a general, primary, or special election. 35 "Election district" means the territory designated by proper authority or by law which is represented 36 by an official elected by the people, including the Commonwealth, a congressional district, a General 37 Assembly district, or a district for the election of an official of a county, city, town, or other 38 governmental unit. "Electoral board" or "local electoral board" means a board appointed pursuant to § 24.2-106 to 39 40 administer elections for a county or city. The electoral board of the county in which a town or the greater part of a town is located shall administer the town's elections. 41 "General election" means an election held in the Commonwealth on the Tuesday after the first 42 43 Monday in November or on the first Tuesday in May for the purpose of filling offices regularly 44 scheduled by law to be filled at those times. "Officer of election" means a person appointed by an electoral board pursuant to § 24.2-115 to serve 45 46 at a polling place for any election. "Party" or "political party" means an organization of citizens of the Commonwealth which, at either 47 of the two preceding statewide general elections, received at least 10 percent of the total vote cast for 48 49 any statewide office filled in that election. The organization shall have a state central committee and an 50 office of elected state chairman which have been continually in existence for the six months preceding 51 the filing of a nominee for any office. 52 "Person with a disability" means a person with a disability as defined by the Virginians with 53 Disabilities Act (§ 51.5-1 et seq.) or the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. § 12131 et seq.). 54 "Polling place" means the one place provided for each precinct at which the qualified voters who are 55 residents of the precinct may vote. "Precinct" means the territory designated by the governing body of a county, city, or town to be 56 57 served by one polling place. "Primary" or "primary election" means an election held for the purpose of selecting a candidate to be 58

59 the nominee of a political party for election to office.

60 "Qualified voter" means a person who is entitled to vote pursuant to the Constitution of Virginia and 61 who is (i) 18 years of age on or before the day of the election or qualified pursuant to § 24.2-403 or 62 subsection D of § 24.2-544, (ii) a resident of the Commonwealth and of the precinct in which he offers 63 to vote, and (iii) registered to vote. No person who has been convicted of a felony shall be a qualified 64 voter unless his civil rights have been restored by the Governor or other appropriate authority. No 65 person adjudicated incapacitated shall be a qualified voter unless his capacity has been reestablished as 66 provided by law.

"Qualified voter in a town" means a person who is a resident within the corporate boundaries of the 67 town in which he offers to vote, duly registered in the county of his residence, and otherwise a qualified 68 69 voter.

70 "Referendum" means any election held pursuant to law to submit a question to the voters for 71 approval or rejection.

"Registered voter" means any person who is maintained on the Virginia voter registration system. All 72 73 registered voters shall be maintained on the Virginia voter registration system with active status unless 74 assigned to inactive status by a general registrar in accordance with Chapter 4 (§ 24.2-400 et seq.). For 75 purposes of applying the precinct size requirements of § 24.2-307, calculating election machine requirements pursuant to Article 3 (§ 24.2-625 et seq.) of Chapter 6, mailing notices of local election 76 77 district, precinct or polling place changes as required by subdivision 13 of § 24.2-114 and § 24.2-306, 78 and determining the number of signatures required for candidate and voter petitions, "registered voter" 79 shall include only persons maintained on the Virginia voter registration system with active status.

80 "Registration records" means all official records concerning the registration of qualified voters and shall include all records, lists, applications, and files, whether maintained in books, on cards, on 81 82 automated data bases, or by any other legally permitted record-keeping method.

"Residence" or "resident," for all purposes of qualification to register and vote, means and requires 83 both domicile and a place of abode. In determining domicile, consideration may be given to a person's 84 85 expressed intent, conduct, and all attendant circumstances including, but not limited to, financial 86 independence, business pursuits, employment, income sources, residence for income tax purposes, 87 marital status, residence of parents, spouse and children, if any, leasehold, sites of personal and real 88 property owned by the person, motor vehicle and other personal property registration, and other factors 89 reasonably necessary to determine the qualification of a person to register or vote.

90 "Special election" means any election that is held pursuant to law to fill a vacancy in office or to 91 hold a referendum. 92

"State Board" or "Board" means the State Board of Elections.

"Virginia voter registration system" or "voter registration system" means the automated central record-keeping system for all voters registered within the Commonwealth that is maintained as provided 93 94 in Article 2 (§ 24.2-404 et seq.) of Chapter 4. 95

§ 24.2-700. Persons entitled to vote by absentee ballot. 96

97 The following registered voters may vote by absentee ballot in accordance with the provisions of this 98 chapter in any election in which they are qualified to vote:

99 1. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation or 100 while on personal business or vacation, will be absent from the county or city in which he is entitled to 101 vote:

102 2. Any person who is (i) a member of a uniformed service of the United States, as defined in 42 103 U.S.C. § 1973ff-6 (7), on active duty, or (ii) a member of the merchant marine of the United States, or (iii) who temporarily resides outside of the United States, or (iv) the spouse or dependent residing with 104 105 any person listed in (i), (ii), or (iii), and who will be absent on the day of the election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote; 106

107 3. Any student attending a school or institution of learning, or his spouse, who will be absent on the 108 day of election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote;

4. Any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable to go in 109 person to the polls on the day of election because of a physical his disability or physical illness; 110

111 5. Any person who is confined while awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor, provided that the trial or release date is scheduled on or after the third day preceding the election. Any 112 113 person who is awaiting trial and is a resident of the county or city where he is confined shall, on his request, be taken to the polls to vote on election day if his trial date is postponed and he did not have 114 115 an opportunity to vote absentee;

6. Any person who is a member of an electoral board, registrar, officer of election, or custodian of 116 117 voting equipment;

7. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election 118 119 because he is primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who 120 is confined at home;

121 8. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election 122 because of an obligation occasioned by his religion; or

123 9. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation, will 124 be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for eleven or more 125 hours of the thirteen hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603.

126 § 24.2-701. Application for absentee ballot.

127 A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for 128 official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them.

129 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an 130 absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications 131 shall be in a form approved by the State Board.

132 Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in 133 which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i) 134 12 months before an election, or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to 135 the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

136 Any application received before the ballots are printed shall be held and processed as soon as the 137 printed ballots for the election are available.

138 For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight 139 hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately **140** preceding all general elections, except May general elections held in towns, and on the Saturday 141 immediately preceding any primary election, May general election held in a town, or special election.

142 Unless physically the applicant is disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the 143 applicant who shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to 144 § 24.2-1016, that to the best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true 145 and correct and that he has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any 146 other state. If the applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note 147 this fact on the applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address. 148

B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

149 1. An application completed in person shall be made not less than three days prior to the election in 150 which the applicant offers to vote and completed only in the office of the general registrar. The 151 applicant shall sign the application in the presence of a registrar or a member of the electoral board. The 152 applicant shall provide one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643, or if 153 he is unable to present one of the forms of identification listed in that section, he shall sign a statement, 154 subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that he is the named 155 registered voter who he claims to be. An applicant who requires assistance in voting by reason of 156 physical disability or inability to read or write may request assistance pursuant to § 24.2-649 and be 157 assisted in preparation of this statement in accordance with that section. The provisions of § 24.2-649 158 regarding persons who are unable to sign shall be followed when assisting an applicant in completing 159 this statement.

160 For federal elections held after January 1, 2004, this paragraph shall apply in the case of any voter who is required by subparagraph (b) of 42 U.S.C.S. § 15483 of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 to 161 162 show identification the first time that voter votes in a federal election in the state. After completing an application for an absentee ballot in person, such voter shall present: (i) a current and valid photo 163 164 identification; or (ii) a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or 165 other document that shows the name and address of the voter. Such individual who desires to vote in person but who does not show one of the forms of identification specified in this paragraph shall be 166 167 offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of § 24.2-653. Neither the identification requirements of 168 subsection B of § 24.2-643, nor the identification requirements of subsection A of § 24.2-653, shall apply to such voter at that election. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the 169 170 electoral boards for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 171 § 24.2-653 and this section.

172 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile 173 device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a 174 device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the 175 registrar or, if made under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a Federal Post Card Application prescribed pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff (b) (2). The Federal Post Card Application may be accepted 176 177 the later of (i) 12 months before an election, or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth 178 month prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to 179 the appropriate registrar no later than 5:00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the 180 applicant offers to vote.

181 C. Applications for absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

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182 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the 183 reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election;

184 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence 185 address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide 186 the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to 187 him. Any person who makes application under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered voter 188 may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

189 3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the 190 application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the 191 applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be 192 either the address of the applicant on file in the registration records or the address at which he will be 193 located while absent from his county or city. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other person; 194 and

195 4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active service as a 196 member of the armed forces of the United States or a member of the merchant marine of the United 197 States, the branch of service to which he or the spouse belongs, and his or the spouse's rank, grade, or 198 rate, and service identification number; or

199 5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of 200 learning, the name and address of the school or institution of learning; or

201 6. In the case of a person any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who 202 is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of a physical his disability or 203 physical illness, the nature of the *disability or* illness or disability; or

204 7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor, the name and address of the institution of confinement; or 205

206 8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of his 207 employer or business; or

208 9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacation 209 reasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

210 10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at 211 212 home, the name of the family member and the nature of his illness or disability; or

213 11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of an 214 obligation occasioned by his religion, his religion and the nature of the obligation; or

215 12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 216 11 or more hours of the 13 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his business or employer, address of his place of work, and hours he will be at the workplace and 217 218 219 commuting on election day. 220

§ 24.2-703.1. Special annual applications for absentee ballots for certain ill or disabled voters.

221 Any person who is eligible for an absentee ballot under subdivision 4 of § 24.2-700 because of a 222 physical disability or physical illness and who is likely to remain so disabled or ill eligible for the 223 remainder of the calendar year shall be eligible to file a special annual application to receive ballots for 224 all elections in which he is eligible to vote in a calendar year. His first such application shall be 225 accompanied by a statement, on a form prescribed by the State Board and signed by the voter and his 226 physician, provider as defined in § 37.2-403, or accredited religious practitioner, that the voter is eligible 227 for an absentee ballot under subdivision 4 of § 24.2-700 because of a physical disability or physical 228 illness and likely to remain so disabled or ill eligible for the remainder of the calendar year.

229 In accordance with procedures established by the State Board, the general registrar shall retain the 230 application and form, enroll the applicant on a special absentee voter applicant list, and process the 231 applicant's request for an absentee ballot for each succeeding election in the calendar year. The applicant 232 shall specify by party designation the primary ballots he is requesting.

233 The general registrar shall send each such enrolled applicant a blank application by December 15 for 234 each ensuing calendar year, and upon completion thereof, the applicant shall be eligible to receive 235 ballots for all elections in which he is eligible to vote in that calendar year.

236 If an official reply to the application or an absentee ballot sent to the applicant is returned as 237 undeliverable, or the general registrar knows that the applicant is no longer a qualified voter, no ballot 238 for any subsequent election shall be sent to the voter until a new application is filed and accepted. 239

§ 24.2-703.2. Replacement absentee ballots for certain disabled or ill voters; penalty.

240 A voter seeking to cast an absentee ballot may obtain a replacement absentee ballot subject to the following conditions: (i) the voter applied for an absentee ballot under subdivision 4 of § 24.2-700 241 242 because of a physical disability or physical illness; (ii) the application was approved and an absentee 243 ballot mailed to the voter; and (iii) the voter did not receive or has lost the absentee ballot on or before

244 the Saturday before the election. In such case, the voter may request a replacement absentee ballot by 245 the close of business for the local elections office on the Saturday before election day and designate, in 246 writing, a representative to obtain a replacement absentee ballot on his behalf from the electoral board or 247 general registrar and to return the properly completed ballot as directed by the electoral board or general 248 registrar no later than the close of polls on the day of election for which the absentee ballot is valid. 249 The representative shall be age eighteen or older and shall not be an elected official, a candidate for 250 elected office, or the deputy, spouse, parent, or child of an elected official or candidate. The voter and representative shall complete the form prescribed by the State Board to implement the provisions of this 251 252 section. The form shall include a statement signed by the voter that he did not receive the ballot or has 253 lost the ballot. Statements on the form shall be subject to felony penalties for making false statements 254 pursuant to § 24.2-1016.

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§ 24.2-704. Applications and ballots for persons requiring assistance in voting; penalty.

256 The application for an absentee ballot shall provide space for the applicant to indicate that he will 257 require assistance to vote his absentee ballot by reason of blindness, <del>physical</del> disability, or inability to 258 read or write. On receipt of an application from an applicant marked to indicate he will require 259 assistance, the electoral board shall deliver, with the items required by § 24.2-706, the voter assistance 260 form furnished by the State Board pursuant to § 24.2-649. The voter and any person assisting him shall 261 complete the form by signing the request for assistance and statement required of the assistant. If the 262 voter is unable to sign the request, the witness will note this fact on the line for signature of voter. The 263 provisions of § 24.2-649 shall apply to absentee voting and assistance for absentee voters. Any person 264 who willfully violates the provisions of this section or § 24.2-649 in providing assistance to a person 265 who is voting absentee shall be guilty of a Class 5 felony.

**266** § 24.2-705. Emergency applications and absentee ballots for persons incapacitated or hospitalized.

267 Any person registered and otherwise qualified to vote who becomes incapacitated on or after the 268 seventh day preceding an election may request at any time prior to 2:00 p.m. on the day preceding the 269 election that an emergency absentee ballot application be delivered to him. A voter who becomes 270 hospitalized on or after the fourteenth day preceding the election and who is unable, because of his 271 condition, to request an absentee ballot earlier than the seventh day preceding the election may request 272 at any time prior to 2:00 p.m. on the day before an election that an emergency absentee ballot be 273 delivered to him in the hospital. For purposes of this section, "incapacitated" means hospitalized, ill and confined to his residence, bereaved by the death of a spouse, child, or parent, or otherwise incapacitated 274 by an emergency which is found by the electoral board to justify providing an emergency ballot 275 276 application; and "hospital" means a hospital as defined in § 32.1-123 or 37.2-100 and any comparable 277 hospital in the District of Columbia or any state contiguous to Virginia.

278 On receipt of the request, the electoral board shall provide an emergency absentee ballot application 279 to the incapacitated voter's designated representative who shall deliver the application to the voter. If the 280 voter is hospitalized, the delivery shall be made to him at the hospital; and if the voter is otherwise 281 incapacitated, the delivery shall be made to him at his current residence address as shown on the 282 registration records. The representative shall be age eighteen or older and shall not be an elected official, 283 a candidate for elected office, or the deputy, spouse, parent, or child of an elected official or candidate.

The application shall be on a form prescribed by the State Board and shall require the applicant (i) to state the cause of his incapacity, (ii) to state that he is unable to be present at the polls on election day, and that he was either incapacitated on or after the seventh day preceding the election or hospitalized on or after the fourteenth day preceding the election and unable to request the application earlier than the seventh day preceding the election, (iii) to designate a representative to receive, deliver and return the ballot, and (iv) to provide other information required by law for an absentee ballot application.

290 If the voter is hospitalized, a hospital administrative official or, a licensed physician attending the 291 applicant, or provider as defined in § 37.2-403, shall certify on the form to the hospitalization of the 292 applicant and the applicant's inability to be present at the polls on election day. If the voter is ill and 293 confined to his residence, a licensed physician, provider as defined in § 37.2-403, or an accredited 294 religious practitioner attending the applicant shall certify on the form to the incapacity of the applicant 295 and the applicant's inability to be present at the polls on election day. If the voter is bereaved, a licensed 296 physician, an accredited religious practitioner, or a funeral service licensee (as defined in § 54.1-2800) 297 shall certify on the form to the incapacity of the applicant and the applicant's inability to be present at 298 the polls on election day. If the voter is otherwise incapacitated as determined by the electoral board, the 299 secretary of the electoral board shall certify on the form to the incapacity of the applicant and the 300 applicant's inability to be present at the polls on election day. The applicant shall sign the application 301 and state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to the 302 best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct. His signature 303 shall be witnessed by the designated representative who shall sign and return the completed application to the office of the general registrar no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day preceding the election. For the 304

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305 purposes of this section, "accredited religious practitioner" means a person who has been trained in 306 spiritual healing or the other healing arts and has been so accredited by a formal religious order.

307 On receipt of the completed application and a determination of the qualification of the applicant to
308 vote, the general registrar or secretary of the electoral board shall provide, in accordance with the
309 applicable provisions of this chapter, an absentee ballot to the designated representative for delivery to
310 the incapacitated voter.

The incapacitated voter shall vote the absentee ballot as provided by law and mark it in the presence of the designated representative. The representative shall complete a statement, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that (i) he is the representative of the incapacitated voter; (ii) he personally delivered the ballot to the voter who applied for it; (iii) in his presence, the voter marked the ballot, the ballot was placed in the envelope provided, the envelope was sealed, and the statement on its reverse side was signed by the incapacitated voter; and (iv) the ballot was returned, under seal, to the electoral board at the registrar's office.

318 The ballot shall be counted only if the ballot is received by the electoral board prior to the close of 319 polls, and the electoral board shall deliver the ballot to the officers of election at each appropriate 320 precinct pursuant to § 24.2-710.

§ 24.2-705.1. Late applications and in-person absentee voting for business and medical emergencies.

Any person registered and otherwise qualified to vote who becomes obligated after 12:00 noon on the Saturday before an election to be absent from his county or city on election day for a purpose pertaining to (i) his business, profession, or occupation, (ii) the hospitalization of the applicant or a member of his immediate family, or (iii) the death of a member of his immediate family, may apply for an absentee ballot and vote absentee in person pursuant to this section and subject to the following conditions:

328 1. The applicant applies in person for an absentee ballot on the Monday immediately preceding the329 election, before 2:00 p.m., at the principal office of the registrar; and

330 2. The applicant signs a statement, which shall be deemed part of his absentee ballot application and 331 subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that he is required to 332 leave the county or city before the opening of the polls on election day for a purpose pertaining to (i) 333 his business, profession or occupation, (ii) the hospitalization of the applicant or a member of his immediate family, or (iii) the death of a member of his immediate family, and that he did not have 334 335 notice or knowledge of such required travel prior to 12:00 noon on the immediately preceding Saturday. 336 "Immediate family" means the children, grandchildren, grandparents, parents, siblings and spouse of the 337 applicant."Hospitalization" refers to confinement in a hospital as defined in § 32.1-123 or 37.2-100 and 338 any comparable hospital in the District of Columbia or any state contiguous to Virginia.
