WHEREAS, Marion Johnson was very proud to be a freemason, and he was a dedicated member of A.F.&A.M. Metropolitan Lodge No. 11 and active in its many activities and missions in the community; and

WHEREAS, Marion Johnson will be fondly remembered for his kind and generous nature and will be greatly missed by his devoted wife of 58 years, Lois Miller Johnson; his daughters Carolyn and June and their wonderful families, including his cherished grandchildren and great-grandchildren; and his numerous other loving family members and friends; now, therefore, be it
