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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11 12	<b>1.</b> That §§ 16.1-69.55 and 17.1-213 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: § 16.1-69.55. Retention of case records; limitations on enforcement of judgments; extensions.
13	A. Criminal and traffic infraction proceedings:
14	1. In misdemeanor and traffic infraction cases, except misdemeanor cases under § 16.1-253.2 or
15	18.2-57.2, all documents shall be retained for 10 years, including cases sealed in expungement
16 17	proceedings under § 19.2-392.2. In misdemeanor cases under § 16.1-253.2 or 18.2-57.2, all documents
18	shall be retained for 20 years. Documents in misdemeanor and traffic infraction cases for which an appeal has been made shall be returned to and filed with the clerk of the appropriate circuit court
19	pursuant to § 16.1-135;
20	2. In felony cases which are certified to the grand jury, all documents shall be certified to the clerk
21	of the appropriate circuit court pursuant to §§ 19.2-186 and 19.2-190. All other felony case documents
22 23	<ul><li>shall be handled as provided in subdivision A 1 of this section;</li><li>3. Dockets and indices shall be retained for 10 years.</li></ul>
24	B. Civil proceedings:
25	1. All documents in civil proceedings in district court which are dismissed, including dismissal under
26	§ 8.01-335, shall be retained until completion of the Commonwealth's audit of the court records.
27 28	Notwithstanding § 8.01-275.1, the clerks of the district courts may destroy documents in civil proceedings in which no service of process is had 24 months after the last return date;
<b>2</b> 9	2. In civil actions which result in a judgment all documents in the possession of the general district
30	court shall be retained for 10 years and, unless sooner satisfied, the judgment shall remain in force for a
31 32	period of 10 years;
32 33	3. In civil cases that are appealed to the circuit court pursuant to § 16.1-112, all documents pertaining thereto shall be transferred to the circuit court in accordance with those sections;
34	4. The limitations on enforcement of general district court judgments provided in § 16.1-94.1 shall
35	not apply if the plaintiff, prior to the expiration of that period for enforcement, pays the circuit court
36	docketing and indexing fees on judgments from other courts together with any other required filing fees
37 38	and dockets the judgment in the circuit court having jurisdiction in the same geographic area as the general district court. However, a judgment debtor wishing to discharge a judgment pursuant to the

54	elapsed from either dismissal or termination of the case by court order or by operation of law. Financial

59 § 17.1-213. Disposition of papers in ended cases.

60 A. All case files for cases ended prior to January 1, 1913, shall be permanently maintained in 61 hardcopy form, either in the locality served by the circuit court where such files originated or in The 62 Library of Virginia in accordance with the provisions of § 42.1-86 and subsection C of § 42.1-87.

63 B. The following records for cases ending on or after January 1, 1913, may be destroyed in their 64 entirety at the discretion of the clerk of each circuit court after having been retained for 10 years after 65 conclusion:

- 66 1. Conditional sales contracts;
- 67 2. Concealed weapons permit applications;
- 68 3. Minister appointments;
- 4. Petitions for appointment of trustee; 69
- 70 5. Name changes; 71
  - 6. Nolle prosequi cases;

7. Civil actions that are voluntarily dismissed, including nonsuits, cases that are dismissed as settled 72 73 and agreed, cases that are dismissed with or without prejudice, cases that are discontinued or dismissed 74 under § 8.01-335 and district court appeals dismissed under § 16.1-113 prior to 1988;

75 8. Misdemeanor and traffic cases, except as provided in subdivision C 3, including those which were 76 commenced on a felony charge but concluded as a misdemeanor;

- 77 9. Suits to enforce a lien; 78
- 10. Garnishments: 79
  - 11. Executions except for those covered in § 8.01-484;

80 12. Miscellaneous oaths and qualifications, but only if the order or oath or qualification is spread in 81 the appropriate order book; and

82 13. Civil cases pertaining to declarations of habitual offender status and full restoration of driving 83 privileges.

C. All other records or cases ending on or after January 1, 1913, may be destroyed in their entirety 84 85 at the discretion of the clerk of each circuit court subject to the following guidelines:

86 1. All civil case files to which subsection D does not pertain may be destroyed after 20 years from 87 the court order date.

88 2. All criminal cases dismissed, including those not a true bill, acquittals and not guilty verdicts, may 89 be destroyed after 10 years from the court order date.

90 3. All criminal case files involving a felony conviction or a misdemeanor conviction under 91 § 16.1-253.2 or 18.2-57.2 may be destroyed (i) after 20 years from the sentencing date or (ii) when the 92 sentence term ends, whichever comes later.

D. Under the provisions of subsections B and C, the entire file of any case deemed by the local clerk of court to have historical value, as defined in § 42.1-77, or genealogical or sensational significance shall 93 94 95 be retained permanently as shall all cases in which the title to real estate is established, conveyed or condemned by an order or decree of the court. The final order for all cases in which the title to real 96 97 estate is so affected shall include an appropriate notification thereof to the clerk.

98 E. Except as provided in subsection A, the clerk of a circuit court may cause (i) any or all ended 99 records, papers, or documents pertaining to civil and criminal cases which have been ended for a period 100 of three years or longer; (ii) any unexecuted search warrants and affidavits for unexecuted search 101 warrants, provided at least three years have passed since issued; (iii) any abstracts of judgments; and (iv) 102 original wills, to be destroyed if such records, papers, documents, or wills no longer have administrative, 103 fiscal, historical, or legal value to warrant continued retention, provided such records, papers, or documents have been microfilmed or converted to an electronic format. Such microfilm and 104 microphotographic processes and equipment shall meet state archival microfilm standards pursuant to 105 § 42.1-82, or such electronic format shall follow state electronic records guidelines, and such records, 106 107 papers, or documents so converted shall be placed in conveniently accessible files and provisions made 108 for examining and using same. The clerk shall further provide security negative copies of any such 109 microfilmed materials for storage in The Library of Virginia.
