083522240 1 **SENATE BILL NO. 186** 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 3 (Proposed by the Senate Committee on Transportation 4 on January 24, 2008) 5 6 (Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Herring) A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 2.2-229 and 33.1-23.03 of the Code of Virginia, relating to the Office 7 of Intermodal Planning and Investment of the Secretary or Transportation and the Statewide 8 Transportation Plan. 9 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That §§ 2.2-229 and 33.1-23.03 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 10 11 § 2.2-229. Office of Intermodal Planning and Investment of the Secretary of Transportation. There is hereby established the Office of Intermodal Planning and Investment of the Secretary of 12 Transportation, consisting of a director, appointed by the Secretary of Transportation, and such 13 additional transportation professionals as the Secretary of Transportation shall determine. The goals of 14 15 the Office are to provide solutions that link existing systems; reduce congestion; improve safety, mobility, and accessibility; and provide for greater travel options. It shall be the duty of the director of 16 17 the office to advise the Secretary and the Commonwealth Transportation Board on intermodal issues, 18 generally. 19 The purpose of the Office shall be: 20 1. To coordinate and oversee major multimodal corridor studies as directed by the Secretary; 21 2. To assist the Commonwealth Transportation Board in the Development of the Statewide 22 Transportation Plan pursuant to § 33.1-23.03; 3. To advocate multimodal planning solutions as part of the six-year improvement program; 23 24 4. To work with and coordinate action of the Virginia Department of Transportation, the Virginia 25 Department of Rail and Public Transportation, the Virginia Port Authority, and the Virginia Department of Aviation to promote intermodal and multimodal solutions in each agency's strategic and long-range 26 27 plans: 28 5. To work with and review plans of regional transportation agencies and authorities to promote 29 intermodal and multimodal solutions: 30 6. To assess implementation of intermodal planning, including periodic comparisons between and 31 among statewide and regional multimodal plans; 32 7. To work with and coordinate actions of the agencies of the transportation Secretariat to assess 33 freight movements and promote intermodal and multimodal solutions to address freight needs; 34 8. To assess and coordinate transportation safety needs related to passenger and freight movements 35 by all transportation modes: 9. To coordinate the adequate accommodation of pedestrian, bicycle, and other forms of 36 37 nonmotorized transportation in the six-year improvement program and other state and regional 38 transportation plans; 39 10. To develop transportation performance measures and prepare an annual performance report Θ 40 state and regional efforts pursuant to § 33.1-23.03; 41 11. To inventory and assess intermodal facilities of statewide importance, prioritize new facilities, 42 and recommend facilities for consideration in the six-year improvement program; and 43 12. To identify and facilitate public and private partnerships to achieve the goals of state and 44 regional plans. § 33.1-23.03. Board to develop and update Statewide Transportation Plan. 45 The Commonwealth Transportation Board shall conduct a comprehensive review of statewide 46 47 transportation needs in a Statewide Transportation Plan setting forth an inventory of all construction needs for all systems, and based upon this inventory, establishing goals, objectives, and priorities covering a twenty-year planning horizon, in accordance with federal transportation planning **48** 49 50 requirements. This plan shall embrace all modes of transportation and include technological initiatives. 51 This Statewide Transportation Plan shall be updated as needed, but no less than once every five years. The plan shall promote economic development and all transportation modes, intermodal connectivity, 52 53 environmental quality, accessibility for people and freight, and transportation safety. The plan shall 54 include quantifiable measures and achievable goals relating to, but not limited to, congestion reduction and safety, transit and high-occupancy vehicle facility use, job-to-housing ratios, job and housing access 55 to transit and pedestrian facilities, air quality, and per capita total vehicle miles traveled, annual rate of 56 change in vehicle miles traveled, vehicle miles traveled per capita, and annual rate of change in vehicle 57 miles traveled per capita. The Board shall consider such goals in evaluating and selecting transportation 58 59 improvement projects. The plan shall incorporate the approved long-range plans' measures and goals

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developed by the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority and the Hampton Roads Transportation 60 Authority and shall include regional goals and performance measures. The Department of 61 62 Transportation shall work with the metropolitan planning organizations to develop such goals. Each 63 such plan shall be summarized in a public document and made available to the general public upon presentation to the Governor and General Assembly and shall include a report of the fulfillment of goals 64 65 and performance measures data for each metropolitan planning organization. The Department shall 66 annual report information related to vehicle miles traveled quantifiable measures.

In conjunction with the update of the statewide transportation plan, but not more ten than once every 67 68 five years, the Department shall, in coordination with the respective metropolitan planning organization or transportation authority collect and report data regarding the modal share of trips for driving, 69

transit, carpooling, telecommuting, walking, and bicycling for the Northern Virginia Transportation 70 71 Authority, the Fredericksburg metropolitan planning organization, the Richmond metropolitan planning 72 organization, and the Hampton Roads Transportation Authority.

It is the intent of the General Assembly that this plan assess transportation needs and assign priorities 73 74 to projects on a statewide basis, avoiding the production of a plan which is an aggregation of local,

75 district, regional, or modal plans.
