A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 24.2-643, 24.2-651.1, 24.2-653, and 24.2-701 of the Code of Virginia, relating to elections; voter identification requirements; absentee voting eligibility and procedures.

10 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That §§ 24.2-643, 24.2-651.1, 24.2-653, and 24.2-701 of the Code of Virginia are amended and 11 12 reenacted as follows:

§ 24.2-643. Qualified voter permitted to vote; procedures at polling place; voter identification.

14 A. After the polls are open, each qualified voter at a precinct shall be permitted to vote. The officers 15 of election shall ascertain that a person offering to vote is a qualified voter before admitting him to the 16 voting booth and furnishing an official ballot to him.

B. An officer of election shall ask the voter for his full name and current residence address and 17 18 repeat, in a voice audible to party and candidate representatives present, the full name and address stated by the voter. The officer shall ask the voter to present any one of the following forms of identification: 19 his Commonwealth of Virginia voter registration card, his social security card, his valid Virginia driver's 20 21 license, or any other identification card issued by a government agency of the Commonwealth, one of its 22 political subdivisions, or the United States; or any valid employee identification card containing a 23 photograph of the voter and issued by an employer of the voter in the ordinary course of the employer's business; or a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck that shows 24 25 the name and address of the voter. Any voter who does not show one of the forms of identification 26 specified in this subsection shall be offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The 27 State Board shall provide instructions to the electoral boards for the handling and counting of such 28 provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of § 24.2-653 and this section.

29 If the voter's name is found on the pollbook, if he presents one of the forms of identification listed 30 above, if he is qualified to vote in the election, and if no objection is made, an officer shall enter, 31 opposite the voter's name on the pollbook, the first or next consecutive number from the voter count form provided by the State Board, or shall enter that the voter has voted if the pollbook is in electronic 32 33 form; an officer shall provide the voter with the official ballot; and another officer shall admit him to 34 the voting booth. Each voter whose name has been marked on the pollbooks as present to vote and 35 entitled to a ballot shall remain in the presence of the officers of election in the polling place until he 36 has voted. If a line of voters who have been marked on the pollbooks as present to vote forms to await 37 entry to the voting booths, the line shall not be permitted to extend outside of the room containing the 38 voting booths and shall remain under observation by the officers of election.

39 Except as provided in subsection E of this section, if a voter is entitled to vote except that he is 40 unable to present one of the forms of identification listed above, he shall be allowed to vote after signing a statement, subject to felony penalties for false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that he is 41 the named registered voter who he claims to be. A voter who requires assistance in voting by reason of 42 physical disability or inability to read or write, and who requests assistance pursuant to § 24.2-649, may 43 44 be assisted in preparation of this statement in accordance with that section. The provisions of § 24.2-649 45 regarding voters who are unable to sign shall be followed when assisting a voter in completing this 46 statement. 47

A voter may be accompanied into the voting booth by his child age 15 or younger.

C. If the current residence address stated by the voter is different from the address shown on the 48 49 pollbook, the officer of election shall furnish the voter with a change of address form prescribed by the State Board. Upon its completion, the voter shall sign the prescribed form, subject to felony penalties 50 51 for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, which the officer of election shall then place in an 52 envelope provided for such forms for transmission to the general registrar who shall then transfer or 53 cancel the registration of such voter pursuant to Chapter 4 (§ 24.2-400 et seq.) of this title.

D. At the time the voter is asked his full name and current residence address, the officer of election 54 55 shall ask any voter for whom the pollbook indicates that an identification number other than a social security number is recorded on the Virginia voter registration system if he presently has a social security 56 57 number. If the voter is able to provide his social security number, he shall be furnished with a voter registration form prescribed by the State Board to update his registration information. Upon its 58

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completion, the form shall be placed by the officer of election in an envelope provided for such forms
for transmission to the general registrar. Any social security numbers so provided shall be entered by the
general registrar in the voter's record on the voter registration system.

E. For federal elections held after January 1, 2004, this subsection shall apply in the case of any 62 63 voter who is required by subparagraph (b) of 42 U.S.C.S. § 15483 of the Help America Vote Act of 64 2002 to show identification the first time the voter votes in a federal election in the state. At such 65 election, such voter shall present: (i) a current and valid photo identification; or (ii) a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other document that shows the name and 66 address of the voter. Such individual who desires to vote in person but who does not show one of the 67 forms of identification specified in this paragraph shall be offered a provisional ballot under the 68 provisions of § 24.2-653. Neither the identification requirements of subsection B of this section, nor the 69 identification requirements of subsection A of § 24.2-653, shall apply to such voter at that election. The 70 71 State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the electoral boards for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of § 24.2-653 and this section. 72

\$ 24.2-651.1. Voter who is shown as having already voted; challenge and procedure for voting; voter
 identification.

The officers of election shall challenge the vote of any person who offers to vote, who is listed on the pollbook, and whose name is marked to indicate that he has already voted in person in the election.

77 When the person is challenged, an officer shall explain to him the basis for the challenge. If the 78 person being challenged states that he has not voted and is qualified, an officer shall ask the voter to 79 present one of the following forms of identification: his Commonwealth of Virginia voter registration 80 card, his social security card, his valid Virginia driver's license, or any other identification card issued by a government agency of the Commonwealth, one of its political subdivisions, or the United States; or 81 any valid employee identification card containing a photograph of the voter and issued by an employer 82 of the voter in the ordinary course of the employer's business; or a copy of a current utility bill, bank 83 statement, government check, or paycheck that shows the name and address of the voter. Any voter who 84 85 does not show one of the forms of identification specified in this paragraph shall be offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The State Board shall provide instructions to the 86 87 electoral boards for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 88 § 24.2-653 and this section.

89 If the person presents the requested form of identification showing him to be the person listed on the pollbook, an officer of election shall give him the form set out in § 24.2-651 for the person to sign subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016.

92 If the person challenged refuses to sign the statement, he shall not be permitted to vote. If, however,93 he signs the statement, he shall be permitted to vote on the voting system in use at the precinct.

When the voter has shown the requested identification, has signed the statement, and is permitted to vote, the officers of election shall mark his name on the pollbook with the first or next consecutive number from the voter count form, or shall enter that the voter has voted if the pollbook is in electronic form, and shall indicate on the pollbook that the person has signed the required statement in accordance with the instructions of the State Board of Elections.

99 § 24.2-653. Voter whose name does not appear on pollbook; handling of provisional ballots; ballots100 cast after normal close of polls due to court order extending polling hours.

101 A. When a person offers to vote pursuant to § 24.2-652 and the general registrar is not available or 102 cannot state that the person is registered to vote, then such person shall be allowed to vote by paper 103 ballot in the manner provided in this section.

Such person shall be given a paper ballot and provide, subject to the penalties for making false 104 statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, on a green envelope supplied by the State Board, the identifying 105 information required in § 24.2-652. Such person shall be asked to present one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643. If he is unable to present one of these forms of 106 107 108 identification, he shall sign a statement, subject to felony penalties for false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that he is the named registered voter who he claims to be, and the The officers of election 109 110 shall note on the green envelope that the required statement was signed in lieu of presenting whether or 111 not the voter has presented one of the specified forms of identification. The officers of election shall enter the appropriate information for the person on the pollbook in accordance with the instructions of 112 113 the State Board but shall not enter a consecutive number for the voter nor otherwise mark his name as having voted. The officers of election shall provide an application for registration to the person offering 114 115 to vote in the manner provided in this section.

116 The voter shall then, in the presence of an officer of election, but in a secret manner, mark the ballot 117 as provided in § 24.2-644 and seal it in the green envelope. The envelope containing the ballot shall 118 then be placed in the ballot container by an officer of election.

119 An officer of election, by a written notice given to the voter, shall inform him that a determination 120 of his right to vote shall be made by the electoral board on the following day and advise the voter of 121 the beginning time and place for the board's meeting and of the voter's right to be present at that 122 meeting. At the meeting, the voter may request an extension of the determination of the provisional vote 123 to the following day in order to *present identification and* provide information to prove that the voter is 124 entitled to vote in the precinct pursuant to § 24.2-401. The electoral board shall have the authority to 125 grant such extensions which it deems reasonable to determine the status of a provisional vote.

B. The provisional votes submitted pursuant to subsection A, in their unopened envelopes, shall be sealed in a special envelope marked "Provisional Votes," inscribed with the number of envelopes contained therein, and signed by the officers of election who counted them. All provisional votes envelopes shall be delivered either (i) to the clerk of the circuit court who shall deliver all such envelopes to the secretary of the electoral board or (ii) to the general registrar in localities in which the electoral board has directed delivery of election materials to the general registrar pursuant to § 24.2-668.

The electoral board shall meet on the day following the election and determine whether each person having submitted such a provisional vote was entitled to do so as a qualified voter in the precinct in which he offered the provisional vote. If the board is unable to determine the validity of all the provisional ballots offered in the election, or has granted any voter who has offered a provisional ballot an extension to the following day as provided in subsection A, the meeting shall stand adjourned from day to day, not to exceed seven calendar days from the date of the election, until the board has determined the validity of all provisional ballots offered in the election.

139 One authorized representative of each political party or independent candidate in a general or special 140 election or one authorized representative of each candidate in a primary election, who is a qualified 141 voter of the city or county, shall be permitted to remain in the room in which the determination is being 142 made so long as he does not impede the orderly conduct of the determination. Each authorized 143 representative shall be a qualified voter of the county or city. Each representative, who is not himself a 144 candidate or party chairman, shall present to the electoral board a written statement designating him to 145 be a representative of the party or candidate and signed by the county or city chairman of his political 146 party, the independent candidate, or the primary candidate, as appropriate. Such statement, bearing the 147 chairman's or candidate's original signature, may be photocopied and such photocopy shall be as valid as 148 if the copy had been signed.

149 If the electoral board determines that such person was not entitled to vote as a qualified voter in the 150 precinct in which he offered the provisional vote, Θ is unable to determine his right to vote, or has not 151 been provided one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643, the envelope 152 containing his ballot shall not be opened and his vote shall not be counted. The provisional vote shall be 153 counted if either (i) such person is entitled to vote in the precinct pursuant to § 24.2-401 or (ii) the State 154 Board or the voter presents proof that indicates the voter submitted an application for registration to the 155 Department of Motor Vehicles or other state-designated voter registration agency prior to the close of 156 registration pursuant to § 24.2-416 and the registrar determines that the person was qualified for 157 registration based upon the application for registration submitted by the person pursuant to subsection A. 158 The general registrar shall notify in writing pursuant to § 24.2-114 those persons found not properly 159 registered.

160 If the electoral board determines that such person was entitled to vote, the name of the voter shall be 161 entered in a provisional votes pollbook and marked as having voted, the envelope shall be opened, and 162 the ballot placed in a ballot container without any inspection further than that provided for in 163 § 24.2-646.

164 On completion of its determination, the electoral board shall proceed to count such ballots and certify 165 the results of its count. Its certified results shall be added to those found pursuant to § 24.2-671. No 166 adjustment shall be made to the statement of results for the precinct in which the person offered to vote.

167 The certification of the results of the count together with all ballots and envelopes, whether open or 168 unopened, and other related material shall be delivered by the electoral board to the clerk of the circuit 169 court and retained by him as provided for in §§ 24.2-668 and 24.2-669.

170 C. Whenever the polling hours are extended by an order of a court of competent jurisdiction, any 171 ballots marked after the normal polling hours by persons who were not already in line at the time the 172 polls would have closed, notwithstanding the court order, shall be treated as provisional ballots under 173 this section. The officers of election shall mark the green envelope for each such provisional ballot to 174 indicate that it was cast after normal polling hours due to the court order, and when preparing the 175 materials to deliver to the registrar or electoral board, shall separate these provisional ballots from any 176 provisional ballots used for any other reason. The electoral board shall treat these provisional ballots as 177 provided in subsection B of this section; however, the counted and uncounted provisional ballots marked 178 after the normal polling hours shall be kept separate from all other ballots and recorded in a separate 179 provisional ballots pollbook. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the electoral 180 boards for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to this section.

181 § 24.2-701. Application for absentee ballot.

182 A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for 183 official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them.

184 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an 185 absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications 186 shall be in a form approved by the State Board.

187 Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in 188 which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i) 189 12 months before an election, or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to 190 the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

191 Any application received before the ballots are printed shall be held and processed as soon as the 192 printed ballots for the election are available.

For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight 193 194 hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately 195 preceding all general elections, except May general elections held in towns, and on the Saturday immediately preceding any primary election, May general election held in a town, or special election. 196

197 Unless physically disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the applicant who 198 shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to the 199 best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct and that he 200 has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any other state. If the 201 applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note this fact on the 202 applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address. 203

B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

204 1. An application completed in person shall be made not less than three days prior to the election in 205 which the applicant offers to vote and completed only in the office of the general registrar. The 206 applicant shall sign the application in the presence of a registrar or a member of the electoral board. The applicant shall provide one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643, or if 207 208 he is unable to present one of the forms of identification listed in that section, he shall sign a statement, 209 subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that he is the named 210 registered voter who he claims to be. Any voter who does not show one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643 shall be offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of 211 § 24.2-653. The State Board shall provide instructions to the electoral boards for the handling and 212 213 counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of § 24.2-653 and this section. An applicant who requires assistance in voting by reason of physical disability or inability to read or write 214 215 may request assistance pursuant to § 24.2-649 and be assisted in preparation of this statement in 216 accordance with that section. The provisions of § 24.2-649 regarding persons who are unable to sign shall be followed when assisting an applicant in completing this statement. For federal elections held after January 1, 2004, this paragraph shall apply in the case of any voter 217

218 who is required by subparagraph (b) of 42 U.S.C.S. § 15483 of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 to 219 220 show identification the first time that voter votes in a federal election in the state. After completing an 221 application for an absentee ballot in person, such voter shall present: (i) a current and valid photo 222 identification; or (ii) a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or 223 other document that shows the name and address of the voter. Such individual who desires to vote in 224 person but who does not show one of the forms of identification specified in this paragraph shall be 225 offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of § 24.2-653. Neither the identification requirements of 226 subsection B of § 24.2-643, nor the identification requirements of subsection A of § 24.2-653, shall 227 apply to such voter at that election. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the 228 electoral boards for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 229 § 24.2-653 and this section.

230 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile 231 device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a 232 device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the 233 registrar or, if made under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a Federal Post Card Application 234 prescribed pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1973ff (b) (2). The Federal Post Card Application may be accepted 235 the later of (i) 12 months before an election, or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth 236 month prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to 237 the appropriate registrar no later than 5:00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the 238 applicant offers to vote. 239

C. Applications for absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

240 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the 241 reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election;

242 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence 243 address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to
him. Any person who makes application under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered voter
may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be either the address of the applicant on file in the registration records or the address at which he will be located while absent from his county or city. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other person; and

4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active service as a
member of the armed forces of the United States or a member of the merchant marine of the United
States, the branch of service to which he or the spouse belongs, and his or the spouse's rank, grade, or
rate, and service identification number; or

5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of learning, the name and address of the school or institution of learning; or

6. In the case of a person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the electionbecause of a physical disability or physical illness, the nature of the illness or disability; or

7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor, the name and address of the institution of confinement; or

8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of hisemployer or business; or

9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacation reasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is
primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at
home, the name of the family member and the nature of his illness or disability; or

11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of anobligation occasioned by his religion, his religion and the nature of the obligation; or

12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or
occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for
11 or more hours of the 13 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his
business or employer, address of his place of work, and hours he will be at the workplace and
commuting on election day.
