4. Title: Advance Health Care Directive Registry; creation

5. Summary/Purpose: The bill, as amended, requires the Department of Health to make available a secure online central registry for advance health care directives. The registry shall be accessible to health care providers licensed by the Board, through a site maintained by the Department of Health. The Department shall make the registry available to the public by contracting with an appropriate vendor, directing the public to an existing registry maintained by another entity, or by entering into a public-private partnership once sufficient federal, local, or private funds are available.

7. Budget amendment necessary: No.

8. Fiscal implications: No.

9. Specific agency or political subdivisions affected: Virginia Department of Health

10. Technical amendment necessary: No.

11. Other comments: Previous issued fiscal impact statements indicated that in order to establish and maintain the registry the agency would require additional funding, which would be supported through the collection of fees established in the bill. The amended legislation authorizes the Department of Health “to accept, hold, administer, and solicit grants, gifts, bequests, contributions or other assistance entirely from federal, local, or other private sources for the purpose of making the registry available and the Department shall make the registry available to the public by contracting with an appropriate vendor, directing the public to an existing registry maintained by another entity, or by entering into a public-private partnership.” The legislation, as amended, would not have an expenditure impact upon the agency.

The Department may also collect fees; however, the number of fees collected is restricted and is not expected to generate a significant amount of revenue.
