A third conviction for these crimes within 20 years is a felony, however, currently, such records are only required to be retained for 10 years.

Fiscal Implications: According to the Supreme Court of Virginia, for the most recent 18 month period (July 1, 2006 to December 31, 2007), there were 66,444 domestic violence cases (§16.1-253.2, §18.2-57.2), or on average 44,300 cases per year. Retention of the record of these cases would require additional resources for storage. However, this will be a local cost and is likely to vary significantly from locality to locality, depending upon caseload. There would also be a fiscal impact to the court system budget due to the additional costs incurred for the time it would take a clerk to identify and cull those files that would have to be retained for the additional time. However, the courts believe that those costs can be absorbed with current court resources
