That §§ 2.2-225, 2.2-225.1, 2.2-2101 as it is currently effective and as it shall become effective, 2.2-2218, 2.2-2219, 2.2-2220, 2.2-2221, 2.2-2233.1, 2.2-3705.6, 2.2-3711, and 23-4.4 of the Code of 11 12 13 Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 14 $\frac{1}{8}$ 2.2-225. Position established; agencies for which responsible; additional powers. 15 The position of Secretary of Technology (the Secretary) is created. The Secretary shall be responsible to the Governor for the following agencies and boards: Information Technology Investment Board, 16 17 Innovative Technology Innovation and Entrepreneurship Investment Authority, Virginia Information Technologies Agency, Virginia Geographic Information Network Advisory Board, and the Wireless 18 E-911 Services Board, and the Virginia Research and Technology Advisory Commission. The Governor, 19 20 by executive order, may assign any other state executive agency to the Secretary, or reassign any agency 21 listed in this section to another Secretary. 22 Unless the Governor expressly reserves such power to himself, the Secretary may, with regard to 23 strategy development, planning and budgeting for technology programs in the Commonwealth: 24 1. Monitor trends and advances in fundamental technologies of interest and importance to the 25 economy of the Commonwealth and direct and approve a stakeholder-driven technology strategy development process that results in a comprehensive and coordinated view of research and development 26 27 goals for industry, academia and government in the Commonwealth. This strategy shall be updated 28 biennially and submitted to the Governor, the Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President Pro 29 Tempore of the Senate. 2. Work closely with the appropriate federal research and development agencies and program 30 31 managers to maximize the participation of Commonwealth industries and universities in these programs consistent with agreed strategy goals. 32 3. Direct the development of plans and programs for strengthening the technology resources of the 33 34 Commonwealth's high technology industry sectors and for assisting in the strengthening and development of the Commonwealth's Regional Technology Councils. 35 36 4. Direct the development of plans and programs for improving access to capital for 37 technology-based entrepreneurs. 38 5. Assist the Joint Commission on Technology and Science created pursuant to § 30-85 in its efforts 39 to stimulate, encourage, and promote the development of technology in the Commonwealth. 40 6. Continuously monitor and analyze the technology investments and strategic initiatives of other 41 states to ensure the Commonwealth remains competitive. 42 7. Strengthen interstate and international partnerships and relationships in the public and private sectors to bolster the Commonwealth's reputation as a global technology center. 43 44 8. Develop and implement strategies to accelerate and expand the commercialization of intellectual 45 property created within the Commonwealth. 9. Ensure the Commonwealth remains competitive in cultivating and expanding growth industries, 46 47 including life sciences, advanced materials and nanotechnology, biotechnology, and aerospace. 10. Monitor the trends in the availability and deployment of and access to broadband **48** communications services, which include, but are not limited to, competitively priced, high-speed data 49 services and Internet access services of general application, throughout the Commonwealth and 50 51 advancements in communications technology for deployment potential. The Secretary shall report annually by December 1 to the Governor and General Assembly on those trends. 52 53 § 2.2-225.1. (Expires July 1, 2018) Office of Telework Promotion and Broadband Assistance. 54 A. There is hereby established the Office of Telework Promotion and Broadband Assistance in the office of the Secretary of Technology, consisting of a director, appointed by the Secretary of 55 Technology, and such additional telework and broadband professionals as deemed necessary. The goals 56 of the Office are to encourage telework as a family-friendly, business-friendly public policy that 57 promotes workplace efficiency and reduces strain on transportation infrastructure. In conjunction with 58

efforts to promote telework, the Office shall work with public and private entities to develop widespread

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access to broadband services. It shall be the duty of the director of the Office to advise the Secretary 60 and the Board of Directors of the Innovative Technology Innovation and Entrepreneurship Investment 61

62 Authority, generally.

63 B. The director shall have the following duties:

1. Promote and encourage use of telework alternatives for public and private employees, including 64 65 but not limited to appropriate policy and legislative initiatives.

2. Assist state agencies in establishing telework policies.

3. Support the efforts of both public and private entities within the Commonwealth to enhance or 67 68 facilitate the deployment of, and access to competitively priced, advanced electronic communications services (commonly known as broadband) and Internet access services of general application throughout 69 the Commonwealth. 70

4. Specifically work towards establishing affordable, accessible broadband services to unserved areas 71 72 of the Commonwealth and monitor advancements in communication that will facilitate this goal.

5. Advocate for, and facilitate the development and deployment of, applications, programs, and 73 74 services including, but not limited to telework, telemedicine, and e-learning that will bolster the usage of 75 and demand for broadband level telecommunications.

76 6. Serve as a broadband information and applications clearinghouse for the Commonwealth and a 77 coordination point for broadband-related services and programs in the Commonwealth. 78

7. Advise the Secretary on broadband adoption, deployment, and application issues.

79 8. Coordinate activities regarding telework with, and regularly report to, a panel consisting of the Secretaries of Administration, Commerce and Trade, Finance, Technology, and Transportation. The 80 Secretary of Technology shall serve as chair of the panel. Additional members may be designated by the 81 Governor. Staff support for the panel shall be provided by the offices of the Secretaries of Technology 82 and Transportation and the Governor shall designate additional agencies to provide staff support as 83 84 necessary.

85 C. The Office shall not have the power to consolidate or otherwise have authority over advanced 86 communications projects being conducted by public or private bodies outside of the executive branch of 87 government.

88 § 2.2-2101. (Effective until July 1, 2013) Prohibition against service by legislators on boards, 89 commissions, and councils within the executive branch; exceptions.

90 Members of the General Assembly shall be ineligible to serve on boards, commissions, and councils 91 within the executive branch of state government who are responsible for administering programs 92 established by the General Assembly. Such prohibition shall not extend to boards, commissions, and councils engaged solely in policy studies or commemorative activities. If any law directs the appointment of any member of the General Assembly to a board, commission, or council in the 93 94 95 executive branch of state government that is responsible for administering programs established by the 96 General Assembly, such portion of such law shall be void, and the Governor shall appoint another 97 person from the Commonwealth at large to fill such a position.

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159 § 2.2-2218. Short title; definitions.160 A. This article may be cited as the

A. This article may be cited as the "Innovative Technology Authority Act of 1984, as amended."

161 B. As used in this article, unless the context requires a different meaning:

"Project" shall mean the construction, improvement, furnishing, maintenance, acquisition or operationof any facility or the provision for or funding of any activity that will further the purposes described in§ 2.2-2219.

165 § 2.2-2219. Declaration of public purpose; Authority created.

166 A. It is found and determined by the General Assembly that there exists in the Commonwealth of Virginia a need to (i) promote the economic development of the Commonwealth by attracting and 167 168 retaining high technology jobs and businesses in Virginia; (ii) increase industry competitiveness by supporting the application of innovative technologies that improve productivity and efficiency; (iii) 169 170 mobilize support for high technology industries to commercialize new products and processes, including 171 organizing assistance for small business and supporting select industry sectors and regional high 172 technology efforts; (iv) enhance and expand the scientific and technological research and development 173 capabilities of the institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth and coordinate such capabilities 174 with the scientific and technological research and development activities and requirements of the public 175 and private sectors, including transferring technological advances to the private sector; (v) expand 176 knowledge pertaining to scientific and technological research and development among public and private 177 entities; (vi) attract research and development (R&D) facilities and contracts from the federal 178 government and private sector, including coordinating efforts to identify and compete for large federal and private sector R&D facilities, tracking federal technology initiatives and recommending state actions, 179 180 and developing a statewide strategy to compete for large R&D contracts; and (vii) facilitate and coordinate the marketing, organization, utilization and development of scientific and technological 181 182 research and development in the Commonwealth.

183 B. To achieve the objectives of subsection A, there is created and constituted a political subdivision 184 of the Commonwealth to be known as "The Innovative Technology Innovation and Entrepreneurship Investment Authority." The Authority's exercise of powers conferred by this article shall be deemed to 185 186 be the performance of an essential governmental function and matters of public necessity for which 187 public moneys may be spent and private property acquired.

188 § 2.2-2220. Board of directors; members; President.

189 The Authority shall be governed by a board of directors consisting of $13 \ 12$ members appointed by 190 the Governor as follows: (i) two members shall be the presidents of the major research universities state institutions of higher education, and one member shall represent president representing the other public 191 192 colleges or universities in Virginia. After the original appointments, all appointments of presidents shall 193 be for terms of five years, except that appointments to fill vacancies shall be for the unexpired terms. 194 No president shall be eligible to serve for more than two successive five year terms; however, after the 195 expiration of a term of four years or less, or after the expiration of the remainder of a term to which 196 appointed to fill a vacancy, two additional terms may be served by such member if appointed thereto. The state institutions of higher education, appointed by the Governor; (ii) three nonlegislative citizen 197 198 members appointed by the Governor; (iii) three nonlegislative citizen members appointed by the Joint 199 Rules Committee from a list recommended by the Joint Commission on Technology and Science; (iv) the 200 Secretary of Technology, who shall serve on the Board for a term coincident with his term of office ex 201 officio with full voting privileges; (v) the Chair of the House Committee on Science and Technology, 202 who shall serve ex officio with full voting privileges; and (vi) the Chair of the Joint Commission on Technology and Science, or his designee, who shall serve ex officio with full voting privileges. The 203 204 Governor shall appoint the nine other members of the Board who shall be nominated by established 205 industry groups and technology councils within the Commonwealth. These appointees shall include representatives of a variety of businesses, industries and corporations of different types, sizes, locations 206 207 and stages of development. All members of the Board appointed by the Governor shall be confirmed by 208 each house of the General Assembly.

209 One nonlegislative citizen member appointed by the Governor and one nonlegislative citizen member 210 appointed by the Joint Rules Committee shall each have experience as a founding member of a 211 technology company based upon intellectual property that has successfully secured a minimum of \$5 212 million of institutional venture capital. One nonlegislative citizen member appointed by the Governor 213 and one nonlegislative citizen member appointed by the Joint Rules Committee shall each have 214 experience as an institutional venture capital investment partner in a fund with a minimum of \$250 215 million of limited partner investment and a minimum of five years of fund operations. One nonlegislative 216 citizen member appointed by the Governor and one nonlegislative citizen member appointed by the Joint 217 Rules Committee shall each have experience as a senior executive in a technology or scientific research 218 and development company with annual revenues in excess of \$50 million.

219 The Secretary of Technology shall serve a term coincident with his term of office. After the original appointments initial staggering of terms, the members of the Board nonlegislative citizen members and 220 221 presidents shall be appointed for terms of four two years. Vacancies in the membership of the Board 222 shall be filled by appointment of the Governor in the same manner as the original appointments for the 223 unexpired portion of the term. No *nonlegislative citizen* member of the Board or president shall be 224 eligible to serve for more than two three successive two-year terms; however, after the expiration of a 225 term of four years or less one year, or after the expiration of the remainder of a term to which 226 appointed to fill a vacancy, two three additional terms may be served by such member if appointed 227 thereto. Members of the Board shall be subject to removal from office in like manner as are state, 228 county, town and district officers under the provisions of §§ 24.2-230 through 24.2-238. Immediately 229 after appointment, the members of the Board shall enter upon the performance of their duties.

230 The Board shall annually elect from among its members a chairman and a vice-chairman. The Board 231 shall also elect annually a secretary, who need not be a member of the Board, and may also elect such 232 other subordinate officers who need not be members of the Board, as it deems proper. The chairman, or 233 in his absence, the vice-chairman, shall preside at all meetings of the Board. In the absence of both the 234 chairman and vice-chairman, the Board shall appoint a chairman pro tempore, who shall preside at such 235 meetings.

The Board shall employ a President of the Authority, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board, to 236 237 direct the day-to-day operations and activities of the Authority and carry out such of the powers and 238 duties conferred upon him by the Board. The President and employees of the Authority shall be 239 compensated in the manner provided by the Board and shall not be subject to the provisions of the 240 Virginia Personnel Act (§ 2.2-2900 et seq.) of this title. 241

§ 2.2-2221. Powers of the Authority.

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The Authority is granted all powers necessary or convenient for the carrying out of its statutory purposes, including, but not limited to, the following rights and powers to:

244 1. Sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, complain and defend in all courts.

245 2. Adopt, use, and alter at will a corporate seal.

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246 3. Acquire, purchase, hold, use, lease or otherwise dispose of any project and property, real, personal 247 or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein necessary or desirable for carrying out the purposes of the Authority, and, without limitation of the foregoing, to lease as lessee, any project and 248 249 any property, real, personal or mixed, or any interest therein, at such annual rental and on such terms 250 and conditions as may be determined by the Board and to lease as lessor to any person, any project and 251 any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein, at any time acquired 252 by the Authority, whether wholly or partially completed, at such annual rental and on such terms and 253 conditions as may be determined by the Board, and to sell, transfer or convey any property, real, 254 personal or mixed, tangible or intangible or any interest therein, at any time acquired or held by the 255 Authority on such terms and conditions as may be determined by the board of the Authority.

256 4. Plan, develop, undertake, carry out, construct, improve, rehabilitate, repair, furnish, maintain, and **257** operate projects.

- 5. Adopt bylaws for the management and regulation of its affairs.
- 6. Establish and maintain satellite offices within the Commonwealth.

7. Fix, alter, charge, and collect rates, rentals, and other charges for the use of projects of, or for the sale of products of or for the services rendered by, the Authority, at rates to be determined by it for the purpose of providing for the payment of the expenses of the Authority, the planning, development, construction, improvement, rehabilitation, repair, furnishing, maintenance, and operation of its projects and properties, the payment of the costs accomplishing its purposes set forth in § 2.2-2219, the payment of the principal of and interest on its obligations, and to fulfill the terms and provisions of any agreements made with the purchasers or holders of any such obligations.

267 8. Borrow money, make and issue bonds including bonds as the Authority may determine to issue 268 for the purpose of accomplishing the purposes set forth in § 2.2-2219 or of refunding bonds previously 269 issued by the Authority, and to secure the payment of all bonds, or any part thereof, by pledge or deed of trust of all or any of its revenues, rentals, and receipts or of any project or property, real, personal or 270 271 mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein, and to make agreements with the purchasers or 272 holders of such bonds or with others in connection with any such bonds, whether issued or to be issued, 273 as the Authority deems advisable, and in general to provide for the security for the bonds and the rights 274 of holders thereof.

9. Make and enter into all contracts and agreements necessary or incidental to the performance of its duties, the furtherance of its purposes and the execution of its powers under this article, including agreements with any person or federal agency.

278 10. Employ, in its discretion, consultants, attorneys, architects, engineers, accountants, financial
279 experts, investment bankers, superintendents, managers and such other employees and agents as may be
280 necessary, and to fix their compensation to be payable from funds made available to the Authority.

11. Receive and accept from any federal or private agency, foundation, corporation, association or person grants to be expended in accomplishing the objectives of the Authority, and to receive and accept from the Commonwealth or any state, and any municipality, county or other political subdivision thereof and from any other source, aid or contributions of either money, property, or other things of value, to be held, used and applied only for the purposes for which such grants and contributions may be made.

12. Render advice and assistance, and to provide services, to institutions of higher education and to other persons providing services or facilities for scientific and technological research or graduate education, provided that credit towards a degree, certificate or diploma shall be granted only if such education is provided in conjunction with an institution of higher education authorized to operate in Virginia.

291 13. Develop, undertake and provide programs, alone or in conjunction with any person or federal 292 agency, for scientific and technological research, technology management, continuing education and 293 in-service training, provided that credit towards a degree, certificate or diploma shall be granted only if 294 such education is provided in conjunction with an institution of higher education authorized to operate in 295 Virginia; to foster the utilization of scientific and technological research information, discoveries and 296 data and to obtain patents, copyrights and trademarks thereon; to coordinate the scientific and 297 technological research efforts of public institutions and private industry and to collect and maintain data 298 on the development and utilization of scientific and technological research capabilities. The universities 299 set forth in § 2.2-2220 shall be the principal leading universities in the research institutes.

300 14. Pledge or otherwise encumber all or any of the revenues or receipts of the Authority as security301 for all or any of the obligations of the Authority.

302 15. Receive, administer, and market any interest in patents, copyrights and materials that were
 303 potentially patentable or copyrightable developed by or for state agencies, public institutions of higher
 304 education and political subdivisions of the Commonwealth. The Authority shall return to the agency,
 305 institution or political subdivision any revenue in excess of its administrative and marketing costs. When

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306 general funds are used to develop the patent or copyright or material that was potentially patentable or copyrightable, any state agency, except a public institution of higher education in Virginia, shall return any revenues it receives from the Authority to the general fund unless the Governor authorizes a percentage of the net royalties to be shared with the developer of the patented, copyrighted, or 310 potentially patentable or copyrightable property.

311 16. Develop a comprehensive research and development strategic roadmap for the Commonwealth to 312 identify research areas worthy of institutional focus. Such a roadmap shall incorporate the strategic plan for each research university in the Commonwealth, identify common themes, and make 313 recommendations for alignment of research and development and economic growth in the 314 315 Commonwealth. In developing the strategic roadmap, the Authority shall solicit feedback from both 316 public and private institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth, as well as the private sector. The Authority shall review and update the roadmap at least once every three years. The Authority shall 317 318 submit the roadmap, and any subsequent updates, to the Governor and the chairmen of the Senate Finance Committee, the House Appropriations Committee, the Senate Committee on General Laws and 319 320 Technology, and the House Committee on Science and Technology, and the Joint Commission on 321 Technology and Science.

322 17. Foster innovative partnerships and relationships among the Commonwealth, the Commonwealth's
 323 state institutions of higher education, the private sector, federal labs, and not-for-profit organizations to
 324 improve research and development commercialization efforts.

325 18. Receive and review annual reports from state institutions of higher education regarding the progress of projects funded through the Commonwealth Research Initiative or the Commonwealth 326 327 Technology Research Fund. The Authority shall develop guidelines, methodologies, and criteria for the reports. The Authority shall aggregate the reports and submit an annual omnibus report on the status of 328 329 research and development initiatives in the Commonwealth to the Governor and the chairmen of the 330 Senate Finance Committee, the House Appropriations Committee, the Senate Committee on General 331 Laws and Technology, and the House Committee on Science and Technology, and the Joint Commission 332 on Technology and Science.

333 19. Develop guidelines for the award of funds from the Commonwealth Technology Research Fund
 334 pursuant to § 2.2-2233.1.

20. Do all acts and things necessary or convenient to carry out the powers granted to it by law.

§ 2.2-2233.1. Commonwealth Technology Research Fund; continued; purposes; report.

337 A. From such funds as may be appropriated by the General Assembly and any gifts, grants, or 338 donations from public or private sources, there is created in the state treasury a special nonreverting, 339 permanent fund, to be known as the Commonwealth Technology Research Fund (the Fund), to be 340 administered by the Authority. The Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller. Interest 341 earned on moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Any moneys remaining in 342 the Fund at the end of each fiscal year, including interest thereon, shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in the Fund. Expenditures and disbursements from the Fund, which may consist of 343 344 grants or loans, shall be made by the State Treasurer on warrants issued by the Comptroller upon 345 written request bearing the signature of the chairman or the vice-chairman of the Authority, or, if so 346 authorized by the Authority, bearing his facsimile signature, and the official seal of the Authority.

B. Moneys in the Fund shall be used for the sole purpose of attracting public and private research
funding for institutions of higher education, in order to increase technological and economic
development in Virginia. Awards from the Fund shall be made to Virginia public institutions of higher
education or to their associated intellectual property foundations.

351 C. For purposes of awards, the Fund shall have four components: (i) a matching funds program to leverage federal and private research dollars; (ii) a strategic enhancement program to upgrade the 352 research capacity of those academic departments that have demonstrated the ability to perform 353 354 innovative research in technology fields that has strong potential to contribute to economic development 355 in the Commonwealth; (iii) a program to upgrade research capacity in key departments of the institutions in order to attract specific companies to locate or expand in Virginia; and (iv) a program to 356 357 enhance the capability of the institutions of higher education to commercialize technologies developed 358 through their research.

359 Awards for the matching funds component shall be contingent upon the approval of the institution's360 grant proposal for federal or private funds.

361 Awards from the Fund shall be matched on at least a dollar-for-dollar basis by the respective
362 institution of higher education, with private funds, or combinations thereof. However, for good cause,
363 this requirement may be waived, in whole or in part, by the chairman of the Authority, provided that
364 such action is reported to the Chairmen of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees at
365 least 10 days prior to the award or disbursement of such funds for such purpose.

366 D. Awards shall be based on scientific merit and economic development potential of research 367 programs in the following fields: aerospace, biotechnology, energy, environmental and information

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368 technologies, high performance manufacturing, sensor sciences, telecommunications, and transportation.
369 However, for good cause, awards supporting research in other relevant fields or disciplines may be made
370 by the chairman of the Authority, provided that such action is reported to the Chairman of the House

Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees at least 10 days prior to the award or disbursement of
such funds for such purpose.

Specific guidelines for the award of funds from this program shall be established and maintained by
the Authority, in consultation with the Virginia Economic Development Partnership and the State
Council of Higher Education. These guidelines shall address, at a minimum, the application process, and
the composition and operation of proposal review panels, and give special emphasis to fostering
collaboration between institutions of higher education and partnerships between institutions of higher
education and business and industry.

379 Awards from the Fund shall be made by the Authority. The chairman of the Authority shall
380 coordinate the evaluation of proposals, to be conducted by and may form review panels with the
appropriate science and technology expertise, drawn from federal agencies and academic and industrial
382 research institutions across the country to assist in reviewing applicants for grants from the Fund.

Recommendations on the grants shall be made by representatives from the Virginia Research and
 Technology Advisory Commission pursuant to § 2.2-2515, the Virginia Economic Development
 Partnership, and the State Council of Higher Education based on the recommendations of the review
 panels.

E. The chairman of the Authority shall provide the Governor and the General Assembly with an annual report to include a detailed list of awards committed, the amount of each approved award, a description of the approved proposals, and the amount of federal or private matching funds anticipated where applicable, and an assessment of the effectiveness of the Fund in attracting public and private research funding and increasing technological and economic development in Virginia.

392 § 2.2-3705.6. Exclusions to application of chapter; proprietary records and trade secrets.

The following records are excluded from the provisions of this chapter but may be disclosed by the custodian in his discretion, except where such disclosure is prohibited by law:

395 1. Proprietary information gathered by or for the Virginia Port Authority as provided in § 62.1-132.4396 or 62.1-134.1.

397 2. Financial statements not publicly available filed with applications for industrial development398 financings in accordance with Chapter 49 (§ 15.2-4900 et seq.) of Title 15.2.

399 3. Confidential proprietary records, voluntarily provided by private business pursuant to a promise of 400 confidentiality from the Department of Business Assistance, the Virginia Economic Development 401 Partnership, the Virginia Tourism Authority, the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization 402 Commission, a nonprofit, nonstock corporation created pursuant to § 2.2-2240.1, or local or regional 403 industrial or economic development authorities or organizations, used by the Department, the **404** Partnership, the Authority, or such entities for business, trade and tourism development; and memoranda, 405 working papers or other records related to businesses that are considering locating or expanding in 406 Virginia, prepared by such entities, where competition or bargaining is involved and where, if such records are made public, the financial interest of the governmental unit would be adversely affected. 407

408 4. Information that was filed as confidential under the Toxic Substances Information Act (§ 32.1-239 409 et seq.), as such Act existed prior to July 1, 1992.

410 5. Fisheries data that would permit identification of any person or vessel, except when required by **411** court order as specified in § 28.2-204.

6. Confidential financial statements, balance sheets, trade secrets, and revenue and cost projections
provided to the Department of Rail and Public Transportation, provided such information is exempt
under the federal Freedom of Information Act or the federal Interstate Commerce Act or other laws
administered by the Surface Transportation Board or the Federal Railroad Administration with respect to
data provided in confidence to the Surface Transportation Board and the Federal Railroad
Administration.

418 7. Confidential proprietary records related to inventory and sales, voluntarily provided by private
419 energy suppliers to the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy, used by that Department for energy
420 contingency planning purposes or for developing consolidated statistical information on energy supplies.

421 8. Confidential proprietary information furnished to the Board of Medical Assistance Services or the
422 Medicaid Prior Authorization Advisory Committee pursuant to Article 4 (§ 32.1-331.12 et seq.) of
423 Chapter 10 of Title 32.1.

9. Proprietary, commercial or financial information, balance sheets, trade secrets, and revenue and
cost projections provided by a private transportation business to the Virginia Department of
Transportation and the Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the purpose of conducting
transportation studies needed to obtain grants or other financial assistance under the Transportation
Equity Act for the 21st Century (P.L. 105-178) for transportation projects, provided such information is

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429 exempt under the federal Freedom of Information Act or the federal Interstate Commerce Act or other 430 laws administered by the Surface Transportation Board or the Federal Railroad Administration with 431 respect to data provided in confidence to the Surface Transportation Board and the Federal Railroad 432 Administration. However, the exemption provided by this subdivision shall not apply to any wholly 433 owned subsidiary of a public body.

434 10. Confidential information designated as provided in subsection F of § 2.2-4342 as trade secrets or 435 proprietary information by any person who has submitted to a public body an application for 436 prequalification to bid on public construction projects in accordance with subsection B of § 2.2-4317.

437 11. a. Memoranda, staff evaluations, or other records prepared by the responsible public entity, its 438 staff, outside advisors, or consultants exclusively for the evaluation and negotiation of proposals filed 439 under the Public-Private Transportation Act of 1995 (§ 56-556 et seq.) or the Public Private Education 440 Facilities and Infrastructure Act of 2002 (§ 56-575.1 et seq.), where (i) if such records were made public 441 prior to or after the execution of an interim or a comprehensive agreement, § 56-573.1:1 or 56-575.17 notwithstanding, the financial interest or bargaining position of the public entity would be adversely 442 affected, and (ii) the basis for the determination required in clause (i) is documented in writing by the 443 444 responsible public entity; and

445 b. Records provided by a private entity to a responsible public entity, affected jurisdiction, or 446 affected local jurisdiction pursuant to the provisions of the Public-Private Transportation Act of 1995 or 447 the Public-Private Education Facilities and Infrastructure Act of 2002, to the extent that such records 448 contain (i) trade secrets of the private entity as defined in the Uniform Trade Secrets Act (§ 59.1-336 et 449 seq.); (ii) financial records of the private entity, including balance sheets and financial statements, that 450 are not generally available to the public through regulatory disclosure or otherwise; or (iii) other information submitted by the private entity, where, if the records were made public prior to the 451 execution of an interim agreement or a comprehensive agreement, the financial interest or bargaining 452 453 position of the public or private entity would be adversely affected. In order for the records specified in 454 clauses (i), (ii) and (iii) to be excluded from the provisions of this chapter, the private entity shall make 455 a written request to the responsible public entity:

456 1. Invoking such exclusion upon submission of the data or other materials for which protection from 457 disclosure is sought; 458

2. Identifying with specificity the data or other materials for which protection is sought; and

3. Stating the reasons why protection is necessary.

460 The responsible public entity shall determine whether the requested exclusion from disclosure is 461 necessary to protect the trade secrets or financial records of the private entity. To protect other records 462 submitted by the private entity from disclosure, the responsible public entity shall determine whether public disclosure prior to the execution of an interim agreement or a comprehensive agreement would 463 464 adversely affect the financial interest or bargaining position of the public or private entity. The 465 responsible public entity shall make a written determination of the nature and scope of the protection to 466 be afforded by the responsible public entity under this subdivision. Once a written determination is made by the responsible public entity, the records afforded protection under this subdivision shall continue to 467 468 be protected from disclosure when in the possession of any affected jurisdiction or affected local 469 jurisdiction.

Except as specifically provided in subdivision 11 a, nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to 470 471 authorize the withholding of (a) procurement records as required by § 56-573.1:1 or 56-575.17; (b) 472 information concerning the terms and conditions of any interim or comprehensive agreement, service 473 contract, lease, partnership, or any agreement of any kind entered into by the responsible public entity 474 and the private entity; (c) information concerning the terms and conditions of any financing arrangement 475 that involves the use of any public funds; or (d) information concerning the performance of any private 476 entity developing or operating a qualifying transportation facility or a qualifying project.

For the purposes of this subdivision, the terms "affected jurisdiction," "affected local jurisdiction," "comprehensive agreement," "interim agreement," "qualifying project," "qualifying transportation facility," "responsible public entity," and "private entity" shall mean the same as those terms are defined 477 478 479 480 in the Public-Private Transportation Act of 1995 or in the Public-Private Education Facilities and 481 Infrastructure Act of 2002.

482 12. Confidential proprietary information or trade secrets, not publicly available, provided by a private 483 person or entity to the Virginia Resources Authority or to a fund administered in connection with financial assistance rendered or to be rendered by the Virginia Resources Authority where, if such 484 485 information were made public, the financial interest of the private person or entity would be adversely affected, and, after June 30, 1997, where such information was provided pursuant to a promise of 486 **487** confidentiality.

13. Trade secrets, as defined in the Uniform Trade Secrets Act (§ 59.1-336 et seq.), or confidential 488 489 proprietary records that are not generally available to the public through regulatory disclosure or 490 otherwise, provided by a (a) bidder or applicant for a franchise or (b) franchisee under Chapter 21

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491 (§ 15.2-2100 et seq.) of Title 15.2 to the applicable franchising authority pursuant to a promise of
492 confidentiality from the franchising authority, to the extent the records relate to the bidder's, applicant's,
493 or franchisee's financial capacity or provision of new services, adoption of new technologies or
494 implementation of improvements, where such new services, technologies or improvements have not been
495 implemented by the franchisee on a nonexperimental scale in the franchise area, and where, if such
496 records were made public, the competitive advantage or financial interests of the franchisee would be
497 adversely affected.

498 In order for trade secrets or confidential proprietary information to be excluded from the provisions 499 of this chapter, the bidder, applicant, or franchisee shall (i) invoke such exclusion upon submission of 500 the data or other materials for which protection from disclosure is sought, (ii) identify the data or other 501 materials for which protection is sought, and (iii) state the reason why protection is necessary.

502 No bidder, applicant, or franchisee may invoke the exclusion provided by this subdivision if the
503 bidder, applicant, or franchisee is owned or controlled by a public body or if any representative of the
504 applicable franchising authority serves on the management board or as an officer of the bidder,
505 applicant, or franchisee.

506 14. Documents and other information of a proprietary nature furnished by a supplier of charitable
507 gaming supplies to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services pursuant to subsection E of
508 § 18.2-340.34.

509 15. Records and reports related to Virginia apple producer sales provided to the Virginia State Apple510 Board pursuant to §§ 3.1-622 and 3.1-624.

511 16. Trade secrets, as defined in the Uniform Trade Secrets Act (§ 59.1-336 et seq.) of Title 59.1,
512 submitted by CMRS providers as defined in § 56-484.12 to the Wireless Carrier E-911 Cost Recovery
513 Subcommittee created pursuant to § 56-484.15, relating to the provision of wireless E-911 service.

514 17. Records submitted as a grant application, or accompanying a grant application, to the Innovative 515 Technology Innovation and Entrepreneurship Investment Authority pursuant to Article 3 (§ 2.2-2233.1 et seq.) of Chapter 22 of Title 2.2 or to the Commonwealth Health Research Board pursuant to Chapter 22 516 517 (§ 23-277 et seq.) of Title 23 to the extent such records contain proprietary business or research-related 518 information produced or collected by the applicant in the conduct of or as a result of study or research 519 on medical, rehabilitative, scientific, technical, technological, or scholarly issues, when such information 520 has not been publicly released, published, copyrighted, or patented, if the disclosure of such information 521 would be harmful to the competitive position of the applicant.

522 18. Confidential proprietary records and trade secrets developed and held by a local public body (i) 523 providing telecommunication services pursuant to § 56-265.4:4 and (ii) providing cable television 524 services pursuant to Article 1.1 (§ 15.2-2108.2 et seq.) of Chapter 21 of Title 15.2, to the extent that 525 disclosure of such records would be harmful to the competitive position of the locality. In order for 526 confidential proprietary information or trade secrets to be excluded from the provisions of this chapter, 527 the locality in writing shall (i) invoke the protections of this subdivision, (ii) identify with specificity the 528 records or portions thereof for which protection is sought, and (iii) state the reasons why protection is 529 necessary.

530 19. Confidential proprietary records and trade secrets developed by or for a local authority created in accordance with the Virginia Wireless Service Authorities Act (§ 15.2-5431.1 et seq.) to provide qualifying communications services as authorized by Article 5.1 (§ 56-484.7:1 et seq.) of Chapter 15 of Title 56, where disclosure of such information would be harmful to the competitive position of the authority, except that records required to be maintained in accordance with § 15.2-2160 shall be released.

536 20. Trade secrets as defined in the Uniform Trade Secrets Act (§ 59.1-336 et seq.) or financial 537 records of a business, including balance sheets and financial statements, that are not generally available 538 to the public through regulatory disclosure or otherwise, provided to the Department of Minority 539 Business Enterprise as part of an application for (i) certification as a small, women- or minority-owned 540 business in accordance with Chapter 14 (§ 2.2-1400 et seq.) of this title or (ii) a claim made by a 541 disadvantaged business or an economically disadvantaged individual against the Capital Access Fund for 542 Disadvantaged Businesses created pursuant to § 2.2-2311. In order for such trade secrets or financial 543 records to be excluded from the provisions of this chapter, the business shall (a) invoke such exclusion 544 upon submission of the data or other materials for which protection from disclosure is sought, (b) 545 identify the data or other materials for which protection is sought, and (c) state the reasons why 546 protection is necessary.

547 21. Documents and other information of a proprietary or confidential nature disclosed by a carrier to548 the State Health Commissioner pursuant to § 32.1-276.5:1.

549 22. Trade secrets, as defined in the Uniform Trade Secrets Act (§ 59.1-336 et seq.), including, but
550 not limited to, financial records, including balance sheets and financial statements, that are not generally
551 available to the public through regulatory disclosure or otherwise, and revenue and cost projections

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552 supplied by a private or nongovernmental entity to the Inspector General of the Virginia Department of Transportation for the purpose of an audit, special investigation, or any study requested by the Inspector

553 554 General's Office in accordance with law.

555 In order for the records specified in this subdivision to be excluded from the provisions of this 556 chapter, the private or nongovernmental entity shall make a written request to the Department:

557 1. Invoking such exclusion upon submission of the data or other materials for which protection from 558 disclosure is sought; 559

2. Identifying with specificity the data or other materials for which protection is sought; and

3. Stating the reasons why protection is necessary.

The Inspector General of the Virginia Department of Transportation shall determine whether the 561 562 requested exclusion from disclosure is necessary to protect the trade secrets or financial records of the private entity. The Virginia Department of Transportation shall make a written determination of the 563 564 nature and scope of the protection to be afforded by it under this subdivision. 565

§ 2.2-3711. Closed meetings authorized for certain limited purposes.

A. Public bodies may hold closed meetings only for the following purposes:

1. Discussion, consideration, or interviews of prospective candidates for employment; assignment, 567 568 appointment, promotion, performance, demotion, salaries, disciplining, or resignation of specific public 569 officers, appointees, or employees of any public body; and evaluation of performance of departments or 570 schools of public institutions of higher education where such evaluation will necessarily involve 571 discussion of the performance of specific individuals. Any teacher shall be permitted to be present during a closed meeting in which there is a discussion or consideration of a disciplinary matter that 572 573 involves the teacher and some student and the student involved in the matter is present, provided the 574 teacher makes a written request to be present to the presiding officer of the appropriate board.

2. Discussion or consideration of admission or disciplinary matters or any other matters that would 575 576 involve the disclosure of information contained in a scholastic record concerning any student of any 577 Virginia public institution of higher education or any state school system. However, any such student, 578 legal counsel and, if the student is a minor, the student's parents or legal guardians shall be permitted to 579 be present during the taking of testimony or presentation of evidence at a closed meeting, if such 580 student, parents, or guardians so request in writing and such request is submitted to the presiding officer 581 of the appropriate board.

582 3. Discussion or consideration of the acquisition of real property for a public purpose, or of the 583 disposition of publicly held real property, where discussion in an open meeting would adversely affect 584 the bargaining position or negotiating strategy of the public body. 585

4. The protection of the privacy of individuals in personal matters not related to public business.

586 5. Discussion concerning a prospective business or industry or the expansion of an existing business 587 or industry where no previous announcement has been made of the business' or industry's interest in 588 locating or expanding its facilities in the community.

589 6. Discussion or consideration of the investment of public funds where competition or bargaining is 590 involved, where, if made public initially, the financial interest of the governmental unit would be 591 adversely affected.

592 7. Consultation with legal counsel and briefings by staff members or consultants pertaining to actual 593 or probable litigation, where such consultation or briefing in open meeting would adversely affect the 594 negotiating or litigating posture of the public body; and consultation with legal counsel employed or 595 retained by a public body regarding specific legal matters requiring the provision of legal advice by such counsel. For the purposes of this subdivision, "probable litigation" means litigation that has been specifically threatened or on which the public body or its legal counsel has a reasonable basis to believe 596 597 598 will be commenced by or against a known party. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to 599 permit the closure of a meeting merely because an attorney representing the public body is in attendance 600 or is consulted on a matter.

601 8. In the case of boards of visitors of public institutions of higher education, discussion or 602 consideration of matters relating to gifts, bequests and fund-raising activities, and grants and contracts 603 for services or work to be performed by such institution. However, the terms and conditions of any such **604** gifts, bequests, grants, and contracts made by a foreign government, a foreign legal entity, or a foreign 605 person and accepted by a public institution of higher education in Virginia shall be subject to public 606 disclosure upon written request to the appropriate board of visitors. For the purpose of this subdivision, (i) "foreign government" means any government other than the United States government or the 607 608 government of a state or a political subdivision thereof; (ii) "foreign legal entity" means any legal entity 609 created under the laws of the United States or of any state thereof if a majority of the ownership of the stock of such legal entity is owned by foreign governments or foreign persons or if a majority of the 610 membership of any such entity is composed of foreign persons or foreign legal entities, or any legal 611 entity created under the laws of a foreign government; and (iii) "foreign person" means any individual 612 613 who is not a citizen or national of the United States or a trust territory or protectorate thereof.

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614 9. In the case of the boards of trustees of the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, the Virginia Museum
615 of Natural History, and The Science Museum of Virginia, discussion or consideration of matters relating
616 to specific gifts, bequests, and grants.

10. Discussion or consideration of honorary degrees or special awards.

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618 11. Discussion or consideration of tests, examinations, or other records excluded from this chapter619 pursuant to subdivision 4 of § 2.2-3705.1.

620 12. Discussion, consideration, or review by the appropriate House or Senate committees of possible
621 disciplinary action against a member arising out of the possible inadequacy of the disclosure statement
622 filed by the member, provided the member may request in writing that the committee meeting not be
623 conducted in a closed meeting.

624 13. Discussion of strategy with respect to the negotiation of a hazardous waste siting agreement or to 625 consider the terms, conditions, and provisions of a hazardous waste siting agreement if the governing 626 body in open meeting finds that an open meeting will have an adverse effect upon the negotiating 627 position of the governing body or the establishment of the terms, conditions and provisions of the siting 628 agreement, or both. All discussions with the applicant or its representatives may be conducted in a 629 closed meeting.

630 14. Discussion by the Governor and any economic advisory board reviewing forecasts of economic631 activity and estimating general and nongeneral fund revenues.

632 15. Discussion or consideration of medical and mental records excluded from this chapter pursuant to633 subdivision 1 of § 2.2-3705.5.

634 16. Deliberations of the State Lottery Board in a licensing appeal action conducted pursuant to
635 subsection D of § 58.1-4007 regarding the denial or revocation of a license of a lottery sales agent; and
636 discussion, consideration or review of State Lottery Department matters related to proprietary lottery
637 game information and studies or investigations exempted from disclosure under subdivision 6 of
638 § 2.2-3705.3 and subdivision 11 of § 2.2-3705.7.

639 17. Those portions of meetings by local government crime commissions where the identity of, or640 information tending to identify, individuals providing information about crimes or criminal activities641 under a promise of anonymity is discussed or disclosed.

642 18. Those portions of meetings in which the Board of Corrections discusses or discloses the identity 643 of, or information tending to identify, any prisoner who (i) provides information about crimes or 644 criminal activities, (ii) renders assistance in preventing the escape of another prisoner or in the 645 apprehension of an escaped prisoner, or (iii) voluntarily or at the instance of a prison official renders 646 other extraordinary services, the disclosure of which is likely to jeopardize the prisoner's life or safety.

647 19. Discussion of plans to protect public safety as it relates to terrorist activity and briefings by staff
648 members, legal counsel, or law-enforcement or emergency service officials concerning actions taken to
649 respond to such activity or a related threat to public safety; or discussion of reports or plans related to
650 the security of any governmental facility, building or structure, or the safety of persons using such
651 facility, building or structure.

652 20. Discussion by the Board of the Virginia Retirement System, acting pursuant to § 51.1-124.30, or of any local retirement system, acting pursuant to § 51.1-803, or of the Rector and Visitors of the 653 654 University of Virginia, acting pursuant to § 23-76.1, regarding the acquisition, holding or disposition of a security or other ownership interest in an entity, where such security or ownership interest is not 655 656 traded on a governmentally regulated securities exchange, to the extent that such discussion (i) concerns 657 confidential analyses prepared for the Rector and Visitors of the University of Virginia, prepared by the 658 retirement system or provided to the retirement system under a promise of confidentiality, of the future 659 value of such ownership interest or the future financial performance of the entity, and (ii) would have an 660 adverse effect on the value of the investment to be acquired, held or disposed of by the retirement system or the Rector and Visitors of the University of Virginia. Nothing in this subdivision shall be **661** construed to prevent the disclosure of information relating to the identity of any investment held, the 662 663 amount invested or the present value of such investment.

21. Those portions of meetings in which individual child death cases are discussed by the State Child
Fatality Review team established pursuant to § 32.1-283.1, and those portions of meetings in which
individual child death cases are discussed by a regional or local child fatality review team established
pursuant to § 32.1-283.2, and those portions of meetings in which individual death cases are discussed
by family violence fatality review teams established pursuant to § 32.1-283.3.

669 22. Those portions of meetings of the University of Virginia Board of Visitors or the Eastern
670 Virginia Medical School Board of Visitors, as the case may be, and those portions of meetings of any
671 persons to whom management responsibilities for the University of Virginia Medical Center or Eastern
672 Virginia Medical School, as the case may be, have been delegated, in which there is discussed
673 proprietary, business-related information pertaining to the operations of the University of Virginia
674 Medical Center or Eastern Virginia Medical School, as the case may be, including business development

675 or marketing strategies and activities with existing or future joint venturers, partners, or other parties 676 with whom the University of Virginia Medical Center or Eastern Virginia Medical School, as the case may be, has formed, or forms, any arrangement for the delivery of health care, if disclosure of such 677 678 information would adversely affect the competitive position of the Medical Center or Eastern Virginia 679 Medical School, as the case may be.

680 23. In the case of the Virginia Commonwealth University Health System Authority, discussion or 681 consideration of any of the following: the acquisition or disposition of real or personal property where **682** disclosure would adversely affect the bargaining position or negotiating strategy of the Authority; 683 operational plans that could affect the value of such property, real or personal, owned or desirable for ownership by the Authority; matters relating to gifts, bequests and fund-raising activities; grants and **684** contracts for services or work to be performed by the Authority; marketing or operational strategies **685** where disclosure of such strategies would adversely affect the competitive position of the Authority; 686 **687** members of its medical and teaching staffs and qualifications for appointments thereto; and qualifications 688 or evaluations of other employees.

689 24. Those portions of the meetings of the Intervention Program Committee within the Department of 690 Health Professions to the extent such discussions identify any practitioner who may be, or who actually 691 is, impaired pursuant to Chapter 25.1 (§ 54.1-2515 et seq.) of Title 54.1.

25. Meetings or portions of meetings of the Board of the Virginia College Savings Plan wherein **692** 693 personal information, as defined in § 2.2-3801, which has been provided to the Board or its employees 694 by or on behalf of individuals who have requested information about, applied for, or entered into 695 prepaid tuition contracts or savings trust account agreements pursuant to Chapter 4.9 (§ 23-38.75 et seq.) 696 of Title 23 is discussed.

697 26. Discussion or consideration, by the Wireless Carrier E-911 Cost Recovery Subcommittee created **698** pursuant to § 56-484.15, of trade secrets, as defined in the Uniform Trade Secrets Act (§ 59.1-336 et 699 seq.), submitted by CMRS providers as defined in § 56-484.12, related to the provision of wireless 700 E-911 service.

701 27. Those portions of disciplinary proceedings by any regulatory board within the Department of 702 Professional and Occupational Regulation, Department of Health Professions, or the Board of 703 Accountancy conducted pursuant to § 2.2-4019 or 2.2-4020 during which the board deliberates to reach 704 a decision or meetings of health regulatory boards or conference committees of such boards to consider 705 settlement proposals in pending disciplinary actions or modifications to previously issued board orders as 706 requested by either of the parties.

707 28. Discussion or consideration of records excluded from this chapter pursuant to subdivision 11 of 708 § 2.2-3705.6 by a responsible public entity or an affected local jurisdiction, as those terms are defined in 709 § 56-557, or any independent review panel appointed to review information and advise the responsible public entity concerning such records. 710

711 29. Discussion of the award of a public contract involving the expenditure of public funds, including 712 interviews of bidders or offerors, and discussion of the terms or scope of such contract, where 713 discussion in an open session would adversely affect the bargaining position or negotiating strategy of 714 the public body.

715 30. No resolution, ordinance, rule, contract, regulation or motion adopted, passed or agreed to in a 757 closed meeting shall become effective unless the public body, following the meeting, reconvenes in open 758 meeting and takes a vote of the membership on such resolution, ordinance, rule, contract, regulation, or 759 motion that shall have its substance reasonably identified in the open meeting.

760 C. Public officers improperly selected due to the failure of the public body to comply with the other provisions of this section shall be de facto officers and, as such, their official actions are valid until they 761 762 obtain notice of the legal defect in their election.

763 D. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the holding of conferences between two or 764 more public bodies, or their representatives, but these conferences shall be subject to the same 765 procedures for holding closed meetings as are applicable to any other public body.

E. This section shall not be construed to (i) require the disclosure of any contract between the 766 Intervention Program Committee within the Department of Health Professions and an impaired 767 practitioner entered into pursuant to Chapter 25.1 (§ 54.1-2515 et seq.) of Title 54.1 or (ii) require the 768 769 board of directors of any authority created pursuant to the Industrial Development and Revenue Bond 770 Act (§ 15.2-4900 et seq.), or any public body empowered to issue industrial revenue bonds by general or 771 special law, to identify a business or industry to which subdivision A 5 applies. However, such business 772 or industry shall be identified as a matter of public record at least 30 days prior to the actual date of the 773 board's authorization of the sale or issuance of such bonds. 774

§ 23-4.4. Authorization to transfer interest; Governor's approval required under certain circumstances.

775 A. The boards of visitors, the State Board for Community Colleges, or their designees are authorized to assign any interest they possess in intellectual property or in materials in which the institution claims 776 777 an interest, provided such assignment is in accordance with the terms of the institution's intellectual 778 property policies adopted pursuant to subsection A of § 23-4.3. However, the Governor's prior written 779 approval shall be required for transfers of such property developed wholly or predominately through the 780 use of state general funds, exclusive of capital assets, and either (i) such property was developed by an 781 employee of the institution acting within the scope of his assigned duties, or (ii) such property is to be 782 transferred to an entity other than the Innovative Technology Innovation and Entrepreneurship 783 Investment Authority, an entity whose purpose is to manage intellectual properties on behalf of nonprofit 784 organizations, colleges and universities, or an entity whose purpose is to benefit the respective 785 institutions. The Governor may attach conditions to these transfers as he deems necessary. In the event 786 the Governor does not approve such transfer, the materials shall remain the property of the respective 787 institutions and may be used and developed in any manner permitted by law.

788 B. The president of each state-supported institution of higher education, including the chancellor of 789 the Virginia Community College System, shall report annually to the Governor and the Joint 790 Commission on Technology and Science regarding the assignment of any intellectual property interests 791 by that institution.

792 2. That §§ 2.2-2513 through 2.2-2517 of the Code of Virginia are repealed.

793 3. That all appointments to the Innovative Technology Authority, as it exists June 30, 2009, shall 794 expire on July 1, 2009. New appointments shall be made to the Innovation and Entrepreneurship 795 Investment Authority, its successor in interest, pursuant to the provisions of this act. The initial 796 appointment of members in accordance with this act shall be staggered as follows: one of the 797 presidents of a major research state institution of higher education and the president representing 798 other state institutions of higher education for a term of one year; one president of a major 799 research state institution of higher education for a term of two years; the Governor's appointees 800 with entrepreneurial and investment experience for a term of one year; the Governor's appointee with industry experience for a term of two years; Joint Rules' appointee with industry experience 801 for a term of one year; and Joint Rules' appointees with entrepreneurial and investment 802 experience for a term of two years. 803

4. That as of the effective date of this act, the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Investment 804 805 Authority shall be deemed the successor in interest to the Innovative Technology Authority. Without limiting the foregoing, all right, title and interest in and to any real or tangible personal 806 807 property vested in the Innovative Technology Authority as of the effective date of this act shall be transferred to and taken as standing in the name of the Innovation and Entrepreneurship 808

809 **Investment Authority.**
