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## **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 822**

3 Commending Lee Congdon. 4

WHEREAS, as Socrates enjoined, "The unexamined life is not worth living"; and

6 7 WHEREAS, the obligation, challenge, responsibility, and high calling of summoning the young to those examinations of life without which ordered liberty is not possible falls at last upon a small band 8 9 of professors in our colleges and universities; and

10 WHEREAS, Lee Congdon recently retired after 33 years as Professor of History at James Madison 11 University; and

WHEREAS, Professor Congdon was revered by students for the breadth and depth of his learning, 12 his devotion to the life of the mind, his embodiment of the even larger life of the spirit, and his civility; 13 14 and

15 WHEREAS, Professor Lee Congdon complemented his rigorous classroom work by scholarly 16 research and writing, including The Young Lukacs, Exile and Social Thought: Hungarian Intellectuals in Germany and Austria, and Seeing Red: Hungarian Intellectuals in Exile and the Challenge of 17 18 Communism, as well as numerous essays; and

19 WHEREAS, in 1999 the Republic of Hungary expressed its high regard for Professor Congdon's 20 embodiment of and contributions to scholarship and culture by bestowing upon him the country's ancient 21 and prestigious Order of Merit - Small Cross; and

22 WHEREAS, Professor Lee Congdon has, even in retirement, recently crowned his scholarly 23 achievements with a new study of the renowned diplomat George F. Kennan (1904 - 2005) of whom he 24 well declares, "George Kennan was, in my view, the greatest American of the century now ended. I do 25 not say `the most important' American; greatness is a quality of being, a matter of character. Kennan's greatness lay not only in his exemplary service to his country, but in his character, wisdom, and literary 26 27 sensibility"; and

28 WHEREAS, Professor Lee Congdon is a worthy reflection of the subject of his George Kennan: A 29 Writing Life; and

30 WHEREAS, Professor Lee Congdon graduated from Wheaton College, received both the Master of 31 Arts and Doctor of Philosophy (History) degrees from the University of Northern Illinois, served in the 32 intelligence division of the United States Army, and is the husband of Carol Congdon and the father of 33 two grown children; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly hereby 34 35 commend Professor Lee Congdon for his long years of distinguished and devoted service to the students of James Madison University and for his permanent contributions to the community of scholars of the 36 37 Commonwealth, the country, and the civilized world; and, be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates prepare a copy of this resolution 38 39 for presentation to Lee Congdon, Emeritus Professor of History, as an expression of the General 40 Assembly's gratitude for his many achievements and best wishes in all his future endeavors.
